1. SEXUAL ABUSE – CATHOLIC DIOCESE OF PITTSBURGH

Topics discussed in this category included discussions on results of a Pennsylvania Grand Jury investigation into alleged sexual abuse by some priests in the Catholic Diocese of Pittsburgh over a period of decades

Topic: This was the first in a series of significant, but often painful interviews, about the pending, and later released results of a Pennsylvania Grand Jury investigation into alleged sexual abuse by some priests in the Catholic Diocese of Pittsburgh over a period of decades. Bishop David A. Zubik, DD, M.S.Ed., initially appeared on the 8/12/2018 program, reacting to an interview that KDKA-TV Investigative Reporter Andy Sheehan conducted with one of the alleged victims of this abuse who was molested twenty years ago by a former wrestling coach and headmaster of a parochial school in Southwestern Pennsylvania. When the program aired, the Grand Jury's findings had not yet been released, but the Catholic Diocese and Bishop Zubik had been made aware of interim findings of the Grand Jury.

Topic: For the first time, in the history of this program, a guest appeared in consecutive episodes of the broadcast, Bishop David A. Zubik, DD,M.S.Ed., who requested to be allowed to return to the program, after the long-awaited release of the Pennsylvania Grand Jury report on alleged sexual abuse by certain priests in Catholic Dioceses in Pennsylvania. In our first segment we heard from two attorneys, Timothy Hale, J.D., Partner, with Nye, Peabody, Stirling, Hale & Miller LLP, from Santa Barbara, California, who won large judgements from California courts several years ago in a similar case involving abuse by priests in that state, and Benjamin J. Sweet, J.D., Founding Partner in the Pittsburgh Office of Carlson Lynch, Kilpela & Carpenter LLP, who is representing Pennsylvania clients that are alleged victims of sexual abuse by members of the Roman Catholic clergy in Pennsylvania. In the second segment, Bishop David A. Zubik was accompanied by attorney Rita Joyce, Chancellor of the Catholic Diocese of Pittsburgh, to discuss the legal ramifications of the grand jury report, and the role of canon law in the Roman Catholic Church.

2. SUPREME COURT

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on the retirement of Associate Justice Anthony Kennedy, discussions on a Supreme Court decision regarding government workers who are represented by a union but who decide not to join that union, and a discussion on the Confirmation hearings for United States Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh.

Topic: The United States Supreme Court could see major philosophical changes in October 2018, because of the retirement of Associate Justice Anthony Kennedy, a President Ronald Reagan Court appointee, who announced his retirement in July 2018. Former United States Attorney for the Western District of Pennsylvania, David J. Hickton, JD, appointed to his position by President Barack Obama in 2010, and now Founding Director of the University of Pittsburgh's Institute for Cyber Law, Policy, and Security, talked about the legacy of Justice Kennedy and his impact on the Court. In the second segment, Bruce Ledewitz, J.D., Professor of Law at Duquesne University's School of Law, and Anne Marie Lofaso, J.D., the Arthur B. Hodges Professor of Law at West Virginia University's College of Law, discussed the judicial philosophical composition of the United States Supreme Court, and how that could be affected by the appointment of an additional strict constructionist conservative justice by President Donald J. Trump.

In the first, of a two-part series of interviews, Rick Dayton talked with Rick Bloomingdale, President of the Pennsylvania AFL-CIO, about the Janus Supreme Court ruling, and its impact on organized labor. In a future interview, which will be noted, we talked with a representative of the Commonwealth Foundation, a conservative "think tank" who had a different view on the Janus ruling.

Guest: Elizabeth Steele - Director of Policy Analysis, Commonwealth Foundation Topic: In the second, of a two-part interview series, Elizabeth Steele, Director of Policy Analysis, for the Commonwealth Foundation (a conservative "think tank"), discussed the recent United States Supreme Court's 5-4 Ruling, in Janus vs. AFSCME, in which the Court sided with a government employee, Mark Janus, who opposed paying dues to the public employee union AFSCME (American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees), in the state of Illinois, where he works. The Commonwealth Foundation believes that forced union representation and payment of union dues, is a violation of worker rights. In a previous segment, KDKA-TV Morning News Co-Anchor Rick Dayton talked with Rick Bloomingdale, President of the Pennsylvania AFL-CIO, who deplored the Supreme Court Janus ruling. AFSCME represents millions of state, county, and municipal employees, across the country.

Topic: This program discussed the controversial, contentious, United States Senate confirmation hearings for United States Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh, and allegations of sexual assault against him by Christine Blasey Ford, PhD, stemming from a party that both attended while in private undergraduate schools in 1982. In the first portion of the broadcast, we heard the views of Sara Goodkind, Ph.D., Associate Professor, School of Social Work, Department of Sociology, and Gender, Sexuality, and Women's Studies Program, at the University of Pittsburgh, and Rona Kaufman, J.D., L.L.M., Associate Professor of Law, at Duquesne University School of Law, who both found Ford's testimony believable. In the second half, we heard from Heather S.Heidelbaugh, Esq., Partner, Leech Tishman Fuscaldo & Lampl, LLC, former member-at-large, of Allegheny County Council, and the past, co-chair of the Republican National Lawyers Association, who said that she believed that the testimony of both Goodkind and Kavanaugh was credible.

3. HURRICANES

Topics discussed in this category included discussions on the one-year anniversary of Hurricane Maria that hit Puerto Rico, and a discussion on relief efforts for Hurricane Florence that struck North and South Carolina.

Fred Ramos - Senior Vice-President, Corporate Communications, Highmark Health Topic: The devastation from Hurricane Maria in September 2017 continues to plague the American Commonwealth of Puerto Rico and its citizens. In this program, we talked with people who live in Pittsburgh with Puerto Rican roots, and Luke Hingson, President of the Brother's Brother Foundation, about Pittsburgh's deep ties to Puerto Rico (through the late Pittsburgh Pirates Hall of Fame outfielder Roberto Clemente, who lost his life, in a plane crash, in 1972, while attempting to provide humanitarian supplies to people in Nicaragua, who had suffered an earthquake), and efforts by charities and businesses to continue relief to Puerto Rico, almost a year after Hurricane Maria's destruction. Our guests included Brother's Brother Foundation President Luke Hingson, Ron Alvarado, Puerto Rican-born Pittsburgh businessman, and Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Pittsburgh Metropolitan Area Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, Raul Rodriguez-Font, a Puerto Rican native, who is President of Luis Garraton, LLC, a distributor of healthcare products, and Fred Ramos, Puerto Rican native, who is Senior Vice-President of Corporate Communications at Highmark Health, all, of whom were directly involved in the hurricane relief effort from

Pittsburgh, including the delivery of humanitarian medical supplies and water to hurricane victims.

He also emphasized the critical need for federal funding to continue these vital services.

IUP held its Marti Institute, to encourage local people to speak out about their addiction problems, and guests Erick Lauber, Director of the IUP Community Health and Leadership program, and Kami Anderson, Executive Director of the Armstrong-Indiana-

Clarion Drug & Alcohol Commission, told Rick Dayton, how they are making a difference in the fight against opioid abuse.

The President's style of diplomacy is far different than anything that the United States has ever seen. It reflects his negotiating skill and style detailed in his own book, "The Art of the Deal", but leaves allies, and what he perceives to be "competitors", as opposed to "enemies", with uncertainty as to how to respond to negotiations. Simpson, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of History at Duquesne University's McAnulty College and Graduate School of Liberal Arts, and Robert Morris University's Political Science Professor, Philip J. Harold, Ph.D., talked about the pluses and minuses of this kind of diplomatic negotiating.

Trump rewrote the book on both foreign policy and diplomatic relations with his personal diplomacy, often taking the lead in this exercise, rather than relying on a Secretary of State, or other diplomats. In the 21st Century, it is often difficult to determine who are allies, or enemies, or, in the case of the Trump Administration, "frenemies", when it comes to astute negotiations over trade and nuclear weapons. Michael Poznansky, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of International Affairs & Intelligence Studies, at the University of Pittsburgh's Graduate School of Public & International Affairs, and Robert Fragasso, CFP, AIF – Chairman and CEO of the Pittsburgh-based Fragasso Financial Advisors, Inc., discussed the political and economic implications of tariffs, negotiations with

leaders in North Korea and Russia, and arguments with countries that are considered American allies, such as Germany and Great Britain.

Topic: Money Magazine's Bert Sperling hinted that Pittsburgh would soon be out of the running to become the site of Amazon's HQ2 Headquarters, with Amazon choosing instead, Northern Virginia's Oatlands, in Loudoun County, which boasts large amounts of undeveloped area, and proximity to Washington, D.C.'s Dulles International Airport. Our guests talked about the determined effort by leaders in Allegheny County and Pittsburgh to lure Amazon to our area, and what the ramifications would be if Amazon came here, or decided to go to Virginia. Topic: As students, teachers, and parents prepared for another school year, there are continuing concerns about the potential for mass violence in schools, especially after last year's tragic, mass shooting at the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida. Our guests talked about the results of a report from Pennsylvania Governor Tom Wolf's School Safety Task Force, led, by Pennsylvania Auditor General Eugene DePasquale and education, law enforcement, and political representatives. Our panelists included Sarah E. Daly, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Criminology, Law, and Society, at St. Vincent College, in Latrobe, Pennsylvania, a former teacher herself, and author of "Everyday School Violence: An Educator's Guide to Safer Schools", Edward Mulvey, Ph.D., Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Pittsburgh's School of Medicine, and Anthony P. Mannarino, PhD, Director of the Center for Traumatic Stress in Children and Adolescents at Allegheny General Hospital, as well as the Vice-Chair of the Department of Psychiatry at Allegheny General Hospital and the Allegheny Health Network.

Topic: The retirement of baby boomers from the workforce and an aging population (the same age group) that is growing have combined to form the perfect storm, a severe and growing shortage of qualified nurses to care for that population.
