1. CAMPAIGN 2016

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on the start of the 2016 Campaign for President, a discussion on the Iowa caucuses, a discussion on the results of the New Hampshire primary, and an interview with Senator Patrick Toomey who is seeking re-election.

Topic: After much anticipation and talk about Campaign 2016, during 2015, 2016 is finally here, as well as the official start of the 2016 American Presidential campaign. With the Iowa Caucuses and the New Hampshire Primary not that far away, we asked Philip J. Harold, Ph.D., Professor of Political Science and Co-Director of the Honors Program at Robert Morris University, and Dana Brown, Ph.D., Executive Director of the Pennsylvania Center for Women & Politics at Chatham University, to talk about this historically significant campaign, the crucial role of both women candidates and voters, and what role Pennsylvania might play in this election. Pennsylvania's Presidential Primary takes place in late April, and often by the time voters are able to select their candidates in Pennsylvania as the nomination process has already been decided by contests in states whose primaries and caucuses occur much earlier in the year.

Topic: Within two weeks of this broadcast the Iowa Presidential Caucuses were to take place. Our guests, with deep political connections, joined us to discuss the role of Iowa, how the caucuses work, and how their result could eliminate a number of the early contenders, in both the Republican and Democratic Presidential races. Keith Schmidt helped former Pennsylvania United States Senator Rick Santorum win the Iowa Caucuses in 2012, although Santorum was later forced to drop out of the Republican Presidential race (as in 2012 Santorum survived Iowa, but left the 2016 campaign in February 2016 and endorsed Florida Republican United States Senator Marco Rubio, who later left the 2016 campaign), and Nancy Patton Mills is the Chairperson of the Allegheny County Democratic Committee, and is a Superdelegate for former U.S. Secretary of State, Hillary Rodham Clinton.

Topic: Two political victims of the results of the New Hampshire Primary, held on February 9th, New Jersey Republican Governor Chris Christie and former Hewlett-Packard CEO, Republican Carly Fiorina, were forced to exit the Presidential race. Our guests on this broadcast, Allegheny County Republican Party Chairman Jim Roddey, and Nancy Patton Mills, Chairperson of the Allegheny County Democratic Committee, talked about results from New Hampshire, and what lies ahead in the future of Campaign 2016. Roddey was so

unhappy with the candidacy of Donald Trump and his likelihood of winning the Republican nomination that Roddey endorsed Florida Republican Senator Marco Rubio for President, and later announced that he would be stepping down as Chairman of the Republican Party of Allegheny County.

Guest: Sen. Patrick Toomey - (R) Pennsylvania

Topic: Conservative Pennsylvania Republican United States Senator Pat Toomey is running for re-election in an unusual Presidential year, marked by the political extremes of Socialist-Democrat Bernie Sanders, Independent Senator from Vermont, Businessman Donald J. Trump, running as a Republican, and Republican conservative Senator Ted Cruz of Texas. Toomey won his past campaigns, with support from the Tea Party, but now faces what could be tough Democratic opposition in the fall because of controversial stands, including a decision not to allow a vote for President Obama's choice to succeed Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court, Antonin Scalia, who unexpectedly died in February. Senator Toomey appeared on this broadcast to talk about his own re-election bid and some of the issues that he feels will be important in the 2016 Presidential campaign.

2. SUPREME COURT JUSTICE NONMINATION

The topic of this category was discussions regarding the nomination of a new Supreme Court Justice to replace Antonin Scalia.

Guest: Kenneth Gormley, J.D. - President-Elect, Duquesne University

Topic: Conservative Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court Antonin Scalia, appointed to the Court in 1986 by President Ronald Reagan, died unexpectedly in his sleep on February 12th- February 13th while on a hunting trip in Texas. Scalia's death leaves the Court without one of its most conservative voices, and the selection of a successor has left great division between President Obama and the Republican-controlled United States Senate. Our guest, Kenneth Gormley, J.D., former Dean of the Duquesne University School of Law, a current Professor of Law at Duquesne, and President-elect of that university, hosted Justice Scalia at Duquesne to help celebrate the law school's centennial in 2011. President-elect Gormley, who is considered an expert in constitutional law, joined Jon Delano to discuss Justice Scalia's legacy, and how the selection of a successor might take place.

Topic: When conservative, Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court, Antonin Scalia, suddenly died in February, President Barack Obama said he would exercise his executive authority, clearly stated in the United States Constitution, to nominate a successor to the high court, who would be subject to confirmation by the United States Senate, and chose Federal District Court Judge Merrick Garland, of the U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C., praised by legal experts, and considered to be a "moderate" choice who often supported judicial "restraint" in deciding whether to overturn lower court decisions. The Republican-controlled United States Senate leadership vowed not to allow this

nomination, or any other by the President to be considered until at least after the American Presidential election. Our special guest, the former Dean of the law school at Duquesne University, a current professor of law, at Duquesne, and its President-elect, Ken Gormley, considered to be an expert on constitutional law, joined us to talk about this nomination, its likelihood of being considered, and the direction of the Court, which had a 5-4 conservative majority until Justice Scalia's death.

3. FLINT WATER SUPPLY

The topic of this category was discussions regarding the contamination of the water supply in Flint, Michigan.

Topic: Flint, Michigan was once known for manufacturing General Motors cars, like Buick and Chevrolet models. Today its name is associated with a community drinking water supply that is tainted with dangerous levels of lead after officials decided to switch the water source from Lake Huron to the Flint River to save money. Our guests talked about this environmental and political issue in Michigan and how it affects policy on protecting drinking water elsewhere, including Pittsburgh.

Topic: The Flint, Michigan drinking water crisis continues, with results of an Associated Press-GFK Poll showing that only about half of Americans are “very confident” about the safety of their own water tap, and a majority believe that the lead contamination of Flint, Michigan's water supply is a sign of a much bigger problem. One of our guests, Dr. Janet Stout, President and Director of Special Pathogens Laboratory Research, and Research Associate Professor at the University of Pittsburgh's Swanson School of Engineering, has served as a consultant to Flint, Michigan, in the past on the water issue. Both guests Stout and Myron Arnowitt, Pennsylvania State Director of Clean Water Action, talked about the concern over the impact of both legionella and lead in municipal water systems, in this country, as well as the impact of corroded water pipes in contributing to both problems.

4. MASS SHOOTING IN WILKINSBURG

The topic of this category was a discussion on the mass shooting that occurred in the Wilksburg neighborhood of Pittsburgh on March 9, 2016.

Topic: Our area was shocked by one of the worst mass shootings in our history: On March 9th, a family was holding an outdoor barbecue on Franklin Avenue in Wilkensburg, Pennsylvania, when gunfire suddenly burst out. When it was over, nine people had been shot, six of them killed, including an unborn child, and three others were wounded. As of this writing the police investigation continued, and no one had been officially charged with the crime. Our guests included two local pastors from the African-American community (Pastor Mitchell, who, himself, had lost a son to a shooting) who talked about the impact of this horrendous crime, as well as other shootings, in that community, and the role that Pastor Maurice Trent was playing as a counselor to one of the families who lost members in this crime, plus a social worker from the Center for Victims, who talked about the emotional impact of this tragedy on the victims and the greater community, and what services the Center can provide to help them through this difficult time.

5. STATE BUDGET

The topic of this category was discussions regarding the unpassed state budget and the impact it is having on school systems and non-profit organizations.

Topic: It's almost time to begin debate on Pennsylvania's budget for 2016. However, the contentious stalemate continues between Republicans and Democrats in both the Pennsylvania State House and State Senate over the unpassed 2015 state budget. School districts and organizations that depend on state funding to provide their non-profit services to the public are caught in the middle of this long political dispute. Our guests discussed the differences between Republicans and Democrats, and the inability of Democratic Governor Tom Wolf to find enough votes, on both sides, to pass a budget.

Topic: As Pennsylvania's legislators continue to battle over the state budget with Governor Tom Wolf, it is the students and teachers who are caught in the middle of the fight. Many school districts may not have enough money to pay teachers, and banks are expressing concern over those districts' ability to pay back the loans. Our guest, former Pittsburgh city councilman and Pittsburgh school board member, Dr. Patrick Dowd, now heads a non-profit organization "Allies for Children" and is a leading member of another organization called "The Campaign for Fair Education Funding".

6. BOMBINGS IN BELGIUM

The topic of this category was a discussion on the bombings in Brussels, Belgium, on March 22, 2016.

Topic: Brussels, Belgium, home of the European Union (EU) and the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) headquarters was rocked with a series of bomb blasts on March 22nd that killed at least 31 people, and injured at least another 300, including several Americans. Two attacks took place at the Brussels Airport, where a third bomb was also discovered, and the third blast occurred at a metro train station. Our guests, two recognized experts on terrorism, Michael Kenney, Ph.D. and Colin Clarke, Ph.D., both, associated with the University of Pittsburgh's Matthew B. Ridgway Center for International Security Studies, and Clarke, a political science researcher at the RAND Corporation's Pittsburgh campus, discussed this latest attack by ISIS, the state of that terrorist organization, why European countries find it difficult to share vital intelligence information with each other, on terrorism, and what role the United States should play in fighting terrorism.

7. DRUG OVERDOSES

The topic of this category was a discussion regarding drug overdoses and the public health crisis it has become.

Topic: Deaths from drug overdoses have become, perhaps, the most important public health crisis in America today, surpassing the impact of one-time killers like Polio, Smallpox, and AIDS, as deaths associated with drug overdoses exceeded the number of people killed in car crashes or from guns in 2014. Pittsburgh could play a significant role in taking on this health emergency after being named by the federal government as one of four cities where political leaders and healthcare providers can find ways to fight this growing problem. United States Attorney for the Western District of Pennsylvania, David Hickton, and Gary Tuggle, Special Agent-in-Charge of the Drug Enforcement Administration's Philadelphia Division, joined us, to discuss plans for the "360 Strategy" initiative.

8. WEATHER

The topic of this category was a discussion regarding the warm winter and the impact of both the El Nino and La Nina on weather patterns.

Topic: The winter of 2015-2016 will go down in history as one of the warmest in many places, including Western Pennsylvania, with minimal snowfall in the Northeast, and torrential rain, flooding, and big snowfalls in higher elevations in the West. We asked KDKA-TV Morning News Meteorologist Ron Smiley, Stephen Tonsor, Ph.D., Director of Science & Research, and Director of the Center for Biodiversity and Ecosystems, at the Carnegie Museum of Natural History in Pittsburgh, and Brad Peroney, Jr., Program

Development Coordinator, at the Carnegie Science Center in Pittsburgh, to talk about the impact of both the El Nino and La Nina weather patterns on this winter's unusual weather. We also asked them how they use new tools, from the internet to interactive displays and demonstrations; to engage today's students to become interested in the fields of science and meteorology.

9. CONCUSSIONS AND THE NFL

The topic of this category was a discussion regarding concussions and head injuries sustained by NFL players.

Topic: The motion picture "Concussion", partially filmed in Pittsburgh, and recounting the work of a former member of the staff of the Allegheny County Medical Examiner's Office, Bennet Omalu, M.D., has brought renewed attention to the problem of repeated head blows incurred by NFL players, later resulting in concussions, and their short-term and long-term effect, including Chronic Traumatic Encephalopathy, or CTE. There is major litigation still pending, the result of lawsuits filed by former NFL players and their families against the NFL for the impact of CTE on those who played for the NFL. Our guests for this important discussion, on Super Bowl Sunday, included the former wife of former Pittsburgh Steeler Justin Strzelczyk, Keana McMahon, who saw the impact of Strzelczyk's CTE, on their marriage and children, and Jason Luckasevic, J.D., Shareholder, with the law firm of Goldberg, Persky, & White, P.C., who filed the first two lawsuits against the National Football League, on behalf of 120-retired players, and their families.

10. CATHOLIC CHURCH

The topic of this category was a discussion with the Bishop of Pittsburgh regarding a report detailing years of abuse of children by priests in the Johnstown-Altoona area.

Topic: A Pennsylvania Investigative Grand Jury released the results of an investigation of the Catholic Diocese of Altoona-Johnstown. Its findings, in a detailed 147-page report, showed that over a period of forty years, hundreds of children were abused by at least fifty priests, and other people associated with that diocese, and that the diocese not only knew about the alleged crimes, but went to great lengths to participate in a cover-up of the tragedy from law enforcement authorities. Our guest, Pittsburgh Catholic Bishop David E. Zubik, of the Diocese of Pittsburgh, which was not part of this investigation, or accused in this case, appeared on our broadcast for reaction to this developing news story and to reiterate the Catholic Church and Pope Francis' strong statements against this kind of sexual abuse.

11. ENERGY

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion regarding a glut of foreign oil, a discussion on energy supplies and future sources of energy, and a discussion regarding a task force to improve safety in Pennsylvania's natural gas industry.

These are just some of the topics that were to be considered at Carnegie Mellon University's “Energy Week”, scheduled from March 14th to March 18th, at CMU. Our guests, on this broadcast included Jared L. Cohon, Ph.D., President Emeritus of Carnegie Mellon University and Director of the Wilton E. Scott Institute for Energy Innovation, at CMU, and Deborah E. Stine, Ph.D., Associate Director, Policy Outreach, at the Wilton E. Scott Institute for Energy Innovation at Carnegie Mellon University, and a Professor of Civil Engineering and Engineering & Public Policy at CMU.

Topic: Attorney Kevin Coyle, from Babst Calland, who is based in Washington, D.C., joined Jon Delano to talk about the recommendations of a special pipeline infrastructure task force, appointed by Pennsylvania Governor Tom Wolf, of which he is a member, to improve safety in the discovery and transport of natural gas and its by-products from thousands of wells in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Pennsylvania is becoming a major player in the drilling industry, but also faces financial challenges in remaining competitive and staying in the drilling business. Kevin Coyle also discussed the struggle between environmental protection and financial stability in Pennsylvania's drilling industry.

12. PITTSBURGH BICENTENNIAL

The topic of this category included discussions on the celebration of the bicentennial of the incorporation of the city of Pittsburgh.

John Heinz IV Regional History Center, Andrew Masich, Ph.D., who also serves as Chairman of the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission, appeared on this program for some background on Pittsburgh's beginnings as a city and why another bicentennial was observed in 1958 marking 200-years since General John Forbes took over control of the river junction of the Allegheny, Monongahela, and Ohio Rivers from the fleeing French. The 2016 bicentennial marks the incorporation of Pittsburgh as a city.

Topic: Lou Stanasovich and Andre Weisbrod made their annual joint appearance on this first broadcast of the New Year as they analyzed the performance of the stock market and investments in 2015, and looked ahead to 2016. 2015 was marked by many "roller coaster" financial rides for investors, and both men believe that we could have a repeat performance in 2016. Oil prices, often influenced by oil producers in foreign lands, sometimes have a ripple effect on both investments and investor confidence. The supply of foreign oil is likely to impact domestic oil production and price, and in general, diversification in investments is a wise course for those involved in stock market trading, whether small or large investors.
