Democratic mayor of Monessen, Pennsylvania, Lou Mavrakis, whose invitation to visit his economically struggling steel mill town was accepted by Donald J. Trump, talked about Trump's appeal to those who believe they have been forgotten by Democratic political leaders, and whose economic recovery has never taken place. Jim Roddey, whose own choice for President, Florida Republican United States Senator Marco Rubio, was defeated by Trump in primaries, once said he could never support Donald J. Trump, but later said that he would probably be voting for him.

Topic: Democratic Presidential candidate Hillary Clinton was diagnosed with viral pneumonia, and had to leave the campaign trail while she was given antibiotics and an enforced rest to cure the infection. Controversy has been swirling about Clinton's health, and when Clinton almost collapsed leaving a 9/11 ceremony in New York, doctors eventually had to release details of her condition. Our discussion centered on the health of both Hillary Clinton and Donald J. Trump, how much the public has a right to know about their private medical records, whether women react differently to certain medical conditions, and how all of this will affect an already contentious campaign for President.

2. VIOLENT DEATHS OF POLICE AND AFRICAN-AMERICAN MALES

Topics discussed in this category included discussions regarding the recent violent deaths of both police and African-American males in America, and the growing racial divide about policing.

Louisiana and St. Paul, Minnesota were attempting to arrest them. Our discussion centered on racial divides over the conduct of police when interacting with African-Americans, and the dangers that police face in trying to do their job.

Reverend Glenn Grayson lost a son to gun violence in 2010, and Dr. Todd Allen has studied the American civil rights movement, and takes students on a bus tour of historic places where civil rights protests and deaths took place in the 1960's.

3. OPIOID ADDICTION

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on viewing the opioid addiction crisis as a health issue, more than a law enforcing issue, and a discussion regarding a non-profit that is expanding its services to help those coping with opioid abuse

Topic: The opioid addiction and overdose crisis, often leading to death, has become a national crisis, and Southwestern Pennsylvania is struggling with this problem. Many public health leaders are urging government leaders to change the way they view the crisis, as a health issue, more than enforcing the law. Our discussion with Dr. Karen Hacker, Director of the Allegheny County Health Department, and with two women who have lost relatives to drug overdoses, was inspired by a report by KDKA-TV reporter Ralph Iannotti, who heard the desperate pleas from these women at a vigil and rally in Coraopolis, Pennsylvania, by the group "Not One More", which provides support to those fighting drug overdoses and mourns the deaths of those who have succumbed to this addiction.

Familylinks, a local non-profit organization that is dedicated to providing vital services to more than 8,000 of Western Pennsylvania's most vulnerable citizens each year, is expanding its services to help those coping with opioid abuse. Our guests included Familylinks' Senior Director of Behavioral Services, Paul Tedesco, and their CEO – Frederick Massey, Jr., who talked about their plans to help those in crisis.

4. TERRORISM

The topic of this category was a discussion on terrorism in response to a series of bombings that occurred in New York City and New Jersey.

Topic: A series of bombings, and bombing attempts, during the weekend of September 17-18th, rattled both the people of New York City and New Jersey, and America as a whole. In the worst incident, 31-people were hurt when a pressure cooker bomb blew up in the Chelsea section of Manhattan on September 17th. What is the status of the war against both domestic and foreign terrorism, and how do intelligence experts monitor those who might be radicalized, at home and abroad, to become terrorists against the United States? Our guests, Michael Kenney, Ph.D., Associate Professor of International Affairs, at the University of Pittsburgh's Graduate School of Public & International Affairs (GSPIA), and Colin P. Clarke, Ph.D., Political Scientist, at the Pittsburgh office of the RAND Corporation (both men are also affiliated with the University of Pittsburgh's Matthew B. Ridgway Center for International Security Studies), provided us with their thoughts on the war against terror, and what can be done to fight terrorism, both here and around the world.

5. HEALTH

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on devoting dollars and political resolve to funding medical research to improve the treatment of cancer and find a cure, and a discussion about the medical and public relations fallout from Mylan's actions to increase the price of the lifesaving EpiPen by almost 500-percent.

Topic: Last January, President Barack Obama, in his State of the Union Address, pledged a concerted effort, similar to one in the 1960's to put a man on the moon, to devote dollars and political resolve to funding medical research to improve the treatment of cancer and find a cure. He selected Vice-President Joe Biden, who lost his own son, Beau, to cancer, in charge of a "Cancer Moonshot Summit", held at Howard University in Washington, D.C., on June 29th. Our program focused on what is being done on the local level in cancer research and treatment, and featured David S. Parda, M.D., Chair of the Allegheny Health Network's Cancer Institute, and Marina Posvar, a cancer survivor, Patients Navigation Services Coordinator at the Hillman Cancer Center, part of the UPMC Cancer Institute, and a participant, on the local level, in the "Cancer Moonshot Summit".

Topic: For those who suffer from life-threatening allergies, the drug epinephrine, which counters the damaging violent effects of those allergies, from everything from peanuts to bee stings, can mean the difference between life and death. But the manufacturer of the EpiPen, the device most commonly used to inject that drug into the human body system, Mylan, with corporate headquarters in Southpointe, Washington County, Pennsylvania, and its pharmaceuticals division based in Morgantown, West Virginia, has increased the price of the EpiPen almost 500-percent, making it financially impossible for many who desperately need the drug to afford to buy it. Our guests, including a paramedic, who needs the EpiPen himself for allergies, and who also administers it on an emergency basis, and an associate professor of Pharmacy at the University of Pittsburgh, and marketing expert from Pitt's Katz School of Business, talked about the medical and public relations fallout from Mylan's actions.

6. GUN LEGISLATION

The topic of this category was a discussion regarding a sit-in on the floor of the U.S. House of Representatives over stalled gun control legislation.

Topic: There was another mass shooting, in Orlando, Florida, on June 12th, the worst, single act of domestic terrorism in American history, in which 49 people were killed by a security guard, and 53-others were wounded, at the Pulse, gay nightclub, in a terrorist/hate crime. The Republican-controlled U.S. House of Representatives refused to take action on gun control legislation supported by Democrats, so a number of frustrated Democrats, including Pittsburgh Congressman Mike Doyle, from the 14th Congressional District, decided to participate in a sit-in on the floor of the House at the end of June, effectively stopping any House legislative activity. We spoke with Congressman Doyle about his decision to take part in the sit-in, and about the status of gun control legislation.

7. EDUCATION

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on new information regarding the Jerry Sandusky sexual abuse scandal at Penn State University, a discussion on an effort by the Pittsburgh Public Schools to provide more diversity in the recruitment of teachers, a discussion on how Point Park University has transformed much of its Downtown campus and its curriculum, and a discussion regarding an effort to encourage young girls to consider science, math, technology, and engineering.

Topic: *The Washington Post* broke a troubling story in July about the Jerry Sandusky sexual abuse scandal at Penn State University, a case that remains in litigation. *The Post* uncovered recently unsealed court documents in which a man testified in 2014, that as far back as 1976, Penn State head football coach Joe Paterno ignored the complaints of a then-fourteen-year-old boy, who claimed that he was the victim of a sexual assault committed by then-Assistant Coach Jerry Sandusky. We spoke with Pittsburgh attorney John Gismondi, not directly

involved in this case, about the impact that these revelations could have on cases still pending, and on the financial condition of Penn State.

Hennigan also talked about new curriculum offerings, including a Master's Degree in Community Engagement, and the opening of an impressive Center for Media Innovation. with street-level television studios at Wood Street and Third Avenue in Downtown Pittsburgh.

Topic: Our discussion centered around the dramatic political rise and fall of Kathleen Kane, as Pennsylvania's first female elected Attorney General, and included issues such as the role that being a woman played in her access to power, and also inexperience in dealing with other political players in Harrisburg and falling into the same trap as male politicians, activity that was illegal, corrupt, and sometimes vindictive. Joe Mistick, former Executive Secretary to another Pennsylvania female political leader, the late Pittsburgh Mayor Sophie Masloff, discussed the contrasts between Kathleen Kane and the more humble Masloff, whose political instincts and devotion to integrity were part of her own legacy.

10. FLOODING

The topic of this category was a discussion on area flooding and solutions to create effective improvements to alleviate these reoccurring problems.

Topic: Western Pennsylvania sustained heavy damage from flash flooding at the end of August. A gate system, put into place along Pittsburgh's Washington Boulevard, failed and emergency personnel had to rescue unsuspecting drivers who were trapped in their cars by sudden flood waters in Pittsburgh's East End. In Connellsville, Fayette County, hundreds of people lost everything they owned when Mountz Creek suddenly overflowed into the Dutch Bottoms section of Connellsville and Bullskin Township, and others had to be rescued. Our guests talked about the causes of each flooding issue, including failure to choose the more expensive but more effective solutions to these flooding problems, and how those solutions could also create opportunities for economic revitalization.

11. BREXIT

The topic of this category was a discussion on Great Britain's vote for their government to leave the EU, and the impact this had on financial markets.
