Thousands of mailed absentee ballots missing address information might not count in Wisconsin. The Milwaukee Journal Sentinel reports that a bill Governor Scott Walker signed in March requires absentee ballots to include the full address of a witness. However the State Elections Commission has received about 400 ballots where witnesses included only a partial address and expects to receive hundreds more with partial addresses ahead of Election Day. The State Elections Commission has

advised clerks to contact the voters and get consent to complete the witnesses' address.

The Coon Valley Lions and Vernon County Sheriff's Department are sponsoring a drug forum. Sheriff John Spears says it's a good place to come for information about what's going on in the community. Slug: MAYOR SLUSH

The La Crosse City Board of estimates voted Monday.to increase a tax levy that would add \$250,000 to its 2017 budget. The board says the increased measure would help plan for future expenses in the city. To date, tax rates have stayed consistent but some city council members say there isn't enough of a cushion for an unexpected emergency. But Mayor Tim Kabat says increasing taxes isn't the answer. "The good momentum that we're seeing, for this next year we are actually ramping up the efforts on our street repairs and other infrastructure. So it really does accomplish those goals. In my mind, we did that and still kept the mill rate the same. I'm a big believer that we should levy what we need for the programs and services that are identified as the priority and not a dollar more." The Common Council will vote on the measure on November 15th and if it passes the tax rate will raise from the current rate of 12.24 per \$1,000in property value in 2016 to 12.47 in 2017.

Slug: FLOODPLAN

About 1,800 structures in the City of La Crosse fall into flood hazard zones. The lowest areas of our city and first to be hit should major flooding strike and if these homeowners have a federally backed mortgage they're required to buy flood insurance, often at considerable cost. But the city recently approved a floodplain relief program that would work with families to have their homes reclassified or at least lower their risk, in turn lowering their insurance premiums.

The decision by the city council to eliminate the Public Works Department is moving toward implementation, Public Works Director Dale Hexum is retiring at the end of the year and Mayor Kabat decided it would be a good time to redistribute its tasks to other departments, and the council agreed. "It's an additional management layer that I don't think we need. I think we have very good supervisors that run our utilities department, our streets department and our engineering departments, and so I think that having one less management position and using that money in other ways is much more effective." The plan calls for transferring existing Public Works employees to other departments.

Native American tribes in Wisconsin are closely watching the protests of an oil pipeline in North Dakota. Protesters are fighting to prevent the pipeline from being built through sacred land on the Standing Rock Sioux Reservation. Tribe members also say the pipeline will threaten their water supply. Deputies from Dane County were sent there to help with law enforcement, but Sheriff Dave Mahoney decided to bring them back.

Slug: ROADS

The County Board will have to make some tough decisions about county roads. La Crosse County Administrator Steve O'Malley recently unveiled the 2017 county budget and the money set aside for road repairs. But he also gives board members alternative options that could help the county catch up with much needed road repairs. Steve O'Malley says the state needs to step up to provide more reasonable solutions when it comes to road maintenance, but if it's not going to do that he has some temporary solutions of his own. His proposed budget calls for borrowing 2.4 million dollars and a slight 1 percent property tax increase, but that's still 2.6 million dollar behind what the Highway Commissioner says is needed to get roads up to date. O'Malley says the county board can accept the 2.4 million dollar budget or increase borrowing at higher rate, increasing property taxes anywhere from 1 to 3.5 percent, giving the county the money the need to fix its roads.

The move comes after numerous phones spontaneously combusting, including one on an airplane earlier this month. Samsung has recalled 2.5 million smartphones citing a battery manufacturing error. In the event anyone gets through airport security with the Galaxy Note 7 announcements are also being made to passengers once they board their plane. Passengers caught with the phones in their luggage could face fines, even criminal charges.

Slug: TIM DALE

The latest ABC News Washington Post poll shows Hillary Clinton ahead of Donald Trump by 4-percentage points among likely voters. That 4-point margin holds true among registered voters in the same poll. But there is a different set of numbers the campaigns consider, the Electoral College numbers. Respected Political Scientist Larry Sabato refers to the Electoral College as the only thing that matters. We began our conversation with UW-La Crosse political analyst Tim Dale by asking what is the Electoral College and why do we have it.

If you use Highway 35 in Onalaska you know travel is a bit slower because of construction. Work on a 31/2 mile section of that highway began in March. Scientists say last month was the warmest September on record. NASA's Goddard Institute for Space Studies says September 2016's temperature was a razor-thin 0.004 degrees Celsius warmer than September in 2014, the previous warmest September. This new warm record means 11 of the past 12 consecutive months dating back to October 2015 have set new monthly high-temperature records

Slug: POLICE ACADEMY

What goes into the decision to use deadly force? The Holmen Police Department wanted the public to get a better understanding and that's why they invited reporters to experience what they go through on a daily basis first hand. News 19's Ginna Roe underwent a deadly force simulation. She joins us now with what's she's learned. The officers briefed me on Wisconsin law, when an officer can legally use deadly force. Then they gave me a simulator gun loaded with plastic shells. They took me through three separate scenarios, and in an instant I had to decide when to pull the trigger. The Holmen Police Department says they invited me to participate in this simulation to be transparent. They want the community and reporters to be aware of why they train and how they train and everything that goes into making an instantaneous decision.

Slug: MN PEDESTRIAN

Now to a police stop caught on camera, sparking outrage in Minnesota. The video shows a white officer confronting a black man for walking in the road. That video ends with the man in handcuffs. The local NAACP has already demanded a formal apology from the city and the police department. ABC's Elizabeth Hur is in New York with details and how upset community members are also speaking out. City officials say they will now review those policies and that they will look to see if any reforms are necessary, including re-training the officers. Elizabeth, we are hearing that there might be dash cam video of the incident, are police planning on releasing it? Edina's regular city council meeting agenda was pushed aside to address the issue and although the mayor had the first words it was the citizens of Endina that had the last.

Iraqi officials say the assault on ISIS is moving faster than expected. Now on the offensive to push the terror group out of Mosul, but US military officials there supporting the Iraqis warn this remains a dangerous and tough fight that could last for months. And with people racing to get out of Mosul officials say some ISIS militants have also been found in that line of refugees, some caught even posing as women.

The image of a university library for most people is one of silence, study and solitude. Well not anymore. News 19's Caroline Hecker spoke with the UW-L Library Director and explains why more and more libraries across the country are transitioning into a more collaborative space. Scott, the days of silence in the library are fading away, instead being replaced with space for students to speak freely and collectively as a group. As technology has changed so has the way university libraries are utilized and with more electronic databases, journals and books you'll find fewer stacks and more room for collaborative work. Another reason for the transition away from quiet study spaces is due to a change in the way students learn and are taught. Now more than ever collaborative group projects are part of curriculums and the need to group think and work out loud is increasing. In the mid 2000's, the first floor of Murphy Library and UWL was made into a group workspace but due to recent budget cuts at the university level the university is struggling to offer more space for team work.

A new report shows Wisconsin's Department of Natural Resources staffing levels are down significantly. The legislative fiscal bureau report examined staffing levels in the last year of each two-year budgets dating back to 1979 and found that during that period the number of positions peaked in 1995 but since has eliminated 565 positions, 196 of those in the last 4 budgets alone, creating an 18% decline in the last two decades. Those cuts took place since Governor Walker and republicans took complete control of state government in 2011, but the agency did also lose positions under democratic Governor Jim Doyle's budgets.

The City of La Crosse is looking for community input on its long term plan to enhance the Highway 53 Corridor. The project extends from Exit 3 to La Crosse Street and the city is in the beginning stages of developing a plan. News 19's Caroline Hecker spoke with the city today and explains why it is turning to the public for help. Dave, the city is looking to get the community and stakeholders involved in the process quickly, hoping to avoid the situation it encountered with the DOT's Exit 3 project in which the city says it found itself behind the 8 ball and scrambling to get a plan put together as a result. This Thursday the city is encouraging people to come out and take part in a collaborative session where they can brainstorm with maps and decide what areas of the corridor need the most attention. The general vicinity of the project runs from Exit 3 to La Crosse Street and from Avon Street to the Black River. The enhancement of the corridor is a component of the DOT's larger, 10 year study into the area.

La Crosse Mayor Tim Kabat vetoed the 20-17 operating budget today, following the city council's recommendation to increase the tax rate by levying additional money. Kabat says levying an additional \$250,000 does not send a message of fiscal restraint to taxpayers. The council says the money could be put in reserves, addressing unforeseen emergencies and providing for a capital improvement budget without "pre spending" future years. City council can override his veto with a twelve person vote. If they decide not to veto it they'll be forced to draft a new budget.

The north and south side branches of the La Crosse Public Library will undergo big changes come January first. The north and south side branches will only be open Monday through Friday from 2 to 6 p.m. and Saturdays from noon to 4. It's all in an effort to balance library budgets. Since 2011, the La Crosse Public Library lost over 11 full time positions. But, because of city-mandated pay increases, employee salaries continue to rise.

The two most daunting tasks of the I-90 project have been completed, the bridge project earlier this year and now the re-construction of I-90 itself between La Crescent and Exit 4 in Onalaska. Project managers say motorists can expect to see lanes opening up and traffic cones being cleaned-up over the next few days, weather permitting.

A federal court has given democrats in Wisconsin a bit of good news following the near republican sweep on Election Day, but it may be temporary. The panel of federal judges has ruled redistricting maps ordered by republican lawmakers in 2011 are unconstitutional. The court ruled republicans redrew maps with a clear political intent to burden the rights of democratic voters by impeding their ability to translate their votes into legislative seats. As for what happens next, the court will consider remedies in the coming months. But the governor and attorney general are both republicans and may choose to appeal. That appeal would be considered by the US Supreme Court, which is currently deadlocked with four liberal and four conservative justices. President Elect Trump will nominate a judge who will tilt the balance toward conservatives, increasing the chances that today's decision may be overturned down the line.

Over their three year history Czys and Tasja have had a lot of success, including winning an award for Merits K-9 Narcotics Find. Given the rise of narcotics use in the Coulee Region this new unit is something the Town of Campbell is very excited about. With the added experience of Officer Czys and Tasja the Town of Campbell is hoping to see them hit the ground running. Officer Czys met Tasja when she was 12 months old. Tasja is a 4-year old Belgium Malinois born in Holland. She competed in sporting competitions before training for K-9 duty.

In the 3-2 vote last night, Winona County became the first Minnesota County to ban frack sand mining. County Commissioners voted to ban mining of the sand used in hydraulic fracturing, a method of oil production. Cubans are ready for anything. Castro's remains are being cremated and nine days of mourning have begun. Slug: BUYER BEWARE

There is a lot of gift buying and travel over the holiday season. It's a great time of year for most people. But a few with bad intentions see it as an opportunity. We spoke with Frank Frassetto of the Wisconsin Bureau of Consumer Protection. We began our conversation with the growing popularity of online sales. Online shopping is upwards of 57-percent during the holiday shopping season. But the other side of the purchasing is the delivery part of it. And, of course, there are lots of parcel services out there whether it's ups or fed ex or the postal service, and others, there are lot of packages being dropped off on porches. Well, the old time crooks are still out there, casing the neighborhoods and looking for packages that are sitting on the porch that have not yet been brought inside. And so consumers when they know a package is coming, it's good to make sure you know when the package is going to be arriving to alert a family member or neighbor to make sure somebody is there. The skimmers have been around for a long time and we've really not given much notice to them because we go into stores, we swipe our cards and don't think anything of it. And then when our statements come in we look at them hopefully with a fine tooth comb to determine the transactions are ones you actually were the driver behind. But in the last few months, we've been finding skimmers inside gas dispensers. We're not talking about the skimmers of the past that plop on top of the card reader and you can wiggle them and pull them off so you know they're fake. These are inside the gas dispensers. And so, we've been finding them throughout the State of Wisconsin mainly along major highway corridors very busy travel centers, but not solely in those areas. So, take a moment to look around the dispenser and if you see some multi colored tape about the size of a band aid, you see some tape that may be across the gap by the access panel. And if that tape is undisturbed, then you can feel confident that an inspection has occurred by that dispenser and it's been sealed up. You may also want to look around the key lock system to see if you see any tampering marks because someone may have tried to pick it, to open the panel and then splice the skimmer on the inside. One way to avoid this is to pay with cash, an old fashioned idea that still works.

One hundred ninety people died in alcohol related crashes last year, nearly three thousand were injured. Local law enforcement gathered for a joint event today on Interstate 90 to publicize a nationwide campaign to get drunk drivers off the road. As News 19's Tianna Vanderhei tells you, the decision to drink and drive is a split second choice with lifelong consequences. Drunk driving continues to be one of the deadliest crimes in Wisconsin. A first offense costs about \$1,000, in addition to a license suspension. From there second and subsequent offenses are criminal acts. But that doesn't take into account the ultimate price; someone may have to pay for driving intoxicated, killing themselves or someone else. A \$1,000 ride in a patrol car or \$20 for a cab is the difference in planning for a night out or being pulled over and arrested with an OWI. An average of one person was killed or injured in an alcohol related crash every 239 hours on Wisconsin roadways in 2015, that's according to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, and law enforcement is out in full force ensuring everyone can enjoy the holidays. He adds it's a regrettable thing, having to arrest someone with an OWI charge at any time during the year especially over Christmas, reminding everyone to create a plan before celebrating the season. The Zero in Wisconsin Drive Sober Mobile App helps drivers choose a designated driver before they start drinking, or find a cab if they need an alternative route home. It's available on ITunes and Google Play. December is also National Impaired Driving Prevention Month, reminding motorists that driving under the influence of drugs, including prescription medication, is just as illegal and dangerous as drunk driving.

Slug: DRUG BUST

Complaints of erratic driving led West Salem police to arrest a woman on drug charges. West Salem police stopped 25-year-old Douazhong Vu of La Crosse yesterday after a report of erratic driving. Slug: DRUG CONSPIRACY

The La Crosse Police Department says it's looking for 4 men believed to be involved in bringing heroin and cocaine to the city. The warrants come after a year and a half long investigation into drug dealing in La Crosse using surveillance and confidential informants. Last month police arrested Douglas Owens and Juanita Owens in La Crosse. Police say they seized more than \$24,000 worth of drugs from two locations. They now face possession charges as well as conspiracy to deliver heroin and cocaine. Police have issued nationwide arrest warrants for these four men. The unnamed gymnast claims USA gymnastics and coaches Bela and Martha Karolyi turned a blind eye to Nassar's abuse, with the lawsuit claiming both USA gymnastics and the Karolyis concealed sexual and physical abuses at their elite training facility in Texas to protect their reputations and businesses. Nassar served as USA gymnastics' team physician during four Olympic Games, and has not been criminally charged. He left his position with USA gymnastics last fall and was fired from Michigan State University.

Slug: COCAINE GUYS

New details were released in a big drug bust over the weekend. The man convicted in the 2012 double homicide at May's Photo in downtown La Crosse is seeking a new trial. Jeffrey Lepsch is serving two consecutive life sentences for the deaths of Paul and AJ Petras. He says his 6th Amendment right to an impartial jury was violated and his appeal was heard by the Supreme Court today. News 19's Caroline Hecker is live at the capital. She sat in on oral arguments today and brings you the latest. If you're from the La Crosse area this is a particularly haunting case. Paul and AJ Petras were shot dead in their store during a robbery. Now, just over 4 years later, their family is being forced to relive it as his appeals case has traveled up the chain and was heard in front of the Wisconsin Supreme Court. Today Lepsch's attorney's main argument is that several of the jurors on the trial were not impartial. In fact, he says of the 12 jurors and one alternate, four of them expressed bias when filling out their questionnaires before trial. He went on to say none of those biases were ever examined further and therefore those jurors should not have been on the jury. The state claims none of the jurors were biased and said Lepsch's trial attorneys were satisfied with the answers given on the questionnaire as well as in person, so much so they didn't ask for anyone to be removed. There are some precedents the court will be looking at when forming its decision. If Lepsch is successful in his appeal he will likely be granted a new trial. That decision will likely be in the next couple of months. The jury during Lepsch's trial deliberated for about four and a half hours before reaching a guilty verdict on all charges.

The county attorney made the decision after reviewing evidence, including dash-cam video, which has not been made public, but reportedly captured Castille telling Officer Jeronimo Yanez he had a gun. Moments later investigators say Yanez fired 7 shots into the car. The aftermath streamed live on Facebook by Castille's girlfriend in the passengers' seat. Castille's death sparked protests and accusations of racism, including from Minnesota's Governor. No comment yet from Yanez or his attorneys, but Castille's family says they are relieved that the officer is being held accountable. Yanez expected to turn himself in and is scheduled to face a judge on Friday

An update now on the Brendan Dassey case .A federal judge has ordered the convicted killer released from prison by Friday at eight pm. Federal judge William Duffin overturned Dasseys conviction back in August, ruling police improperly obtained his confession, that he was tricked into confessing given the 16 year olds age and learning disability. In the mid 2000's Wisconsin began requiring video recording during police interrogations. This change has helped prosecutors and defense attorneys. But it's resulted in some challenges as well. News 19's Tianna Vanderhei spoke with a local attorney and judge and is here with the details. La Crosse County Judge Scott Horne says video evidence makes it crystal clear for courts and juries who are trying to make decisions during trials, but sometimes it's more complicated than what meets the eye. When taking testimony during a trial the jury typically watches a recorded interview first, listening closely to what was said and trying to decipher what value to place on those statements. A prime and public example is the Brendan Dassey case.

Yellowstone is world-renowned for its beautiful scenery. But it also could be the backdrop for the perfect murder. Lacey Darrow has a closer look at the legal loophole that makes a small portion of Yellowstone National Park in Idaho a place where someone could get away with murder. When people think of Yellowstone usually they think about Old Faithful, roaming bison and crystal clear streams. What may never cross anyone's mind; murder in particular how to get away with murder, an unsavory thought to be sure. Brian Kalt, a law professor at Michigan State, maintains the sliver of Yellowstone that rests within Idaho is the perfect place to commit the perfect crime. In fact the legality of a Yellowstone murder comes down to the old saying, location, location, location. Federal court districts follow state lines. Wyoming is in the District of Wyoming. Idaho is in the District of Idaho mostly but the 50 mile stretch of Yellowstone located in Idaho is in the District of Wyoming. So, purely hypothetically, if you, me or anyone else were to say partake in a murderous vacation to the remote Idaho section of Yellowstone, You might, just maybe, get away with murder. Kalt acknowledges his theory is by no means air tight. He says if you conspired to kill outside of the area then committed the crime in no man's land you could find yourself in hot water with a conspiracy charge. But as for a murder charge you may be guilty as sin, but still be free as a bird. A common argument is that the state wouldn't just let someone get away with murder. They'd find a way to prosecute. But because it is federal land, the state has no power to prosecute crimes there. Kalt says he doesn't encourage anyone to commit the crime. In fact, he wanted to find a solution to the problem. And he says it won't take much to change the law. More than a decade after Kalt published his paper the loophole still exists, and Kalt's not giving up, but he's tackling this fight far away from Yellowstone.

The holiday season is a busy time for parties and family get-togethers. If your gatherings include alcohol, make sure it doesn't ruin your holiday, or your life. On average in Wisconsin, alcohol related crashes kill one person every three hours. As News 19's Tianna Vanderhei explains, the price to pay runs much deeper than what's printed on a citation. Even with a blood alcohol content level, or BAC, as low as .04, one's judgement is impaired, and the risk for an accident or injury increases. And with holiday parties and gatherings over the next few weeks, the chances heighten. A simple phone call can make a big difference. While a first offense results in a large ticket and mandatory suspension, second and subsequent OWI offenses are criminal acts. Schroeder adds that the ticket amount can be somewhat nominal compared to the loss of a job and possible career change as a result of someone's actions. Last year alone the economic loss due to alcohol related crashes in Wisconsin cost the state more than 400-million dollars, that's according to the National Safety Council. The Wisconsin Department of Transportation's Zero in Wisconsin Drive Sober Mobile Application helps people estimate their blood alcohol level, select a designated driver and find a safe ride home. The app provides users with taxi services and numbers in their area. It's available on ITunes and Google Play for download.

Slug: NITEK CHARGE

It's been one month since the fatal shooting of a Rusk County Sheriff's deputy, and still no charges have been filed in the case. It was Halloween weekend when Rusk County Deputy Dan Glaze was shot to death while investigating a report of a suspicious vehicle south of Ladysmith. After a search and a standoff, which included deputies being fired on Doug Nitek was taken into custody. But now, one month later, the investigation is still not finished. The Eau Claire County Sheriff's office is handling the investigation. Sheriff Ron Cramer told me while the lion shares of reports have been completed; they are still doing follow-up interviews. He says the trajectory of bullets has to be determined. And because deputy glaze was shot from a distance, they are using aerial photos to make sure their information is accurate. Cramer says they are also trying to track Nitek's movements before the shooting, to determine what led up to it. Nitek had a long history of run-ins with the law, but Cramer would not say if deputy glaze had previous contacts with him. Cramer says two of his investigators, and two from Chippewa County, are working the case full time, along with a forensics lab technician, and reconstruction experts from the state patrol. Cramer says it's not unusual for an investigation to take this long, and says he has no idea when it will be done. He also says there's no rush, since Nitek is being held for violating probation from a repeat drunk driving conviction. Nitek remains in a cell just like this one, in the Barron County jail. Jail administrator Tim Evenson told me Nitek is classified as a maximum security inmate, based on his criminal history, his past behavior in custody, and the significant violence surrounding the current case. The Department of Corrections revoked Nitek's probation Monday which means he will go to prison on that drunk driving case, Evenson says probably within a week or two. An Assistant Attorney General is handling prosecution of his murder case, that's in part because the Rusk County DA lost his re-election bid and a new DA will take over in January.

Slua: HUMAN TRAFFIC

A human trafficking survivor in Mexico turned activist hopes to use her experience to target those creating the demand for the industry. Rafael Romo reports that this woman's journey to safety was long and especially difficult because many of her abusers were in positions of authority. She travels the world, telling her story. Her name is Karla Jacinto. By her own estimate, she was raped more than 43,200 times by the time she turned 16. After being forced to work as a prostitute for four years, she was rescued during a police raid and taken to a shelter. Over several years, she says, she went from being a victim to a trusted volunteer who would help and give advice to other victims. When we first met Karla in early 2015, she was still recovering from her deep emotional wounds and harrowing memories of sexual abuse. She says she wants the world to know human trafficking is part of today's reality and every child is at risk. Karla says some of the men who abused her were in law enforcement. Rosi Orozco, a former Mexican Congresswoman who now fights against human trafficking, says men in positions of power were among Karla's worst abusers. Last July, she told her story to Pope Francis at the Vatican during an international conference about modern-day slavery. In the end, she says, her main goal is raising awareness and protecting girls and boys so that they don't fall prey to human traffickers like she did. In just four days an international operation led by the FBI made hundreds of arrests and rescued 82 teens from sex trafficking.

Slug: OHIO TUESDAY

Classes resumed at Ohio State University this morning. That's where police say a suspect drove a car into a crowd of classmates, and then jumped out stabbing several students. Now, there is a search for answers as investigators look into possible links to ISIS. There was a threatening announcement before a terrifying assault: this is OSU. We have a vehicle that struck several pedestrians. According to law enforcement officials, a mere three minutes before the first call for help, Abdul Razak Ali Artan posted to Facebook "I can't take it anymore, America! Stop interfering with other countries, especially

the Muslim Ummah. We are not weak. We are not weak, remember that." And then Columbus Division of Fire, Franklin County Fire and EMS "Be advised, we got a man with a knife running around, ah cutting people." The FBI is digging deeper to learn what pushed the Somali immigrant overboard, leading to the attack in his adoptive country's homeland. Artan was recently profiled in the Ohio State University campus newspaper The Lantern, blaming the media for Muslims feelings scared on campus. Authorities believe he may have become radicalized and are looking into recent ISIS propaganda urging followers to copy the vehicle attack that took place in Nice, France killing 84 people, and just two days ago, the terrorist group posting this video instructing followers how to use a knife to attack nonbelievers. In all, eleven people were hurt, one critically. Police saying it may have been worse were it not for the campus police officer who was in the right place at the right time. Our officer was on-scene in less than a minute and he ended the situation in less than a minute. He engaged the suspect and he eliminated the threat. The officer who brought an end to the rampage by killing the attacker was able to reach the scene so quickly, less than a minute after it began, because he was investigating a gas leak nearby to where the attacks took place.

A former Eau Claire teacher faces two felonies for exposing a child to harmful material. According to the criminal complaint one of Merlin Kardin students reported seeing pornographic images on his computer during class over the course of two days. The principal, along with a Chippewa Falls Police Department officer, confronted Kardin and had him open his internet tabs in class. There they say they saw an image of a woman breastfeeding on his Facebook page from the group 'science porn'. Kardin claimed he had never seen it before. He is scheduled back in court January 18th.

Slug: MILW ABUSE

Another example of the tragic cycle of child abuse in our society: one of the two women arrested in the death of a 7-year-old child was previously convicted of neglecting a child who also died from his injuries. In the most recent case, police say the boy had numerous injuries when he was brought to the hospital Tuesday and died a short time later. Police have arrested two women in the death and two men for failing to prevent injury. Court documents show one of the women was convicted of fatal child neglect in the 2003 death of a 1-year-old boy. She served 18 months in prison.

Slug: MKE SHERIFF

A clash between Milwaukee County's Sheriff and area leaders continues to grow. Some officials are calling for Sheriff David Clarke to resign following deaths at the jail, this coming as Clarke is being considered for a spot in Donald Trump's administration. In October, reports surfaced publicly that four deaths happened inside the Milwaukee County jail this year. The next day the sheriff called Chief Medical Examiner Brian Peterson threatening to get his license revoked. In an email sent to County Executive Chris Abele on October 29, Peterson said he was subjected to some 20 minutes of yelling and threats against his license for no good reason. Abele says the County Executive Office stands behind the medical examiner's decision to release information. The family of one of the inmates who died in jail is suing. They want to find out if he was denied water leading to the medical examiner's ruling of extreme dehydration in his death. Milwaukee County is taking a closer look at medical care inside the jail.

It's an update to a story we brought you in September. West Salem native Barbara Kendhammer died after her husband told investigators a metal pipe came through the windshield and struck her as the two were traveling on County Road M in the Town of Hamilton. That incident is now under investigation as a homicide. News 19's Caroline Hecker is here to explain what investigators think happened and who they allege is responsible. After nearly three months of investigating this incident, the La Crosse County Sheriff's department arrested Barbara's husband, Todd Kendhammer this morning, charging him with first degree intentional homicide. Family and friends say they are shocked and do not believe Todd is responsible for his wife's death. Todd originally told investigators a metal pipe flew off a southbound truck as he and his wife were traveling northbound on County Highway M on the morning of September 16th. He said the pipe came through the windshield, striking his wife, but the criminal complaint tells a slightly different story, with eye witnesses in the area telling police they saw a car off the side of the road with the passenger side door open and no damage to the windshield during the timeframe Kendhammer described to investigators. Within minutes they say they heard sirens. The state crime lab did extensive testing at the scene and it found the pattern of the shattered glass found on the inside of the car indicated no one was sitting in the passenger seat at the time the pipe hit the windshield. The autopsy conducted on Barabara Kendhammer found she died of blunt force trauma to the head, but also found injuries to the neck and extremities that suggest a possible physical struggle. Todd Kendhammer is currently being held in La Crosse County jail on \$250,000 cash bond. The La Crosse County Sheriff's department is calling the homicide a "domestic incident." Online records show Todd Kendhammer has no previous arrests, charges, or convictions.

Sentencing is February 17th.

The trial for the La Crosse man accused of stabbing his wife to death in front of their children is underway in La Crosse County Circuit Court. Thirty five year old Haron Joyner is charged with first degree intentional homicide in the death of 29 year old Jessica Joyner after police say he stabbed her a number of times following an argument in their apartment last March. News 19's Caroline Hecker spent the day in court and is here now to explain what the defense is looking to convince the jury of. If there is one thing the two sides can agree on, it's that Haron Joyner did stab his wife Jessica, resulting in her death. However his defense attorney is arguing a different point. He says Joyner did not intend to kill his wife. As a result he believes the jury should find him quilty of first degree reckless homicide, not first degree intentional homicide, the difference being the lack of intent as well as the lesser sentence that charge carries. We do want to warn you, some of the images you're about to see are disturbing. Today the jury heard opening arguments from the prosecution and defense. Photos of the crime scene were shown, along with a video taken on Jessica's cell phone moments before the stabbing. Police officers and investigators who processed the scene were called to testify by the state. The defense argues the two had been bickering back and forth all day and Haron Joyner "snapped", grabbing a knife without thinking and stabbing his wife. But the prosecution says he did so intending to kill his wife and believes the jury should find him guilty of that first degree intentional homicide charge. Later on this week, the jury will watch several videos of the children being interviewed about the homicide. The Dane County medical examiner who performed the autopsy on Jessica Joyner also testified. She says Jessica suffered 3 stab wounds, one to her arm, one to her neck and another to her temple. She testified it was the stab wound to her neck that caused her death, severing both her jugular and carotid artery. If convicted of first degree intentional homicide, Haron Joyner faces life in prison.

A local lawyer wants to warn you about a particular Facebook post asking you to participate in a wine exchange. He warns that it is a scam. Here's what it looks like. Attorney Brent Smith says the scam

calls for 6 people to join, asking each to buy a bottle of wine for at least \$15. Then they send that bottle to someone and in exchange they receive a number of bottles. Smith says it's a pyramid scheme and you should stay away from it. Smith says if you are interested in a wine exchange this holiday season do it with people you know and trust.

Prosecutors in Winona have charged a 20 year old man in the alcohol related accidental shooting death of a friend. The Sheriff's Department says Lucas Schultz faces second degree manslaughter charges in the death of 20 year old Riley Holden Sassloken in November. Officials say a group of men were drinking alcohol at an apartment on East Third Street in Winona. Schultz went to his room and returned with a .22 caliber handgun and jokingly pointed it at the victim's face. When he pulled the trigger, witnesses say the gun fired and struck Sassloken in the face. He died a day later. If convicted, Schultz faces a maximum of 10 years in prison. He had a blood alcohol level of point one seven shortly after the shooting.

Forty six year old Todd Kendhammer told authorities last September his wife Barbara died after a metal pipe fell off a truck and came through the windshield of their car. The Dane County Medical Examiner testified that after conducting the autopsy. She found blunt impacts on Barbara's head and neck, abrasions on her checks and torn fingernails, all inconsistent with a pipe. Kendhammers lawyers challenged those findings.

Slug: BURKE

Former La Crosse Bishop Raymond Burke, who became a cardinal in the Catholic Church in 2010, now faces an investigation into his actions that may have put him at odds with Pope Francis. It's a bit complicated, but at issue is the church's stance against artificial birth control. Cardinal Burke is under investigation by the Vatican for engineering the removal of a church official for condoning the use of condoms to protect sex slaves in the Nation of Myanmar from being infected with AIDS. Even though the official in question did not take part in the condom distribution, he was aware of the program. Burke supported the process of removing the official, saying he was carrying out the wishes of Pope Francis, which was not the case. In fact, the Pope is on record as saying avoiding pregnancy is not an absolute evil, in cases such as women protecting themselves from the Zika Virus. Burke has been outspoken in his disagreements with some of Pope Francis's policies. The Vatican is investigating the circumstances leading up to the removal of the church official, although it's unclear what the consequences may be. Burke, a Richland Center native, served as Bishop for the Diocese of La Crosse from 1995-2003.

The State Supreme Court is expected to rule this week on whether the State Justice Department has to turn over training videos featuring Republican Attorney General Brad Schimel to the Wisconsin Democratic Party. The party filed a lawsuit in 2014 seeking videos of presentations Schimel gave at DOJ seminars in 2009 and 2013 on how to prosecute sexual predators. Schimel was the Waukesha County District Attorney at the time he gave the presentations. The Democrats alleged Schimel may have made inappropriate remarks during the seminars. DOJ attorneys say releasing the videos could reveal investigative techniques and re-traumatize the victims in the cases Schimel used as examples. The Supreme Court is expected to rule on the release Wednesday.

Slug: HOLMEN OFFICER

We now know the name of the officer involved in a drug investigation shooting in Holmen last week. The La Crosse Police Department says investigator James Mancuso fired several shots at a suspect's car after they fled during an arrest. Mancuso has been on the force for 10 years and is currently assigned to the drug unit within the investigative bureau. The department says it is policy to place an officer on paid administrative leave for an officer involved shooting incident.

Slug: RITTER

As we reported, a La Crosse police officer was struck by a car when the driver, 24 year old Brandon Ritter attempted to flee police. That officer then fired several shots at Ritter's fleeing car which came to a rest in a snowbank. He was arrested and that officer suffered minor injuries. Today Brandon Ritter appeared in court. Brandon Ritter faces six charges, three of which involve possession and intent to sell methamphetamine. This investigation and his subsequent arrest is a result of a controlled buy with the help of a confidential informant. Investigators arranged for the informant to purchase meth from Ritter and if that informant saw additional meth in his possession the decision would be made to arrest him. Ritter agreed to sell 2 eight balls of meth to the informant or about 7 grams, but then offered another 2 grams for an additional 100 dollars. When the controlled buy was over and the informant left the scene, investigators attempted to block Ritter's car in the parking lot. However when he saw one

of the investigators get out of his car and approach him he accelerated, that officer going up onto the hood of Ritter's car and bouncing off as he drove into a snowbank. He was then placed under arrest. All of this work, a relatively new approach for La Crosse county officials, according to the criminal complaint. The officer that was struck by Ritter's car said he jumped up right before being hit and stated if he hadn't jumped he likely would have been run over. After Ritter was placed in custody, he was taken to the hospital for any injuries. That's when he told police he did not know the person in front of him was a cop and complained police shot at him without their emergency lights on. While at the scene investigators located a plastic bag buried in the snow near Ritter's car. It contained 36.4 grams of methamphetamine as well as the money given to the confidential informant for the controlled buy. Ritter's bail was set at \$25,000.

A Baltimore judge denied bail to Adnan Syed, the subject of the hit podcast "Serial", as he awaits a new trial. Syed was a teen when prosecutors say he killed his ex-girlfriend and buried her body in a park in 1999. He was convicted in 2000 and sentenced to life in prison, but the 2014 podcast raised questions that led a judge to vacate his sentence and order a new trial. In denying bail, the judge cited issues including the prosecutor's appeal of the order for a new trial.

The Coon Valley man accused of killing the family dog with a hammer is formally charged today. Fifty one year old Joseph Clements faces a charge of mistreatment of animals along with disorderly conduct. On Tuesday, Clement's ex-wife called police saying he killed their family dog "Thor" with a hammer in front of their 2 children. Police interviewed the children who said their father got mad at Thor for urinating on their bedding. Police found the family dog 70 yards from the house where Clements said he threw him over the fence. He could face up to 4 years in prison and an \$11,000 fine if convicted.

Authorities arrested five Dakota Access Pipeline protesters in North Dakota Tuesday for criminal trespassing because they violated an agreement with law enforcement to stay off the Backwater Bridge. For months, members of the Standing Rock Sioux tribe and their supporters camped; fighting the Pipeline they say could be hazardous and damage the water supply of their reservation. They won a big victory earlier this month, when the Army Corp of Engineers announced it will look for an alternate route for the pipeline to cross under a major lake.

However, those neighbors are part of about 400 dairy farms across Wisconsin that have shut down. Now there are just about 9,400 dairy herds in the state. That's down 4% from 2015. Mess be-

News 19s Brittany Lake takes you to a farm in Coon Valley where the hay bales have a different purpose. Sunshine and blue skies in November mean farmers have great weather to harvest. On the Gilbeck Farm in Coon Valley their hay helps their herd. Gary Gilbeck grew up here. His wife Terry moved in when they got married 44 years ago. Neighbors call the Gilbecks the most gracious and kind people you'll meet. But like many farm families they couldn't convince their son to stay. Gary and Terry's son Chad ditched the farm life for a more 21st century job. This techie passed up art school for a more lucrative degree, now he's the technology guru at Viterbo. Chad is popular around campus, and not only because he fixes computers. Chad channels his artistic side on the side of a hay bale. With a white bale as his canvas and his finger on a can of spray paint Chad churns out a masterpiece; art that fits the culture. Although Chad didn't stay on the farm to work, he comes back to make artwork. And the farmers reap the benefits. His agricultural art is his contribution on the farm. As the farmers work starts to taper, Chad's artwork has only just begun. If you want to drive out to the farm to see his creations first hand it is two miles from Coon Valley next to Norskedalen.

A native aquatic plant missing from the bay of Green Bay is set to return. A thousand pounds of wild rice is ready to be seeded in waters it disappeared from decades ago. Recent test plots show the rice and grow and flourish thanks to improvements in water clarity and erosion control. Slug: FEATHERSTONE

After one of the wettest summers many farmers suffered major crop loss. Featherstone Farm fits that mold, losing more than \$100,000 worth of cabbage. The certified organic farm is now turning to the community for help in fear of closing its doors if it doesn't reach its capital campaign goal. News 19's Caroline Hecker toured the farm today and explains why the owner says it's a dire situation. In the farming industry it's all about timing, and Featherstone Farm is unique in that it doesn't offer what are known as more resilient crops like corn and beans. It focuses on organic vegetables, many of which did not survive the summer rains. The farm estimates it lost around \$350,000 in crops this year, mostly in the form of cabbage. The farm relies on a diverse assortment of crops to limit damage in down years, but this year that strategy did not work. More than 120 tons of cabbage that would normally be in storage and on its way to stores is lost. So the farm is turning to customers and supporters, looking to raise \$150,000 by Thanksgiving. The farm employs 50 people, both full and part time. Many have been with Jack for years, and if the farm closes, would be forced to look for other work. The farm also produces things like cauliflower, tomatoes, carrots, melons, onions. All suffered, but most of the money was lost with cabbage. He tells me in 20 years he's never seen persistent rain like we had late this summer.

UWL is installing new rain gardens to help eliminate pollutants that go through the sewer system that leads to the campus. News 19's Alex Wasilenko is here now with information on how this will affect the Mississippi River and what it means for the UWL Campus. We all know that the Mississippi River isn't as clean as we would like it to be, but UWL is taking a step in the right direction in trying to reduce the pollutants that enter the river through storm water runoff. Storm water runoff can have lasting impacts on the environment and can increase flooding risks across the Coulee Region. UWL has implemented approximately twenty rain gardens across campus that with help of indigenous plants can soak up that extra storm water run-off. This allows any pollutants from storm runoff to be filtered by the soil and ground as opposed to going straight to the Mississippi River.

Slug: CONSERVANCY

According to the Mississippi Valley Conservancy 30,000 acres of farmland are lost to development each year. One way the conservancy tries to combat that trend is entering into permanent legal agreements with owners called conservation easements. News 19's Sam Shilts introduces you to someone in Coon Valley in one of those agreements and explains just how it's use to preserve land. Farming has been a part of Rod Ofte's family history for generations. Ofte grew up on a dairy farm and became the owner of Willow Creek Ranch in 2007. Ofte's children aren't planning on taking over the family business, meaning if the farm needs to change hands the land is at risk of being altered for new developments; that's where the Mississippi Valley Conservancy comes in. Ofte, along with 130 other landowners, have a conservation easement with the conservancy, a permanent legal agreement giving up development rights in the interest of preserving farmlands, meaning if and when the land changes owners it will always remain a farmland. He says one way of making that positive impact is preserving these lands and working with nature instead of against it. So far the conservancy says they have entered into 130 easements for roughly 18,000 acres of land.

Record-breaking warm temperatures over the Arctic triggered a late fall freeze and now extreme melting of ice and snow. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration found that the Arctic's air temperature is 6 degrees higher than it was in 1900, creating record low sea ice and snow cover. And that change in the Arctic's environment is negatively affecting some small animals. It's also responsible for the early widespread growth of tiny marine plants that serve as the base of the marine food chain.

A US-Canadian agency is considering additional ways to measure the safety of Great Lakes water for drinking and activities such as swimming and fishing. Additionally, the researchers are calling for close monitoring of invasive Asian Carp, which might out-compete native fish species if they infest the Great Lakes.

Some good news about wildlife in Wisconsin; wildlife officials recently counted a record number of occupied eagle nests. The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and staff from other conservation groups completed an aerial survey that shows 1,500 occupied eagle nests. That number is up 39 from last year. DNR pilots conducted the survey in March and April. Officials say eagles are expanding into new territories. The first bald eagle survey was flown in late March and April to locate occupied nests and the second survey was flown in late May and June to count young and determine nest suc-

cess. Occupied eagle nests were observed in 69 of 72 counties in the state. Additional ground observations were provided by landowners and volunteers.

That bear is now in confinement with Wild Instincts, a non-profit wild animal rehab center in Rhinelander where it will be allowed to hibernate through the winter before it will be evaluated to make sure its bizarre behavior is not a result of a medical condition for the safety of the public. The bear will not be released back into the wild. Instead, they will try to find it a permanent home at a zoo and if they can't, they say they will be forced to put it down.

The City of La Crosse is rich in history, much of which can be seen in the cities plethora of old homes. But some say as those homes age, part of the city's history is lost in the shuffle. News 19's Ginna Roe introduces us to a La Crosse family doing more than transforming an old home, but bringing out the characters that use to live there. When Courtney Lokken and her husband Lucas Schwaller moved from Chicago in January of 2015 they knew they wanted to take some the convenience of the big city with them. They wanted to be able to walk to the library, the YMCA, even the grocery store. They found the perfect location, on 8th and Cass Street, but the house needed some work. Now, after a year and half of restoring and renovating, they can finally call that house their home. At first glance this 95 year old home might not look worth saving. But if you look a little closer there's history in these walls, something worth salvaging. It just took the right people to notice. Right after moving in the Schwaller family started renovating. They gutted most of the place but left its character; French doors, heat grates, and of course, the floors. But there's another part of this home this family chooses to keep alive; the people lived here before them. Ori j. Sorenson, former Mayor of La Crosse and the crafts-

man that built the house generations before them, and still these are faces the Schwallers want their 2 year old daughter Margo to know. As she plays here in her parents creation she's breathes new life into what was once old. And as their family grows they'll continue to share the stories of this home. When the Schwallers bought the home they went out of their way to learn more about the Sorenson family. They looked up their ancestry and actually contacted Ori and Ava's living relatives. They say it helps them feel connected to their home. Keeping its history alive is important them. Courtney says her hope is that more families will do the same, move into La Crosse neighborhoods and make historic homes their own, to carry on tradition and keep La Crosse's identity alive. Courtney is the niece of Jay Lokken, who own RLR Properties. Together with his business partners, husband Ken Riley and Dick Record, they're working to restore a number of historic homes in La Crosse. This is where Courtney and Lucas originally got the idea to restore and renovate an old home.

The boat owner says a man fitting Ben's description climbed onto his boat around 12 a.m. The boat owner told the man it was private boat and asked him to get off. He responded "no, you get off." The boat owner went back into the cabin of the boat and locked the door behind him. He told the sheriff's department he heard a splash. When he woke up the next morning he found footprints on the front of the boat and two drops of blood.

It's time now to meet this month's Jefferson Award winner. Those of you familiar with the award know that the recipients are nominated by someone in the community and then a committee does interviews and research about that person. The Jefferson Award is a prestigious honor. News 19's Heather Armstrong joins us now to tell us about this month's winner. This month's recipient is Charles Hinders, a La Crescent man making a big impact in the lives of people thousands of miles away. Charles designed the first motorized float still used in the Applefest Parade today, but said he was sitting in church one Sunday when he heard about a volunteer project that gave him the chills and inspired him to use his handy work in a much different way. Charles Hinders is tough stuff; the tall, strong man is a product of his childhood which he appreciates but doesn't miss. Charles Hinders, poor, tough on the farm, back in the 40's. You get up about 4 in the morning, do chores and go to school. Hinders says he thought he knew hardship. We take a lot for granted, we can get around; we are mobile. We can eat a good three meals a day. Hinders and his wife Sandy were in church when they heard about the pet project, a mobility cart that helps people in poor countries with disabilities get around. Hinders was immediately interested. Thomas Lyons is a friend of hinders for 35 years and says the work Charles does is the epitome of selfless. Hinders says he is shocked by the amount of people who need the mobility cart. In fact he gets so choked up describing this picture that his wife Sandy has to explain. Two years ago Charles built a garage meant to be somewhat of a man cave but today is it is much more fulfilling. He is so dedicated to it that he's out here every day working on something and there's just no limit when it comes to this project. The pet cart project is transitioning to the name, Mobility Worldwide, if you're interested in learning more about it. Charles told me that one man was so excited when he got his cart that he drove 17 miles non-stop to check out the place where he lived, a place he had never seen. Many of these people live walking around on their hands. The cart not only gives them the ability to go to work and be self-sufficient, but it also gives them the chance to look someone in the eye rather than looking at them from the ground, and Charles says that alone makes it worthwhile. Charles and his wife Sandy are always looking for volunteers to help paint the wood slabs for the carts.

Tonight we introduce you to a Sparta man who basically runs his own ministry doing odd jobs to help the disabled, seniors and widows, but he's also an integral part of adding to the recreation trails in Sparta. News 19's Heather Armstrong joins us now to tell us how this project started. Jim Cook is our October recipient of the Jefferson Wward. Jim grew up in Warrens, working in the cranberry marsh making 50 cents an hour. He thought he was rich and that if you have money what else do you need. Well, things changed when Jim met his wife, Joan. Her parents were farmers who taught him about volunteering. Today, it's an integral part of his life. The idea to connect Sparta walk and bike trails by bridges happened over a cup of coffee. With this month's Jefferson Award winner James Cook and another one, Rheinhard Mueller, Jim Cook, the October recipient, worked side by side. Mueller, who says his friend deserves just as much recognition for more than just his role in building bridges. Working through all types of weather, Jim and his buddies, who call themselves the 5 Shovelmen, built five bridges with their own hands from design, to gathering material to even fundraising one million dollars. Jim credits his wife and her family for influencing him to volunteer. And for the record, Jim is a lot older than he looks, 80 going on 81 that is. But Jim says why stop when there is so much to do. Helping neighbors is a big part of his personal ministry. At 36 Jim aged out of the Jaycees, a civic engagement and leadership group, which he calls a blessing in disguise. Because of that, he had time to start a much needed Boy Scout troop in Sparta. It did much more than just help kids. Some days Jim says the bones start to hurt a bit more but the trick is to keep moving. It keeps you young. But there's a lot more to it than that. Jim and the 5 Shovelmen also restored an old school house in Monroe County. Every year kids take a day trip there and Jim says the kids enjoy it so much they always ask if they can come back. Jim is a Korean War veteran. He credits the military for teaching him discipline, structure and responsibility. Jim and his wife Joan are passing down the importance of bettering your community to their son who started the food compressor at Sparta High School, teaching students the importance of caring for the environment.

It's a program that originally started back in 2014, and since, has grown. The La Crosse Police Department wanted to create a new and innovative way to connect with the community, engaging people in a way that normal police patrolling could not. That's when the Neighborhood Resource Officers came to be. Teams of two focus on a particular neighborhood, building relationships and establishing a routine police presence. We spent some time with these officers to see how their work is impacting the community. Over the next three days you'll meet the officers patrolling the Washburn neighborhood, the Northside and the newest team, the Downtown Neighborhood Resource Officers. Ginna Roe introduces you to Officers Joel Miller and Alex Burg. When Officers Joel Miller and Alex Burg first heard about the chance to patrol downtown they jumped on it. They submitted their applications along with about a dozen other officers. They were hand chosen by the department, and if you the chance to spend a day with them you'll know why. They're not your typical police officers. And they don't do a typical job. Joel Miller and Alex Burg are the Downtown Neighborhood Resource Officers, positions the department added back in April. In just over 7 months these two are accomplishing a lot. It all starts with building relationships in the community. Miller and burg spend a lot of their time with La Crosse's homeless population, stopping by Cameron Park and Tent City several times a week. Calling each person by name, it's clear the officers are bridging a gap between law enforcement and a group of people that are often overlooked. But it's not just about making friendships; it's about safety and preventing downtown crime. Part of patrolling downtown means checking in with downtown business owners. While they don't mind giving Addiecakes their business, they're happy to offer their support, too, changing perceptions when it comes to policing. While their commitment to downtown benefits the department, it also leaves a long term impression that goes deeper than the average community policing. Officers Miller and Burg say this is the kind of job most cops would like to do, but don't have the opportunity or time to do so. They feel fortunate that the department has given the chance to invest in the downtown community. They say they're really starting to see a difference in their work.

We continue our series On the Beat; where we go on the job with the La Crosse Neighborhood Resource Officers. News 19s Brittany Lake takes you to the Northside where Officers Tyler Pond and Dale Gerbig are using the golden rule to police the community. A typical shift for La Crosse police officers starts by arriving at the station, getting in your squad car and immediately responding to calls. Instead of getting dispatched to call after call, the Neighborhood Resource Officers immerse themselves in the community and try to keep those calls from coming in. They don't triage calls, they know the community well enough to just drive around, notice something suspicious and address it. As neighborhood officers they can be the good cops, pick and choose their battles and treat residents the way they want to be treated. Letting people off the hook for minor infractions increases trust and creates relationships. Officer Dale Gerbig has been on the force for 17 years. His partner Officer Tyler Pond has 4 years' experience and has a self-described photographic memory. That comes in handy when meeting new people and working with area partners, like the community social worker. Another big need is mentors for kids. Unfortunately a lot of kids don't have dual parent households or a lot of supportive people in their lives, so having a positive mentor is a really big deal. Tyler and Dale have time to be those mentors for kids at the Boys and Girls Club. There's quite a few kids that come up to us and say why are you here who are you looking for and we want to break down that barrier and say we're here for you guys, wanna hang out, see what's going on, we're the neighborhood guys. And what do the kids think of these neighborhood guys? It's kinda fun when they're here because they make everything even more fun. I know police officers have a heart in them they actually have a family so I know they actually have a heart. These officers are policing from the heart and using their compassion to change the game. The neighborhood resource program is funded in part by a federal grant and local stakeholders that felt the need for community policing.

Time now for another edition of our series Everyone Has a Story. News 19's Heather Armstrong introduces you to two Onalaska women who have a lot in common, starting with their name. Wendy Franke, and Wendi Franke, say there were lots of clues that their worlds were about to collide starting over a decade ago. I first realized there was someone else named Wendy Franke when I would go to a local hospital and I go to the clinic and every time I would go in there they would say is this your social security number. This is before HIPPA. And that is only the beginning. The mix ups were becoming so common that they even got each other's lab results, and one knew that the other was pregnant before she did. The interesting part about that is I wasn't in any sort of relationship at that point and so my first thought about this miraculous conception was really. We have the same middle-name, we're only a year and a month apart in age. Our daughters are only a year and a month apart. Their lunch accts would get confused at school. Our dad's birthdays are only a couple days apart. We both have the black lab large mixes that are identical and we both have two small dogs. Her dog's name is Gary Franke and that's my dad's name. Our senior pictures are identical, you can't tell us apart. Wendi with an I says while all the confusion can get a little taxing there is an upside. I remember years back, an article that featured Wendy about the Red Kettle campaign and that the whole week people I work with it were saying, how do you have time to do all of this between your busy real estate and the Red Kettle Campaign. And I said I don't know. While the two women say they were brought together by a common name they admit to having bonded over much different things. My mother is only 65 but she's very sick and she's been in a nursing home for a long time. She has mental illness. She had some stuff shipped up here, a keepsake chest and there were all these mementos from her childhood. So it's just those kind of things. The two agree while having the same name has certainly made for a good story it's all the things in between that's made for a great friendship. We even talk about retiring together, we seriously talk about retiring somewhere warm together. It's like finding long lost family. The Wendy's say they have a lot of crossover with their businesses. Wendy with a Y sells neighborhood publications in the same neighborhood that Wendi with an "I" sells real estate in, and that makes for a lot of confusion on a daily basis, and a lot of funny stories. The two also volunteer and serve on a lot of the same boards. And even the day we showed up to do this story they had a mix up at the hairdresser.

The Boys and Girls Club first got the idea to renovate the center over two years ago. It was a collaborative effort between the club and Logan High School. They wanted to make the center more accessible to students after school. Now the entrance to club faces the high school. But the real need for renovations was simply the lack of space. Over 175 kids a day attend the Terry Erickson Club and they needed room to grow, especially when it came to their teen center. Now the teens have their own space, separate from the younger kids. Now the teens have a new recording studio, a place to play music and sing. They also have a new dance center and their own gym. Desmond says the kids are more than excited for all the new activities. Attendance is up, with over 30 more kids coming to the center each day. Construction started on the center back in February. In a matter of 8 months the Boy and Girls Club raised over 7 million dollars for the project.

One lifelong La Crosse resident and loyal north sider continues to serve the community long after his time in the service has passed. News 19's Tianna Vanderhei sat down with him and shares the pride he has for his country and the City of La Crosse. Louie Ferris is well known throughout the La Crosse community for his compassion and generosity. He tells me that when he was young Veterans Freedom Park in La Crosse was actually a dump and his siblings and he used to dig for pop bottles to sell to get an ice cream cone, which cost a nickel. While a lot of things have changed since then a couple things remain the same, his passion for the community and dedication to service. As a first generation American born of immigrant parents from Lebanon Louie Ferris knows first-hand that freedom is not free. Ferris was born and raised on the north side of La Crosse, growing up during the Great Depression. He lost his father at age 11 and after graduating from Logan High School in 1949 he enlisted in the Wisconsin National Guard, serving a tour with the US Air Force during the Korean War. Ferris now serves as the President of the Korean War Veterans Association in La Crosse, and played an instrumental role in making the Memorial in Veterans Freedom Park a reality. He also helps local Hmong Veteran volunteers with the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post and is the 2016 Torchlight Parade Marshal for Oktoberfest in La Crosse. Part of Louie's personal ministry, or mission, is to turn the tables and provide special care and company for those he says have lasting scars. And if you're looking for Louie on any given day you can usually find him sitting here sharing stories for those who can't tell their own. Louie says he's always been taught to be humble and do things behind the scenes. So initially he was thrown off when he was asked to be a parade marshal this year, a quite public volunteer position. But he says he's warmed up to the Oktoberfest Family and the lederhosen shorts and is excited for the rest of their adventures this year. Ferris has owned and operated several businesses in La Crosse over the years including Ferris Boot King, a Greek Guerrero Restaurant in the mall and Bon Appetite downtown, just to name a few. He also speaks six languages including Spanish, Arabic, German and French.

Curious, smart, strong; all are words to describe 11-year-old Jesse Plowman. It's tough to keep Jesse occupied at the doctor's office. It's tough for Jesse to reach milestones. It's hard for us as adults to realize how fragile a child's brain is. At just a few months old, Jesse was violently shaken. So to even to move back and forth is shaking the brain inside skull cavity and its rocking and hitting. He was quickly removed from his home and placed in foster care. Robin and Paul Plowman have experience treating children with shaken baby syndrome and know what it takes to be a foster parent. Loving Jesse was easy; finding out just how much damage was done was hard. Jesse has developmental delays. He has trouble seeing clearly, communicating properly and controlling his body. He is hospitalized often with health problems, some nearly fatal. Through everything Jesse is a fighter. He regained his strength, re-learned how to walk and is finally reaching a few milestones. His doctor credits his success to his family. His family credits the community. Jesse still has a long path ahead. With his determination in the driver's seat, and a supportive tailwind at his back he won't have to go at it alone. CMN hospitals have been there along the way supplying specialized equipment to support Jesse's development. Items include an in-home jungle gym, specialized car seat and the lpad and tricycle you saw in that story. Robin and Paul did adopt Jesse after being his foster parents for a few years. The adoption process was difficult because Jesse is Native American. November is also adoption month, a time to celebrate adopted children.

What the city gets is another family ready to help revitalize a struggling La Crosse neighborhood. The family is the second to capitalize on a program that provides affordable home ownership with funding for education. Families who qualify buy the home with the incentive of up to \$50,000 for higher education. News 19's Heather Armstrong met with the Johnson family and joins us now to share their story and enthusiasm about the program and their new home. The Johnson family is the 2nd family to benefit from the La Crosse Promise program. Today the family of 4 moved in to their new home that they built on an empty lot on a pretty run down street. But that is changing quickly. It's all part of an effort to revitalize the neighborhood and the Johnsons say it's an effort they are happy to be a part of. The floors, windows and stairs are all new, built from the bottom up on an empty lot. It's a big move for the family with small but significant changes for son Lucas. Before, the family had less space and even shared a bathroom. And while Lucas' mom says it's a modest house, it is all theirs. But the icing on the cake is that each of the couples 2 sons will get \$25,000 to use toward college. Celine says the house still needs a few finishing touches. Love, family and the promise of a bright future have already made it their home. For ten years, the City of La Crosse has been working to revitalize the south side, namely the Powell-Poage-Hamilton area. In September their efforts were recognized with an award from the Wisconsin Economic Development Association, which they say shows the La Crosse Promise model is working. To be eligible for the program, potential buyers need to occupy the house for at least 4 vears.

A Trempealeau police officer is being honored for his quick response and life saving measures as he responded to a serious accident in October. Officer Tim Moen was first on scene of a motorcycle versus car accident on Highway 35 near Centerville. Nearly three months later his department honored him with the first ever "Life Saving Award." Tim Moen says he was just doing his job that day. Ge joined the department 4 years ago and was out patrolling around Trempealeau when he received a call about that accident and it was his quick thinking and extensive training that meant the difference between life and death for the people involved. October 9th started off as any other day for Office Tim Moen, but that afternoon everything changed, and he quickly found himself in a life or death situation. The motorcycle driver and passenger were thrown 100 feet from the bike and that's when Officer Moen snapped into action. The department recently added tourniquets to their equipment belts, proving to be a life-saving tool that day. After stopping the driver's bleeding, he turned his attention to the passenger until help arrived. Since that day, he hasn't spoken to the man and woman he helped save Both victims survived the crash and as a result of his actions Moen was honored with a "Life Saving Award" from his department. And while an award is a nice reminder that his hard work is appreciated he'll tell you he was only doing his job. Officer Moen told me if anything can be learned from this story it's the importance of police officers carrying tourniquets. When he first arrived on scene a passer-by was using a belt to apply pressure but it wasn't working. He says had he not had the tourniquets on his belt the story would have likely ended very differently. The two motorcyclists who were injured were not from the area, but officer Moen is still holding out hope he hears from them one day.

Tonight you'll meet a Dakota Minnesota man working as a farrier, a person specializing in equine hoof care. Chuck Potter said animals were always on his radar. In high school he wanted to be a herpetologist, specializing in anything reptile. He even apprenticed with a doctor who would extract poisonous venom from snakes for research. As you're about to find out, Chuck's life took a few twists and turns, but it all led him back to doing what he loves most, working with animals. When Chuck Potter shows up he means business. The tools Chuck uses to trim hooves are pretty basic, and no two jobs are alike. But that's a good thing for the man with an exciting past as a Green Beret in the Special Forces. Chuck even worked as a body guard in Afghanistan. Being open to try new things is a big part of why Chuck found a job he loves, but if you ask him he'll most likely tell you it's all about following your passion. A few weeks ago Chuck was called to an animal rescue involving 14 horses with hooves that appear to have never been trimmed. Its stuff like this that Chuck said makes him mad. And another thing that makes Chuck mad, when people complain about their job. Chuck is more than just a farrier, he is also an inventor, coming up with the first ever Fix for Founder, a common and very painful condition affecting horses and donkeys, Chuck's "Hoof Cinch" device literally screws into the animals hoof forcing it to grow the right way and enables these animals to be able to grow their hoof correctly and walk again.

Growing Stars Child Development Center officially opened today. It's located on the corner of 711 West Montgomery Street in Sparta, just across from the high school. Across from Sparta High School stands a renovated daycare facility. Now known as Growing Stars Child Development Center, 711 Montgomery Street, previously known as Child First closed in early December and went up for sale in April. Schultz says her and her husband, Scott, were there right away, ready to make her dream a reality. The center offers 90% all natural organic foods. Recently hiring a cook who has a 90-day menu prepared making all meals from scratch. It's a familiar location for Sparta residents with updated technology and amenities, all ready to teach, care for and develop young minds. The building is 6,700 square feet and can accommodate up to ninety children. Growing Stars is currently open for enrollment, welcoming children ages six weeks to twelve years old with prices ranging from \$140 to \$190 per week, depending on age.

A sober living facility on La Crosse's north side is only a few months away from opening its doors. Driftless Recovery Incorporated is currently in the process of renovating the former St. Clara's Convent building on Caledonia Street. When it's complete it will house 16 individuals recovering from illicit drug and alcohol addiction. News 19's Caroline Hecker went along on a tour of the inside of the house and is here now to explain how it will serve its residents in a positive way. There has been a lot of pushback surrounding this project from some people living on the north side, telling city council they don't want recovering addicts living in their neighborhood. Hhowever, it seems we can't go a week without hearing about the opioid crisis, and Driftless Recovery says if you're wondering what you can do, its support this project. Today we got an inside look at the house during demolition. Ccrews are working primarily to expand the kitchen area to allow for more room, as well as renovating the bedrooms, living rooms and bathrooms. Those who live in the house will be required to go to work for 30 hours a week, attend recovery meetings, meet with a recovery mentor, follow all house rules and volunteer for at least 10 hours a month. The mission of Driftless Recovery is to use the house as a tool to help those in recovery become reintegrated into society. The facility will also include a house manager, Peter, who we spoke with. In recovery himself, he says he'll bring valuable experience and lessons to the house and says he hopes he can give back to the community that saved his life. If all goes as planned the facility will open in mid-January. If you're interested in applying for a spot in the house, keep an eye out on the Driftless Recovery website in the next few weeks for details on how.

Slug: CAVALIER TROUBLE

The historic Cavalier Theatre in downtown La Crosse is in need of major repairs and the owner is turning to social media for help. The Cavalier was issued an order to fix a bulging brick wall on the side of its structure by November 22nd. Those repairs are estimated to cost between \$30 and \$40,000, which, on top of other existing renovation projects, is creating a heavy financial burden. This comes after the Cavalier already suffered from September rainstorms damaging the roof and issues with a cracked water main. Owner Jason La Course says he's reluctant to ask for money or help out of personal pride but in this case, he's open to ideas. Total estimated repair costs right now are over \$50,000. Some projects have been put on hold to divert remaining funds towards fixing the wall. Plans are already in the works to get started on those repairs. La Course says so far the outpouring of support and fundraising ideas have been overwhelming and there may be light at the end of the tunnel. La Course says events previously scheduled at the theatre will go on as planned, despite these setbacks.

College graduates are leaving school with more debt than ever before; with the Institute of College Access and Success finding the average undergrad faced just over \$30,000 in loans last year, up 4% from 2014. That means these students will pay about \$300 a month for more than 10 years. Sixty eight percent of new, four-year graduates had loans last year, compared to 1993 where it was less than half of all new grads. The report did not include for-profit colleges, many of which have been criticized for their student loan practices.

Slug: DNR TAXIDERMY

In August, the DNR said hunters will no longer be allowed to bring whole deer carcasses across state borders into Minnesota. It's an effort to prevent Chronic Wasting Disease from spreading to Minnesota herds. News 19's Ginna Roe spoke with both the DNR and one La Crescent taxidermist who says his business will take a drastic hit. So far, there's hasn't been a case of Chronic Wasting Disease reported in Minnesota and the DNR wants to keep it that way. As the prevalence of the disease increases in neighboring states the department is asking hunters and taxidermists to cooperate with new regulations. But La Crescent taxidermist Ed Heberlein says the DNR is not considering is how this will impact his livelihood. For 28 years "Big" Ed Heberlein has been skinning, cleaning and mounting deer for his customers. A new Minnesota DNR regulation will prevent those hunters from bringing in any whole carcasses into Minnesota. They can still bring in meat that is boned, cut and wrapped, or antlers and skulls, but only if the deer's brain tissue is properly cleaned out. But Heberlein says not all hunters are trained to clean deer that thoroughly, that's his job. The DNR is asking for taxidermists their cooperation, to turn in any customers bringing deer across the border. The DNR says they're looking at the big picture, protecting Minnesota's deer herds from contacting the fatal and highly transmissible CWD. As he prepares for a \$20,000 hit, this year alone, Heberlein doesn't see it that way. And while that may be the case, the state says it's worth it, for the health of Minnesota herds. Chronic Wasting Disease affects the deer's brain, which then affects the deer's behavior, and ultimately leads to death. It's difficult to tell which deer are infected. The disease is transferred through contact between deer, spreading through saliva, urine or feces. Because of this, baiting and feeding deer in the State of Minnesota is illegal. Some counties in the State of Wisconsin have a ban on baiting and feeding deer. Here in La

Crosse County feeding deer is allowed. The Minnesota DNR says that is some parts of Wisconsin as many as 25% of the adult male herd is infected with Chronic Wasting Disease.

It's the work of many minds and multiple agencies. The Winona Bridge is under construction right now, with completion due in the fall of 2019. The Stillwater Bridge crossing the St. Croix River will be finished next fall, and the Red Wing Bridge project will start next spring.

No more long lines, removing shoes and jackets or fishing around for your liquids and computer. TSA pre-check allows you to expedite most of that process, skipping ahead to the security check. Frequent flyer Sara Teska is ready to speed up her travel process. That's why she's applying for the TSA pre check. First she'll have to pass a background check, complete with fingerprints and an \$85 enrollment fee for, good for 5 years. The whole process can be taken care of at the La Crosse Regional Airport. Travel Leaders agent Sherry Westby says her customers are taking advantage of the pre-check. Teska says she and her family choose to fly out of La Crosse any chance they get. Now as new pre-check members, the process will become even more convenient. TSA says if you have an appointment, the entire process of paperwork and fingerprinting only takes about ten minutes. The La Crosse Regional Airport will offer the mobile pre-check enrollment through the end of the week. You can sign up for an appointment on their website, or just walk in. It will take about two to three weeks before backgrounds checks to be approved and for passengers to receive their traveler number, making them an official TSA pre-check member. La Crosse is now one of more than 150 airports offering the service. It's the 8th airport in Wisconsin to offer TSA pre-check.

Don Weber says a major transformation within veteran's healthcare is coming within the next 10 years. Moving away from VA medical centers and toward private providers, something he says will provide more consistent care. He's happy LHI can be a major player in that change. Ten to 15% of LHI employees are veterans and Weber hopes to increase that number to 20%.

In turn, keeping the workforce high quality and caliber is extremely important both statewide and in the coulee region. Wisconsin hospitals employ more than 100-thousand people overall. Vacancy rates have doubled since 2012.

The day after Christmas tends to be a big one for retailers, many people coming in to spend gift cards and others exchanging gifts that may have just missed the mark. News 19's Sam Shilts spent the afternoon at Valley View Mall and joins us now with more details on these Day After returns. On the surface, it may seem like crowds of people at the mall today didn't receive what they would have liked on Christmas, but in actuality, most shoppers were just looking to exchange gifts that were right for them but just maybe in the wrong size. Monday mornings at the mall aren't usually this busy but this particular Monday being the day after Christmas people here are looking to fix some Santa mistakes. According to retail staff here, the popularity of gift cards has grown quite a bit. Some may try to avoid any embarrassment by getting the wrong size and opt for a card from a store they know their friend of family member would like. The word "returns" typically dominates the day after Christmas, but the majority of transactions today aren't returns at all. Shoppers enjoy the ability to exchange for the right

product, and retailers like it even more because more exchanges than returns equals better sales, which is a reason why stores like Buckle keep voluntary records of customer sizes, making today's exchange process move faster. So if you're worried about getting the wrong size or color retailers and shoppers alike say don't fret because you're hearts in the right place and it's the thought that counts. According to the mall's Marketing Director, a number of years ago a study found that nearly 70% of gift cards purchased were never redeemed, meaning companies selling those gift cards net all of that profit without losing any stock. So if you do have any gift cards lying around, retailers encourage that you try to make use of them before they expire. If you're looking to make a return but do not have a gift receipt most retailers will work with you, giving you in store credit or in some cases, a full refund.

Antibodies created by vaccines decline as time goes by and seniors are the ones primarily affected. But both sides agree an early shot is better than none at all.

Johnson and Johnson is warning more than 100,000 medical patients who use certain insulin pumps that they could be targeted by hackers. Its Animas one-touch ping insulin pump has a bug causing a potential cybersecurity risk and hackers could hijack the device and force it to deliver unauthorized and possibly lethal insulin doses. But the company said the probability of that happening is extremely low and there have not been any reports of hack attempts. They also said the pump has features for advanced protection should patients be concerned.

Alzheimer's is a deadly disease affecting millions of Americans. Now new research is pointing to why Alzheimer's might be caught later in women. In a study published in the Journal Neurology researchers compared subjects' performance in verbal learning tests to their brain activity in a pet scan and women tended to perform better than men on these word tests when their brain scans showed the same mild to moderate levels of cognitive impairment. That supports the idea that women's generally better verbal memory may mask the early symptoms of cognitive decline.

For as much as we know about the devastating effects of Alzheimer's and other forms of dementia. We know little about how to prevent these conditions, a situation that has a number of companies offering up so-called "brain games". A team of researchers from the US and the UK took a look at the state of the science behind brain games and concluded there's just not enough evidence yet to say that these methods work.

The CDC estimates that 30% of American women who use the pill eventually quit because of dissatisfaction with side effects; one big one, depression. A study of nearly one million women conducted at the University of Copenhagen found that women taking hormonal birth control were more susceptible to depression compared to women who didn't use that method of contraception. Around one-in-four American women between the ages of 15 and 44 use hormonal birth control and researchers say that this type of birth control alone isn't the only thing that causes depression, and say more research is needed to better understand the link.

The benefits of jogging and running, Canadian research is finding it could repair brain damage. Ottawa Hospital discovered a molecule that may promote healing in the brains of those who suffer from MS or other neurological diseases. It happens when genetically-modified lab mice with similar neurological conditions began running on treadmills. Before they started, the mice would typically die at 25 to 40 days. But if they ran, they lived for an entire year. Picketts says this discovery doesn't mean that other forms of exercise aren't as effective as running because researchers learning more about the benefits of exercise every day.

They also found the vast majority of dietary supplements are being used without a doctor's recommendation, with the popularity of many supplements tied closely to how much they are advertised, rather than if they have proven benefits for health.

Mike Robbins says he used his cellphone to capture the Democratic National Convention bus dumping human waste down a storm drain in Georgia. Remaining carriers are raising premiums. They expect 3.5 million uninsured people to enroll next year and about 9.2 million are projected to re-enroll.

He had breathing issues, feeding issues, and seizures. Doctors expected his recovery to be slower but he is doing well and they babies are taking it one day at a time.

She says prevention requires a comprehensive approach that the entire community needs to be involved in.

Slug: MED MINUTE

How much time do your children spend with television, on the phone or computer? It's known as screen time and now some of the nation's top pediatricians are answering the question, how much is too much. TVs? Computers? And touch screens? They are the new playgrounds for kids and toddlers alike. But many worry that this constant exposure to electronic media might come with negative consequences, that today's babies are a giant lab experiment about screen time. To answer the growing concerns about this new wave of devices and technology and what it might be doing to our kids the American Academy of Pediatrics has now come out with a set of guidelines. Their recommendations? Parents should completely eliminate exposure to electronic media for kids under18 months. For kids between 18 and 24 months, an introduction to screens is okay but they urge that parents to participate in all digital exposure, so it can be about the parent-child contact. And for kids between the ages of two and five? Limit screen time to one hour or less per day and stop screen time use one hour prior to bedtime, keeping bedrooms and meal times screen-free. These devices can be great ways to educate and entertain a child but creating that "unplugged time" in the home leaves a chance for the whole family to download some bonding and program a happier future.

These cold mornings and evenings may have you thinking about turning on the heat for the first time. But you may want to consider a couple of things first. Alex Wasilenko is here now with the 'need to knows' about turning on the heat for the first time. You don't need to be a meteorologist to know that winters chill has been in the air the past couple of mornings. Now is the best time to schedule a cleaning to help prevent any foreseeable issues while heating your home this winter. Has your furnace had a good cleaning yet? You may also want to think about a new carbon monoxide alarm on your next trip to the hardware store! This time of year, heating related fires are always a concern as Lieutenant Steven Cash of the La Crosse Fire Department describes. With winter right around the corner, you should check smoke and carbon monoxide alarm batteries. Lance Alecson from Bagniefski Heating and Air Conditioning knows how complex furnaces can be and says that safety is a number one priority. If you suspect you have a faulty furnace here are some hazards that may conclude that you need to call the professionals. If there is any water leaking on the floor, a noticeable crack in the heat exchanger, a dirty air filter, any strange noises and finally if there is no heat it is time to call for help. Space heaters have multiple safety hazards as well. Lance Alecson from Bagniefski Heating and Air conditioning also tells me that the more expensive the air filter is for a furnace the better, but if you can find a filter that is good quality and thick you'll only have to check on the filter once a month to make sure it's not dirty. The more dirty an air filter is the more stress it can have on the furnace. Lieutenant Steven Cash and Lance Alecson both advise that if there is a problem with your heating call the professionals and leave it to them. Furnaces usually have a life span of 17 to 25 years. Proper inspections are important to keep your furnace up to date and your house safe during the cold winter months.

An estimated 3,500babies die from SIDS and other sleep-related complications in the United States each year.

More than 40 veterans at the Tomah VA may be forced to relocate or find new housing by January 16th of next year. This comes as the Veterans Assistance Foundation received a cancelation notice from the Department of Veteran Affairs. News 19's Sam Shilts spoke with those residents in Tomah, and joins us now with details. The Veterans Assistance Foundation is a non-profit that has leased part of building 407 on the Tomah VA grounds. That building is currently used by the VAF as a shelter and rehabilitation center for homeless veterans. At a meeting last night, residents were informed that the VAF's agreement for use in that building was being canceled and that they would have to vacate the building by January 16th. This came as a shock to residents. Many are worried that with such short notice, by the time January comes around some may not have anywhere to go. So far, the VAF hasn't been able to inform their residents as to why their lease agreement is being canceled. The veterans I spoke to all spoke very highly of the program, saying that in many instances it had turned their lives around. The most frustrating part to them: not knowing exactly why this is happening. VAF hosted an informational meeting that started moments ago to provide more information on the transition. We reached out to the Tomah VA on this matter. They have yet to return our calls; still no word on the reasoning behind that cancelation. The VAF will be required to schedule three monthly status meetings with the VA's Chief of Social Work with subsequent weekly transition meetings in January.

Researchers believe this is attributed to the south's cheap cigarette prices and weaker tobacco control policies.

Sentara Healthcare in Virginia found a unique way to reduce infections; by using copper. Their researchers found using copper infused bedding, towels, tray tables, and gowns even sinks reduced

The findings proved so successful to patient's health they are now putting the metal in every patient room. The findings could be a game changer for hospitals across the country.

If your child is staying up late playing on a mobile device It may be keeping them wide awake longer than expected. Researchers analyzed reports of more than 125,000 children worldwide and found a "strong and consistent" connection between media device use at bedtime and poor sleep. It's caused from the device's light which delays the release of melatonin, the hormone that contributes to tiredness, making it harder for kids to fall asleep. The National Sleep Foundation recommends at least 30 minutes of what they call "gadget-free transition time" before bedtime.

Slug: AIR POLLUTION

UNICEF is calling on world leaders to reduce air pollution, saying it leads to the deaths of more children each year than malaria and HIV and AIDS combined. Its new report found some 600,000children under the age of five die every year from diseases caused by outdoor and indoor air pollution. Their report was released in advance of the UN Climate Change Conference in Morocco next week where UNICEF is asking world leaders to cut back on fossil fuel combustion and invest in energy efficiency as well as increase children's access to health care.

The unseasonably warm weather is enjoyable for some but not for those who suffer from allergies, especially pets. Many people go year round for certain medications for their animals, especially if they have allergies. Thompson adds don't forget to watch for fleas and ticks because of the extended warmth and wet air they're hanging around a little longer than usual too.

A new report shows prescriptions for opioid pain relievers in Wisconsin has dropped 10% over the past year. Heightened awareness of the dangers of addiction played a role in the decrease. That database tracks pharmacy records and allows doctors to curb what's called "doctor shopping", or a patient going to several different pharmacists and doctors to fill extra prescriptions. A new law taking effect next spring requires doctors and pharmacists to check that database.

The once conjoined twins boys separated last month are doing better than expected. Both boys are breathing without tubes and are doing so well that doctors hope in coming weeks they can leave the hospital for a rehabilitation center.

The World Health Organization is introducing a new set of guidelines for the care of pregnant women and teens. The WHO says about 300,000mothers die while pregnant or in child birth and more than six-million babies die before they are a month old. The agency attests many of the deaths could be prevented through simple interventions with trained health care workers during pregnancy.

A new report from the American Cancer Society says the number of women dying from cancer is expected to more than double world-wide in the next 14 years. Breast cancer remains the deadliest form of cancer among women, with rates of survival hugely dependent on early detection and treatment and varying greatly from country to country. The American Cancer Society says the

massive increase in deaths will mostly come from low and middle income countries where access to health care is less widespread.

Slug: SUICIDE

Suicide is the third leading cause of death among adolescents with major depression on the rise, but especially for girls. A study published in the journal "Pediatrics" examined government data from more than 172,000 adolescents, finding cases of major depression among all adolescents rose from about 9% in 2005 to about 11% in 2014. But the biggest increase was among teenage girls, jumping from about 13% to about 17% in 2014 over the same time period. The increase among boys was much lower. Researchers noted that there was not a corresponding rise in the proportion of adolescents receiving treatment.

Cancer is poised to overtake heart disease as the number one killer of adults in the United States by 2020. Although the risk of dying from either of these causes appears to be on the decline, the same report also shows that, over the past several decades, cancer has overtaken heart disease as the leading cause of death in a number of states. In 1993 cancer was the leading cause of death in only one state, by 2010 cancer was the top killer in 23 states. So, what does the future look like? CDC researchers looked at data on deaths from 1969 through 2014 from the national vital statistics system (NYSS) and created a mathematical model incorporating population risk, growth, and aging. They es-

timate that by 2020, cancer will become the leading cause of death in the US this anticipation could help us focus our efforts in reducing the number of preventable deaths.

Audiologists are sending out a warning to area hunters, saying they're risking hearing loss if hunting without ear protection. While some hunters say they hear the warning, they likely won't change the way they hunt. Jeff Lohmeier loads, then sights in his rifle, ready for the gun deer hunt. First shot at fifty, second at one hundred yards away. But inches from his gun are his ears, and he's not planning on plugging up this weekend, which can cause instantaneous hearing loss. These hunters say they won't plug their ears; they want to hear deer approaching. McMahon knows she won't convince all hunters to plug it, something she wants hunters to avoid, so they don't have to wear hearing aids in the future. Slug: HEART HEALTH

Guidelines recently released by the US Preventive Services Task Force are advising adults between 50 and 69 to take a low dose aspirin daily. They say the aspirin will help ward off cardiovascular disease. For Cathy Steinberg, a family history of cardiovascular disease gave her cause to worry about her own heart health. So she consulted a preventive cardiologist early on who recommended adopting certain habits to maintain heart health. Her doctor told her to add one more weapon to her arsenal, a low dose aspirin. People younger than 50, or older than 70, are not good candidates for a daily aspirin. The most common side effects from this daily dose are excess bleeding and acid reflux. As for Cathy Steinberg, who continues to be heart healthy, she gets some peace of mind by following at least a few of her doctor's recommendations.

A new medical procedure means amputees may soon feel sensation with the help of a robot prosthetic. Doctors at a Boston Hospital unveiled the first of its kind amputation procedure today. If successful, they believe the surgery will help an amputee's brain interact with a robotic prosthetic. The patient would then be able to perform complex actions and feel sensation. Jim Ewing underwent the experimental type of amputation surgery after he lost part of his leg in a rock-climbing accident. Slug: PERTUSSIS

A lot of people travel during the holiday season, so there's always some concern about spreading illness. That includes a concern this year about pertussis, or whooping cough. The La Crosse County Health Department is reporting 31 cases of the illness. Pertussis is a cough illness that is certainly something people think is away and why do I even bother getting that shot because pertussis is a thing of the past. And, it's something we see a resurgences of in our community and it's something we happen to be seeing a resurgence of now of this particular illness. And it's not something we can predict or guess at when it's going to take re-emergence in our community so it's important to be getting your shots for pertussis on an ongoing basis and being staying up to date. It's hard to put exactly into perspective the exact number of cases, 31-cases, in one particular county. It's definitely a concern because those 31-cases, our cases that we're seeing here are in anyone from adolescents to adulthood, and, the most concerning cases in any community are those people who are potentially expos-

ing young infants. Infants can see fatality associated with pertussis and that's who we need to protect the most from getting pertussis infections in our community. Pertussis is actually most contagious at a point in time when people don't know they have the infection. It's spread from secretions, droplets from one person to another and it's most contagious in a phase of the illness, again, before most people know they have pertussis. So stopping the spread of pertussis, the best prevention is really good immunization campaigns ensuring that children are up to date with their vaccinations and looking at adolescents to be sure that they're getting that booster dose of vaccine that they can get. Pfaff mentioned pertussis is a cough related illness, but it begins with cold like symptoms. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, it includes a low grade fever and mild cough, but as it progresses it can include much more coughing followed by that whooping noise.

As you decorate your home for the holidays, keep your pets safety in mind. Tour pet should not drink the water in your Christmas tree stand; it often contains fertilizers and chemicals from the tree. If your dog enjoys playing outside despite the cold, make sure you keep an eye on them and let them back in before they get cold. You can also give them doggie clothes to keep them warmer. It is also a good idea to keep your pets away from your tree or where you keep your presents. You can also cover your dog's feet when they go outside. There is a chemical in the ice dissolving salt compounds that can be painful if it gets stuck in your pet's paws.

Slug: VADENTIST

According to VA officials, nearly 600 veterans may risk infection with Hepatitis B, C or HIV after a dentist failed to follow Veteran's Administration protocol. Now, the VA is urging the veterans who received care from this dentist to get screened. The VA will not identify the dentist due to federal employee protections. Between October of 2015 and October 2016 a dentist within the medical center's clinic was

using his own equipment and improperly sterilizing it. The piece of equipment, known as a burr, is often used in crown and bridge work. The VA says it was discovered after a fill-in dental assistant saw it and reported it. The dentist is no longer seeing patients but is still employed by the VA as this investigation continues. A review of his license is also ongoing with the state licensing board. Brahm says the dentist cleaned his instruments with a cleaning solution and a disinfecting wipe, but that method is not endorsed by the VA. Because the VA believes it to be intentional, Brahm says they have referred the case to the Office of Inspector General for possible criminal charges. It is important to note that the risk of contracting an infection through this method is very low. Vets who received care from this dentist received a letter or phone call. The VA is opening a clinic to assist veterans who were seen by the dentist. It is open Monday through Friday from 8 to 5:30 and on Saturday from 8:30 to noon. The lab work is free of charge.

It is that time of year. Common colds are the main reason kids miss school and adults miss work. Each year in the US adults have an average of 2 to 3 colds and the CDC says that number is much higher for young people. News 19's Tianna Vanderhei spoke with health professionals and explains how to determine whether it's time to stay home. Colds, minor infections of the nose and throat, are caused by more than 200 different viruses according to the American Lung Association. But there are a number of ways to prevent illness. That's the million dollar question, how do you decide if a child should stay home or go to school? Dr. Todd Mahr at Gundersen Health System says most school districts have drawn up guidelines to help decide. So what about a runny nose, sniffles or a cough? Mahr adds, the common sense thing is can the child participate in activities? Creating a plan upfront as to who will take care of a child or who can pick them up from school if they do fall ill will help alleviate stress in the midst of the work day. Rhinovirus is the most common cause of a cold and can trigger asthma attacks, sinus and ear infections. But it does not spread through air and personal contact. If symptoms last more than 10 days, a temperature is higher than one hundred degrees or symptoms appear unusual or severe you should consider a visit to the doctor.

The holidays are a time to give thanks for family. It's easy to sometimes take them for granted. But one Eau Claire family treasures every day they can spend together. Reporter Andrea Albers brings you the story of five year old Joshua Adler and shows you how he continues to inspire others. As brave as you think you are, you'll never be as brave as a child. For six months this sweet little boy would wake in the middle of the night screaming in agony. Trip after trip to the emergency room could not pinpoint the pain behind his knee. Doctors called it growing pains. And on a late July day the daycare called. It took 96 miles but just one MRI to reveal what Joshua Adler was up against. It was a primitive neuro-ectodermal tumor lodged in Joshua's lymph nodes. Five year old's should spend Labor Day at the beach or playing baseball. Joshua geared up for his first round of chemotherapy. As optimistic as you try to be, you'll never have the hope of a child. As strong as you imagine you are, you'll never have the strength housed in his tiny body. Joshua is a warrior. But he's not fighting alone. His prayer army is growing louder, support sent from Eau Claire where Dave Adler has had to return any free moment he can. Quietly his employees have set up a Go Fund Me page. By the end of November Joshua had completed 6 rounds of chemotherapy. Six rounds was not enough. But this little fighter is still in the ring, proving to us all the innocent, unyielding faith of a child. The interview with the Adler's in Rochester happened just before Joshua's final MRI to determine if they'd need to go forward with the surgery. On Tuesday he went through leg amputation surgery and is in recovery. Doctors say there is no visible evidence left of cancer and that Joshua is doing well.

Slug: TOMAH TOWN HALL

From the prescription drug scandal to the most recent dentist misconduct incident the Tomah VA has faced its share of negative publicity in recent months. To demonstrate its commitment to change, the Tomah VA held a Town Hall meeting tonight. Following the drug scandal, Secretary of Veterans Affairs Robert McDonald directed VA facilities nationwide to hold town hall meetings to improve lines of communication. With all of the controversy surrounding the Tomah VA in the last two years, typically these town hall meetings consist of harsh words of criticism and demand for change. However, to-

night's meeting conveyed a different tone. The VA first took the opportunity to talk about the advancements it has made within its adaptive sports program. Then, acting director Victoria Brahm fielded questions and comments from the crowd of about 25 people. Surprisingly, the most recent controversy, the VA dentist who resigned after an investigation was launched into his improper sterilization of tools, wasn't really discussed. Instead, one veteran we spoke to say the bad press the VA has received has not tarnished his view of the facility. Acting director Victoria Brahm did say the culture is slowly but surely changing at Tomah. She says last year the Tomah VA was at the bottom tier of VA's nationwide in terms of feedback from an employee survey. This year however, she says the morale and comfort has increased tremendously amongst staff. In addition, the Veterans Assistant Foundation, the non-profit homeless shelter at the VA, will now lease the second floor of building 407 through the end of April. The VA will conduct a walk-through inspection, this after a resident veteran jumped out a third floor window last month. The Tomah VA has also announced the procedure for the 592 veterans impacted by that dentist to receive screening from VA community based outpatient clinics and non-VA providers.

But over the last several years the drug company Mylan has increased the price by more than 400%, the steep increase resulting in harsh criticism and a federal investigation. The generic version of the epi-pen will be about half the price, \$300 for two doses.

The joys, memories, sights and sounds that the Christmas season brings fort\h are different for everyone. For Scott Sklenar December 24, 2015 will forever be ingrained in his mind. From the moment he was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer, his coworkers, family members and friends began rallying behind him. Jim Hoffman was diagnosed with prostate cancer in August of 2016. After a promising prognosis and weeks of radiation treatment he was able to ring the bell, bringing a state of euphoria to patients and staff at a time when they need it the most, delivering the perfect gift, a signal of hope and relief just in time for Christmas. Prior to ringing the bell patients get to sign their name on the ribbon painting adjacent from the bell itself. Once one board is full it's moved to a different location for display and a new one is started.

Slug: CMN MASON

Children's Miracle Network Hospitals raise funds for 170 hospitals across the country and each year Gundersen Health System chooses five new heroes to serve as Ambassadors for CMN. News 19's Tianna Vanderhei tells you the story of Mason Rotering and how CMN helped his family during their time of need. On December twenty-second of 2013 the uncertainty as to if Danielle and Kevin Roterings son would make it to Christmas weighed heavily on their minds. For more than three years following that date, several hospital stays, thousands of pills, hundreds of IV bags and nearly 30 spinal taps consumed Mason's life and his families'. Finally, on February 28, 2016, his treatments were complete, but that wasn't the first time the Roterings had encountered medical drawbacks. He was born with two holes in his heart, thyroid issues and struggled initially with hearing in addition to muscle development. But none of those obstacles held the very compassionate, outgoing and energetic Mason back. Over the course of their time spent at Gundersen, Children's Miracle Network Hospitals provided gas vouchers for their drives to and from Trempealeau and meal vouchers. Mom and dad say at first they were apprehensive about Mason becoming a hero. Since August now six year old Mason has attended countless community events as an Ambassador for CMN. As for the future, the Roterings say the sky is the limit. Just recently Children's Miracle Network Hospitals helped Mason get an IPad, which he uses to advance his speech and learning. Mason says he loves everything about school, the Green Bay Packers and playing catch with his family.

Slug: MEDMON

It's that time of year when the weather is colder and the sun sets earlier, and if you haven't yet, you might start feeling your mood reflects the season. According to Gundersen Health System psychologist Tom Ledeaux, Seasonal Affective Disorder, or SAD, is a yearly, recurring pattern of depression that starts in the fall, lasts through winter, and is alleviated during the spring. We're not getting as much sunlight as we do the rest of the year, which upsets our biological clock, Ledeaux said. That, in turn, causes depressive symptoms. Ledeaux suggests three main therapies for SAD: light therapy, psychotherapy and in some cases, antidepressant medication. The most research is available for light

therapy. Ledeaux said the best is direct light stimulation for the retina, which can be achieved by sitting by a "light box" for a short period of time to help offset some of the negative effects of darker days.

Oktoberfest is notorious for being of the biggest weekends of drinking in the La Crosse area, but it's also one of the biggest for "Operation River Watch", a student run safety initiative now in its 10th year. Before the inception of "Operation River Watch" in 2006, La Crosse saw an average of one river drowning every year for almost a decade prior. However as News 19's Sam Shilts tells you, since 2006 those drowning incidents have been virtually eliminated. What started as a small group of students from UW-L trying to make a difference is now a widely coordinated effort between all three universities and the La Crosse police department. And that effort is working. Operation River Watch sends groups of student patrols around Riverside Park in shifts, turning back anyone they might run into who's intoxicated, hoping to prevent any incidents. In fact, the number of alcohol related drownings has dropped from nearly one per year to zero after 2006. Out of the string of drownings, the average blood alcohol content was .29, three times Wisconsin's legal driving limit, and it's understandable how anyone might become disoriented with that much in their system, which is why some of these students are giving up their Oktoberfest weekend, and many other weekends. Western Technical College also offers incentives to students. Each shift gets a student's club more funding from the university in exchange for shifts patrolling the river. River Watch has approximately 70 volunteers for Oktoberfest weekend, but they are always looking for help with future weekends.

Nearly a half-a-million hunters are expected to head to their tree stands for the opening of Minnesota's gun deer hunt this weekend. The hunt officially kicks off this Saturday at dawn. It's one of two firearm seasons in the state of Minnesota and is highly anticipated by many in the area. News 19's Ginna Roe

talked the Minnesota DNR about what changes hunters can expect this season. It will be a warm weekend for hunters headed to the woods. The Minnesota DNR wants to remind them of some new regulations this year. Hunters who harvest a deer outside of the state are no longer allowed to bring it into Minnesota. It's part of the department's effort to stop the spread of Chronic Wasting Disease. The DNR is also encouraging hunters to have their deer sampled for CWD. Hunters can bring their deer to one of 30 stations across the state. Those locations are available online at mndnr.gov/cwd. The projected deer harvest this year is between 165 and 185 thousand. Last year, hunters killed 159 thousand deer.

Slug: CUBS WIN

The curse is reversed. The Chicago Cubs won the World Series in dramatic fashion last night, beating the Cleveland Indians in an epic game which started on Wednesday night and carried over in to this morning. The new World Series Champions arrived at Wrigley Field this morning after flying home from Cleveland. The road to victory was torturous for Cubs fans: holding a 3-run lead Chicago called on overworked closer Aroldis Chapman, but the Indians rallied with three runs in the eighth inning, including a game-tying two-run home run by Rajai Davis which stunned the Cubs. Faithful as Cleveland started to celebrate but the Cubs regrouped. After a 17 minute rain delay they pushed two runs across in the 10th inning led by World Series most valuable player Ben Zobrist. But the Indians wouldn't give up. They rallied for a run of their own but fell short when Michael Martinez grounded out to Kris Bryant to end the longest championship drought in baseball history, Chicago erupting overnight, thousands of fans celebrating. Soaking up the win that's been in the making for over a century, that celebrating continues today as thousands of cubs fans are still outside of Wrigley field, soaking in the win they have waited for, for so long.

Gun deer season begins Saturday, but this year comes with a few changes in the way deer are harvested and registered. The 2016 gun deer season will be the first year in Wisconsin where all licenses and tags will be issued through the new "Go Wild" system, meaning hunters this year will be able to purchase them online and print them off at home. Wisconsin's 2016 gun season is taking a few more steps towards the modern age, including the brand new "Go Wild" licensing system. They can be purchased purely online, but also your local DNR agents will still be selling licenses and answering ques-

tions about the new systems. It may take longer time to get used to, but the DNR says this will be more convenient for hunters. That convenience doesn't come without a price. Being paper printout, it's subject to being damaged out in the field. The upside, you can reprint them if that does happen. Preliminary sales show that about 45,000 more gun deer licenses have been purchased than at this time last year, and unlike years past, licenses can still be purchased after the 9 day season starts, meaning Wisconsin's woods could be seeing a few more hunters this year. The DNR wants to remind everyone going out to always think about firearm safety, treat every gun as if it's loaded, don't point the muzzle at anything you're not prepared to shoot at, know your target and what's beyond and keep your finger off the trigger until your sights are on target.

A deer hunter from Howard Lake, Minnesota has quite a story to tell. Jim Wackler killed this huge deer and it could become a new state record. The 36 point buck weighed in at 216 pounds. The 36 point buck is unofficially measured at 270 inches, which would be a firearms state record for non-typical antlers. Wackler expects it could dry down to about 250 inches, which would still make it one of the five biggest deer ever killed in Minnesota.

Be sure to wear to blaze orange or pink, and take extra precaution when in a tree stand. Falls from tree stands are the leading cause of injuries during the gun deer season.

Hunters fortunate enough to bag a deer this season must register it online. The DNR says it's a more convenient way, allowing hunters to avoid making a trip to a registration stations. But those former stations are feeling the pinch. Now that all registration and licensing is done online these smaller businesses have gone from doing the registration to assisting with the online process. Schnitzels Sports Store in Sparta used to get people from as far away Black River Falls. They would average about one thousand deer registered every year. But last year, they only had about 200, which will mean they are getting considerably less people coming to their shop. Schnitzler mentioned that before the online registration system they would have three

lanes of cars coming in to register. Despite those numbers being down however he suspects that general sales in his shop may go up because that higher volume of traffic.

It was all smiles Saturday morning-as hunters made a pit-stop before heading out into the woods. Some hunters say they won't go home until they get a buck, others feel a little differently, but the hunters we spoke with Saturday morning all agree that there's nothing like being in the woods. Even though the day got off to a windy start, the hunters say the cooler temps can stick around a little longer. DNR figures show hunters bought more than 613 thousand gun licenses last year, compared with nearly 695 thousand licenses in 2000. As of Friday, a little more than 533 thousand license had been purchased. The DRN hopes to have preliminary registration numbers beginning tomorrow after 5 pm.

Around this time of year venison can account for almost a quarter of business done at smaller meat processors. Numbers are down slightly this year due to poor weather conditions for hunting. Processors aren't allowed to sell venison, so any unwanted meat is ground, packaged and given to local food pantries.

Hunters killed about five percent fewer deer on opening weekend of Wisconsin's 9 day gun-deer season this year than last. The Department of Natural Resources preliminary figures show hunters killed a little more than 114 thousand deer compared with 120 thousand last year. The harvest was also down in three of the state's four management zones with the northern forest the only zone seeing an increase. According to the DNR La Crosse County hunters killed 1,370 deer, Monroe County saw 2,763 deer harvested, Jackson County 2,113 and Vernon County 3,255.

But for some of these tree hunters, the type of tree doesn't matter as much as the company you're with. And once you find that perfect tree, it's time to cut it down, drag it out, shake any excess needles off, pack it away and then load it up for the trip home. Peyton Manning is keeping busy expand the NFL brand in China, a population of well over a billion people. Under the lights there is something new in China. The helmets, the pads, the hits: its football, American style, in a country that doesn't know much about it, yet. These are the Beijing Iron Brothers, one of 14 teams from across the country in the relatively new American Football League of China. They're gearing up for a game against the Shanghai Nighthawks. It's a bold claim in a country where football typically means feet-only and round ball. NFL games are tough to watch because of the time difference. Tuesday morning football just doesn't have the same ring. Plus, sports like ping pong and badminton have long reigned supreme. But there are those who believe there's a yearning here for something a bit more physical. Chris McLaurin founded the league in 2013. A former standout at the University of Michigan, he knows quality football. And he knows his league has a long way to go. McLaurin says he's tapping into a sports renaissance in China with more young people than ever trying new things. And a much bigger league wants in on the action. The NFL is slowly increasing its profile in the Middle Kingdom and its 1.4 billion potential fans, sponsoring flag football leagues and clinics like this one. Yes, that's the recently retired Peyton Manning, one of the NFL's most well-known stars, giving tips on a three step drop-back to kids outside Beijing. He's part of the league's strategy to have its stars help promote the sport, a hugely successful tactic already employed by the NBA. Basically, the NFL is looking for a Yao Ming-type success story. And maybe that player would come from the American Football League of China. It's just amateurs for now. The players even have to pony-up for most of their own gear. But the plan is to start paying players in the next few years as sponsors line up and ticket sales rise. The Iron Brothers ended up losing a close one to the Nighthawks, but they say they'll be back and better next year, just like the league in which they play.

Slug: CLOWN PSYCH

Over the last couple of weeks the area has been plagued with clown threats; people dressing up like clowns and some, brandishing weapons or using social media to circulate threats of violence. A few individuals have been arrested and face serious penalties. But it begs the question, in the face of those consequences, why would someone want to do it? News 19's Sam Shilts sat down with a UWL psychology professor to discuss what might drive such behavior. This clown scare phenomenon may seem new, but the use of veiled and most often empty threats is not, and the drive behind them may come down to impulse control. And it's easy to chalk this up to negative attention seeking behavior, but it's not always that simple. In other words, there may be a barrier of communication that isn't easy for some to overcome in a healthy way. It's important to note that it isn't illegal to dress as a clown, creepy or not, and using these threats as an excuse to take matters into your own hands is another negative impulse to avoid. Arguably the most important lesson is to think before you act online, or off. Three area school districts have experienced threats in the past few weeks. Students behind threats in Holmen and La Crescent have been arrested and face serious charges. Despite what some may see as a prank, police take any threats seriously, and discourage any copycat behavior.

Voters in the La Crescent-Hokah School District will decide whether to pass a new operating levy being proposed by the district. If passed, the levy would generate around \$500,000 each year for the next five years. But if it fails the district will be faced with tough decisions and serious cuts. This school year is the first year in 5 years the district has had a balanced budget, thanks in large part to cuts of more than \$450,000 last year, resulting in the loss of a couple teachers and class offerings. This year the district is facing an even bigger problem and Cardille says if voters say no, students will pay the price. That \$500,000 the district is asking for may sound like a lot but compared to similar sized districts in the state it's not. La Crescent ranks in the bottom third of districts when it comes to current levies and ranks below the state average. If the levy is approved totaling about \$1,100 a student, the district will rise above that average. If it fails the district will be forced to make a tough decision. To give you an idea of how much tax will increase, a home with a market value of \$200,000 currently pays about \$83 a year. If the levy passes, that will increase to \$242, an increase in \$159 a year. The district will hold a public meeting on November 3rd at the high school library from 5 to 7 p.m. addressing any questions about levy.

And with a combination of movement exercises, breathing, and mindfulness he says the kids' behavior slowly changes. The goal is that they'll not only be at peace for the rest of the day, but hopefully for the rest of their life. The Holistic Life Foundation says they want to expand the success they've had here in Baltimore to schools across the country and now other programs are tapping in to Mindful Mediation as well, using it to help soldiers returning from war, over stressed executives, and everyday families at home.

Many substitute teachers are often working in multiple districts at once. With that being said, no one district like La Crosse for example has exclusive rights to a sub. In turn with the pool of substitute teachers declining the competition for those who are available is increasing. Teachers provide the foundation of a student's education and the future of our communities. Despite the apparent pool of applicants within the past couple of years the school district of La Crosse has experienced a significant drop in the availability of substitutes and those who are graduating with education degrees are finding full-time positions, which is good news for those entering the workforce but not good news for the district seeking part time and long term subs. Lisa Schreiner, principal at Southern Bluffs Elementary said she gets to work at 6:30 every morning and the first thing she does is check to see who's gone. In Wisconsin someone who has obtained a four year degree can become a licensed substitute even if they did not graduate in education, an opportunity that's relatively new within the past five years. The school district of La Crosse uses an automated system called absence management which electronically works to fill vacancies on a regular basis. In a city where the population is more than 54,000 and with two teacher education universities, it's surprising that there is this issue but white adds that if it's happening here, in this large of a district, you can guarantee that it's being felt at deeper level at smaller districts. The La Crosse school district accepts applications for substitutes through the Wisconsin Education Career Access Network.

Slug: UWRACISM

The University of Wisconsin has been the focus of increasing scrutiny for the racist incidents that have happened in the past few semesters and things have become even worse since the presidential election, with an alarming jump in the number of reported bias incidents at the UW; 16 in the first week alone. It has administrators and students struggling to change the culture. After a year that included incidents of spitting and racial slurs, swastikas and racist graffiti, many African Americans at the University of Wisconsin, students and staff, came to school this fall with a certain sense of dread. But even though they expected it, the incident that tipped the scale seemed to catch university leaders unprepared. Chancellor Rebecca Blank initially defended the UW's handling of a fan who wore a President Obama mask with a noose attached to a Badger football game. She said allowing him to stay in the stadium after removing the mask was a protection of free speech. Blank declined our request for an interview. Patrick Sims is Vice Provost and Chief Diversity Officer at the UW. Although he would seem to be the UW's point man on racial issues, Sims says he wasn't consulted on the initial costume response. Although UW officials eventually took a stronger stand, coming up with a new fan conduct policy, black student leaders say the lack of an immediate, definitive response shows indifference by the chancellor's office. Student Eneale Pickett decided to speak out with his wardrobe. He started his company, Insert Apparel, as a way to insert racial issues into conversations on campus. But there can be a price to pay for getting involved. Grad student Michael Davis says some solutions are already on campus. Patrick Sims says there are signs of progress, including a positive response from UW faculty to taking cultural competency training. Sims says another step in the right direction would be a mission statement on the university's commitment to diversity and inclusion. The UW reports that, in addition to the 16 incidents in the week after the election, there were a total of 66 bias incidents reported in the first half of 2016.

This morning we continue our two part series on the severe teacher shortage affecting the State of Wisconsin. Many teachers blame Governor Walker's Act 10 legislation for the lack of teachers. Naomi Poquette says she's found a home away from home at Lincoln Middle School. Co-workers become mentors and her students, her inspiration. She's one of a shrinking number of college students entering the teaching field across the state, as Department of Public Instruction data shows the number of students enrolled in teaching license programs dropped from around 12,000 in 2010 to 8,800 in 2015. Many educators attribute that drop to fallout from Governor Walker's Act 10 legislation ended collective bargaining rights for teachers. However unlike most universities across the state, UW-La Crosse says its enrollment numbers have held steady. On this day Naomi and her morning group are focusing on mindfulness, creating thank you cards and gratitude journals. When she graduates Naomi will have little trouble finding a job, as the statewide teacher shortage keeps many positions from being filled. Despite numbers remaining steady Marci Wycoff Horn does say there has been a shift in the kind of student pursuing a teaching degree. Upon graduation, Naomi will be certified to teacher first through eighth grade, but no matter where the job takes her, her goal will remain the same. And having that impact means more than any of the politics or public perception surrounding the profession. Earlier this year the Wisconsin Institute for Law and Liberty used data from the Department of Instruction and says they found that the Act 10 fallout is exaggerated.

President Obama won it in 2008 only to lose it in his 2012 re-election bid. It is a fast changing state. It has a tradition of being a republican strangle holder, but the democrats have begun to make this a truly competitive state. The North Carolina voters I spoke with were concerned about a range of issues. But one came up with the greatest frequency. Undecided voters like Chad Summers says he's frustrated by this election; Clinton has been here 10 times, Trump 13and the nation has watched as NC has been thrust into the national spotlight over its LGBT bathroom law and police shootings of black men that resulted in race riots in Charlotte. Those issues important to the voters here, but more than anything, the people I meet speak of their families and the impact this election will have on generations to come. We should have a president that can make our country and everything safe to play on and do. North Carolina voted almost exclusively democratic from 1876 through 1964 and almost exclusively republican beginning in 1968. largely in response to white conservative voter uneasiness with the civil rights legislation passed in the mid-1960s.

But there are limits: you only have three chances to lock in your vote and the elections office keeps track of how many times you do. The daughter of an army veteran who died after visiting the Tomah VA says Senator Ron Johnson didn't do enough for her family, although documents show the senator pressed the VA to look into the death. Candace Delis' father, Thomas Baer, died after suffering two strokes at the VA in 2015. She says he wasn't given a CT scan because the machine wasn't working and an Inspector General's report found a doctor failed to diagnose a stroke, however, determined the physician and staff did nothing wrong. Delis said she contacted Senator Ron Johnson for help following her father's death and that Inspector General's report. However, she says he failed to launch his own investigation into her dad's death. During Friday's debate Senator Johnson fielded a question about how he plans to improve the VA moving forward and mentioned Delis and her father in his response. She says she's not interested in being a feather in Sen. Johnson's political cap. Senator Ron Johnson's campaign says he did everything in his power to help the families of veterans who may have suffered at the Tomah VA, and also points to new documents released that they say show Russ Feingold neglecting to respond to Tomah VA personnel in 2008. As for Candace, she has now started the Thomas Baer Veterans Memorial Fund, where 100 percent of the proceeds go to vets in Wisconsin. Senator Johnson's campaign tells News 19 he did everything in his power to hold wrongdoers at the VA accountable and force reforms to help prevent future tragedies.

Slug: WRITE IN RULES

If you're not enthusiastically supporting a candidate in one of the races on Election Day you may consider writing in someone's name, say. Aaron Rodgers, or your brother in law, as a form of protest. But, unlike in past years, you won't be making the statement you think you are. Wisconsin has quite a few rules in the books regarding the counting and tabulating of write-in votes. La Crosse City Clerk Teri Fehrke says after spending many hours at various polling locations, poll workers do look at every ballot and its important voters understand the repercussions of what they're writing down. When it comes to Election Day there are typically well-known names on the ballot. Others voters aren't as familiar with and write in options. Lehrke adds it's important that voters educate themselves on all the candidates rather than simply writing down a name. With that being said, although writing down your neighbor or Mickey Mouse is in fact an actual name, on the local, city level, employees are required to tally all write-in votes, which amounts to more tedious work come election night. In turn, Ginny Dankmeyer, the La Croose County Clerk, says while these trivial write-in names are acknowledged on the local level, once they're submitted to the county they're thrown out. Magney adds that although there's no official record for write-in candidates one of the most common over time that the state has seen is none other than Brett Favre. Today at four thirty was the deadline to send in paperwork for write-in candidates for president and vice president. All other write in candidates for other offices have until noon on Friday November 4 to file their paperwork. Currently there are five registered write-in options for president and vice president, three for congress and one for the assembly with no local write-in options available.

Each race sees an incumbent taking on a fresh challenge democrat Steve Doyle seeks his third full term in office. He was first voted to the legislature in a special election back in 2011 when republican Mike Huebsch left to serve in Governor Walker's administration. Julian Bradley, the republican challenger, is no stranger to Western Wisconsin voters, having previously run for Wisconsin Secretary of State against longtime incumbent Doug LaFollette in 2014 and the 95th Assembly seat in 2010. Bradley aims to turn the 94th back into a republican seat. Transportation funding could be one key topic of debate in the 94th tonight, Doyle having recently suggested a gas tax to pay for road projects.

Donald Trump has made headlines recently for attacking the legitimacy of polls that show him trailing Clinton, but this isn't the first time politicians and pundits have questioned the accuracy of polling data.

So, how have they been perceived in previous elections? Barack Obama is fighting for re-election and republicans are furious, saying polls showing him with a significant lead over Mitt Romney are 'skewed' in favor of democrats, and dead wrong. By Election Day the polls have tightened to a dead-lock, but the final result is anything but. The president cruises to re-election, beating Romney fifty-one to forty-seven percent. Two years later the 2014 midterm elections: the numbers suggest the president's party may be in for a rough ride, so this time some democrats are saying "don't trust the polls." and it turns out the polls are wrong, the news is not bad for democrats, it is catastrophic. The GOP takes the Senate, tightens its grip on the House, and seizes more Governorship too. It all encourages doubt, and gives anyone losing in the polls an easy complaint. Pollsters are undeniably facing challenges: fewer voters willing to participate; new technology, like computerized calling, which makes some polls cheaper, faster and at times less accurate and unbelievably close races with rapidly evolving news cycles can lead to occasional mistakes which have always plagued the polling business. Still, CNN's Tom Foreman who did this report says presidential polls remain among the most accurate. There is still a margin for error, but the vote will almost always fall within the margin of error and he says, when you average several solid polls the results become even more reliable.

News 19's Dave Solie spoke with political analyst Tim Dale today, asking why Donald Trump is focusing on Wisconsin, a state that by most polling data leans toward Hillary Clinton. The Trump campaign right now is really looking to broaden the map and they are doing this because there are a lot of states that they think they can do well if they can, get all of their supporters to turn out. So mid-western states like Michigan and Wisconsin are towards the top of their lists right now and they think they are doing well on eastern states like Florida and North Carolina but really they want to in the last week of the campaign make closing arguments. They really kind of want to cast their net wide and see if they can pick up one of these states which really will be critical for a Trump victory in an electoral college. It's interesting to look at a story like this late in the campaign and how this might affect the voters on each side its probably true that Clinton supporters are not really going to be turned from voting for Clinton especially how the Clinton campaign has reacted to the story and making it a political story on their side. I think that some people either in the center, people who are undecided, maybe some republicans who weren't completely convinced on Trump, it may build his support some more which is what we are seeing right now. Trump is coming up in the polls because undecided or independent candidate voters, third party voters are gravitating towards Trump. Clinton's numbers are necessarily coming down that much but we are seeing Trump increase and that's what is narrowing the gap between the two. If we look at the polls there has been a number between five and as much as twelve or thirteen percent of voters who are either undecided or voting for a third party candidate, these are voters who may vote for one of the two candidates but either because they didn't like either one or because they thought the election was already a foregone conclusion may not have been supporting either of the two candidates. In the final week the candidates need to do two things, number one they need to ensure their voter turnout, the thing we are going to be talking about on election night is going to be turn out, turn out, turn out, who's voting, did the candidate get their supporters to the polls. The second thing is they want to focus on those undecided voters, the voters who are making their decision on the final days of the campaign and really these are voters who have been turned off by the process so it's

not like they haven't heard the arguments; they just didn't like the candidates. I think the forced choice by the candidates saying you either vote for me or you are stuck with my opponent and I think that's going to get a lot of polls in the final days.

Slug: BILL CLINTON

Another one of Clinton's main surrogates is her husband, former president Bill Clinton, who's in the spot light today after the FBI released heavily redacted files from its 2001 investigation of his pardon of indicted hedge-fund trader Marc Rich. That happened on Clinton's last day in office and no related charges were filed. The release quickly drew complaints from democrats against FBI Director James Comey. Comey sent a letter to members of congress on Friday saying "the FBI is looking into recently discovered emails that could be pertinent to the investigation into Hillary Clinton's use of a private server."

Slug: CLINTON

The announcement's effect is reflected in the Marquette Law School poll released today prior to the FBI's announcement. Fifty percent of Wisconsin voters said they were greatly bothered by Clinton's use of her private email server but after Comey sent out the letter that number rose to 60%. At present the amount of voters bothered by her email usage is back to 50%. However, the issue isn't proving to be too big of a deal to voters because the same poll shows her leading among likely Wisconsin voters 46% to Donald Trump's 40%. Early voters make up 16% of that sample and of those Clinton received 64% of early votes to 25% for Trump.

Slug: DOWN BALLOTT

In the final days leading up to the November 8th election deadline it is not only the presidential and the vice presidential candidates who are feeling blowback from some of the recent election controversies. Candidates for every office are feeling the effects. Down-ballot; it literally refers to the elected offices that come in further down the ballot. Like Senate, US House of Representatives, all the way down in some places to really local offices, popular presidential candidates, often bring a wave of support that carries through to all these other offices. But in this election, those down-ballot candidates are not hitching their wagons to their parties' stars at the top of the ticket so much as lobbing grenades at the opposing team. And on one side, there is actual party defection of the 34 seats up for election in the Senate. Ten are currently held by democrats, 24 held by republicans. For the democrats to gain control outright, they would need to win 5 additional seats. And in the US House of Representatives all 435 seats are up for grabs. With the stakes so high, President Obama is focusing on this election like never before.

That can be a Wisconsin driver's license, ID card, passport, military card, or in some cases a student ID. And if you plan to register on site on Election Day be sure to have proof of residency. That can be a driver license, utility bill or even a lease. If you see anyone actively campaigning at or outside the polls let the Chief Campaign officer know. Wisconsin statute states that any one campaigning must be at least 100 feet from a polling place. If anyone is causing a distraction they will be asked to leave the polling place. Dave Solie begins our last weekly conversation with political analyst Tim Dale about why Kaine spent time here. Well, for both campaigns right now, the big question, really the only question they have in their minds is turnout, and the question when they look at the map and they see the states that they need to well in, they're targeting the final days of the campaign the states they need their people to turnout in order to win based on what the polls are saying and based on what their projection is for how their candidate wins. Kaine visits La Crosse because Wisconsin is an important state for Hillary Clinton and the La Crosse area, Western Wisconsin, is a really important place where they need a lot of voters to turnout in order to pull the state. The Trump campaign has a theory about the election; that they think they can play in a lot of places where democrats have been winning historically, and particularly in the industrial upper Midwest. They're looking at Michigan, Wisconsin, and Minnesota even as places where they have a theory that they can do well if they can just get people turned out to vote, and again we get this same answer that turnout is going to be key in this election, and the Trump campaign thinks they can have a chance if they can get people to the polls in these states. That connects back to the way that the campaigns and the political parties are starting to see elections, and that is if turnout is key and they need people to vote, the best way to ensure that people vote is to make sure that they vote early, and so both campaigns and both political parties have started a much greater effort at getting people to the polls early so they can bank those votes, and vote banking means they don't have to worry about what happens on election day, and election day often times sees lines, sees waits at the polls. Early voting is a great way for anyone running for office to know that people have voted for sure, and so we have campaigns that are pushing for it, and it's really convenient for voters. So I don't think we are going to see any change in that going forward, and certainly this year early voting is going to make a big difference.

Slug: TIM DALE

Throughout the presidential campaign we spoke with UW-La Crosse political analyst Tim Dale. Those conversations began last August and I'm sure we'll ask him for analysis during the Trump administration's time in the White House. But he joins us today to talk about what turned out to be a challenging race for the experts. Whenever we take polls, what we look for is how we are going to measure the voting turnout. So when we have voters turning out to the polls, either more or less in any given election, creating a poll means trying to guess what amount people vote at. So if people stay home and decide not to vote, or if people leave a particular race blank, that really has an impact on how we tally the final vote versus what the polls look like. In sports, we would say this is why you play the game, and in politics we say this is why you have an election, and no matter what the polls say going into an election, democracy means it's what happens on election day that matters, and in this election we saw, in this case, a much lower democratic voter turnout than we would have expected. Barack Obama did much better in Wisconsin, not because the republican candidate did better or worse, it's that more democrats voted. So what we saw on election day and the big surprise was that turnout was down on the democratic side but not so much on the republican side it looks like Donald Trump being an unpopular candidate really polarized people, but for every republican he drove away, he actually captured someone who had not voted republican before or who hadn't turned out to vote before. So what happened was Donald Trump's numbers in Wisconsin virtually matched identically Mitt Romney's numbers. So he lost some voters, he gained some voters. Hillary Clinton, on the other hand, did not gain the voters that she needed to. She didn't even stay at a competitive level with Trump, obviously, and she ended up winning by a very small margin. But that unlike-ability factor, the lack of motivation

to the polls really hurt Hillary Clinton, maybe not necessarily people who voted for Donald Trump, but people who either decided to stay home or leave their ballot blank and vote for the other races. Donald Trump is noticing what everyone who goes into politics notices, and even running as an outsider candidate, you still have to deal with the realities of politics, and that is that Donald Trump has to be in a position of governance where he's bringing parts of even his own party together, and so it's not just a matter of he says he will drain the swamp, but it's also even draining the swamp itself. Donald Trump saying 'I'm going to clean out Washington' is going to require people with political experience. Donald Trump also has a Republican Party that disagrees with itself. There are members of congress right now that are unhappy that Trump was elected, and Paul Ryan and Priebus represent parts of the party that Donald Trump needs in order to govern, and so his cabinet appointments are going to be very telling in terms of what the government is going to look like and already we're getting a view that Donald Trump wants outsiders, but he also wants people who understand Washington, and I think it's those pressures on his presidency that are going to show us that even running as an outsider, even running on a person who is going to change government has to have people there who have experience and know what the landscape looks likes.

Green Party nominee Jill Stein and others are seeking an audit and recount of Election Day votes in Wisconsin, Michigan and Pennsylvania. A group of academics and security experts reportedly alerted the Clinton campaign to possible hacks in key counties in the three states where they say the electronic voting machines could have been tampered to tilt the election in Donald Trump's favor. Hillary Clinton's lead in the popular vote is close to two-million more votes than Trump. Now, pressure is mounting among liberals for an investigation into what happened on Election Day. New York Magazine is reporting that in Wisconsin Clinton received 7 percent fewer votes in counties that relied on electronic-voting machines compared with counties that used paper ballots counted by optical scanners. 2016 will go down as one of the most dramatic years for politics in Wisconsin; hotly contested presidential primaries and a very close general election just part of the story, along with visits from candidates and their running mates, a contentious US Senate race and a recount in the 32nd State Senate race highlighted a historic year. The La Crosse area played host to the biggest names in politics throughout 2016, with two visits from now president-elect Donald Trump as well as Bernie Sanders and Hillary Clinton. News 19 traveled to the Republican National Convention in July where we heard what Wisconsin delegates had to say about the future of country and the Badger State. Take a look. The race for the White House began long before Presidential candidates began visiting La Crosse. In July of 2015 Governor Scott Walker announced his candidacy for president at an event in Waukesha. That campaign ended two months later with Walker eventually endorsing Senator Ted Cruz one week before the Wisconsin primary in April. But before that primary, a host of presidential candidates visited our area. First up, Ohio Governor John Kasich hosted a rally in West Salem, focusing on the country's debt and looming threat of terrorism. A few days later Hillary Clinton made a campaign stop at Western Technical College and encouraged high voter turnout on primary day. She wrapped up her visit to La Crosse with a stop at Pearl Street Brewery. The next day her opponent Bernie Sanders held a rally at the Onalaska Omni Center. News 19 spoke with the presidential candidate one on one, asking him about his plan for raising the minimum wage and free tuition. The following week was a highly anticipated visit from republican front runner Donald Trump, who held a rally at the La Crosse Center. He spoke about national security, the economy and "making America great again." In July, News 19 traveled to Cleveland for the Republican National Convention, following delegates from our area and talking to them about what the United States and the next administration stands to learn from Wisconsin. This fall Chelsea Clinton made a stop at UWL on behalf of her mother and Governor Mike Pence campaigned for his running mate Donald Trump. Two days before the November election Democratic vice presidential candidate Tim Kaine stopped at Pearl Street Brewery. News 19 spoke with him about the economy, student loan debt and Wisconsin's role in the election. Locally, a highly competitive race for the 32nd Senate District between incumbent Jennifer Shilling and republican Dan Kapanke with the race ending with Shilling beating Kapanke by 56 votes. A recount of that race found Shilling victorious

over Kanapke by a total of 61 votes. Last but not least, the closely watched Senate race between Senator Ron Johnson and Russ Feingold; Marquette polls early on showed Feingold with a double digit lead over Johnson, but that lead shrank to 1 percent as the election approached. Johnson defeated Feingold handily on election night, granting him another six years in office. Among other election headlines: the West Salem School District passed both parts of its referendum, 20 million dollars to expand upon the current middle school and 5 million dollars for renovations to athletic facilities. The La Crescent School District's Operating Levy failed to get past voters, forcing the school to make \$300,000 worth of cuts in the upcoming school year. Donald Trump also made a second visit to La Crosse this summer for a private fundraising event. Donald Trump won Wisconsin by just 27,000votes out of nearly three million votes cast. La Crosse County remained a democratic strong hold in the 2016 elections. It was 1 of only 13 counties out of 72 in Wisconsin that voted for Hillary Clinton.by about a ten point margin.

The team will continue its way around Viroqua for the next week hoping to bring comfort to the lives of those turned upside down following the historic floods. Andrew Hanna says Team Rubicon hopes to help about 20 homeowners during its 9 day stay in Viroqua and the team says they are always in need of volunteers. As we've reported the record rainfall totals that fell in the area during the month of September were nothing compared to the heavy flooding that occurred on September twenty-first and twenty second News 19's Tianna Vanderhei explains how local and state officials are diligently working to provide relief. The Wisconsin Emergency Management Center estimates damages throughout the state to exceed 14-million dollars. That total includes debris clearance, protective measures and damage to infrastructure. The following days play a critical role in determining whether Wisconsin will request a Federal Disaster Declaration after devastating flooding in parts of the state. With budget constraints, levy caps and pressures on local property tax payers the Federal Emergency Management Agency or FEMA provides assistance in the wake of major disasters and stressful times. This initial stage in damage assessment includes specifically public structures such as town and county roads, bridges, culverts and storm drainage systems. Johnson stressed that without the capacity to be reimbursed by the state or by FMA for natural disasters like this one local governments, businesses and residents would be searching for money in budgets that are already depleted. At this time there's not enough damage to meet requirements for FEMA assistance for homeowners and businesses. However the state is actively looking at other programs to help assist those flood victims. FEMA and WEM officials met today at the Wisconsin Department of Military Affairs headquarters in Madison. Three different inspection teams will make their way to Jackson, Crawford, Richland, Vernon and La Crosse counties tomorrow with damage from Monroe and Trempealeau counties being submitted electronically. All teams will start at eight tomorrow morning. The state anticipates the assessments should be complete and submitted to Governor Scott Walker by Friday.

Matthew has been between a category 4 and 5 hurricane for 84 hours. This makes Matthew the longest lived major hurricane in the past 6 years.

Hurricane Matthew is gaining strength as it moves closer to the United States as the East Coast is bracing for the most powerful storm to hit the region in almost a decade. Florida, Georgia and the Carolinas are in its path. Residents are stocking up and evacuating, but some store shelves are already empty and gas is scarce. Matthew is bearing down with 145-mile-per hour winds causing catastrophic damage in Haiti. So far at least 11 deaths have been blamed on Hurricane Matthew

Slug: VERNON FEMA

The Federal Emergency Management Agency, otherwise known as FEMA, started a preliminary damage assessment today on the flooding that hit Western Wisconsin on September twenty first and twenty second. News 19's Tianna Vanderhei caught up with one of the teams in Vernon County and explains the process. Since the flooding local counties and towns have stayed busy compiling estimates. They then reported those to the state in hopes of receiving some type of aid to pay for the repairs. The first FEMA team covered La Crosse and Crawford County this morning, the second Clark and third Vernon County, FEMA employees, local and state emergency management personnel and county representatives gathered for a meeting early this morning at the Vernon County Public Safety building before hitting the road to check out the damages to public infrastructure, including cracked roadways downed bridges and dams. In Wisconsin the total amount is typically around eight million dollars to even consider asking for assistance. Pitchard says as the estimates came in from the counties the totals were at or above that amount. Earlier this summer flooding that hit Ashland and Iron Counties in northern Wisconsin required federal aid. Unfortunately this is the second time this year that FEMA has come into Wisconsin again. This assessment is just covering public infrastructure. WEM and FEMA encouraged home and business owners with excessive damage to take photos and call their respective county emergency management agencies for assistance.

Slug: HURRICANE

We're watching the evacuation in Florida, the result of Hurricane Matthew. Millions of people encouraged to leave, the Governor there saying this storm will be devastating. The Keys did not receive major damage and all roads and bridges there are open. But some models indicate that the hurricane could make more than one visit to south Florida. There's a chance the storm could loop back around, arriving again tomorrow as a weakened storm closing in on the state's Atlantic Coast with its powerful winds and threat of severe flooding. Hurricane Matthew is moving towards Florida. Now a Category 4 storm, it's on track to be the most powerful hurricane to hit the US in more than a decade, possibly the largest evacuation ever in the Sunshine State with orders in place for 2.5 million people from here to the Carolinas, taking the warnings seriously after seeing the destruction Matthew left behind in the Caribbean, battering the Bahamas and killing more than 100 people in Haiti in what officials there call the worst humanitarian crisis since the 2010 earthquake. Here in Florida, theme parks closing, store shelves left empty, businesses boarded up, from Miami all the way up the coast and inland. Millions are now bracing for what the National Hurricane Center says could be Matthew's potentially disastrous impacts. Forecasters say Matthew is expected to make landfall along Florida's east coast as a category 4 storm late tonight into tomorrow. President Obama has already declared a state of emergency, employing 2,500 National Guard troops to help with all of the last minute evacuations.

Nineteen year old Chukwudi "Ben" Onyeghala disappeared October seventh, last seen walking near campus. Crews searched the Mississippi River near Levee Park throughout the weekend. But now the Sheriff's Department is calling in help from neighboring agencies. News 19's Ginna Roe updates the search and why the Sheriff's Department is focusing on the river. On Friday, the Winona Sheriff's Department obtained surveillance footage from a camera in Levee Park facing the CAT Fremling boat, Winona State's Educational boat docked on the park's north side. The video showed a man matching Ben's description heading south in the park along the water. That's what first prompted the Sheriff's Department to search the water. But now the department is investigating new information from a boat owner docked in Levee Park the night Ben went missing. The boat owner says a man fitting Ben's description climbed onto his boat around 12 a.m. The boat owner told the man it was private boat and asked him to get off. The man responded "no, you get off." The boat owner went back into the cabin of the boat and locked the door behind him. He told the Sheriff's Department he heard a splash. The Sheriff's Department says the boat owner is helping with the investigation and over 70 volunteers and multiple agencies are helping with search efforts. That includes the La Croose dive unit, which came up to help today. Six boats were in the water scanning the river with sonar technology. The Sheriff's Department does not suspect foul play. Ownyaygala is from the Minneapolis suburb of White Bear Lake.

Slug: MISSING STUDENT

The Winona County Sheriff's office says authorities recovered the body of 19 year old Winona State student Chuckwudi "Ben" Ownyaygala. He was reported missing October 7th, last being seen walking on the levee in Winona. News 19's Caroline Hecker spoke with the Sheriff's Department and has details. It's the outcome no one wanted but early this morning divers were called to a location on the main channel about 3 miles from the levee in Homer where a homeowner on the river called police saying there was something odd in the water. That call came in at 9:30, and by the time dive rescue boats arrived the man who made the call to police had jumped in his boat and made his way out to the body. Divers brought the body to shore where with the help of a death investigator confirmed the body was that of Ben. In total he had been missing for 11 days. Winona County Sheriff Ron Ganrude says it's not often this sort of tragedy happens in Winona. The Sheriff's office says it will continue to investigate the last moments ben was seen alive and is continue to pursue leads. Sheriff Ganrude says there's one valuable lesson to take away from this tragedy; always be aware of your surroundings and wear a life jacket anytime you are on or near the water. Sheriff Ganrude also says it's critical to call police if you suspect something isn't quite right or suspicious. It can mean the difference, he says, between life and death in some cases.

Slua: SEMI CRASH

Two people are dead, the result of a head on crash involving two semis just outside Nodine on I-90. News 19's Tianna Vanderhei has an update. The Minnesota State Patrol received a call just after noon. A semi-truck traveling east bound crossed over the median and crashed into another semi traveling westbound. The head on collision killed both drivers on impact, resulting in fire and smoke.

Several local fire departments responded to the scene, the Minnesota State Patrol and Winona County Sheriff's Department. Sergeant Troy Christianson with the State Patrol says unfortunately crashes like this one are preventable. There were drivers who passed by and witnessed the crash take place. Sergeant Christianson says right now they're trying to gather as much evidence as possible. The westbound lanes were completely covered with debris including both the damaged trucks and the contents which the State Patrol believed to be some time of grain in one of the semis. He expects the westbound lane to re-open by six.

President Obama has declared a federal disaster in 10 Western Wisconsin counties hit by torrential rains in September. Trempealeau County did not sustain enough damage to qualify. The floods caused an estimated eleven million dollars in damage.

Slug: CA-BUS-CRASH

In southern California one of the deadliest road accidents occurred in the state's history. it happened early this morning when a tour bus carrying 44 passengers rear-ended a semi-truck at high speed. Thirteen people on the bus were killed and that death toll could rise. Thirty one others were rushed to the hospital. The tour bus crashed into the semi-truck's trailer on this stretch of desert highway near Palm Springs, about 100 miles from Los Angeles. As you can see the entire front of the bus penetrated the back of the semi. Witnesses say several rows of seats in the bus were crushed by the impact and heavy machinery was needed to pull apart the mass of metal. The California Highway Patrol says the bus was moving significantly faster than the truck. The bus riders were returning from a trip to a casino.

One person is in custody after a high speed chase through two counties this morning. News 19 obtained this surveillance video from Bob Locksmith's Shop. It shows a man approaching the van on a motorized scooter and eventually getting in and driving away. That's when La Crosse police received a report around 8:15 of the stolen van. After a failed attempt to stop the driver the suspect hit another car and drove onto I-90. A Wisconsin State Patrol trooper picked up the chase along with a Town of Campbell officer. Twice the officers set up spike strips along I-90 to try to stop the van which was traveling over 80 miles an hour. After the second attempt the van slowed and struck the median. Authorities arrested 29-year old Cameron Baker of La Crosse on a number of charges. Police stopped traffic in both directions while making that arrest. Baker was taken to Mayo in Sparta and then transported to La Crosse County jail. Dalton says the van was his main way of getting around town to customers. The van, in addition to all the damaged gear inside, totaled around \$30,000 according to Dalton.

Slug: WILDFIRES

More than 3,000 firefighters in the southeast are battling wildfires again today. At least 41-large fires are burning across parts of 7 states, the flames all fueled by droughts. But many believe they were man made. ABC News reports police in Kentucky arrested 21-year old Johnny Mullins who wants to be a weatherman. ABC reported the Police Chief in Jenkins Kentucky says "he likes to do Facebook videos and have people follow him on his 'weather forecast,' so that's pretty much why he did what he did. He enjoyed the attention he got from the Facebook stuff." The chief also said "he didn't realize how much danger he was putting other people in." The remaining suspicious fires are under investigation but in North Carolina the situation is so dire a mandatory evacuation is in place. The widespread smoke also prompting air quality warnings in parts of North Carolina and Georgia and with no rain in the forecast anytime soon North Carolina's Governor is warning the largest fire may not be put out until March.

The New Jersey transit operator involved in the fatal Hoboken train crash in September has been diagnosed with sleep apnea. One person died, more than 100 were injured.

Slug: BP OIL SPILL

New maps from NASA and the US geological survey show a dramatic loss of shoreline in Louisiana, following the deep water horizon oil spill in 2010. Louisiana lost a lot of marshland over the last several years. The maps show a dramatic loss of land from 2010 to 2011 after much of the coastline was coated with oil from the spill. Researchers say the oil can kill or weaken vegetation along shore and when that happens the soil is more prone to erosion.

Those eager to hit the slopes are hoping for that snowstorm this weekend. But with that comes cold temperatures. News 19's Tianna Vanderhei explains how you can ensure you're prepared for what's to come. Extremely cold wind chills early next week will carry through the week, dropping temperatures into the single digits. Right now it's important to make sure your vehicle is prepared for what's ahead, making sure you have an emergency kit, things like a flashlight, battery charger, jumper cables, just in case that battery does die, checking the date on it now will most likely save you time next week. According to Triple A at 32 degrees a car battery loses 35% of its strength and at zero degrees Fahrenheit it loses about 60%, stressing the importance of being prepared. Wind chill temperatures don't adversely affect a vehicle as a car won't cool down past the outdoor temperature at any given time. However if you do break down those harsh winds will cause body temperatures to drop. It's best to stay in your vehicle if at all possible and again keep those layers on. Checking your tire pressure is also a good idea, as that will progressively decrease as the temperatures drop.

He is reported to be Syrian and shouted "do not forget Syria, do not forget Aleppo" and that "everyone who has taken part in this oppression will, one by one, pay for it." The Russian government is calling the incident a terrorist attack. Karlov had been the Envoy to Turkey since 2013.

Cheetahs are the world's fastest land animals but they are racing toward extinction. A recent study found only about 7,100 cheetahs remaining in the world. This comes after cheetahs lost 91% of their historic habitat in Africa and southwest Asia. The study suggests securing protected land for cheetahs is not enough because they don't typically stay within conservation areas, and that the animal's status needs to be changed from "vulnerable" to "endangered" to better protect them.

Slug: MISSING PLANE

The US Coast Guard is actively searching for a missing plane with 6 people on board that vanished just after taking off from Cleveland last night. Search teams are on and over Lake Erie, trying to find any sign of a small plane that disappeared with three adults and three children on board following a Cleveland Cavaliers game. Just after take-off from the airport it vanished from radar 2 miles off the shore of Lake Erie. So far no debris has been found. Despite not hearing from them the airport officials are hoping for a positive outcome.

Slug: MISSING PLANE

The La Crosse County Sheriff's Department says about an hour before the shooting sheriff's deputies were dispatched to a domestic disturbance call. The suspect fled the scene of the disturbance in a car before deputies arrived. About an hour later a sheriff's deputy saw a car matching the description of the suspect from the domestic disturbance and conducted a traffic stop. According to the department the suspect refused to cooperate and mutual aid assistance was called in for both La Crosse and the Campbell police departments. The suspect then exited the car and charged deputies and officers while in possession of a weapon. Tri-State Ambulance confirmed to News 19 the suspect was transported with life threatening injuries. According to statements from both La Crosse police department and the La Crosse County sheriff's department each has an officer on paid administrative leave following the incident.
