Two republican lawmakers want to bar transgender students from using the school locker room or bathroom assigned to the gender with which they identify. Representative Jesse Kremer and Senator Steve Nass want to require school boards to designate bathrooms and locker rooms as exclusive to one gender. The transgender legal defense & education fund says the bill singles out transgender students in Wisconsin for discrimination.

The Wisconsin Department of Justice is coordinating a statewide drug take back event this Saturday. The goal is to dispose of unwanted or unused drugs in a safe, convenient way while also educating the community about the issue of prescription drug abuse.

Slug: CONCEAL

A republican sponsored bill in Madison would allow concealed carry gun owners to bring weapons into public university buildings. That bill comes less than 2-weeks after a gunman killed 9-people at a community college in Oregon. Under current law license holders can carry guns on the grounds of colleges and universities, but they are banned in campus buildings.

Slug: ROADS

Transportation budget cuts are set to delay up to 82 million in state highway repair and maintenance affecting 114-projects in western and southwestern Wisconsin. In La Crosse and surrounding counties there are nearly 32 projects projected at more than \$53 million dollars. That includes work in La Crosse County on Highway 33 from Shady Pines Road to Highway OA and from Kirschner Road to the Monroe County line.

For the Madsons, they brought home Jax as a newborn. Under current Wisconsin law, birth parents have around 30 days, sometimes much longer, to relinquish their rights to the child. They are also required to make a court appearance and answer questions in front of a judge.

Governor Walker is calling on state lawmakers to release hundreds of millions of dollars to fund a delayed road project in the Janesville area and several others around the state. The Governor asked the Joint Finance Committee to borrow 350-million dollars over the next two years for the five projects. Walker says the money is critical for south-central Wisconsin.

A new bridge, a bit of a re-route of the current path and a new stretch of highway, all part of the I-90 construction project. But building the highway is not the only issue construction crews have to be concerned about. Today the focus is what's under the bridge. About 3-thousand small brown bats typically live under the bridge set for demolition next year. Because bats are legally a protected species something needed to be done.

A state assembly health committee signed off on a package designed to combat heroin use. The panel also approved a bill clarifying a state law allowing pharmacists to dispense the overdose antidote Narcan without specific prescriptions. The vote clears the way for a full assembly vote.

Slug: MN STANDARD TEST

Minnesota lawmakers are discussing reducing the number of mandatory standardized tests students must take from kindergarten through high school. State Senator Charles Wiger says students are required to take dozens of Minnesota comprehensive assessment exams. He says students and teachers are spending too much time preparing for the tests. If Minnesota eliminates some of these exams, Wiger says it will have to get approval from the federal government.

Slug: OPT OUT OF TESTS RDR

In Wisconsin the State Assembly passed a bill today allowing all students between grades 3 and 12 to opt out of standardized tests required by state or federal law. Under the bill schools wouldn't be penalized on accountability reports for students who don't take tests. The bill now heads to the Senate.

Slug: BUCKS ARENA

The Milwaukee Bucks say the planned opening of their new downtown arena will be delayed by a year. The team hoped to have the arena ready by the start of the 2017-2018 NBA season. However, Bucks officials now say their construction schedule now targets an opening for the 2018-2019 season. The NBA had threatened to move the team if a new arena wasn't built by 2017. An NBA spokesman says the league is quote "comfortable with the revised timetable."

Slug: SPARTA JAIL

Construction continues at the new Monroe County Justice Center in Sparta. Phase one is scheduled for completion in February. Sheriff Scott Perkins says his department is ready for that transition, while the current jail can hold up to 68 inmates, the new justice center will house up to 180 people.

Slug: MAYOR PAY

Despite a veto by the mayor this summer some city council members are proposing a pay raise for the mayor. In mid-August the city council approved a proposal to raise the mayor's salary from 77-thousand a year to 85-thousand a year beginning in 2017. Council member Martin Gaul says the pay raise isn't about attracting candidates but about fairly compensating city employees including the mayor. He hopes to see about a 1-percent increase for all city employees in the next budget. The proposal would raise the mayor's salary by 1.2-percent for four years which comes to 79-thousand and 5-hundred dollars each year. Gaul says city employees deserve even higher raises but says the number reflects raises of people in the community.

Slug: ROUINDABOUT

To Madison now and a bill in the assembly's transportation committee that could create problems for roundabouts. The bill would give local communities veto power over roundabout construction. Representative Chris Danou opposes the bill. He says local governments should not be able to "micro manage" what the DOT does. He adds the projects are funded by state transportation funds not local money and the proposal would lengthen an already lengthy process.

Slug: LAXPDREPORT

The City of La Crosse has the Green Bay Police Department's independent report into the investigation of the workplace environment at the La Crosse police department. Two La Crosse police officers are on administrative leave pending an investigation, that investigation looking into allegations of misconduct against one officer and allegations made by the accused officer against a second officer. When the mayor's office became involved police suspended their internal investigation. That report from the Chief of the Green Bay Police Department has been completed. Mayor Tim Kabat is not commenting on the findings at this time.

The Board of Public Works approved a fitness area for City Hall. The current employee break room located in the basement will become a workout facility with the west conference room on the first floor temporarily serving as a new break room. Funds for the project come from an existing health plan fund. They plan to start with two or three pieces of equipment and build from there.

Slug: BUSSES

The school year began with a number of glitches, buses were late picking up and dropping off students, sometimes even skipping scheduled pick up locations altogether. The district contracts with Ohio based First Student Incorporated to provide bus services. Now the district says the issues are nearly resolved. If you're one of the many parents of students in the district frustrated with the inconsistencies of your child's bus schedule you're in luck. The district says it will go back to its old bus routes in order to make sure its students are safe and parents aren't inconvenienced. After long talks with the First Student Bus Company and feedback from parents the district says resorting to old bus routes from years past is the best solution to the problem. So why the change in routes to begin with? Superintendent Randy Nelson says the district wanted to determine what kind of efficiencies would come of it, but after a lack of drivers and routes that were too long the district quickly realized it needed to make a change.

Slug: ASSEMBLY

Republicans in the State Assembly have approved changes to Wisconsin's Electronic Food Stamp Program for needy families. The measure would add photos to the benefit cards as a fraud prevention tool. Supporters say the change will prevent people from selling or trading the cards. Democratic critics say its demeaning to the needy, is a waste of money and won't reduce fraud. The change will cost seven million dollars in its first year. It still needs State Senate approval.

Slug: HOLMEN FIRE

We could learn more tonight about the future of Holmen Fire Chief Doug Schober. Criticism of the Chief has reached the point where a member of the village board called for his resignation. During a previous fire district meeting board member Chuck Olson asked Schober to resign citing lack of leadership. The fire board will address the state of Schober's employment at a special meeting tonight. Debate is likely to grow heated and the board is likely to go into closed session to discuss personnel matters. Another topic on the agenda is an agreement among Holmen and the towns of Onalaska and Holland for fire protection.

Slug: HOLMEN FIRE

Chief Doug Schober has held the post since 2002 and worked for the department since 1991. His critics are calling for his removal, raising concerns during previous fire board meetings about his leaderships skills. The fire board went into closed session for about an hour. When they came back they said no action would be taken. They didn't say whether or not they would address the department's issues with Schober in the future.

Slug: FIRE BUDGET

The Holmen Fire Board did take action on another matter. After 3 years of negotiation the board approved a fire agreement between all three municipalities in its jurisdiction; the Town of Holland, Village of Holmen and Town of Onalaska. This agreement means that the 425 thousand dollar operating budget is divided based on population and number of calls for service rather than simply dividing it three ways.

During a previous fire district meeting board member Chuck Olson asked Chief Doug Schober to resign citing lack of leadership. The board went into closed session for about an hour Sunday afternoon discussing Schober's leadership and performance. After reconvening the board decided to suspend him with pay.
