1. NORTH KOREA

The topic of this category was a discussion on the potential resumption of hostilities between the United States and North Korea.

Topic: Tensions increased this summer between North Korea and the United States after North Korea continued to test its ability to launch intercontinental ballistic missiles (ICBM's). As more and more North Korean tests were conducted, the rhetoric heated up between Kim Jong-un, Chairman of the Workers' Party of Korea and "Supreme Leader of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea" (known, to the rest of the world, as North Korea), and President Donald J. Trump, who, in September, called Jong-un – "Rocket Man". North Korea's ability to launch weapons of mass destruction toward places as close as the U.S. Territory of Guam have political and military analysts worried about the increased likelihood of a resumption of hostilities between the United States and North Korea (the Korean War – from June 25, 1950-July 27, 1953, ended in a stalemate, and the casualty rate included 54,246 Americans, with more than 7,700 still, unaccounted for, 103,284 Americans wounded, in action, 217,000 military and 1,000,000 million South Koreans killed, 406,000 military and 600,000 North Koreans killed, and 600,000 military, from what was then referred to, as Red China, killed.). Our guests included Forrest E. Morgan, Ph.D., Senior Political Scientist at RAND Corporation's Pittsburgh Office and Adjunct Member, at the Ridgway Center for International Security Studies and the Graduate School of Public & International Affairs (GSPIA) at the University of Pittsburgh, and Michael Poznansky, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of International Affairs and Intelligence Studies at Pitt's Graduate School of Public & International Affairs (GSPIA).

2. HEALTH CARE

The topic of this category was a discussion on legislation in Congress to repeal the Affordable Care Act.

Topic: Most Republican members of Congress continued to work this summer to put forward legislation that would eliminate the Affordable Care Act, or, "Obamacare". Even as this strategy went forward, there were few specifics given, on what, if anything, might replace the Affordable Care Act, and who would be impacted by its demise. Our guest, Dr. Martin Gaynor, the E.J. Barone Professor of Economics & Public Policy at Carnegie Mellon University's Heinz College, joined Ken Rice and John Allison, to talk about why passing, or changing healthcare legislation is so difficult and divisive, and how the economics of providing healthcare, including rising costs, are affecting healthcare providers, insurers, and consumers.

3. CHARLOTTESVILLE PROTEST

The topic of this category was a discussion on what should happen to statues that pay tribute to leaders of the Confederacy.

Topic: A state of emergency was declared by the governor of Virginia, in the town of Charlottesville, on August 12th, when white nationalists clashed with counter-protesters, about a plan to remove a Civil War statue of Confederate General Robert E. Lee, from that city's park. (In addition to fights, racial taunting, and shoving, a man from Ohio drove his car into the crowd, killing a 32-year-old woman, and injuring 34-others.) What should happen to statues that pay tribute to leaders of the Confederacy (many of them constructed not after the Civil War but, as a sign of defiance during the struggle for civil rights, during the 1950's), and statues, like one from 1900 honoring Pittsburgh-born composer Stephen Foster and a barefoot, Black man playing a banjo, which many African-Americans and others, find to be objectionable today?, We asked four academic leaders, who are experts in Civil War and civil rights history, for their perspective: Dr. Andrew Masich, President & CEO of the Senator John Heinz Regional History Center, Dr. Todd Allen, newly-appointed Special Assistant to the Provost, at Messiah College, in Mechanicsburg, Pennsylvania, who takes students on a tour of historic places where modern civil rights history took place, Dr. Jason Phillips, Eberly Professor of Civil War Studies, at West Virginia University, and Kirk Savage, Ph.D., the William S. Dietrich II Chair, in the History of Art & Architecture, at the University of Pittsburgh.

4. STEVE SCALISE SHOOTING

The topic of this category was a discussion on the shooting during Republican House members' practice session for the annual Congressional Baseball Game for Charity.

Topic: On June 14, 2017, a Republican member of Congress from Louisiana, Steve Scalise, a District of Columbia police officer, and a Congressional aide were wounded, when James Hodgkinson, a man described as a left-wing activist from Illinois began firing a gun during a Republican House members' practice session in Alexandria, Virginia, for the annual Congressional Baseball Game for Charity. The shooter, Hodgkinson, was killed in the ten-minute shootout, and another Capitol police officer was injured. We talked with the Democratic Representative from Pennsylvania's 14th Congressional District, Mike Doyle, from Swissvale, senior member of Pennsylvania's Congressional delegation, who manages the Democratic counterpart of the Republican Congressional baseball team, about this tragic incident, and about general Congressional partisan gridlock. Congressman Doyle also

discussed some of the legislative goals for the current session of Congress, including attempts toward resolution of the dispute over healthcare.

5. PITTSBURGH WATER AUTHORITY

The topic of this category was a discussion on a recently released study regarding major administrative, health, and safety issues, affecting the Pittsburgh Water and Sewer Authority.

Topic: Results were released on August 28th, from a wide-ranging study conducted by the Maryland-based, Infrastructure Management Group (IMA), about major administrative, health, and safety issues, affecting the Pittsburgh Water and Sewer Authority (PWSA). The consulting firm described the troubled PSWA as “on its last leg” after problems with lead in outmoded pipes, water breaks, poor billing procedures, and “decades of disinvestment and neglect”. Our sole guest on this broadcast was the Interim Executive Director of the Pittsburgh Water and Sewer Authority (PWSA), Robert Weimar.

6. OPIOID CRISIS

The topic of this category was a discussion regarding the opioid crisis and how Washington County, Pennsylvania is dealing with the issue.

Topic: President Donald J. Trump publicly declared America’s opioid crisis a national emergency, on August 10th. In Washington County, Pennsylvania, this is something that political leaders have recognized for some time. Their district attorney, Eugene Vittone, and the Director of Washington County’s Drug and Alcohol Commission, Erich Curnow joined Jon Delano to talk about what’s being done in that county to address the growing opioid abuse crisis. The Drug and Alcohol Commission has helped to change the discussion of drug abuse, from a criminal to a public health issue, and provides specialized case management services to opioid abuse patients in Washington County.

7. CLIMATE CHANGE

The topic of this category was a debate regarding the subject of climate change.

Topic: As the next few months were soon to illustrate, major climate events took place, including several, high-level hurricanes, resulting in the loss of life, and billions of dollars in damages to Southern states such as Texas and Florida, and U.S. Territories, such as the Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico. On this broadcast, there was a spirited debate between two distinguished science and social science professors at Carnegie Mellon University, Paul Fischbeck, Ph.D., Professor, Social & Decision Sciences, Dietrich College of Humanities and Social Sciences, and Neil M. Donahue, Ph.D., Lord Professor of Chemistry, in the Departments of Chemistry, Chemical Engineering, Engineering & Public Policy, & the Center for Atmospheric Particle Studies, & Director, Steinbrenner Institute for Environmental Education & Research, about the battle over climate changes and global warming. Complicating this discussion, is President Donald J. Trump's opposition to the Paris Climate Accord, which requires countries to lower carbon emission levels to prevent, what many scientists believe is global warming.

8. ENERGY

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion with a company that is the operator of the nation's largest electric grid, a discussion regarding how safe is the electric grid from terrorism and interference from foreign governments, and a discussion regarding the impact of Hurricane Harvey on the oil and gas supply.

Andy Ott, a native of Altoona, Pennsylvania, discussed PJM's work in managing challenges to security, safety cost, and the reliability of electric power.

The Summer Dreamer's Academy involves students, in grades kindergarten through 8 at the Pittsburgh King School, in an innovative free program that encourages thinking and reading, and provides high-quality academic lessons in English-Language Arts and Mathematics, as well as enrichment activities.

12. CONSTITUTIONAL LAW

The topic of this category was a discussion with an expert on constitutional law.

Topic: Ken Gormley, President of Duquesne University, is the former dean of its law school, and is a recognized expert on constitutional law. He has written books about the impeachment proceedings against former President Bill Clinton ("The Death of American Virtue: Clinton vs. Starr"), the work of Watergate Special Prosecutor Archibald Cox ("Archibald Cox: Conscience of a Nation"), and the historical relationships between American Presidents and the Supreme Court ("The Presidents and the Constitution: A Living History"). In this interview, we discussed both, the most recent session of the United States Supreme Court, and the appointment of a Special Counsel, by F.B.I. Director James Comey (former F.B.I. Director Robert Mueller) to investigate certain aspects of the Trump Administration, including the possible role of Russia in influencing the outcome of the 2016 American Presidential election.

13. HUMAN SMUGGLING

The topic of this category was a discussion regarding the subject of human smuggling.

Human smuggling and human trafficking are also a problem, in areas, like

Pittsburgh. Our guests included the acting United States Attorney for the Western District of Pennsylvania, Soo C. Song, J.D., with extensive experience on this subject during her work in Phoenix, Arizona, and Mary Burke, PhD, Professor of Psychology, at Carlow University, who founded “The Project to End Human Trafficking”, an all-volunteer American-based non-profit group that raises awareness about the economic exploitation and enslavement of people. In Pittsburgh, many of the human trafficking cases are for sexual exploitation.
