Here's another sign of spring; alternate side parking has ended for the season. La Crosse residents can now park their car in any legal space overnight.

Gov. Walker signed a bill today prohibiting people from bothering hunters in the Wisconsin woods. Senate bill 338 expands protection for hunters who may be harassed for lawful hunting, trapping, or fishing.

Minnesota Governor Mark Dayton is banning state employees from non-essential travel to North Carolina because of the state's new law limiting official protections for gays and lesbians and transgender people. Dayton sent a letter to state employees directing them to stop all nonessential travel to North Carolina for conferences or other official business until further notice. Dayton said in a statement quote "when the rights of some Americans are threatened...it is the responsibility of all Americans to stand in opposition to those discriminatory acts."

Slug: SC RE-DISTRICT  
How should the lines for legislative districts be decided for voting? Conservative challengers argued only eligible voters should be considered. But in a unanimous decision today the US Supreme Court ruled that a state can draw legislative districts based on total population. The issue goes back to the 1960's and the "one person, one vote" principle. That's when the court held that state legislative districts must be drawn so they are equal in population. But until today the court never specified whether that doctrine applied to the general population or to the voting population.

La Crosse voters turned out to the polls in large numbers yesterday to vote in the April 5th election. La Crosse County saw a 61 percent voter turnout, about double past April elections, but still about ten percent less than for presidential elections. The high turnout theme stretched throughout Wisconsin. Before the election officials predicted 40 percent turnout, the actual number was 47 percent.

Hundreds of thousands of retirees across the nation could soon find their pension checks slashed by as much as seventy percent unless Congress repeals the 2014 Multi-Employer Pension Reform Act.

Governor Scott Walker is signing bills designed to help crime victims. One measure gives sexual assault victims the right to be accompanied by an advocate when navigating the legal and medical systems. Another increases the funeral and burial allowance to relatives of homicide victims from \$2,000 to \$5,000. Another bill would ensure victims can learn when their offender's parole has been revoked, and the Governor signed a bill giving domestic abuse victims the right to transfer rights to their phone numbers from their abusers to themselves.

Ryan says he just returned from Israel where conversations about ISIS were a focus. Ryan was accompanied by 3rd District Representative Ron Kind. Kind also says recent anti-Muslim comments throughout the course of the presidential campaign have some Sunni nations skeptical of the United States intentions and says full cooperation from European and Middle Eastern countries is critical to destroying ISIS.

Minnesota lawmakers are hosting a public hearing on the controversial Transgender Bathroom Bill and dozens of people on both sides of the debate showed up to voice their concerns. Some lawmakers want to ban schools and businesses from letting transgender people use restrooms and locker rooms that don't match their sex assigned to them at birth. That means, if approved, a transgender person assigned male at birth, but who identifies as a woman could not use the women's restroom. Parents, pastors and those at the center of the debate, transgender men and women all testified before lawmakers.

Senator Elizabeth Warren is filing legislation that would require the IRS to develop a free online tax preparation service you could use to file returns directly with the federal government. Warren says taxpayers spend an average 13 hours preparing their taxes and paying about \$200 for tax preparation services, almost 10 percent of the average federal tax refund. The bill is co-sponsored by a number of senators including Bernie Sanders and Wisconsin's Tammy Baldwin.

Slug: RIGHTWORK

The three labor unions challenging Wisconsin's Right to Work Law want a Dane County judge to prohibit the state from enforcing the law immediately, but the State Department of Justice has other ideas. Right to Work Laws prevent union workplaces from requiring employees to pay union dues, even though all employees benefit from the workplace rules negotiated by the union. Judge William Foust declared the Right to Work Law is unconstitutional because it takes property away from the unions, the mandatory dues of its members, without just compensation. Late Tuesday attorneys for the three unions submitted a proposal that the final judgement state the law is unconstitutional and that it can no longer be enforced anywhere in Wisconsin.

The city council voted to approve Gundersen's request to demolish a block of homes on La Crosse's south side to build a temporary parking lot, but not without an amendment. The properties will be turned into parking space for a period of 5 years. At the end of that time the property will revert back to its previous use. Those in opposition say a parking lot is the worst possible use of this space and that the city should be improving these homes not demolishing them. Gundersen also made its case, saying a temporary parking lot is needed. With the addition of the Gundersen Hotel and the future of its medical residence housing the hospital is losing two parking lots.

The new law requires anyone who uses a public bathroom to go into the room that corresponds with the gender they were born with. The reaction is starting to cost the state economically. Some companies have canceled or threatened to cancel business in North Carolina, and a number of performers have canceled their shows in the state. Now mayors from across the country are banning government travel to the state. Madison Mayor Paul Soglin joins that effort. Gordon Severson has the story.

The treasury department will take Andrew Jackson off the 20-dollar bill. Harriet Tubman will replace him. Treasury Secretary Jack Lew said last year that he would feature a woman on a new version of the 10-dollar bill beside Alexander Hamilton. But now sources say Hamilton will stay on the front of the ten dollar bill by himself. Instead a montage of leaders from the Women's Suffrage Movement will be added to the back of the ten. That redesigned 10-dollar bill is expected to enter circulation by 2020. It will be the first US bill to have a woman on it in more than 100 years. No word on when the twenty-dollar bill with Tubman will go into circulation

The Parks and Recreation Department will pay a consultant to evaluate the pool. The Parks board voted to pay a Platteville-based aquatics company \$17,000 for the evaluation which will detail the necessary repairs should the city go that route.

Meanwhile Governor Scott Walker signed legislation to crack down on drunk drivers. Drivers with four convictions or more will now face a felony charge in Wisconsin regardless of the circumstances of the

case. The law eliminates the so-called look back period, which allowed a fourth offense to still be considered a misdemeanor, as long as it came five years or more after a third offense.

Parking spots in the ramps will allow drivers three hours of free parking between six am and six pm weekdays. Nights and weekend parking will continue to be free until the gate issues are resolved.

Winona's historic Mississippi River Bridge will get a 38-million dollar renovation. The Minnesota Department of Transportation is currently building a new bridge across the Mississippi at Winona. This past February the MN-DOT announced the bridge project was over budget. They paused the process to work through different options for both the new and old bridge. What's new is that MN-DOT has now funded a full 50 year re-hab for the old bridge. MN-DOT narrowed the renovation options down to two including maintaining the old bridges historic look. That work begins later this year. The new Mississippi River Bridge in Winona is expected to be completed by September of this year which is ahead of schedule.

A change in a long term standard in the military as gender roles continue to evolve; young women could soon have to register for the military. The US Senate passed a 602-billion-dollar defense bill which included an amendment that would require women to sign up to serve when they turn 18. This new legislation passed with a landslide vote of 85-13, and a Marine Corps Sargent based in Wausau says this potential change isn't surprising.

A council representing the Eight Great Lakes States has voted to allow Waukesha, Wisconsin unprecedented access to Lake Michigan as its drinking water source. The city of 70,000 in the Milwaukee suburbs won unanimous approval from Eight States that are members of a regional compact designed to prevent far away states from using the water. The city says its groundwater is tainted with radium.

A growing number of jails and prisons around the country are training soon-to-be-released inmates to use the heroin overdose antidote Naloxone, or Narcan, which can reverse the effects of an overdose within minutes. Currently at the La Crosse County Jail, Narcan can be used by jail nurses to help counteract the effects of heroin if necessary, but opponents say giving it to inmates will encourage people to use more.

Two suspects in the homicide of a Tomah man are hoping their confessions to police will be thrown out before trial. Twenty one year-old Sebastian Martinez and 27-year-old Zachary Davis are charged in the homicide of 43 year old Derek Magnuson at the Econo Lodge in Tomah last year. This new approval is hoped to increase capacity for testing in the US as well as shorten the time taken to get a diagnosis. The federal government says someone overdoses on pain medication every 19 minutes. Twenty eight thousand people died from overdoses linked to opioids in 2014, the most recent federal data available. Nearly a third of antibiotic prescriptions in the US are unnecessary. That's according to a new study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association. It's the most in-depth study yet of the use and misuse of antibiotics. The study looked at prescriptions from doctor's offices, ER's and hospital-based clinics from 2010 to 2011, using information from two major CDC surveys. The results mean about 47-million unnecessary prescriptions are written each year in the US. Most of them are for conditions that don't respond to antibiotics, such as viral illnesses. Health officials have warned about the overuse of antibiotics for decades now because they contribute to the creation of antibiotic-resistant bacteria.

Swaddling is when babies are wrapped up tightly in a blanket with just the head exposed. According to the study, swaddled babies placed on their sides or stomachs are twice as likely to die from the syndrome. Researchers say overheating could be a factor. They also suggest that parents who do swaddle their babies pay attention to their position. The risk is less for babies who sleep on their backs.

- A pharmacist is loudly disclosing potentially embarrassing information about one of the people waiting online at prescription pick-up. Will someone tell the pharmacist to quiet down or will everyone listen in?
- A young girl is testing out a demo video game in the store when two boys begin harassing her, telling her "girls can't play video games." Will any of the customers come to the young girl's defense?

- **Surrogate Mom:** A surrogate mom excitedly tells the parents-to-be she is carrying twins, but they want only one baby and refuse to take the second one. How will bystanders react when the parents tell the surrogate to get rid of one of the babies?
- **Drunk Cab Driver:** A cab driver gets drunk on his lunch break and tries getting behind the wheel to continue his shift. How will bystanders react?
- **Overwhelmed Caregiver:** Our actors are a woman and her elderly mother, who needs help doing everything. Traci is at her wit's end – all of the emotion she's bottled up about having to care for her mom boils up and overflows. She complains to her mother about being overwhelmed, and her mother reacts nastily, saying things like, "I'm the one who should be overwhelmed. You're stupid and forgetful." What will people do?
- **Teacher/Student:** A teacher is out with her student helping him "study" when some inappropriate PDA between them starts up. They begin to discuss their relationship, and there seems to be something more going on between them than just tutoring. Do others speak up to protect the boy or stay quiet?
- **Eating Disorder:** Three teen girls are eating lunch together. One of the girls is curious how the other two stay so skinny despite the bad food they eat. They admit to her that they binge and purge, and they encourage her to do the same. How will other diners react to the two "skinny" girls pressuring their friend to take up their unhealthy habit?

But no one did more to keep moms and babies alive than the nurses, including Margie Wyler, who helped a mom deliver her baby during the crisis, and Karla Roth, who sacrificed her own life in a brave attempt to wrestle a gun away from Worthington.
