1. HEALTH CARE

Topics discussed in this category included discussions on The Affordable Care Act and the glitches associated with the computer sign-up system for it, a local Congressman's efforts for a major overhaul of America's broken mental health delivery, and a look at the efforts to eradicate polio as well as the University of Pittsburgh's historic role in Dr. Jonas Salk's groundbreaking work in developing and testing a vaccine to prevent polio.

Guest: <u>Karen Wolk Feinstein, Ph.D.</u> - President & CEO, Jewish Healthcare Foundation Topic: The Affordable Care Act (Obama Care) sign-up began for the public but with major glitches, including failures within the computer sign-up system. We talked with Dr. Karen Wolk Feinstein, President & CEO of the Jewish Healthcare Foundation, and a recognized expert on the delivery of healthcare, about the Affordable Care Act, what it does, how it is supposed to work, and who benefits from it. It wasn't until the end of the year before most sign-up glitches were addressed, and sign-up levels remained below goals set by the Obama Administration.

Guest: Rep. Tim Murphy, Ph.D. - (R) 18th Congressional District, Upper St. Clair

Topic: Western Pennsylvania Republican Congressman Tim Murphy, with 30 years of experience as a clinical psychologist, before serving in the Pennsylvania state legislature and in Congress, is taking the lead in calling for a major overhaul of America's broken mental health delivery, especially after a series of mass school shootings in America. He talked about that proposed legislation, which would expand access to care, rely more on court-ordered and preventive treatment programs, and provide extra federal spending for prevention, research, and first-responder training. Congressman Murphy also discussed 2013, a year of political gridlock in Washington, and what he believes will take place on Capitol Hill in 2014, an election year for the entire United States House of Representatives.

Topic: Polio remains a crippling and potentially deadly, highly infectious disease, which could see resurgence, unless it is completely eradicated from the earth. Rotary International, since 1988, has made its goal the elimination of polio, and the disease is present in only three countries today (Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan). Our guests talked about Pittsburgh and the University of Pittsburgh's historic role in Dr. Jonas Salk's groundbreaking work in developing and testing a vaccine to prevent polio. This program included clips from exclusive KDKA-TV interviews with Dr. Salk in 1980 and with David Oshinsky, author of the Pulitzer Prize-winning book: "Polio: An American Story", part of a KDKA-TV documentary about polio. Both of our hosts have a personal connection to polio, as "KD/PG Sunday Edition" co-host Stacy Smith is a polio survivor, and co-host David Shribman's father was also a polio survivor.

2. GOVERNMENT SHUTDOWN – DEBT CEILING

Topics discussed in this category included discussions on the debt ceiling, and what the possibility of default would mean to the financial credibility of the United States.

We talked with Antony Davies, Ph.D., an Associate Professor of Economics at Duquesne University's Graduate School of Business. He provided perspective on what options the country had and if an agreement was reached at the last minute to avoid default.

Topic: As the federal budget deadline wore on, we called upon two men with extensive backgrounds in banking, Duquesne University's Tom Nist, and the University of Pittsburgh's Jay Sukits, to discuss the possibility of default, and what it would mean to the financial credibility of the United States. Default was averted at the last moment when agreement was reached in Congress on stopgap legislation. The long-term potential for a repeat performance is likely, unless political divisions narrow on Capitol Hill.

3. TOURISM

Topics discussed in this category included discussions on the increase in tourism in Pittsburgh due to the Pittsburgh Pirates' appearance in the playoffs, and the 40-foot inflatable duck on Pittsburgh's rivers that drew 500,000 visitors to the city.

Topic: As predicted, in a previous broadcast, the Pittsburgh Pirates' appearance in Major League Baseball playoffs for the first time in many years, combined with the visit of a 40-foot inflatable duck on Pittsburgh's rivers (part of the Pittsburgh Cultural Trust's "Festival of Firsts") resulted in huge crowds (an estimated 500,000 visitors), a boom in tourism, and a boost to the local economy. Craig Davis, President and CEO of VisitPittsburgh, returned and discussed the presence of many tourists from out-of-town on their first visit to Pittsburgh for both of these events. There have been requests for the duck, which was leaving, after a limited stay to return to Pittsburgh because of the overwhelming positive response to this art initiative, a new area for Pittsburgh and its own population, as well as visitors.

Shaunda Miles, from the Trust, joined us, to talk about the economic and psychological lift that this unusual expression of art along the rivers provided to Pittsburgh. It is something that is unlike any other art exhibit in the history of the city. The duck is not scheduled to return, but the Trust has kept silent about what other possibilities exist to draw on the positive experience of this exhibit.

Melissa Hart and Jim Burn weighed in on political leaders from New Jersey Governor Chris Christie to Hillary Rodham Clinton. They also talked about divisions within political parties that could cause problems in the coming election.

of the Tea Party, in American politics. However, Senator Santorum has a new role to play as CEO of a Texas-based film production and distribution company EchoLight Studios, which produces and distributes high-quality motion pictures for families, including a recently released film called "The Christmas Candle" with limited release in selected theaters. Santorum talked about the role that this company can play in the entertainment industry.

5. EDUCATION

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on the role teachers are being asked to play in protecting students in schools, a discussion with the Superintendent of Pittsburgh Public Schools, and a discussion regarding the "Pittsburgh Promise" scholarship fund.

Topic: December 14th marked the first anniversary of the mass school shootings at Sandy Hook Elementary School, in Newtown, Connecticut, in which a 20-year-old Newtown resident fatally shot twenty elementary school children and six adult staff members, before killing himself. Adam Lanza had also murdered his own mother in their home before going on the school shooting spree. It was the second-deadliest mass murder at a U.S. elementary school in American history. Our guests talked about the critically important role that teachers are now being asked to play in protecting students in schools (Pittsburgh recently had a shooting near Brashear High School, in which several students were shot, and teachers played a major part in protecting students), whether teachers should be armed with guns, and whether anything can be done to move the stalled political agenda for gun reform and better mental health monitoring.

Topic: The Superintendent of Pittsburgh Public Schools, Dr. Linda Lane, joined us to discuss her "State of the Pittsburgh School District" findings. Dr. Lane's goal is to have 100-percent of students continue their education with either a two-year or four-year college degree or workforce certification. That will mean focused attention on academic achievement, teacher accountability, and perhaps a shrinking of the number of schools.

"The Pittsburgh Promise" scholarship funds are limited to students who live within the city and attend Pittsburgh Public Schools.

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion with the author of a book on the legendary 1970's Pittsburgh Steelers, an interview with the Manager of the Pittsburgh Pirates, and a discussion with the author of book on former Pittsburgh Steelers coach Chuck Noll.

Pomerantz believes that because of changes in the way players receive their salaries, and changes in the way pro football is regulated on the field, there will never be another dynasty like the Pittsburgh Steelers of the 1970's.

7. 50th ANNIVERSARY OF THE ASSASSINATION OF J.F.K.
The topic of this category was a look back at the 50th Anniversary of the assassination of President John Kennedy.

Topic: This was a very special broadcast from a historical standpoint for KDKA-TV, marking the upcoming 50th anniversary of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy and the continuing controversy about the findings of the Warren Commission regarding the investigation into JFK's death, as well as the single-bullet theory adopted by the Commission. Dr. Cyril Wecht has been a longtime critic of that theory and the Commission's findings, and his Cyril Wecht Institute of Forensic Science at Duquesne University was holding an international symposium on the 50th anniversary of the Kennedy assassination. Dr. Wecht appeared on this broadcast, along with symposium participant and original Warren Commission critic author Mark Lane, whose controversial book Rush to Judgment questioned the findings of the Warren Commission. Mark Lane was the first guest on

legendary KDKA-TV talk show hostess Marie Torre's "Contact", broadcast in May, 1967, discussing the same issue, and today, stands by his criticisms, and, in this 50th anniversary broadcast we showed for the first time in 50 years a charcoal sketch by then KDKA-TV Art Director Jack Guest of President John F. Kennedy, which was used during KDKA-TV station breaks during the mourning period after Kennedy's assassination. This program also re-broadcast a special report by KDKA-TV News Anchor Stacy Smith (regular co-host of this broadcast) from 1983 from Dallas, Texas, about the Warren Commission findings, first broadcast on the 30th anniversary of the assassination of President Kennedy.

8. NATURAL DISASTER RELIEF EFFORTS

Topics discussed in this category included discussions on continuing disaster relief efforts in Haiti due to an earthquake, and local efforts to assist the victims of the typhoon in the Philippines.

The trip was made to provide journalists with a special experience in international reporting and to report on the grassroots recovery by the people from Haiti from the devastating earthquake in 2010. Deborah Todd and Erv Dyer appeared on this broadcast to report on the people they met, the many connections that Pittsburghers have made with Haiti, and to applaud the important work of the Pittsburgh Black Media Federation.

Topic: Typhoon Haiyan, called Typhoon Yolanda in the Philippines, struck portions of Southeast Asia including the Philippines on November 7th as a Category 5 Super Typhoon and was said to be perhaps the deadliest storm in history, killing more than 6,000 people in the Philippines alone, leaving hundreds of thousands of people homeless, and at least 1,700 people missing. With more than one and a half billion dollars in damage, members of Pittsburgh's small Filipino community and local charities like the Pittsburgh-based Brother's Brother Foundation, and the Western Pennsylvania chapter of the American Red Cross, are providing medical supplies, financial relief, and relief workers to the affected area including the city of Tacloban, one of the hardest-hit, in the Philippines. The first half of this broadcast included interviews with members of the Filipino-American Association of Pittsburgh, while the second half of the broadcast concentrated on the charity efforts by Brother's Brother Foundation and the American Red Cross in Western Pennsylvania, to help the victims of Typhoon Haiyan.

9. NELSON MANDELLA

The topic of this category was a look back at the life of South Africa's Nelson Mandela.

Topic: Nelson Mandela, who rose from the slavery of racial apartheid, and long imprisonment in South Africa, to lead political rebellion, and later become President of the same country that had once imprisoned him, died on December5th. He was a recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize, for his efforts to unite his divided country, and was known, later, as the father of his country and its democracy. Our guests all had direct contact with South Africa and several of our guests heard Nelson Mandela speak at the Soldiers & Sailors Memorial Hall in Oakland, and met him during the course of their work, either in Pittsburgh, or South Africa. They discussed his remarkable life and legacy.

10. ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on Pittsburgh's remarkable transformation over the last thirty years, and economic development initiatives occurring in the Braddock section of Pittsburgh.

Our guests included *Post-Gazette* staff writer Mackenzie Carpenter, one of the principal contributors to this series, and Douglas Heuck, Editor and Publisher of *Pittsburgh Quarterly*, a local magazine that focuses on business issues. Much of the discussion centered on the demise of much of the steel industry as a main economic force, and the transition from heavy manufacturing to the development of medical and academic start-ups, called "meds and eds" which saved Pittsburgh's economy and gave it a new direction for the future.

Braddock Mayor John Fetterman and William J. Gatti, Jr., President of TREK Development Group, talked about this venture which received government assistance from the county and the state.

But in order to have sufficient funding for the project, funds are being solicited on-line – through Kickstarter.com. Without \$250,000 in seed money, the project might not become a reality. Mayor John Fetterman and Chef Kevin Sousa talked about their ambitious plans, which would include employing local residents, from using local produce and chickens, to restaurant employees and the restaurant would "kick start" Braddock's economy.

The topic of this category was a discussion on the local impact of the US Airways/American Airlines merger.

It remains unclear whether any future economic incentives would do anything to preserve those jobs that hang in the balance.

Topic: This year, the cost of natural gas for heating was expected to rise thirteen percent, and the cost of propane fuel for heating was expected to go up nine percent. For those struggling to find money to pay for heating their homes, the Low Income Heating Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), financed, in part, by customers donating a small amount of money on their bills, is a lifesaver. It helps to subsidize heating bills for those in great need. Columbia Gas' Brynnly Schwartz and Equitable Gas' Scott Waitlevertch joined us, to talk about this tremendous program, how it works, and how to qualify.

Gary Mitchell - Uncle of Domestic Violence Deceased Victim Mariah Jai Anderson Topic: In November, a repeated victim of domestic violence, Mariah Jai Anderson, mother of three children, had made plans to file a protection-from abuse order against her live-in boyfriend and the father of her three children, Carlos Monique Harper, who had beaten her, threatened her, and stalked her. On a Sunday night, as she left her job at the Walmart in New Castle, Harper waited until she entered her car, approached it, and fired shots into the auto, killing her, before killing himself, in the middle of a standoff with police. Our guests talked about victims of domestic violence, surviving domestic violence, and programs that are available for victims and their families. Sadly, during the

holidays, domestic violence increases by ten percent, while calls for help and the number of people in shelters decreases.
