1. CAMPAIGN 2016

Topics discussed in this category included discussions regarding the Pennsylvania Primary, the phenomenon of Donald Trump, and the role women are playing in this year's election.

Topic: With the Pennsylvania Primary looming, our guests talked about the tightness of the races, including Pennsylvania where Vermont's Independent U.S. Senator Bernie Sanders continued to show strong support. Hillary Clinton did manage to win the Pennsylvania Primary, though Sanders received some delegates. In addition, our guests talked about the important role that women will play in this campaign year, from the U.S. Senate race (in which Katie McGinty defeated Joe Sestak in the Democratic Primary to face incumbent Republican Senator Pat Toomey) to the Presidential race. The campaign was also marked by the sometimes bombastic comments of Donald J. Trump, who said that women who undergo abortions "should be punished". Our guests, all women, including Republican Heather Heidelbaugh, discussed the historic nature of this campaign should Hillary Clinton become the first woman to be nominated for President of a major political party, and Heidelbaugh said that she could not and would not support Trump if he is the nominee of the Republican Party.

Topic: This broadcast was a preview of the following Tuesday's Pennsylvania Primary, which was won by Republican Donald Trump and Democrat Hillary Clinton. Our guests, two political veterans, discussed divisions within both the Republican and Democratic parties, the phenomenon of Donald J. Trump, who later, became the presumptive nominee for President for the Republicans, and the appeal of Independent Vermont Senator Bernie Sanders (running as a Democrat), the inability of Hillary Clinton to have the same appeal to Sanders' supporters, the general anger of the voting public, and the issue of gun control in this campaign.

Topic: This program aired after Republican Presidential candidate, Texas United States Senator Ted Cruz, in a move many considered one of desperation, announced a running mate (former CEO of Hewlett-Packard – Carly Fiorina), even though Donald Trump had soundly defeated him in a number of contests. After another loss, Cruz became mathematically eliminated, and dropped out of the race. Our guests, once again, discussed the unusual role of women in this Presidential campaign. Although Hillary Clinton won Pennsylvania, and other key state primaries, she did not show strong results in places like Altoona (Blair County), Johnstown (Cambria County), and Lycoming County, and although Donald J. Trump may have alienated key groups like women, African-Americans, and Latinos, he has brought former Democrats to his campaign, and could pull off an upset win in the general election.

Topic: As the Donald J. Trump phenomenon continued to grow and it became more and more likely that Trump was going to become the Republican Presidential nominee, we spoke with Thomas Uram, former Republican Party Chairman in Washington County, and Monica Morrill, Republican, from Somerset County. Both are going to be Trump delegates at the G.O.P. National Convention in July. We also spoke with Philip J. Harold, Ph.D., Professor of Political Science at Robert Morris University, and former Robert Morris lecturer, Jay Cost, conservative, who is a staff writer for the conservative magazine, *The Weekly Standard*, who said that Donald Trump is not a conservative, and that he will not vote for him.

2. ORLANDO MASS SHOOTING

The topic of this category was a discussion on the shooting massacre at the Pulse Gay nightclub in Orlando, Florida, its impact on gun control, and how the Orlando tragedy has affected the gay rights movement in general.

Topic: Our broadcast provided two different perspectives about gun violence and what can be done about it, and reaction to the shooting massacre at the Pulse Gay nightclub in Orlando, Florida, the worst single act of domestic terrorism in the country's history, on June 12th, in which 49-people, many of them gay, were killed, and 53-others were injured. In our first segment, Republican Congressman Tim Murphy, a psychologist by profession, reacted to Democratic members of the U.S. House's decision to hold a sit-in on the floor of the House to protest Congressional inaction on attempts to approve some gun control measures that might prevent a tragedy like the one in Orlando (Murphy has introduced a bill that would overhaul the mental health system in America and might cut down on the number of people who are able to obtain weapons who have mental illness). In our second segment, Gary Van Horn, Junior, President of the Delta Foundation of Pittsburgh, and Chris Bryan, Director of Marketing and Development for the Delta Foundation, shared their thoughts about the impact of the Orlando shooting massacre on Pittsburgh's own LGBT (lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender) community, and how the Orlando tragedy has affected the gay rights movement in general.

3. OPIOID ADDICTION

The topic of this category was a discussion on the widespread impact of the opioid addiction problem and what's being done for both treatment, and prosecution of drug dealers.

Topic: This broadcast included a report from the "CBS Evening News with Scott Pelley" by Jon LaPook, M.D., which incorporated an interview with a recovering female drug addict from Pittsburgh. The impetus for this broadcast was the view that opioid addiction is now a huge national public health crisis and that more people are killed from drug overdoses than in auto accidents. Our guests included District Attorney Eugene Vittone (D) from Washington County, where drug addiction and drug trafficking is a major problem, Jason Snyder, the Policy & Communications Director for Pennsylvania's Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs, a recovering drug addict himself, from Cambria County, who lost both a brother and a sister to drug abuse, and Elizabeth Krans, M.D., M.Sc., an Obstetric Hospitalist at UPMC's Magee-Women's Hospital and Assistant Professor at the University of Pittsburgh Healthcare Services for Drug-Dependent, Pregnant Women – in Magee's Pregnancy Recovery Center, all of whom talked about the widespread impact of this problem and what's being done for both treatment, and prosecution of drug dealers.

4. ZIKA VIRUS

The topic of this category was a discussion of the Zika virus, what we know about this disease, how it is transmitted, and what can be done here to mitigate the chance of spreading this disease.

Topic: There were two major developments involving the Zika virus which prompted this discussion: growing concerns over the true dangers of this disease to pregnant women and their fetuses, and the chance that infants infected with the Zika virus could develop brain defects, including Microcephaly, resulting in small brains in children, and concern that the Zika virus could be transmitted through sexual activity. Our guests included Karen Hacker, M.D., MPH, the Director of the Allegheny County Health Department, and Amesh Adalja, M.D., Ph.D., an Infectious Disease Physician at UPMC, and a member of the UPMC Center for Health Security, in Baltimore, Maryland. Our guests discussed what we know about this disease, how it is transmitted, and what can be done here to mitigate the chance of spreading this disease. Mosquitoes can be carriers, so Allegheny County is going to spray suspicious areas in which stagnant water could lead to the attraction of mosquitoes, which could be infected, and then transmit the disease.

5. EDUCATION

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion with the outgoing Superintendent of the Pittsburgh Public Schools, and a discussion regarding how the Pittsburgh Public Schools are starting an important initiative to encourage African-American male students to consider teaching as a career

Topic: Dr. Linda Lane has been a somewhat frequent guest on this program but was never as candid as she was in this broadcast as she prepared to step down from her post. Dr. Lane is a devoted educator, whose accomplishments include improvement in the graduation rates of students, the “Summer Dreamers’ Academy”, a model for other school districts in the country, and fiscal responsibility and relative labor peace, during an economically challenging period. Gregg Behr, President of the non-profit, Grable Foundation, says Dr. Linda Lane had “grit”, and Dr. Lane took courageous steps including turning down pay raises for herself and dealt with increased needs for security at schools in the wake of shooting incidents across the country.

The agreement came, after support from two Pennsylvania governors, and other political leadership. We talked with *Pittsburgh Quarterly*'s Editor and Publisher, Doug Heuck, and Kurt Rankin, Economist for the PNC Financial Services Group, about the significance of this development.

All three commissioners appeared on this program, for the first time, to discuss some of the economic development challenges that will come with the cracker plant project. There will be costs incurred, and needs for schools and other facilities that could accompany an increase in the population.

Topic: David Fawcett and Bruce Stanley, two prominent Pittsburgh attorneys, worked together at the Pittsburgh law firm of Reed Smith on behalf of the families of coal miners who had been killed in the 2010 explosion at the Massey Upper Big Branch Mine, in Montcoal, West Virginia. After years of litigation, former Massey CEO Don Blankenship was convicted of conspiracy to violate mine safety laws at the Upper Big Branch Mine, and began to serve the minimum sentence of a year in prison. We talked with Fawcett and Stanley about this difficult and controversial case, and “The Price of Justice”, the name of a book written by Lawrence Leamer, which discussed these attorneys’ battle to prosecute Blankenship.

7. MEDICAL MARIJUANA

The topic of this category was a discussion on the recently passed legislation in Pennsylvania that allows the use and manufacture of marijuana for medicinal purposes.

Topic: Some people thought that it would never happen in Pennsylvania: approval of legislation permitting the use and manufacture of marijuana for medicinal purposes. The Pennsylvania Medical Cannabis legislation received rare bi-partisan support after heavy lobbying by families affected by those who would benefit from the use of medical marijuana. We talked with one of the sponsors of the legislation, Vandergrift, Westmoreland County Democratic State Representative Joseph Petrarca, and Heather Shuker, from Wexford, Pennsylvania, Allegheny County, active in the political group “Campaign for Compassion”, and the mother of a 13-year-old girl named Hannah, who suffers from seizures, which are relieved or prevented by the use of medical marijuana. Both guests discussed the lobbying and bi-partisanship that was needed to pass this somewhat controversial legislation, and how it will be enforced, from production to distribution, and regulation.

Topic: Although Western Pennsylvania's air quality is a good deal better than it was in the 1930's and 1940's (before smoke control), that air is still not clean enough for many people, including pulmonary experts, who treat patients with breathing problems associated with air pollution. The results of a recent study commissioned by the non-profit Heinz Endowments show that children in the Pittsburgh area have a higher rate of asthma than children in other parts of the country, and that this can not only affect their physical health, but also their academic ability. Our guests on this broadcast included Deborah Gentile, M.D., Director of Allergy and Asthma Clinical Research, Division of Pulmonary, Allergy, and Critical Care Medicine, for the Allegheny Health Network (AHN) and Lead Investigator of this pollution study, and Philip L.S. Johnson, Program Director for Science and Environment, for the Heinz Endowments.

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on the transition from heavy manufacturing to high-tech as well as changing the world's perception of what Pittsburgh was, what it is, and what it could be, discussions regarding developments in Pittsburgh's Strip District, Bakery Square, and South Side, a discussion on the state of Downtown Pittsburgh, and a discussion regarding the positive impact on the Pittsburgh economy and tourism from the Pittsburgh Penguins' Stanley Cup victory.

Topic: This segment dealt with the battle to raise the minimum wage. UPMC announced plans to do that for minimum starting salaries for beginning positions at most of its Pittsburgh facilities to fifteen dollars an hour, but not until January, 2021. Our guests included Barney Oursler, Executive Director of Pittsburgh United, and Josh Malloy, a floor technician at UPMC/Mercy, who is not a union member, but who is part of an organizing campaign for non-union UPMC employees. UPMC declined our request to appear in this segment with the labor representatives.

Topic: This program was recorded on June 10th, and was originally scheduled to air on June 12th, but was pre-empted for special continuing CBS News coverage of the tragic Orlando, Florida shooting massacre at the Pulse gay nightclub, the worst, single act of domestic terrorism in American history. It was broadcast instead on June 19th. Among the topics discussed by former Governor Corbett were the announcement by Royal Dutch Shell that it will build a multi-million-dollar thane cracker plant (to produce plastic products) in Potter Township, Beaver County, a project that was initially sought during Corbett's administration, passage of reform of the state store system by the Pennsylvania state legislature (which permits the sale of wine and beer in supermarkets), reform which Corbett approves but which he says does not go far enough, and comments about Donald J. Trump, as the presumptive, Presidential nominee of the Republican Party.
