Slug: ROMEO/JULIETBILL

Wisconsin lawmakers are considering a bill that would reduce the legal consequences for sexual relations between consenting teenagers. Currently sexual contact involving anyone under the age of 18 is illegal regardless of consent. Under the proposed change such contact would still be illegal but would be considered only a misdemeanor rather than a felony. Capitol Bureau Chief Greg Neumann reports on the so called Romeo and Juliet Bill. Cindy Komoroswki fought back tears as she told lawmakers about her teenage son Mitchell. Others told stories of being impacted directly by the state's law pertaining to sex between teens. Currently, that is the potential penalty for sexual contact or intercourse between two people between the ages of 15 and 18. The bill would change the law so 15 to 18 year olds who engage in sex would only face a class a misdemeanor, which a judge could later expunge. The Wisconsin Department of Justice is opposed to the change for that reason. State prosecutors also argue they already have the discretion not to charge in such cases and almost always do. But a UW law professor in favor of the bill disagrees. And Mary Prosser says they shouldn't be treated like felons. A vote on the bill won't happen in the Assembly Committee on Criminal Justice until November at the earliest.

Slug: GOV RACE

The field of candidates for the Democratic Nomination to challenge Governor Walker next fall continues to grow. Former Wisconsin Democratic party chairman Matt Flynn announced his candidacy today. That makes him the eighth Democrat to announce a run, with several more considering it. The 70-year-old Flynn is a retired lawyer. He served as state party chairman in the early 80's and ran unsuccessfully for the US Senate and House of Representatives.

Slug: SANCTUARY

A proposal targeting sanctuary cities in Wisconsin is taking center stage at the state capitol. This controversy started in January when President Trump issued an executive order that would withhold federal funding from sanctuary cities. A federal judge has since blocked that order. As Capitol Bureau Chief Greg Nuemann tells you, the bill's authors say this strictly targets criminals and doesn't require local law enforcement to act as immigration agents. But opponents say it's unconstitutional. An overflow crowd of protestors stood outside the hearing room where lawmakers took testimony on the latest attempt from Wisconsin Republicans to prohibit so-called sanctuary cities. In reality, that term can mean any local unit of government with a policy that prevents cooperation with federal immigration authorities. If a local government failed to comply it could face a loss in shared state revenue of \$500 to \$5,000. The bill's author warns those communities could also lose federal dollars but democrats dispute that. But republicans and supporters of the bill say the courts can decide whether it's constitutional, arguing it is in the public interest. But opponents of the bill say there are already mechanisms in place to achieve that goal, including federal immigration authorities getting a warrant from a judge to make sure local authorities detain an immigrant until federal authorities arrive.

Slug: COULEE COUNCIL

The proposal passed by just one vote. The 10 to 3 vote means the Coulee Council on Addictions can now build its new facility in a south side La Crosse neighborhood. It needed a supermajority to pass because of the large number of people who objected to the zoning change. News 19's Mackenzie

Amundsen just returned from the meeting where people spoke out passionately on both sides. The council kept the room on the edge of their seats all the way up to the final vote. Council members went back and forth, sharing their positions on the issue. Council Member Marcou spoke first against the rezoning. She believed the space should be set aside for single house development to help the neighborhood grow. Council President Gaul and Council Member Janssen ultimately agreed with her stance. They reminded the room that it did not reflect on the importance of Coulee Council on Addictions' work in the community. Council Member Brever argued that if the council supported their work it should be supported fully, including the right to rezone for a new facility. In the end the recovery group got the outcome they've hoped for so long. Thompson says that message is that the La Crosse community cares. The new facility will allow those in recovery to receive more effective holistic treatment. It was standing room only at tonight's meeting with people crowded in the room to show their support for the project. Thompson hopes the victory from tonight's vote will transition that support into raising the remaining funds for the recovery center.

Slug: WAREAGLE

The Council also tonight made another major decision, voting to repeal the historic preservation protection for a downtown building. The vote means Pischke Motors can move forward with demolition of the building. The building features the mural of the War Eagle Riverboat on the side at 520 3rd Street South. The building has stood vacant for more than ten years and is in serious disrepair. Auto dealer Rahn Pischke argued that the building didn't meet the criteria of historic preservation. Barb Kooiman specializes in historic building preservation and she says the building was once home to some of the first bohemian immigrants to La Crosse. After a public hearing, the council voted 10-3 to remove the historic preservation title of the building. Pichke has said he wants to expand his dealership onto the property.

Slug: MARINA MONEY

The Council has also voted to take over operation of the Municipal Boat Harbor. That decision means a nearly two million dollar investment to bring it up to standards. The Isle La Plume Marina will now become part of the city's Parks Department. City Engineering will help with the necessary repair and operations. The money generated from the harbor will go back to the city to repay the reserve fund.

Slug: ALTPARKING

Normally in just two weeks alternate side parking rules take effect in La Crosse, designed to keep cars off one side of the street to make snow removal easier. It used to run from November First through April First, but this year drivers will have two more weeks to park on either side. That's after the City Council voted in September to shorten alternate side parking by 15 days in the fall and 15 days in the spring. Supporters argued there is hardly ever enough snow in early November or early April to warrant it, and that it can be particularly hard on students in off campus housing.

Slug: GUN MOUNT CAM

A Minnesota police department is considering gun-mounted cameras. The West Hennepin Police Department says the technology would help capture clearer footage of confrontations between suspects and police. It mounts directly on an officer's gun and as soon as it's taken out of the holster it automatically turns on. Officials say this feature would eliminate the risk of a camera not turned on. Critics of the technology though say it doesn't capture the interactions that lead up to an officer pulling out his or her gun out.

Slug: SCHIMEL

We won't find out until next spring whether the US Supreme Court will order Wisconsin to draw new legislative districts. Earlier this month the court heard arguments in the so called Gerrymandering case. At issue is whether republicans who drew the new maps since they had control of the State Assembly and Senate and the Governor's office intended to make it virtually impossible for democrats to compete for seats in certain districts. They do that by packing democratic voters into some districts in order to reduce their influence in others, a process called gerrymandering. Wisconsin Attorney General Brad Schimel believes the court will rule in the states favor due to legal and practical considerations. Schimel says the current districts meet legal guidelines in that they are close in population, compact in size and contiguous, meaning they share a common border.

Slug: BUDGET SURPLUS

Wisconsin finished the fiscal year with a 579 million dollar surplus. The surplus came in 126 million dollars more than expected. Governor Walker attributes the surplus to pro-taxpayer and pro-growth reforms. Democratic Senate Minority Leader Jennifer Shilling says it's misleading to say the state has a surplus when Governor Walker is putting off road projects and underfunding local schools. Shilling compared the state's surplus to a family with money in its bank account but refuses to pay its bills on time.

Slug: PRAT FOLLOW UP

La Crosse County voters gave their okay to a special tax to pay for road repairs last spring but it was just an advisory referendum, the first step in a long process that won't bring in funds in time to meet current needs. The tax would bring in about 6 million dollars a year for transportation projects. Today Representative Steve Doyle and Senator Jennifer Shilling officially introduced legislation that would allow for a binding referendum on the premier resort area tax or prat. The county says it blames the funding crunch in part on the delay on the state budget which lawmakers turned in three months late, but it also says the state's inaction on long term transportation solutions certainly doesn't help matters. La Crosse County currently has 87 million dollars in deferred maintenance on projects covering about 285 miles and 69 bridges it oversees. That doesn't even include all of the towns, cities and villages deferred maintenance for transportation infrastructure.

Slug: LAX AND SHELBY

The deal is complex and multi-faceted, and those interested in specifics can attend a public hearing next month; details on that in a moment. In general terms it brings an end to disputes between the two by setting up a plan to encourage growth without boundary conflicts and to establish rules for annexation of properties. Mayor Tim Kabat and Town of Shelby chairman Tim Candahl made the announcement today. The new agreement also opens doors for possible partnerships in nature trails, increased school enrollment and a library system. An informational meeting is scheduled for November seventh at 6pm at Central High School, a chance for those affected to ask questions. The deal needs approval from the State Department of Administration.

Slug: COUNTY BUDGET

As the La Crosse County Board works out the details of its 2018 budget those discussions include setting pay increases for all county employees. The increase would be about 1.5% more than current pay rates. La Crosse County Board Supervisors qualify as county employees so the pay increase would apply to them as well. Tara Johnson, Chair of the La Crosse County Board, says the increase would take supervisor's monthly pay from \$411 to \$417.

Slug: GROUNDWATER

Local environmentalists plan to host a forum about groundwater this Tuesday in the Town of Holland. The forum comes after wells in Brice Prairie and Holland tested positive for bacteria and high levels of nitrates. The contaminated water poses health risks especially for children and pregnant women. Patrick Wilson, Chair of the Coulee Region Sierra Club, says the forum is designed to educate people about contaminated groundwater and possible solutions. He says clean water is a priority for many across the country. Wilson says it's the first time an environmental issue has made the top ten fears in that survey. The groundwater forum is this Tuesday October 24th at the Town of Holland Town Hall starting at 7pm. The forum is open to everyone.

Slug: DAYTON MN LEGISLATURE

Taxpayers in the State of Minnesota have shelled out hundreds of thousands of dollars to fund the ongoing legal battle between Governor Mark Dayton and the State Legislature. So far costs are nearing in on 1 million dollars. It comes after the Republican controlled legislature filed a lawsuit against the Governor earlier this year. That lawsuit aims to undo Dayton's line item veto of the House and Senate's operating budgets. While the legal battle rages on Dayton says the entire process has been unnecessary. The fate of funding for the 201 lawmakers and more than 400 staffers is in the hands of the Supreme Court, which ruled the veto constitutional.

Slug: MUNICIPAL COURT

Onalaska's City Attorney has completed a review of record keeping and data entry at the Coulee Region Joint Municipal Court. That court, located inside Onalaska City Hall, handles ordinance and traffic tickets in 8 towns and cities. City Administrator Eric Rindfleisch requested that review following the termination of the Joint Municipal Clerk last August. The court now has a new clerk. The review by Attorney Sean O'Flaherty sought to determine first, whether money paid from tickets had been mishandled or misappropriated, second, to determine whether defendants had been overcharged or not had judgments released following payment and finally, to determine whether processes were either inadequate or not followed. O'Flaherty's cursory review found funds "do not appear to have been misappropriated." Payments "appear to have been properly credited" and the report says "issues appear to be the result of an increase in tickets over time and a failure of the clerk's office to follow office procedures." The report also says the office failed to adapt to changes in rules and did not adapt to and use technology and the review cites "disorganization and lack of office discipline." An accounting firm will now examine the issue and release its report in early December.

Slug: GERRYMANDER

As the US Supreme Court considers Wisconsin's political redistricting case known as the Gerrymandering Case, tonight The League of Women Voters and UW La Crosse Political Science Department hosted a forum encouraging non-partisan voter maps. The court is considering whether the republican drawn districts unfairly tilt the playing field in their own favor. News 19's Mackenzie Amundsen has just returned from the forum that featured mostly democrats, but one former republican lawmaker as well. There was a full lecture hall tonight in Wimberley Hall with voters of all ages attending the fair voter maps forum. Those in attendance were asked if they knew what gerrymandering was. Almost every hand went up. One UW-La Crosse student even gave a textbook definition. For Emily Bunting, plaintiff on the Gill v. Whitford, the case is about more than just winning or losing it's about an opportunity to educate the public about the process of drawing district lines and making sure they are drawn fairly. Former State Senator Dale Schulz spoke on the panel. As a republican he said that the issue is not partisan. He got involved out of a sincere desire to make the system better. All four local and state panelists acknowledged that there is no simple solution to getting rid of partisan gerrymandering. However they all agree that the process of drawing district lines needs to be taken out of the hands of politicians. Every month The League of Women Voters hosts a forum on a different political issue. On November 14 the La Crosse Area Family Collaborative will address issues related to poverty.

Slug: PARKS AUDIT

La Crosse City Council members are looking to spend \$30,000 on an external audit of the Parks Department, a response to the mayor ordering an internal audit of major parks projects both completed and ongoing. The goal is to be more transparent to the public. But some council members now want to take that a step further. News 19's Sam Shilts joins us tell us why following the mayor's request some council members said they wanted a bigger picture on how the city does their financial business when it comes to park projects. After the new band shell project announcement some told their council reps that they were concerned about where their tax money or private donations were going, and raised an issue that there was not a way for them to track that. Council members felt that an external set of eyes lent itself to a more thorough look. Marshall said it's important to note that the audit is not about the people or leadership at the Parks Department but of the financial processes, and being able to locate any weaknesses therein. As for the auditor, the council is looking to Wipfli but it first has to pass the Finance and Personnel Meeting on November 2nd and the following Common Council Meeting on November 9th. News 19 reached out to Parks Director Steve Carlyon. He declined to comment. The audit will cover the department's past three years of expenditures.

Slug: BOAT EVICTION

A change in operation at the La Crosse Municipal Boat Harbor has led to eviction notices for boat owners, leaving some with no place to turn as winter approaches. A company called Rupel Lewandowski bought the harbor assets and is under orders from the city to remove the docks by December first. Owners of boats docked in the harbor must remove their boats immediately. Many have already paid fees they thought would allow them to keep their boats in the water over the winter, but the city says in order to make repairs and have the marina open next spring the docks and boats must be removed immediately. The city says removing the docks is required to comply with the Department of Natural Resources. The DNR says there is no valid permit for the current harbor structure and it is a public safety and environmental hazard. The city plans to spend 1 point 8 million dollars redoing the harbor next year.

Slug: WALKER FENTANYL

Governor Scott Walker has signed a bill aimed at deadly opioids known as fentanyl analogs. Fentanyl is a synthetic opioid far more powerful than heroin and its analogs have slight variants in the chemical makeup. They have been blamed for a spike in overdoses around Wisconsin. The bill Walker signed was passed just Thursday night in the assembly. It would add fentanyl analogs to the synthetic opiates category of controlled substances. That would make it easier for prosecutors to go after manufacturers. Possessing, manufacturing or dealing a fentanyl analog would be a felony.

The public got its first in depth look at the proposed boundary agreement between the City of La Crosse and the Town of Shelby. The two hammered out the agreement over a two year period with a goal of having both benefit from Economic Development and Public Services. The two announced last month an agreement in principle. Tonight they presented their draft to residents hoping to answer their questions and hear their comments. The agreement still faces scrutiny. It must pass planning commissions from communities then the Town Board and City Council, and then the State Department of Administration must give its okay.

Slug: MARINA UPDATE

There is an update now on the La Crosse Municipal Boat Harbor. Last Thursday boat owners got an eviction letter to move their boats as soon as possible. Many boat owners were frustrated at the seemingly sudden notice and as News 19's Mackenzie Amundsen explains, boat owners still in the harbor say communication has not gotten any better. People with boats still in the harbor tell me that yesterday they received an email notifying them that power would be shut off today. Only a fraction of the boats in the harbor last week are still docked there today. Since the notice, many owners have removed their boats as a crew with Rupel Lewandowski Holdings works to remove the docks. The City Attorney gave Rupel Lewandowski Holdings 30 days to clear the docks from the harbor. They plan to cut power to the boats in an effort to get remaining boats out of the harbor and meet that deadline.

Slug: COMMON COUNCIL

Some major topics are set for discussion at tonight's Common Council meeting that began just moments ago. News 19's Mackenzie Amundsen has the story. It's a busy night here at City Hall. Council members came an hour earlier than normal for their monthly meeting to look at potential La Crosse Center designs. Now council members will weigh in on those proposals that cost an estimated 37-million to 46-million dollars. After that meeting they will vote on two resolutions with major impacts for the Parks and Recreation Department. Last week the Finance and Personnel Committee voted 4-2 in favor of an external review of the department. With a number of major parks projects happening in the city, the review comes after taxpayers voiced concerns about how their dollars are being spent. Tonight the full council will vote on allocating 30-thousand dollars to an external audit of the parks department over the last three years. Those in favor of the audit say it's in an effort to create transparency between the department and the community. Also on the agenda, a resolution to present the River Architects with an estimate of construction costs for Veterans Memorial Pool.

Slug: HEMP

Wisconsin would join a majority of other states in allowing the farming of industrial hemp under a bill sent to Gov. Scott Walker. Supporters of the change say hemp is often unfairly and inaccurately linked to marijuana. The Wisconsin Assembly passed the bill unanimously Thursday. It cleared the Senate unanimously Tuesday and now goes to Walker. His spokesman said Walker would review the bill but did not commit to signing it. The proposal would establish state licenses for farmers who want to grow industrial hemp. People with drug convictions wouldn't be eligible for the licenses. The plants couldn't contain more than 0.3 percent THC, the active ingredient in marijuana. At least 30 states have passed legislation allowing hemp farms.

Slug: RON KIND

Republican lawmakers released their rewrite of the tax code on November second. The one-point-five-trillion-dollar plan would cut the corporate tax rate from 35% to 20% and establish three tax brackets, replacing the seven that exist now. Republican lawmakers claim the bill will help America compete with the rest of the world while other lawmakers see it differently. House republicans hope to pass the legislation before Thanksgiving. They will vote on the plan sometime this week.

Slug: COBOARDPREVIEW

The La Crosse County Board Meeting is underway. Supervisors are listening to public input on the 20-18 budget. As News 19's Mackenzie Amundsen explains, the budget is just one agenda item that could have an impact on county residents. It's a relatively short agenda tonight for the La Crosse County Board Meeting. However, Chair Tara Johnson says they will be making decisions on a number of items that will impact not only the residents of La Crosse County but also residents in neighboring counties. Supervisors will have the chance to approve a staffing proposal that would fill the 4H and the Agricultural Educator positions in the La Crosse County UW Extensions Department. Johnson says those positions have been unfilled for nearly two years. She says they're necessary to the county where agriculture is a large part of the economy. Supervisors will also address mosquitoes. Johnson says the county has gone above and beyond what they've been mandated in disease-control and pest prevention. She says being located along the Mississippi River naturally brings more insects into the area. Although the disease-control will continue pest prevention could be cut. She says this will have an effect not only on La Crosse County but other counties in the area who also use the services. Supervisors will also vote to apply for community development block grant funding that would help with recent flood damage. La Crosse County qualified for emergency funding this summer. That money would not only help out La Crosse County but also 11 neighboring counties in the area and finally after going through all of the other items on the agenda the county board will start discussing the budget. Before tonight's monthly meeting, there is a public hearing regarding the 2018 budget. Johnson says they will listen to public input and depending on how long tonight's meeting goes they could decide to wait until tomorrow before they cast their vote. Johnson says the proposed budget is solid. It moves La Crosse County to the sixth lowest per capita of all 72 counties. The tax rate will also go down 14-cents per 100-thousand.

Slua: VETO

Less than an hour ago La Crosse Mayor Tim Kabat vetoed a resolution authorizing an outside audit of the Park and Recreation Department. In a letter to council members the Mayor writes the legislation is vague in scope, duplicates current auditing practices and accuses staff without identifying any specific problems; that letter from the mayor sent to council members today.

Slug: ELECTION COMMISH

The head of Wisconsin's Elections Commission says a 28% reduction in staff weakens security of the State's voting systems, this at a time when concerns about Russian interference in elections is forcing officials to make additional safeguards. The commission wants the legislature to approve hiring three additional staff members, with two of them focusing on election security issues. A third position would focus on educating voters about such things as Wisconsin's voter identification law. The commission plans to vote Monday on the recommendation to ask for money to hire the staff. It comes after Gov. Scott Walker signed a state budget that cut six positions.

Slug: PIPELINE APPROV

Nebraska regulators voted today to approve a route for the Keystone XL Pipeline through the state; that vote coming just days after a pipeline spill in South Dakota. Nebraska officials say state law did not allow regulators to consider pipeline safety as a factor in their decision the Keystone developer says it's going to review the regulator's decision however because what was approved was a different route through the state than what the company preferred. Now the US State Department is looking into whether Nebraska's approval of that modified route will affect the federal permit the pipeline developer received in March.

Slug: FBI CHECKS

Tens of thousands more Americans became eligible to legally buy guns this year. Their names were purged from the National Criminal Background Check database after the FBI narrowed its interpretation of who is a "fugitive from justice." Gun purchases can now only be denied to fugitives who cross state lines. Firearms used to be off limits to anybody with an outstanding warrant. The change in policy happened at the end of the Obama administration but wasn't implemented until February.

Slug: DEER CARCASSES

Have you noticed a higher number of dead deer on the side of the road recently? It's likely because some aren't getting removed from Wisconsin highways as quickly as they're being run down, as officials adjust to a new carcass pickup system. A provision in the state budget transferred responsibility for picking up dead deer from the Department of Natural Resources to the Department of Transportation. That change took effect in September. Contracted vendors are supposed to remove deer carcasses within two business days of a report. The Capital Times reports some carcasses on Interstate 94 appear to have been there longer than two days. Some officials say they weren't informed of the switch of responsibility from the DNR to the DOT.

Slug: JOHNSON TAXES

Republican Senator Ron Johnson says he still intends to vote against the Republican tax bill unless changes are made. Johnson says he's working diligently with other Senate Republicans who have similar concerns to fix the problems. He says the proposal doesn't cut business taxes enough for "pass through" partnerships and corporations. Those are businesses in which profits are passed onto the owners, who report the income on their individual tax returns. Johnson is set to vote in the Senate Budget Committee today on the measure.

Slug: HARBOR

The Municipal Boat Harbor in La Crosse will open next May as scheduled after the Park Board unanimously approved the new design. This was the second design drawn by the Parks and Recreation Department. Boaters rejected the first draft earlier this month, angry with the number of spaces for houseboats and overall congestion. Members of the Parks Department worked with the boaters to address those issues and create a draft that would make both sides happy. With a short public hearing and no complaints about the design the Harbor Project will move forward. The Park Board will continue to meet with boat harbor users regularly as the process moves forward. Smalley hopes communication between all parties involved continues in the future.

Todd Kendhammer says his wife Barbara died in a freak accident last year but the sheriff's department says otherwise. He's facing first degree intentional homicide charges in his wife's death. Now, just a few weeks before his trial, he says he does not want a jury to visit the scene of the alleged crime. As we've reported on September 16th, deputies responded to a crash on County Road M near Bergum Coulee Road. When they arrived they found Todd Kendhammer and his wife Barbara. He told investigators they were driving north when a pipe fell from a southbound truck and went through the windshield, striking his wife. However, the investigators say Barbara's autopsy was inconsistent with her husband's story and arrested him last December in connection with her death. This week a La Crosse County Circuit Court judge will decide if jurors will visit the scene of the alleged crime during the trial, which takes place December 4th through the 15th. Kendhammer's attorneys argue jurors do not need to visit the scene, especially during a different season than the incident occurred in. Rather, they argue the jury can rely on hundreds of photographs and videos taken by investigators. Prosecutors say visiting the scene will help the jury better understand the circumstances surrounding Kendhammer's conflicting statements.

Slug: CAR IN HOUSE

One person is in custody after crashing their car into a north side home following a high speed chase with police. The La Crosse Police Department says an officer on patrol recognized a stolen vehicle in the Menards parking lot on La Crosse's north side. When the officer attempted to contact the driver, 20 year old Trevor Maloney, he drove away. A short time later police located the car again in the 30 block of Copeland Avenue, but again, Maloney drove off. Police chased him for a short time but say they stopped when speeds reached dangerous levels. Moments later police found the car again, crashed into a home on the 500 block of Gould Street. But the pursuit was not over. Maloney managed to flee on foot after the crash. Sergeant Walsh says he's not aware of any injuries during the incident. The investigation continues.

La Crosse police say the suspect in an attempted armed robbery Saturday night was shot with the very gun he stole earlier in the evening. Police say they responded to a call for an attempted armed robbery around 9:30 Saturday night outside of Vick's Bar on Mormon Coulee Road; minutes later police received a call from someone saying their gun had been stolen from their vehicle, parked at Vick's Bar and then later that night, another call came in, only this one from a man who had been shot in the

shoulder. Police were able to link all of the incidents to Mackey Drake, who they say broke into the vehicle, stole the hand gun, attempted to rob someone at Vick's Bar and then went to a home on 23rd Street South where another juvenile accidentally shot him. La Crosse police say they've seen a 157% increase in gun related calls since 2010. Captain Melby says a combination increased training and diligence on the streets helps officers be prepared and stay safe.

Slug: SEX-SCHILLING

The Holmen School District says a high school educational assistant has been arrested on suspicion of charges related to sexual assault of a child. Forty seven year-old timothy schilling is facing charges of first degree sexual assault, repeated first degree sexual assault of the same child and child abuse with the intent to cause harm. In a letter to parents the district says there is no evidence the current charges involve the school district or its students. The district goes on to say the charges are considered a confidential personnel matter and Schilling has been placed on unpaid leave. The former Stanford University swimmer who was convicted last year of sexually assaulting an unconscious woman and spent only three months in jail is appealing his convictions and requesting a new trial. Lawyers for Brock Turner filed an appeal Friday claiming their client was denied due process during his 2016 trial and calling it "fundamentally unfair." Turner was charged after two Stanford graduate students witnessed the assault taking place in January 2015 while they were riding bicycles near Stanford. He was 19 at the time. A jury in Santa Clara County found Turner guilty in March 2016 on three felony counts.

Prosecutors say 47 year old Todd Kendhammer killed his wife then concocted a bizarre story to cover it up. Barbara Kendhammer died in September of 2016. Her husband says it was a freak car accident. Prosecutors say otherwise. Today attorneys for both sides laid out their case to jurors in opening statements before they began calling witnesses. News 19's Caroline Hecker is live at the La Crosse County courthouse with some of the evidence presented today. We knew quite a bit of what the prosecution was going to try to convince the jury of going into today. Perhaps its biggest revelation to the jury is that surveillance video along County Road M does not show the flatbed truck Todd Kendhammer described as the one a pipe fell off of within the time frame of the incident. The jury began its day visiting the scene on Bergum Coulee Road, spending just about 20 minutes observing where prosecutors say the car ended up and where the pipe was found. Opening statements followed with the defense portraying Todd Kendhammer as a happily married man of 25 years who "never argued" with his wife. They contend because Todd was questioned so extensively immediately following the accident, an emotionally stressful time, it explains why his explanation of what happened leading up to the incident is so inconsistent. Surveillance video also a major point of the prosecution's argument, one of the biggest questions of the day revolved around that surveillance video. The quality was not very good and the time stamp on the video was 12 hours fast. The defense argued the nothing was used to corroborate the time. Testimony will continue through the rest of the week. If convicted Todd

Charges were filed against a La Crosse man for repeated sexual assault and physical abuse of a child. Prosecutors have also charged 47-year old Timothy Schilling with 4 counts of disorderly conduct. According to the criminal complaint the assaults and abuse happened over a 6 year period beginning when the child was 6-years old. The repeated sexual assault charge has a maximum sentence of 60-years. Schilling had worked as an educational assistant in the Holmen School District. The district informed parents there is no evidence the charges involved the district or students. Schilling was placed on unpaid leave after his arrest.

The first week of the Todd Kendhammer homicide trial wrapped up today with expert testimony. Among those taking the stand, a Crash Reconstructionist from the State Patrol and a forensic analyst also from the Wisconsin Crime Lab. News 19's Mackenzie Amundsen is following the trial. The prosecution worked through those experts to raise questions about how the incident happened. Crash Reconstructionist Mike Marquardt used the laws of physics to raise doubts about a pipe hitting the passenger side of Kendhammer's car. Nick Stahlke also took the stand today. He's a forensic analyst with the Wisconsin Crime Lab. In a series of photos Stahlke also showed that there was no blood on the backrest or headrest of the passenger seat. He also found that the windshield was likely fractured three times before the pipe penetrated through the windshield. The defense worked to discredit those witnesses during the cross examination. They questioned how the experts arrived at their conclusions and emphasized alternative scenarios they argued could also be true. The prosecution will wrap up its case next week then the defense will start begin witnesses. News 19 will continue its live stream coverage of the trial starting Monday morning around 8:30. Slug: JURY

The Kendhammer jury is made up of eleven women and four men, three of whom are alternates. The case has shined a light on the jury selection process. The Sixth Amendment to the Constitution guarantees the right to trial by impartial jury. News 19's Sam Shilts shows us how the selection process works and why that process is so important to a fair trial. Should you be called upon, It is a required service, although in La Crosse County your chances of having to serve each year are pretty low. Out of 7500 names picked at random each year only about 2 to 3 hundred serve on trials in La Crosse County, the selection process for which needs to be thorough, to be fair. Being too close to the trial or having feelings one way or the other even slightly will lead to a juror being struck from the panel. The process is long, arduous and frustrating in some cases. But the clerk here says all of that is worth it, a crucial part in ensuring a fair trial with a jury of one's peers. Though many don't like the idea of serving jury duty your chances of having to do so in La Crosse are pretty low. Of all cases this year, only 29 actually went to trial with between two and three hundred people total serving on those juries. There's a six percent chance you'll be selected for the 7500 names in the jury pool and only a three percent chance of actually serving on a jury.

Slug: RITTER

Twenty five year old Brandon Ritter plead guilty in October to delivery of methamphetamine and an amended charge of second degree recklessly endangering safety. The charges stem from a controlled drug buy in December of 2016 in which Ritter sold more than \$380 worth of methamphetamine to a confidential informant. News 19's Caroline Hecker was in the courtroom and is here with more on what Brandon Ritter had to say. Investigator Jim Mancuso, the officer struck by Ritter says he's still suffering from chronic pain in his upper back and shoulder blade after being thrown onto the hood of Ritter's car nearly a year ago. After undergoing more than 8 months of rehab and continual doctor visits he says not a day goes by that he doesn't think of December 22, 2016. Mancuso says when he received the call that night he had a bad feeling about it, mostly because he knew who they were dealing with, Brandon Ritter. After the controlled buy in the Holmen Festival Foods parking lot Mancuso says he exited his vehicle to take Ritter into custody but that's when he says he made eye contact with Ritter, who threw the car in drive and slammed on the gas. Mancuso jumped up, landing on the roof and fired several shots at Ritter, who eventually surrendered after driving into a snowbank. Here's what Ritter had to say today at his sentencing. Ritter's defense claims because the investigators were dressed in street clothes, with weapons and had no emergency lights flashing he did not know they were police and thought he might be getting robbed. As Mancuso continues to deal with the injuries he suffered that night he told the court he won't let it stop him from continuing his career. Brandon Ritter is currently serving a sentence for a burglary conviction in 2009. He will serve both sentences for this case consecutively after he completes that sentence.

Slug: SEBASTIAN

A suspect in the 2015 homicide of a Tomah man will spend the next 10 years in prison. Twenty three year old Sebastian Martinez pled guilty earlier this year to robbery with use of force and harboring a felon in connection with the death of 43 year old Derek Magnuson. As we reported last fall 27 year old Zachary Davis was convicted of first degree intentional homicide in Magnuson's death. Davis and Martinez were last seen with Magnuson in a room at the Econo Lodge in Tomah in March of 2015. The next day Magnuson's body was discovered covered in stab wounds from a machete. Davis and Martinez were later arrested in Tennessee. During Davis' trial last September Martinez testified against him saying he was afraid of Davis and just "went along with it". As a result the felony murder charge against him was dropped. Today Martinez was sentenced to 8 years of initial confinement for the robbery of Magnuson and two years for aiding a felon.

Slug: JAKUBOWSKI

It was last April when Jakubowski went on his crime spree. In court today the judge at times struggled to understand his motive for writing an anti-government manifesto to President Trump, stealing guns, and becoming a fugitive. In the end the judge sent Jakubowski to jail for 14 years. As reporter Tony Galli tells you Jakubowski tried to explain his actions, sometimes with profanity, claiming government has failed him. Joseph Jakubowski's statement during his sentencing turned into a rapid fire back and forth between the former fugitive and Judge William Conley, with Jakubowski's anti-government philosophies summed up by his statement to the judge. Give me freedom or give me death, followed by an expletive to the judge and reminiscent of Jakubowski's recent interview with 27 News. Judge Conley's assessment was that Jakubowski was a "broken" man, the product of an abusive, toxic childhood, a man needing to have his anti-government philosophies mature. Jakubowski himself revealed that a psychiatric evaluation found him to be schizoid, paranoid, with personality disorder, and alcoholism. Even the judge's warnings stolen guns still missing from Jakubowski's run from the law could fall into the wrong hands failed to convince Jakubowski to reveal their location. The US Attorney in Madison believes Jakubowski's 14-year sentence, six years less than the maximum still sent a message. Jakubowski had been prepared to make a violent, stand to avoid capture and said Jakubowski's actions could be considered terrorism, although he was not charged with that. Jakubowski spent ten days on the run before his capture in Vernon County between Readstown and Viola in April. A farmer found him camping on his property and notified authorities who arrested him without incident.

Black River Falls attorney James Ritland was sentenced yesterday. In August Ritland plead guilty to two counts of attempted adultery and one count of disorderly conduct. Ritland will also undergo a sex offender assessment which could result in being placed on the sex offender registry. A judge today sentenced one of the girls in the so called Slenderman case to spend up to 25 years in a state mental hospital. Anissa Weier is now 16 years old. She was 12 when she and another girl attacked a classmate in order to please a fictional online character called Slenderman. The victim survived but still bears the emotional and physical scars. Weier had pleaded guilty but not responsible for her actions due to mental illness. A jury agreed. The sentence means Weier must spend at least two and a half years in the facility but can petition for release after that. She expressed regret in court today. The other girl charged16 year old Morgan Geyser, was also found not guilty by mental illness. She faces sentencing in February.

A La Crosse man faces arson charges for a fire last week that damaged a downtown apartment building. Forty-three year old Edward Foster made a court appearance today. According to police Foster admitted starting a fire in a first floor trash room by lighting a paper bag and putting it in a dumpster inside the Market Square Building in downtown La Crosse. The fire forced the evacuation of the 62 residents of the complex. Prosecutors have not yet filed formal charges. He is currently held at the La Crosse County jail on a \$10,000 cash bond.

Slug: CRIME YEAR IN REVIEW

We begin our year in review series tonight focusing on crime and court stories that dominated headlines in the La Crosse area. News 19's Caroline Hecker is here with a look back at some of the most notable stories. With all of the good things happening in La Crosse in 2017 comes the bad, a mixture of drugs, violence and officer involved shootings were some of the unwanted headlines of the year. News 19 was there for all of them. Take a look. The first half of 2017 remained relatively quiet in the La Crosse area but as summer got underway and temperatures began to rise law enforcement in our area got busy. In July 19 year old Deshawn Huff led La Crosse police on a high speed chase through downtown in a stolen car. Dash cam video shows Huff turning down Norplex Drive, losing control and crashing into Swift Creek. Huff later died as a result of the crash. Later that month La Crescent police officers were involved in a shootout on Highway 16 just outside of town. Video released shows officer Ryan Guanrud approaching the stopped vehicle when a shot is fired out the driver's side window. The two suspects, Wyatt Helfrich and William Wallraff, led police on a high speed chase, eventually ending outside of Caledonia. Officers Ryan Guandrud and Christopher Frick were cleared of any wrongdoing. Wallraff and Helfrich are jailed on 1st degree attempted murder charges. In August 65-year-old Rebecca Berdt was killed after being hit by an impaired driver on Sand Lake Road. The driver of that car, 34-year-old Corey Bolstad, currently faces five charges including homicide by intoxicated use of a vehicle. A week later La Crosse police officers fatally shot 54 year old Roger Burzinski after police say he carjacked a woman at Houska Park with her child in the back seat and led them on a pursuit through town. Both officers involved in the shooting were cleared of any wrongdoing. Also in August the last suspect in a major meth trafficking operation stemming back to 2015 was sentenced to prison. Twenty nine year old Adam Vang was sentenced to 3 1/2 years in prison for his role in the multi-state enterprise. In September Town of Campbell police responded to an apparent murder suicide. Police say 50 year old Kevin Manix fatally shot 46 year old Patricia Manix. The couple was going through the process of a divorce. In early December 33 year old Dustin Bagstad, a La Crosse school district employee, was arrested and charged with 10 counts of sexual assault of a child. He's accused of sexually assaulting a student at Logan High School where he worked as a part time show choir director. If convicted, he faces 424 years in prison. Most recently 47 year old Todd Kendhammer was convicted of killing his wife Barbara in September of 2016 and staging it as a freak car accident. A jury deliberated for 9 hours before finding Kendhammer guilty of first degree intentional homicide. He'll be sentenced in March. Also this year statistics from the La Crosse Police Department show a 157% increase in gun calls in the city between 2010 and 2017 between the dates of January 1 through mid-November. Another sad but notable story; La Crosse K-9 Officer Brutus passed away shortly after retiring from the department. You'll also remember a nationwide manhunt for Joseph Jakubowski ended in Vernon County in April when a local farmer discovered him on his property. Charged with federal gun crimes, Jakubowski was sentenced to 14 years in prison last week.

The Wisconsin Supreme Court has ruled that Debra Sands, the ex fiancée to John Menard, is not entitled to ownership share of the Menards building supply stores. The ruling came yesterday in a 5 to 2 decision. The High Court says Sands failed to show how her contributions increased Menards assets and she and Menard were not in a joint enterprise. But Sands attorney says plenty of evidence shows Sands worked for Menards and that Sands cared for John Menard's personal life. Sands filed her lawsuit in 2008, two years after the couple split.

Slug: CORN HARVEST

Fall means harvest season across the Midwest Corn and soybean crops are already in or are nearly ready. Weather is always a concern. News 19's followed up with a farmer in Trempealeau County and joins us now with how he says this year's harvest is turning out. In June we spoke with HV Acres owner Shane Goplin who was worried that the heavy rains and flooding in spring might have a negative effect on crop yields and quality. Now a little over three months later, Shane says yield and quality are good, but it's harvesting itself that is going to prove difficult. It is harvest time for corn crops in the Midwest. Just a few months prior, some were worried about how it would turn out and were just hoping to make it through. Heavy rains were rampant and threatened to severely lower yields, but that tune has changed after a long dry period in the late season. It's not the last word from those heavy rains though. The harvest itself may now see challenges, meaning there's a worry of machinery getting stuck in unseen ditches or washouts, meaning this year more than many knowing your fields and their troublesome areas saves time and money in the future, one final hurdle on a particularly difficult growing season. Goplin says he uses a variety of ways to locate problem areas over the course of the growing season including walkthroughs by foot, flying drones and even befriending someone who owns their own helicopter to survey the crops. Following that, it becomes somewhat of a surgical procedure to make sure the equipment and the operators stay safe during this year's harvest. In an effort to improve soil health after harvesting corn Goplin plants rye grass to take root and provide a matted surface which aids in decreasing soil erosion before the next planting season.

A wet autumn has some Minnesota farmers facing a delayed harvest. Harvesting crops in a soggy field can compact the soil, which may stunt the next growing season. Farmers say they're concerned that pushing the harvest too late could run the risk of snow. But even if crops get harvested before winter, they could be wet, causing mold and fungus to grow. But despite those worries, one Minnesota farmer is facing the situation with a smile. Todd Bergman has been harvesting sugar beets in Lake Park Minnesota for years, completely dressed in costumes. He said it started as a way to cheer people up. Life wasn't always fun for Berman though. A near fatal crash left him in a coma for 5 months. But he says he used the experience to bring joy to others in times of need and it's gained him quite the following.

La Crosse County has struck a deal with the state to hire two new agents in the extension office. The County has been without an Agricultural Education Agent and 4-H Agent for more than 2 years. The UW-Extension System has been forced to operate shorthanded because of a state hiring freeze. In the past the state would cover 60% of the salary and benefits of an agent. The county would pitch in the other 40%. The new proposal would flip those numbers. Johnson says agriculture is one of the largest trade industries in La Crosse County. She hopes to have the agent positions filled by the end of this year.

Slug: CRANBERRY

Wisconsin leads the nation in cranberry production. Massachusetts is a distant second. But supply is growing faster than demand, and the industry is looking outside the US for help. News 19's Sam Shilts visited the Cutler Cranberry Company in Camp Douglas where growers met with potential overseas buyers. In the late 90's, only 5% of cranberries were exported out of the US. That number is closer to 35% now, but cranberry growers say there's still a lot of work to be done. Twenty potential buyers from India and China toured Cutler's Marsh and facilities this afternoon, learning the history of cranberries, how they are grown and how they can be used. That last part is important, because in these markets which have approximately 3 billion people between the two, cranberries are a relatively new product. The combined markets in India and China are about 10 times larger than that in the US, just based on population. Right now the cranberry industry in Wisconsin employs about 4,000 people, and some growers say tapping into these new markets could not only address an oversupply problem, it could help expand the industry in the future. Following a tour at Cutler Cranberry buyers from India and China also toured the Ocean Spray facility in Tomah and met with a Rutgers University scientist to learn more about the health benefits of cranberries.

But global demand coupled with falling supplies increased the price for butter, which many French supermarkets are unwilling to pay, forcing bakeries to increase their prices. Last year France consumed 18 pounds of butter per capita, more than three times the US average.

Slua: TURKEY MN

Did you know Minnesota produces more turkeys than any other state, about 18% of the total? Eighty-eight percent of Americans eat turkey on Thanksgiving. We eat 46 million turkeys on Thanksgiving, 22 million on Christmas and 19 million on Easter. As News 19's Sam Shilts tells you, until now, you may not have known that much of those turkeys are hatched, grown and processed in Minnesota. Though most of us only think about turkey when the holidays roll around, for many independent farmers in Minnesota, turkeys are on the mind 24/7 365. As part of the nation's largest producer in the industry

Minnesota leads the nation in turkey production, about 45 million birds produced each year and over 800 million in economic impact. It is home to the 2nd largest processing company in the US, and the world's largest hatchery. But in between those two steps, we find the largest number of independent turkey farmers than any other state. Those are farms like this one in Morristown Minnesota, whose owner originally wanted her father's family owned trucking business. She didn't take over her father's business but she did end up with a business of her own. With the holidays on the way, one would think that this time of year is her busiest, but according to Kim, it's just another day. Turkey farming is year round work, raising birds from day old hatchlings to full grown adults. We'll take a look at that work as close we can safely. In 2015, the industry was dealt a blow with prevalence of the bird flu. Biosecurity precautions are very important to making sure the flock stays healthy over the course of a year. Halvorson Farms produces 100,000 turkeys each year, with about 10,000 birds in each building at any given time. Each day they go through a whopping 15 tons of feed what goes in, must go out. Manure byproduct is then used by 20-30 area producers on their soil during planting season. Having the entire process from hatch to grow to processing all in one state in such a big way is what Minnesota attributes to their success. But without small farms like the one here in Rice County none of that is possible. The people who took Chasing Daylight from just a dream to reality, caring for animals is in their blood. News 19's Mackenzie Amundsen is there, where volunteers are preparing for to open doors open here at 7 pm and volunteers way with the snow this afternoon they expect a good size crowd for opening night.

The capacity for the Warming Center is 40 people and last year the Warming Center Coordinator Mark Schimpf tells me they had 39 people almost every night. Volunteers predict this season will be just as busy if not busier this season. When people check in they have access to more than just a place to sleep. They can take a shower, do laundry and even enjoy a free meal. Schimpf says they have enough volunteers but they are looking for material donations. If you're interested in donating to the Warming Center you can drop off items Monday through Thursday from 9 to 4. Schimpf says the Warming Center fills up fast in the winter months. Sometimes they hit capacity within 20 minutes of opening the doors. He says the earlier people check in to the Warming Center the better chance they have of getting a spot. The Warming center will check people in throughout the night if space allows. Schimpf says that even if the Warming Center hits capacity he will work with the Salvation Army to make sure everyone has a place to stay. He says in the cold temperatures being inside could save a life.

Despite a seemingly strong economy hunger remains an issue in La Crosse County, with local food pantry services setting record numbers in the past year. News 19's Sam Shilts joins us now with details on what those numbers mean. Last year Wafer La Crosse gave away 1.6 million pounds of food, with a record 1,500 pounds given away last month, which brings up a dichotomy the US economy is still on an upswing. And closer to home, in the past 5 years the unemployment rate in La Crosse County has gone down by 3%. And yet the number of people who need to rely on services from Wafer has remained pretty much constant, and even started to grow since early summer. The effort to end homelessness in La Crosse will get a major funding boost. The La Crosse County Board voted last night to make a substantial investment. The vote came following a public hearing during which members heard impassioned pleas to fund the Collaborative to End Homelessness. News 19's Mackenzie Amundsen tells you how much the board will invest and why it's so important the resolution to transfer \$500,000 from the general fund to the Collaborative to End Homelessness sparked the longest debate of the night. Although some supervisors had sticker shock at the price tag the board ultimately passed the resolution, sending a message of support of the efforts to end homelessness. Homelessness is an issue for cities across the nation. The La Crosse Collaborative to End Homelessness has made La Crosse County a leader in eliminating homelessness. But members of the collaborative say there is still more work to do. On Monday night the La Crosse County Board voted to dedicate \$500, 000 in the 2018 budget to make ending homelessness a reality. Although \$500,000 might seem like a lot, but not addressing homelessness also comes at a cost. National data from the Los Angeles Ending Homelessness Coalition shows supporting a homeless individual costs taxpayers up to \$64,000. That number drops to \$17,000 when that person finds supportive housing. With the resolution the collaborative looks ahead to not only ending homelessness but preventing it. Even though the resolution was approved the \$500,000 is a placeholder. The collaborative won't have access to the money until they can provide supervisors with a more detailed plan on how the money will be used. County Board Chair Tara Johnson says the money is a wise investment. She says preventing homelessness is cheaper for taxpayers than intervention. Right now the collaborative is researching homeless prevention projects currently in use around the world with the goal of bringing some concrete proposals before the board in the months to come.

The Good Fight has been open for about a year. They originally opened in August at King on 5th and now they've moved to Jay Street. Nate Coleman started the Good Fight Community Center. He says the kids are good kids who just need a little guidance. They say he's a friend, mentor and father figure who teaches more by actions than by words. At the Good Fight it's not about the punch. It's about people. Nate Coleman came up with the idea to start Good Fight, a community center helping kids of all abilities build confidence and stay on the right path. Like some kids at the club, Nate says he rarely saw his father growing up but despite that but he still went on to do good things. But 8 years ago all that changed. His whole outlook changed. Nate says the Good Fight is all about teaching kids that life isn't fair, but if you don't give up you can overcome anything. From student to instructor and everyone in between if you're here, Nate says, you've probably witnessed some miracle in your life. Nate says physical training builds confidence and not quitting builds character. The upstairs portion of the Good Fight has a library with donated books, an

area for kids to do homework, and use the computers. There is also a food pantry. In the summer when donations are down the staff takes turns making a meal in the crock pot for the kids. Another thing to note, at the Good Fight everyone must greet one another and practice making eye contact. Nate says knowing how to communicate properly is one of the keys to success. It is \$25 a month to join the Good Fight but Nate says not all kids can afford that so they do what they can to not have to turn anyone away. Laverne Tranberg was only 46. Rita was now responsible for the family. As it turns out she too had the community of Blair. The town has been good to this family. Rita's 10 daughters, 5 sons and their families including Sherry are focused on doing the same for others. Through the Rita Tranberg Memorial, celebrating its 10th year now, the annual event happens each September in Blair

Riverside Memorial Park. Local businesses donate items for live and silent auctions. The memorial has games, activities and tournaments. The proceeds are collected and distributed to people with medical challenges. Sherry told us about one gift of money to a man from Whitehall. Sherry is part of a large group working to do for others what others did for them and they have no plans to stop. Rita experienced that help. So did Sherry. That's why she lives in Blair and has become part of a community tradition to watch out for one another. The person who nominated Sherry says her father has received help from the Tranberg family twice in 10 years. The memorial has helped more than 800 people.

Heather brings you the story of a Holmen man who says losing everything taught him to appreciate the most basic things. Walter Van Roo is 44 and he admits to packing a lot of life into those years. He's had a lot of ups but lately it seems like more downs. Like many of us, Walter had his share of struggles but says his story is proof that sometimes losing everything is the only thing that can make you feel whole. When Walter Van Roo is in the room he gets a lot of looks. With his legs on he stands about 6 feet 7. Walter's mind and body battle started in 1995 when he was bit by a brown recluse spider. The poison lay dormant in his body for years, but doctors believe the poison was reactivated when Walter walked in cleaning chemical. But even before that life changing incident, Walter admits to putting too much pressure on himself. Even though it might have felt that way, Walter did achieve a lot, many life-long dreams. He was a horse handler at Canterbury Park and at the height of his singing career he performed at the Grand Ole Opry in Nashville. Things were going great until some friends Walter was hanging out with in the music scene introduced him to drugs. Kicking that addiction is something Walter is open about. It took 10 surgeries to take Walter's legs but the last surgery was the most significant. "I woke up from this one here, from the knee down and I said 'you know I'm gonna live this day as there is no tomorrow". Today, Walter is trying to quit smoking, get back into singing and make amends with his ex-wife and kids. Not too long ago, Walter came out as gay. To say it's been liberating is an understatement and while many might think Walter should be singing the blues he's actually, for once, quite content, and ironically, for the first time, feeling whole despite losing so much.

The quarter million dollar grant will help fund the expansion of the Viroqua Food Co-Operative on Main Street. The grant is a part of an overall 7 million dollar project that will more than double the space of the current building, add 20 new jobs and more incentive for economic growth downtown. News 19's Sam Shilts joins us with why the expansion is necessary and why WEDC choose the co-op for this grant. It's an expansion the Viroqua Food Co-Op has been working on since 2012 with many hands involved in planning and development, about 3800 in fact. The co-op's downtown location made it a

great choice for WEDC's grant, but its relationship with local food producers really sealed the deal. The Viroqua Food Co-Op is at work on a new expansion, their third in just 22 years. Local food is a big deal here, with nearly 20 neighboring farms in just Vernon County alone, a connection the co-op holds in high regard. Currently a third of sales come from food producers within 100 miles with an expansion that will more than double the space. They're hoping to increase that local connection. The Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation is lending a \$250,000 hand in the form of a Community Development Investment grant, or CDI. Those grants primarily are aimed at spurring downtown growth. Over the years the co-op has become somewhat of a community hub both for local producers and consumers, a symbiotic relationship continuing to grow right in the heart of downtown.

The Trump Administration has formally announced its plan to repeal the Clean Power Plan, its key policy of former President Barack Obama and attempts to cut greenhouse gas emissions produced by power plants. News 19's Caroline Hecker spoke with Dairyland Power today and explains how they plan to cut down on CO2 emissions all while still using coal in daily operations. The goal of the Clean Power Plan, which was announced in 2015, was to reduce emissions from electrical power generation by 32% by 2030. The idea was to achieve that by lessening the impact of coal fired power plants and increasing the use of renewable energy. The other 40% is made up of a variety of other sources. However, in its long term strategic plan the company hopes to cut down on its use of coal and diversify its portfolio. According to La Crosse County, in 2009 67% of electricity in Wisconsin was created using coal power. In 2016 that number decreased to 51%. With the decreasing prices of solar and wind energy Dairyland Power is adding renewable energy sources to its portfolio

There is a 300 day statute of limitation on workplace sexual harassment claims. Attorneys say it's important to get to know your employers workplace environment policies to find out who you can go to if and when incidents occur and report them to your human resource department in the case where the employer is the harasser or human resources is not available. It could then become a case for the Equal Opportunity Employment Commission or an employment attorney. In any case, if something crosses into assault Frantz says not to wait. Call police and subsequently notify your employer. With most employers any unwelcome advance, verbally or physically, may be considered har-

assment, as well as instances of quid pro quo, meaning in this case the exchange of sexual favors for employment gains.

An ad in a church bulletin led to a life-saving operation for an Onalaska man. About 30 years ago, Gary Luecke says he witnessed the ultimate selfless act one day in church. Gary was able to say yes to that question coming from Bill Liska, a father, grandfather and beloved teacher who placed an ad in the bulletin requesting a kidney. Gary's desire to help would take time though as Bill had one health crisis after another. While it was a scary time, Bill believes it was divine intervention working in his life. It took 8 years for Bill to get healthy enough to cash in on Gary's offer. Bill found out he had polycystic kidney disease when he was in his 30's. The condition causes cysts on the kidneys to fill up with fluid eventually causing kidney failure. The disease runs in Bill's family and for that reason family aren't eligible donors. Sixty people responded to Bill's request for help. Doctors say they've never seen anything like it. Gary and Bill say they are bonded for life now, not just because they are both kind, caring people but because they share a faith, love of family and a desire to do what's right no matter the cost. The type of kidney disease Bill has is hereditary so family members were not a good match. Full disclosure; Gary is my dad. On Sunday, he and more than 200 living donors from around the state received recognition at UW Health in Madison.

A national report shows that height and weight measurements used to calculate body mass index indicate Wisconsin's adolescents are catching up to adult levels of obesity. The 2016 National Survey of Children's Health found 30% of Wisconsin children ages 10 to 17 are overweight or obese, while the state's adult rate of obesity is 31%. Obesity can cause children to develop other health problems such as high blood pressure and high cholesterol. Health experts say those diseases are typically found in middle-age adults, so seeing them affect younger children is alarming.

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, an annual campaign to increase awareness of the disease. One in eight women in the United States will develop breast cancer over the course of their lifetime. Early detection is key and a lack of breast cancer in your family history doesn't mean you're immune. A diagnosis of breast cancer is devastating, life-changing news, but new research shows it's also job-changing as well. They also found women were twice as likely to stop work after a single mastectomy and three times as likely to stop work after a double mastectomy. Currently 26 states take part and several more are considering it. In addition to streamlining the process and cutting down on costs states will still maintain some level of authority. If Wisconsin does not enact the bill, all of Wisconsin nurses will need to obtain separate licenses for Wisconsin, Iowa and Minnesota.

So if glucose levels increase the green in the tattoo will darken to brown. The team used pig skin samples to test the ink, hoping to help people better monitor their health.

A report from the Wisconsin Department of Health Services says the state saw an increase of about 13% in reported chlamydia, gonorrhea, and syphilis cases in 2016. State public health educators say the increase may be due to more testing. The state had more than 26,400 chlamydia cases, more than 6,600 gonorrhea cases and more than 400 syphilis cases last year. Those STDS can be treated with antibiotics. Southeastern Wisconsin had the most reported cases, with more than 19,000. The US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says there was a nationwide STD increase in 2016.

Slug: GROUNDWATER

Drinking water is something most of us take for granted until we don't have it. In April the La Crosse County Health Department issued a health advisory after testing turned up dangerous levels of nitrates and bacteria in private wells in the Town of Onalaska and the Town of Holland. Tonight there is a forum to address concerns and to highlight possible solutions. News 19's Caroline Hecker is live at that forum and explains what high levels of nitrates can mean for those who drink the water. Traces of nitrates can be found in normal drinking water, but some of the groundwater tested in private wells had dangerously high nitrate levels. The tests followed a 2016 audit showing multiple failings by the Wisconsin DNR to enforce clean water laws. The county is urging private well owners to test the water every year to monitor the status of these contaminants. The forum gets underway at 7 and the public is encouraged to attend. Senate Minority Leader Jennifer Shilling says water quality has diminished because of reduced enforcement by the state. She says the problems are getting worse as regulators ignore major violations.

There was more attention on the national opioid epidemic after President Trump called it a public health emergency last week. In an address at Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health, for-

New research offers even more hope to breast cancer patients. Twelve percent of women in the US will face breast cancer in their lifetime. It is the second leading cause of cancer deaths in women. Aside from mammography doctors can now test genetic material to see if the DNA is susceptible to a higher risk of cancer. The Mayo Clinic Health System in La Crosse and Onalaska are now conducting a study called Strive, with the goal to continue advancing early-detection blood tests.

The American Heart Association has released a new definition for high blood pressure. The ultimate goal is earlier intervention and preventing further increases in blood pressure. News 19's Alex Wasilenko explains the new guide lines. The American Heart Association's new definition of high blood pressure has not changed drastically, but it does make a difference when you go to the doctors now. This new definition is based on the increased risks associated with high blood pressure. This means that adults in the US living with high blood pressure will increase from 32% to 46% which in turn means more of us taking medication to combat the problem. Lifestyle changes may be needed if you

want to avoid medicating so before getting anxious, get active to keep your blood pressure healthy and within the new guidelines. High blood pressure accounts for the second largest number of preventable heart disease and stroke deaths, second only to smoking.

Slug: CANCER CENTER

A major expansion project is underway at the Mayo Clinic Health System in La Crosse. Since its construction more than a decade ago the Cancer Treatment Center has seen the number of patients double. Today, Mayo announced plans to double the size of that treatment facility, projected to cost just under 5 million dollars. News 19's Sam Shilts joins us now with details on that project. Mayo Franciscan's Cancer Center treats an average of 37 patients a day and the need isn't going down. The 4.9 million dollar project would essentially double what they are able to provide, creating room for nine new exam rooms and another nine treatment bays. It would also create dedicated spaces for support services including a dietician, social worker and palliative care. Keeping up with demand is import for area Mayo patients because if something can't be scheduled here, they may have to travel to Rochester. Mayo says it isn't just the number of patients increasing. The ability to detect and diagnose earlier is increasing and patients are living longer, requiring long term care beyond chemotherapy. With this new expansion, they hope more can get all of their treatment closer to home in just over a year's time construction will begin next spring. The treatment center will still remain open through construction with completion set for spring of 2019.

Slug: DIGITAL PILL

The FDA approved the first "digital pill" which allows doctors to track when patients are taking their medication. The pill itself has a tracking system with a sensor that gives off a charge when mixed with fluids in the stomach, which in turn sends a signal to a patch worn by the patient. The pill is called ability my-cite and it's approved for schizophrenia and bipolar disorder, diseases that have long standing problems with patients not taking pills as prescribed. But this digital pill is getting mixed reaction. Security experts say anything that can give of a sensor can be hack-able and although the functionality of the digital pill would prove useful for doctors questions on ethics and privacy remain.

Slua: GENE EDITING

For the first time in history scientists tried editing genes inside someone's body. It may look like an average IV drip but it's actually a tool called zinc fingers, described as a GPS for the body that is combined with a new gene so they can attach to DNA and fight diseases together. It's being used on a patient with a rare genetic disorder called Hunter Syndrome, a disease that usually kills people before they reach their teens. But after 26 operations 44 year old patient Brian Madeux is hoping this new treatment will help him to continue defying the odds. The treatment is a one-time fix and the changes are permanent. Right now the risks aren't fully known but if successful scientist plan to apply gene editing to fix some metabolic diseases and hemophilia.

Slug: OPIODS

A Minnesota task force has set new limits on opioid prescriptions by doctors who participate in the state's Medicaid program. The rule adopted Thursday won't take effect until approved by the State Human Services Commissioner. Doctors who exceed the new limit for more than half of their patients will receive warnings and undergo training. They could eventually face removal from the Medicaid program if they don't reduce their dosage amounts. Medicaid covers about 20% of the state's population. The limits will only apply to outpatient prescriptions meant to manage short-term or acute pain.

Slug: BREASTIMAGING

Earlier this year Mayo Clinic Health System in La Crosse announced a new technology to detect early breast cancer. Molecular breast imaging is now up and running at the hospital and as News 19's Mackenzie Amundsen explains, it's already detecting early breast cancer in patients missed by the traditional mammograms. Mayo Clinic Health System in La Crosse is just one of a handful of institutions across the country offering molecular breast imaging. At least eight women have used the technology since it started operating last week. Technicians say the imaging has already allowed some of those patients to get an earlier diagnosis and earlier treatment. With a genetic history of breast cancer on both sides of the family Amanda Kubista Owen has been getting mammograms from a young age. But for Amanda and thousands of other women mammograms don't always detect cancer cells. The new molecular breast imaging at Mayo Clinic Health System in La Crosse has raised early detection of breast cancer by more than 250%. A patient undergoing the new imaging technique is injected with small amount of radioactive material. That material settles on cells or tumors that may be cancerous. The new imaging is giving women like Amanda hope and doctors predict the molecular breast imaging to be the beginning of more advanced breast cancer detection and treatment. Amanda hasn't gone through molecular breast imaging yet. She hopes to try the new technology for the first time by the end of the year. Doctor Ellis says the new imaging should be used in addition to the mammogram. Women with dense breasts or other risk factors are encouraged to consider the additional screening. With only one machine at Mayo Clinic in La Crosse space is limited. Women can learn more about undergoing molecular breast imaging by calling the breast center or visiting the website.

Slug: CBD-OIL

In May of this year a new law made it legal to possess CBD oil in the State of Wisconsin. CBD, or cannabidiol, has been said to ease symptoms for people who suffer from seizures. News 19's Brittany Lake has the story of one woman who says the drug is life changing. Juliette Wallen's special caramels, gummy bears and popcorn aren't just snacks. They're her "medicine". Each of her snacks contains CBD, which is short for cannabidiol, a derivative of the marijuana plant. It is currently being studied to see if it helps treat several conditions, including anxiety, pain, inflammatory diseases and more. CBD has been available in oil form for a while, but it's now popping up in snack foods, sold in stores and online. Yet, the DEA considers it a controlled substance and says it is not legal in food. The FDA recently sent out warning letters to some companies marketing CBD-infused products claiming benefits for cancer, Alzheimer's and other diseases. The FDA says those claims are unsubstantiated, and the agency is still evaluating whether CBD should pass the drug-approval process. However some manufacturers think there are loopholes in the current law. Juliette says she'll continue to count on her special treats as long as she can find them for sale while the law passed in May makes it legal to possess CBD oil. It is still illegal to produce or sell the oil in the State of Wisconsin.

On top of the surprise of the new studio and her father being there, and a gift Jennifer and her family will forever cherish. Jennifer's dad also gave her two more cameras as her gift for Christmas. Jennifer says this holiday season she couldn't possibly ask for anything more.

Slug: HOCKEY IN DECLINE

Young people aren't signing up to play hockey as often as in past years. That's forcing schools to establish co-ops, combining teams from different schools to form one team. Athletic directors say a shortage of players in youth leagues is leading to a shortage in high schools. News19's Sam Shilts tells you what schools are doing to reverse that trend. Hockey is unique, not just for how and where it's played but for how students make it to the competitive level. But lately in La Crosse keeping those numbers high enough has proved to be a struggle. That decline in numbers can be traced to retention troubles in youth leagues where some feel there has been an abrupt shift in young player's experience. Currently, River City Youth Hockey's 8-10 year old teams are split in two, an "A" team and a "B" team. But for the next year they may just have 2 "B" teams. Other youth leagues in the US made similar changes and saw retention jump from 60 to 90%. A dire need for La Crosse to keep their numbers up, with that and more recruitment efforts, there may be light at the end of the tunnel. It will be a slow process but an important one to help local hockey survive. And it's not just hockey. Central's Activities Director also warns that high school wrestling is also struggling with numbers and may need to look toward co-op's in the future.

Animal health officials say routine testing has discovered Chronic Wasting Disease in a 3-year-old white-tailed buck from a Winona County farm. On Wednesday the Minnesota Board of Animal Health confirmed the results with the US Department of Agriculture. The state board already has quarantined the herd and begun its disease investigation. Board officials say they have 10 years of records on the registered herd, which has a good history of Chronic Wasting Disease surveillance. The farm's current herd inventory is seven adult white-tailed deer. The board will track movements of deer into and out of the herd within the last five years. Chronic Wasting Disease is fatal to deer and elk, and there are no known treatments or vaccines. Consuming infected meat is not advised.

Evers says one of the disadvantages rural school districts have when it comes to mental health is the lack of practitioners you would typically find in a larger city. He says it's the job of parents, teachers and administrators to ensure students get the help they may need.

A new report says in the last seven years there has been 5 point 4 million dollars in questionable transactions made between UW System schools and their private foundations. A review of those transactions started in January after UW-Oshkosh officials were accused of using millions of dollars in foundation funds to cover university project costs. News 19's Mackenzie Amundsen is following the story which includes a transaction. At the UW-La Crosse that system officials describe as not following best practices. UW-La Crosse started building the Roger Harring Stadium in 2008, a 16-million dollar project. The university approached the foundation asking them to help raise money for the project. The foundation pledged \$500,000 to the new stadium. However the fundraising came up short. The university covered the nearly \$184,000 needed to finish the project. Greg Reichert, president of the UW-La Crosse Foundation says the transaction is not the result of intentional wrongdoing. Reichert says he hasn't seen any impact in donations since the report was published. The foundation is raising money for scholarships with a direct focus on giving on the students. Reichert says the foundation is reviewing policies and protocol as a result of the findings in the report. Moving ahead, the foundation won't be funding as many brick and mortar construction projects like Roger Harring Stadium. Reichert took the position as foundation president in 2010 after this transaction had already taken place. He says the foundation is cooperating as part of the review. Reichert says the foundation exists to support the University. Its faculty and its students and will continue to do so.

I've talked at length with Jake Speed over the last several months and he tells me none of it is true and claims the school board has had a problem with him ever since he forced incumbents Tim Smaby and Anne Garrity off the ballot during the election in 2016. The numerous spats between Speed and the rest of the board have definitely taken their toll. Both sides say it has hurt the board's progress toward being productive and putting students first. Speed has been adamant that he will not be stepping down and welcomes a new challenger. Tonight the school board will take up the issue and because the board clerk has ruled the petition sufficient. It's likely they'll rule in favor of a recall election.

The La Crescent Hokah School District is turning to voters as it tries to avoid major cuts to programming and class offerings after a failed operating levy a year ago and the current one expiring. The district is asking voters this time around to approve new a 1 million dollar levy. News 19's Caroline Hecker is live in La Crescent and explains what the district could face if the referendum fails. We've been following this story ever since the referendum failed last year and the school district has been working very hard to be efficient and eliminating anything that is no imperative to the district's mission. But something good that came out of last year's failure was a survey sent out district wide to get a feel for what voters might be willing to say yes to. One thing the new levy would allow the district to do is to raise the amount of money per pupil from \$226 to \$850. It's still below the state average, but something voters indicated on that survey they would be willing to support. Without the approval of this levy Superintendent Kevin Cardille says the district is going to look very different from what it currently does. On the average \$200,000 home a homeowner would see a \$17 a month increase in property taxes if the levy passes. Cardille says the hard sell is convincing people who no longer have children in the district to vote yes, knowing all too well a struggling district has an adverse effect on property value within the city. The district hosted several public information meetings throughout the fall to help members of the community understand what the district is asking for and why it's so badly needed.

Slug: JAKE SPEED

Embattled Onalaska School Board Member Jake Speed will face a recall election tomorrow. It follows a successful petition by community members to force the election. In October the school board clerk found the petition to be sufficient and ordered the recall. The board previously censored Speed last spring following allegations of false claims against the district, threatening and harassing employees and being disruptive at board meetings. Speed, who has spoken at length with News 19, says the allegations are false. He claims the district has been out to get him for forcing incumbent members Tim Smaby and Ann Garrity off the ballot in the April 2016 election. Polls are open tomorrow from 7am until 8pm.

Slug: RECALL

Jake Speed was elected in April of 2016. His was the only name on the ballot for a vacant seat on the school board because he had filed a successful challenge to the validity of the nominating papers of the other two candidates. His 20 months on the board were marked by repeated clashes with other board members and school administrators. Those conflicts led to a formal censure of Speed last April for failing to live up to board policies regarding conduct and ethics. Speed is a former member of the local Tea Party. News 19 has spoken at length with Speed who says the allegations against him are untrue. Allegations like harassing district employees and filing false claims against the district. Last month opponents successfully collected enough signatures to force a recall vote, and today was Election Day. Here are the results from tonight's recall election. Incumbent Jake Speed wins just 6% of the vote. Challenger Deanna Verdon wins the seat with 94% of the vote. We were unable to contact speed for reaction to tonight's vote.

Slug: CHARTER

Research shows Charter Schools are among the nation's most segregated, an Associated Press analysis finds an outcome at odds, critics say, with their goal of offering a better alternative to failing traditional public schools. Reporter Carrie Antlfinger examines the trend in Wisconsin. Tanja Dixon remembers being bussed out of Milwaukee's inner city to a mostly white school in fifth and sixth grades. But today, three of her grandchildren, whom she is helping raise, go to a largely black Charter School near her house. Ninety-eight percent of the kids at Milwaukee Math and Science Academy are black. National enrollment data reviewed by the Associated Press shows nearly 15% of the nation's Charter Schools are 99% black or Hispanic, compared to five to seven percent of traditional public schools. Principal Alper Akyurek says the reason they are one race is because most of their students live within five miles. School integration gains achieved over the second half of the last century have been re-

versed in many places over the last 20 years. The trend has been blamed on the effects of Charters, the lapse of court-ordered desegregation plans in many cities, and other factors like housing and economic trends. Former Milwaukee Public Schools Superintendent Howard Fuller is on the Board of Milwaukee Charter School. In the AP analysis the performance of students in Charter Schools varies widely. But schools that enroll 99% minorities, both Charters and traditional public schools on average have fewer students reaching state standards for proficiency in reading and math. Principal Akyurek, says the school has significant room to improve test scores, but so do the neighborhood schools his students would be attending otherwise. He says race isn't a factor in families' decisions to take the kids there. Bullying is why Jamain Lee's mom took him out of his old school to bring him here. Living in a higher crime area, these kids are not untouched. Tanja Dixon's son Anthony was murdered in a robbery in September so the family and the school are paying special attention to his 4-year-old son Devon and his cousins. The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction reports there are twenty Charter Schools registered in the Milwaukee Public School District and six in the La Crosse District.

Lawmakers wanted a clearer picture of how a Russian "troll farm" meddled in American politics using social media. Facebook informed lawmakers about the ads almost a month ago, and CEO Mark Zuckerberg pledged to hand them over to Congress.

Slug: GERRYMANDER

It's a pillar of democracy, the right of the people to choose their representatives. A new case going before the Supreme Court claims that right is in jeopardy within the State of Wisconsin. News 19's Mackenzie Amundsen is digging deeper into the importance of Gill versus Whitford, which is currently before the US Supreme Court. States redraw legislative districts every 10 years to reflect a changing population. It is called redistricting. That's different from gerrymandering, a process of re-drawing districts to favor one party or the other. On Tuesday the United States Supreme Court heard arguments in a Wisconsin case called Gill v. Whitford. The justices will consider the guestion of whether there is a constitutional limit to leveraging partisan power. Tonight we are digging deeper to explain why this case is important to future Wisconsin elections. You might not guess it by just looking at them but Jerome Gunderson and Maureen Friedland are two supervisors on the La Crosse County Board who typically have opposing political views. They found common ground co-sponsoring a bi-partisan redistricting resolution in August. La Crosse County is just one of twenty-nine counties across the state to adopt this resolution in an effort to end partisan gerrymandering. Known as the fair map movement, the resolutions have passed at a time when Wisconsin's district lines are being called into question. In the Supreme Court case Gill v. Whitford the constitution allows states to decide how district lines are drawn and in the State of Wisconsin that privilege goes to lawmakers in the majority party. Democrats

and republicans have used redistricting as an opportunity for gaining a political advantage. The guestion before the court is whether gerrymandering can reach such an extreme point that it becomes unconstitutional. This is not the first time the Supreme Court heard a case regarding gerrymandering. However political scientists say technology and voter data analysis make the intent easier to prove. The Supreme Court could decide to rule on the case after analyzing all of the evidence, changing the redistricting process in the State of Wisconsin and across the United States. Regardless of the outcome of Gill v. Whitford, Friedland and Gundersen say the resolution will serve as a reminder that La Crosse County will continue standing against gerrymandering to demonstrate the importance of parties coming together to foster bipartisanship. One alternative method of redistricting used by some states is a non-partisan group of mapmakers. Iowa is one state using this system which takes redistricting out of the hands of legislators. Depending on the outcome of Gill v. Whitford Schimel says it's not likely that Wisconsin lawmakers would choose to adopt that method. The lawmakers would have to vote on and pass to change the current system which Schimel says is deeply rooted in tradition. Schimel tells News 19 that finding a solution to end gerrymandering would be finding the equivalent of finding a political unicorn. Voters should not expect a ruling anytime soon. Ultimately this decision may hinge on how much partisanship is too much and court observers point out the Supreme Court by a 5-to-4 vote refused to outlaw even extreme partisan gerrymandering. Those on the case say it will take weeks or even months for the judges to deliberate. A ruling is expected to be given in time for lines to be redrawn for the 2018 elections.

In Iran, the reaction to Trump's announcement varies among moderates and hardliners. Slug: RUSSIA INVEST

The first indictments resulting from the Russian investigation played out today as Special Counsel Robert Muller charged Paul Manafort, the President's former campaign manager and Rick Gates, the deputy campaign manager, both men pleading not guilty. White House spokeswoman Sarah Sanders is distancing President Trump from the three men indicted by Special Counsel Robert Mueller, among them, campaign foreign policy advisor, George Papadopoulous, shown here with Mr. Trump in a meeting the president described as "my national security team." But President Trump had previously praised Papadopoulous. According to the indictment, at this meeting, Papadopolous stated he had "connections that could help arrange a meeting" between Mr. Trump and Russian President Vladmir Putin. The indictment also charges that Papadopoulos met with a professor connected to Russian government officials and a Russian woman who falsely claimed to be related to Putin. But perhaps most damagingly, the indictment alleges Papadopoulos notified at least three senior campaign officials that the Russians had thousands of emails damaging to Hillary Clinton. Pled guilty earlier this month to lying to the FBI made public today on the same day that Paul Manafort, the former Trump campaign chairman and deputy campaign manager, Rick Gates, pled not guilty to 12 counts include conspiracy against the United States, false statements and conspiracy to launder money. The charges against these two do not directly reference allegations of collusion with Russia during the campaign. Both Manafort and Gates are being released to home confinement with Manafort being released on a 10 million dollar bond and Gates on a 5 million dollar one.

Slug: RUSSIA PROBE

President trump is making a crucial trip to Asia. On his five country visit he will focus on trade, national security and North Korea. But in the US, new details about the Russia probe threaten to overshadow the trip. A new question in the Russia investigation; did the president and attorney general lie about a member of the campaign having contact with Russians. It all goes back to this meeting in March of 2016. There seated between then candidate Trump and Senator Jeff Sessions, Foreign Policy Advisor George Papadopolous. Monday's unsealed documents revealed Papadopoulos, worked with suspected Russian contacts, then lied to the FBI about those meetings and when he introduced himself at that meeting, told them "he had connections that could help arrange a meeting between then-candidate Trump and Russian President Putin". A Trump adviser in the room tells ABC, as Trump listened; Jeff Sessions shot the idea down and said not to mention it again. But President Trump has denied anyone on his campaign had contacts with Russia and when it came to that meeting the attorney general now faces new questions after this testimony at his confirmation hearing. More recently he was asked again about contact with the Russian government. Senator Franken has sent an 8 page letter full to the Attorney General asking for answers. The Justice Department insists Sessions did not give false testimony.

The Supreme Court will consider whether it's okay to wear political apparel at polling places. This stems from a Minnesota law which bans voters from wearing political insignia like buttons at the polls. The plaintiff says he was temporarily blocked from voting over a "Don't Tread on Me" t-shirt he wore to his polling place. His lawyers argue the ban is unconstitutional and applies to campaign materials and soliciting at polling places not apparel. But lawyers for the State of Minnesota say speech restrictions inside polling places are legal as long as they are reasonable and neutral.

ABC News has learned that the special counsel is looking into President Trump's dismissal of James Comey as Director of the FBI. The President and the President's son-in-law are increasingly coming under scrutiny. ABC News has learned that Robert Mueller's team has requested documents from the Justice Department related to the President's dismissal of FBI Director James Comey. Campaign foreign policy advisor George Popadopolous says he offered to connect the campaign to people with ties to Russian President Vladmir Putin, an offer that was made to Attorney General Jeff Sessions, then a campaign advisor to Mr. Trump. The Senate has given Kushner until November 27th to turn over all Russia-related documents.

He says no one from Badger Corrugating was injured. Sexauer says it will take time to clean up, so at the moment no clear timeline for business to resume there.

Nancy Cook returned to what's left of her home, sifting through the rubble, trying to salvage anything she can find. She was able to help evacuate the mobile home park she and her husband manage where nearly all of the more than 100 homes were destroyed. Across Sonoma County, entire neighborhoods are now unrecognizable, Chris Pond overwhelmed with grief, sifting through the ashes trying to find her most valuable possession. Explosive fires in the State of California consumed more than 115,000 acres. At least a dozen unstoppable wild-fires destroyed at least 2,000 residences and businesses, including this winery. In southern California, massive flames there engulfed homes, charring at least 7,500 acres. Vice President Mike Pence, in California, announced federal assistance for the state. Fire Fighters have requested help from departments out of state. We're also told officials are now going through at least 150 missing person calls, hoping some of those are from people who had to evacuate quickly and not able to contact their loved ones.
