1. TERRORISM, INTERNATIONAL CONFLICTS AND THREATS

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on terrorism from abroad as well as domestically, a discussion on the investigation into the crash of Malaysia Airlines Flight#17 in Eastern Ukraine, and a discussion regarding computer hacking that may have originated in Russia.

Topic: Just as Americans are disengaging our troops from Iraq and Afghanistan, we face a new and potentially even more dangerous threat from rogue terrorists abroad, who have beheaded journalists, affiliating themselves with a group they call ISIS, and domestic terrorists including a man named Eric Michael Frein, who shot and killed one Pennsylvania state trooper and critically wounded a second trooper in central Pennsylvania. How has the war against terrorism changed? We talked with former F.B.I. Agent and Professor and Chair of the Department of Justice, Law, and Security at La Roche College, Lawrence Likar, J.D., and Colin P. Clarke, Ph.D., Associate Political Scientist for the RAND Corporation in Pittsburgh.

Entering into the investigation is the potential role that Russian President Vladimir Putin, and political activists against the Ukrainian government might have played in this disaster, and what impact that might have on American-Russian relations. So far little information has been released about the cause of this crash.

Topic: Just as the NFL Football regular season was about to begin, came the release of a controversial shocking surveillance video of Baltimore Ravens' running back Ray Rice punching out his fiancée, Janay Palmer, inside the elevator of an Atlantic City, New Jersey casino. Rice had initially been suspended for two games, but after the video surfaced, the Ravens released Rice, and he is now under indefinite suspension by the NFL, which continues to investigate the incident, along with police. The purpose of this broadcast was to pull away the curtain from the "dirty little secret" of domestic violence and provide information on what services are available to victims, and our guests included Nicole Molinaro Karaczun, Director of Services for the Women's Center & Shelter of Greater Pittsburgh, and Deborah Murphy, survivor of domestic violence, who told a compelling tale of her own experience.

3. MENTAL HEALTH

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion with Representative Tim Murphy on the need for improved mental health services, and a discussion on the growing problem of depression and sometimes-related suicide.

Topic: The suicide death of actor/comedian Robin Williams, who hanged himself inside his home, shocked and saddened the world, and his millions of fans. The death of this Academy Award-winning actor also brought needed attention to the growing problem of depression and sometimes-related suicide in this country, the stigma attached to mental health disorders, and the need to educate the public about suicide and help that is available for those suffering from depression. Our guests included Republican Congressman and psychologist Tim Murphy of Upper St. Clair, sponsor of legislation to reform mental health treatment in this country, and two local psychiatrists who treat their patients for depression, Dr. Christina Ann Smith from the Allegheny Health Network, and Dr. Kenneth Thompson, Staff Psychiatrist for Milestone Centers, Incorporated.

4. IMMIGRATION

The topic of this category was a discussion on issues relating to immigration policies and the impact they are having in Allegheny County.

Topic: As more and more immigrants from Central America illegally crossed over the American border to escape political and economic distress and danger, Allegheny County found itself in the position of taking care of some of those immigrants. We talked with Pittsburgh attorney Jacqueline Martinez, who clients have included some undocumented immigrants who are facing “removal”, or deportation, Jamie Englert, from Jewish Family and Children’s Services in Pittsburgh, which provides immigration-related, legal and naturalization services, Sr. Janice Vanderneck, from the Order of St. Joseph, in Baden, Pennsylvania, who has service the needs (including housing and education) of these immigrants since 2003, through her Casa San Jose, in Brookline, and Barbara Murock, Project Manager of the Immigrant and International Advisory Council of Allegheny County’s Department of Human Services. This program led to a series of special reports by KDKA-TV’s Andy Sheehan for KDKA-TV newscasts.

5. DEATH OF FORMER PITTSBURGH MAYOR – SOPHIE MASLOFF

The topics of this category were discussions on the legacy of former Pittsburgh Mayor – Sophie Masloff.

Topic: People in the Pittsburgh area were saddened to learn of the death of former Pittsburgh Mayor Sophie Masloff, the first woman and first person of the Jewish faith to become Mayor of Pittsburgh (1988-1994), who died at the age of 96. Our special broadcast included obituary material on her amazing political life, from growing up in Pittsburgh’s Hill District as the daughter of immigrant parents, to becoming a member and president of Pittsburgh City Council, to becoming Mayor of Pittsburgh, upon the death from amyloidosis of Mayor Richard S. Caliguiri, as well as interviews with those who knew Mayor Masloff, and whose lives she touched. Frederick Frank was her attorney, campaign treasurer, advisor, and friend, Darlene Harris, former president of Pittsburgh City Council, talked about the way Sophie Masloff helped to break the glass ceiling of leadership in the Pittsburgh mayor’s office, and Therese Rocco, legendary head of the Missing Persons Bureau, was named an assistant chief of police, the first woman to be appointed to that position in Pittsburgh, by Mayor Sophie Masloff.

Among the proposals are having a private real estate firm construct a luxury hotel on the same property, limiting the space for the center. Pittsburgh's non-profit foundations and city and county leaders are working, to develop an alternate plan.

As we recorded this broadcast, the fate of the financially-troubled August Wilson Center for African-American Culture (named for the Pulitzer Prize-winning Playwright) seemed in doubt and likely to be limited in size to share accommodations with a hotel, to be built by developers, on the same property. We invited representatives from competing organizations, to appear on this broadcast, to present their case: Matthew Shollar, Partner in 980 Liberty Partners LLC, who represented the hotel developer who was trying to acquire the property through court proceedings, and Grant Oliphant, new President of the Heinz Endowments, and Tim Stevens – President & CEO of the Black Political Empowerment Project (B-PEP), who represented foundations, the City of Pittsburgh and Allegheny County leadership, and the Urban Redevelopment Authority of Pittsburgh, who proposed allowing the foundations to acquire responsibility for paying off the Center's debt and managing the non-profit institution. Our broadcast appeared on Sunday, and, on Monday, just before a court hearing, developer Shollar rescinded his proposal, allowing the non-profits to assume control of the Center (Post-Gazette: "In a last-minute settlement, an entity to be formed by the Pittsburgh Foundation will buy the August Wilson Center for African American Culture for \$8.49 million and keep its mission intact. As part of the deal, New York developer 980 Liberty Partners will bow out; terminating the sales agreement it had to buy the building for \$9 million.

7. 40th ANNIVERSARY OF THE RESIGNATION OF RICHARD NIXON

The topics of this category were discussions on the 40th Anniversary of the resignation of Richard Nixon, the legacy of his presidency, and the impact of the Watergate scandal.

Forty years later, we looked back on the Nixon presidency, Watergate, and President Nixon's legacy, with Dr. Gerald Shuster, Professor of Communication at the University of Pittsburgh, and Dr. John McCarthy, Associate Professor of History at Robert Morris University. McCarthy brought an interesting element to the broadcast, since he was born after Watergate, and is teaching students totally unfamiliar with this issue about its vital importance to modern American history.

Nixon and Pat Nixon, to speak at its special dinner celebration, this past month, Julie Nixon Eisenhower graciously agreed to an exclusive interview with Jon Delano, which included thoughts about Watergate and its impact on the country and her family, thoughts given, forty years after President Nixon became the only President in American history to resign from office.

Topic: Thirty years ago, a word entered the vocabulary that caused fear and alarm around the world: AIDS – or Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome. Thirty years later, progress has been made in studying, and treating the disease, the number of new infections has dropped, and AIDS-related deaths are now at a seven-year low, although AIDS remains one of the most misunderstood diseases, and certain areas of the world still have large populations at high-risk (more than two out of three of the 35-million people with HIV live in sub-Saharan Africa). We talked about research being done in Pittsburgh, to find a cure for AIDS, and Pittsburgh's very special role in providing confidential monitoring of the male population (Men's Study at the University of Pittsburgh), which was instrumental in guiding medical research with Dr. Ken Ho, Instructor of Medicine in the Division of Infectious Diseases at the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine and Medical Director of the Pitt Men's Study, Keith Kanel, M.D., Chief Medical Officer for the Jewish Healthcare Foundation of Pittsburgh, and Jim Huggins, Ph.D., Co-Founder and former Associate Executive Director of the PERSAD Center in Pittsburgh, a human service organization that works to improve the well-being of the HIV-AIDS and LGBTQ communities in our area.
