Wisconsin Assembly Speaker Robin Vos is disputing the state elections board's stance that Wisconsin's new campaign finance laws don't require political parties and legislative campaign committees to disclose contributions they receive from corporations. A campaign finance bill Governor Walker signed last month allows corporations to donate up to 12 thousand dollars to parties and legislative committees. Government Accountability Board spokesman Reid Magney says the board believes the law doesn't require reporting corporate donations. Vos obtained a memo from the legislative reference bureau saying the law does require reporting.

Slug: FETAL TISSUE

A key senate republican says she cannot support the current version of an assembly bill designed to ban the sale and use of aborted fetal tissue, because it would stop major medical research being conducted at UW-Madison. Sen. Alberta Darling made those comments just one day after the Assembly Committee on Criminal Justice and Public Safety held a public hearing on the bill. The bill would not only ban the sale of aborted fetal tissue, but the use of any tissue derived from fetuses aborted after 2009. Dr. Robert Golden, Dean of the UW School of Medicine and Public Health, said in the hearing that such a ban would shut down a number of research projects aimed at finding cures and therapies for diseases like cancer, Alzheimer's and Parkinson's.

The Wisconsin State Senate tackles controversial legislation on Wednesday, passing bills targeting Planned Parenthood of Wisconsin. The legislation would effectively take millions of dollars away from Planned Parenthood. Right now, Planned Parenthood can purchase certain prescription drugs such as birth control at a discounted rate, then get reimbursed through Medicaid at the regular price. Republicans voted to pass legislation that would only allow Planned Parenthood to be reimbursed for the price they actually paid.

New figures show tax revenues collected in Wisconsin are down significantly from previous projections. While the state will still have a budget surplus, it's smaller than expected tax revenue came in at just half a percent below expectations. But that amounts to about 90 million dollars. Overall the state will finish the two year budget cycle with a 70 million dollar surplus, rather than the 164 million projected. That drop in revenue will discourage any additional funding for state programs.

Governor Mark Dayton has credited the state's economic performance for the surplus while republicans say Minnesota has overtaxed its citizens.

The photo id requirement was in effect for the first time during the 2012 spring primary election, but a court soon halted its implementation due to ongoing legal challenges.

The federal government wants to lower the legal blood alcohol level allowed to drive. The National Transportation Safety Board is asking states to lower the limit from .08 to .05. Officials say it's a way to reduce alcohol and drug-related crashes. In the last 15 years, one-third of all highway deaths involved alcohol.

Two senior military leaders say women should be required to register for the draft. Restrictions that barred women from combat jobs in the US were lifted by the defense department last year. The current system requires men between 18 and 26 living in the US to register for the selective service

system. They could be called into service in the event a draft is re-established. The last time a draft was used was during the Vietnam War.

Martin Shkreli, the ex CEO of Turing Pharmaceuticals, was on Capitol Hill today during a hearing on drug pricing. Shkreli, named by some last year as "the most hated man in America", was questioned on his actions at Turing. While CEO he hiked prices of a drug used to treat aids and cancer patients from \$13.50 a pill to \$750 a pill. Shkreli took the stand today, but refused to give testimony.

Governor Walker signed a bill today legalizing concealed switchblades and knives at an NRA and Wisconsin Forces convention in Weston. Manufacturing, selling, transporting, purchasing or possessing a switchblade has been illegal in Wisconsin for decades. The republican-authored bill makes all of that legal, and permits anyone who can legally possess a gun to carry concealed knives of any length without a concealed carry license. The bill also bars local governments from enacting knife regulations stricter than state law.

Wisconsin is now the first state to legalize blaze pink for hunting, but for some it left concerns about the motivation behind it. The authors of the bill said they wanted to provide another color option, but also encourage women to get involved in the sport. The President of the Women's Hunting and Sporting Association in Wisconsin said pink is not the right way to do it. The law requires hunters to wear bright orange on at least half of all clothing above the waist.

Now, voters must present a valid ID in order to receive a ballot. Wisconsin driver's licenses, state ID cards and passports are the most common form of acceptable ID. You can also register to vote the same day of the election. One important thing to remember, the City of La Crosse recently redistricted its wards, so double check exactly where you're polling place is. All registered voters received a postcard in the mail detailing where their polling place is located.

Hough submitted she was stepping down with the best interest of her health and family in mind, stating that the decision isn't one that was taken lightly.

Slug: SEX ASSAULT

The State Assembly passed a bill ensuring that sexual assault victims and others who report such crimes can't be cited or disciplined for underage drinking. The bill comes as universities try to increase sexual assault reporting on campus through education and outreach programs. The bill's supporters say the measure would solidify that practice in state law and encourage more reports. The bill now goes to the State Senate.

Slug: WRONGFUL CONVICTION

The Assembly also approved a wrongful conviction compensation bill. People wrongly convicted of crimes in Wisconsin could claim up to \$50,000 for each year spent behind bars. Payouts are now capped at 5,000 for each year with a maximum of \$25,000. The new compensation levels capped at \$1,000,000 total would apply to claims filed by anyone wrongly convicted, released on or after January 1, 1990. The bill would also provide the wrongly convicted with access to the state's health insurance program and transitional services like job training and housing. Now the bill goes to the State Senate.

This proposed bill would require testing water and paint samples for levels of lead in communities that have a high number of cases of lead poisoning.
