The indictment of Jerry Sandusky, the firing of legendary head football coach Joe Paterno, and university president Graham Spanier, the retirement of vice-president of business and finance Gary Schultz, and the paid leave of athletic director Tim Curley, have all shocked the Penn State community of faculty, students, and alumni, as well as the State College community. Our guests discussed the issues of rape, sports, public relations, and how they have all tragically coincided in this developing story.

Penn State University, its faculty, students, alumni, and athletic program, were rocked by scandal recently when its former defensive football coordinator and assistant coach Jerry Sandusky was accused of sexually abusing juveniles, over at least a fifteen-year period. The alleged abuse came through youths who participated in Sandusky's non-profit "Second Mile" organization. The incident resulted in the firing of legendary head football coach Joe Paterno, the resignation of Penn State University President Graham Spanier, and the resignations of former athletic director Tim Curley and former vice-president of business affairs, Gary Schultz. Local attorney John Gismondi appeared on this broadcast, he did his undergraduate work at Penn State, to discuss the legal and political ramifications of this scandal and tragedy.

Harris took heat for this action as Pittsburgh Mayor Luke Ravenstahl demanded that Harris be fired as the honorary chairman of the "Pittsburgh Promise", an organization that provides scholarship money to qualified high school students in exchange for meeting academic standards. Harris voluntarily stepped down as chairman, but was allowed to remain on the board of directors, and was later reinstated as honorary chairman.

Our guests talked about a concerted effort to "grow" the entertainment industry in Pittsburgh (with the help of partners like WQED-TV), and bring home some talented "natives", to produce, direct, and star in productions made in Pittsburgh.

As a political impasse continues on Capitol Hill between Democrats, Republicans, and the Obama Administration, there is the likelihood that an extension of federal unemployment benefits could run out, on December 31st. We talked about the problem of unemployment with Christopher Briem, an economist with the University of Pittsburgh's Center for Social & Urban Research, Reverend Kenneth Love, Employment Coordinator for Light of Life Mission, an ordained minister and a former machinist at the now-closed General Motors Fisher Body Plant in West Mifflin, Pennsylvania, and Vincent Brandon, former Port Authority Transit bus driver from Point Breeze, who lost his job last March when state funding was cut to Port Authority. There was one hopeful sign. After this broadcast aired, we received a call from a viewer, with a possible lead on a job for Vincent Brandon.

Brown, and Lee Fisher, former Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Ohio, and now President and CEO of "CEO's For Cities", to talk about Kalamazoo, Michigan's incredible "Kalamazoo Promise" Educational Initiative, on which the similar "Pittsburgh Promise" was based. Kalamazoo due to economic and population decline created an initiative that guaranteed payment for a college education for certain students who academically qualified. One of the results was an influx of population from other cities, of families with children, who wanted to take advantage of this opportunity. Dr. Brown and Lee Fisher talked about lessons learned from "The Kalamazoo Promise", and how they could help "The Pittsburgh Promise" initiative.

Our guests included Pittsburgh city councilman Patrick Dowd (former school board member, and former teacher, and a current member of the Board of Directors of Carnegie Library), and Mary Alice Gorman, also a former teacher, and the co-owner of the Mystery Lovers Bookshop, in Oakmont. Both supported this initiative, which remarkably was approved by the voters in the City of Pittsburgh.

Raja denied the allegations.

Steve Craig (D) - Chairman, Board of Commissioners, Lawrence County, Pennsylvania Municipalities across the country and the state have been hit with the results of the recession. That comes as political leadership has never been more divided between Republicans and Democrats, and conservatives and liberals. However, there is a bipartisan effort called the "Power of 32", in which an advocacy group has developed to examine political issues from a four-state, 32-county region to find common ground on how to solve some of these problems. This program began with an excerpt from CBS News Correspondent Scott Pelley's interview with children who were asked what it's like to go hungry. The broadcast coincided with the 30th anniversary of the launching of KDKA-TV's "KD Turkey Fund", begun by the late, legendary KDKA-TV Commentator Al Julius, and originally called "Julius' Turkeys", which was begun at the height of unemployment in the steel industry in the Pittsburgh area. We ran a video clip of Al Julius asking for the help of KDKA-TV viewers, in feeding the hungry. Unemployment has returned, with a wider range of people suffering, and donations to the food banks have dropped because of a general economic recession. Our guests talked about what it will take to successfully battle hunger in the long run.

The Beaver County district attorney dismissed the allegations, which the Diocese had said amounted to extortion, and Zubik addressed the broader problem of increasing numbers of reported incidents of sexual abuse within the Catholic Church, as well as other entities

This week marked an important milestone in the history of the Iraq War. The last combat troops left Iraq, marking the end of U.S. military involvement there. We talked with two men who served in Iraq, Lieutenant Colonel Mark Stimer from the 165th Quartermaster Group of the 316th Expeditionary Sustainment Command of the United States Army Reserve, and Lieutenant Colonel Mark Rayburg, a Baldwin native, who is with the 1st/103rd Armor Task Force Dragoon of the Pennsylvania National Guard (Rayburg is also a police lieutenant with the Mount Lebanon, Pennsylvania police department), about their assessment of our role in the Iraq War, and predictions about the future of that country after America's military departure.

The National Transportation Safety Board this week (12/12/2011) called for a nationwide ban on the use of cell phones and text message devices while driving unless it's an emergency. We talked with a Carnegie Mellon University neuroscientist, Dr. Timothy Keller, and Pittsburgh attorney James Thomas, from Pepper Hamilton, about the scientific research background that supports this recommendation. We also talked with Thomas about potential liability that businesses might face, if, in the process of driving and either texting or talking with their firm, they are in an accident related to distraction, because of the texting or cell phone use.

William Shepard, DVM Chairman, Western Pennsylvania National Wild Animal Orphanage In one of the most bizarre stories in recent memory, the town of Zanesville, Ohio was shaken after the troubled owner of a private animal farm suddenly set 56-exotic animals free, including rare Bengal tigers, before committing suicide. In this program, our guests, all experts in the care of these beautiful but dangerous creatures, talked about what laws exist in Ohio and Pennsylvania governing these animals, and how they and the public can be better protected from a similar incident occurring again.
