1. MAY PRIMARY

Topics discussed in this category included discussions with the May Primary Election candidates for Mayor of Pittsburgh, and an interview following the election with the candidate who won.

Guest: Jack Wagner (D) - Candidate for Mayor of Pittsburgh

Topic: This program began a series of three interviews with the Democratic candidates for Mayor of Pittsburgh in the May Primary. All of these interviews were hosted by Ken Rice, from the KDKA-TV contribution to this broadcast. In this program, the guest was former Pennsylvania Auditor General Jack Wagner, who was a later entry into the mayoral race. Wagner was endorsed by a number of labor unions, and both Pittsburgh newspapers, as well as a number of Democratic political leaders, but lost to City Councilman Bill Peduto.

Topic: This was the second in a series of three interviews conducted with the Democratic candidates for Mayor of Pittsburgh, in the May Primary. In this program, the guest was Pittsburgh City Councilman Bill Peduto (D) 8th District (Point Breeze), who defeated Jack Wagner, State Representative Jake Wheatley, Jr., and political activist A.J. Richardson. Peduto's campaign began months ago, at the grass roots level, and included endorsements from political leaders like (D) Allegheny County Executive Rich Fitzgerald and several members of Pittsburgh city council, as well as large support from political activists in the neighborhoods.

Topic: In our third in a series of interviews with the Democratic candidates for Mayor of Pittsburgh in the May Primary, we talked with Pennsylvania State Representative Jake Wheatley, Junior, who represents the Hill District and portions of a variety of other Pittsburgh neighborhoods, in the State House. Wheatley, a veteran of the United States Marine Corps, served in Operation Desert Storm, and received military honors for that service. He is a graduate of North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University, and received a Master's Degree from the University of Pittsburgh.

Topic: Bill Peduto returned to this broadcast, after his convincing victory over Jack Wagner, Jake Wheatley, and A.J. Richardson, in the May Democratic Primary. It was one of the most expensive and divisive primary campaigns in recent memory. Peduto will face Republican Josh Wander, and perhaps an independent candidate in the November election. He also talked about his relationship with incumbent Mayor Luke Ravenstahl (who is seldom seen in public, or in his office), and what lies ahead, if Peduto, as expected, given the overwhelming Democratic voter registration in the City of Pittsburgh, becomes the next mayor of Pittsburgh.

2. WEST PENN/ALLEGHENY HEALTH SYSTEM MERGER

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion regarding the impact on healthcare in the region with the approval of the West Penn/Allegheny Health System merger, and a discussion with physicians regarding the benefits of the merger.

Topic: The proposed merger between Highmark and the West Penn Allegheny Health System cleared a big hurdle, after the Pennsylvania State Insurance Department gave “conditional” approval of that merger. The welcome news for the two partners was diminished by comments by competitor UPMC that there would be no extension of its current agreement to service Highmark subscribers at UPMC facilities, after the current contract expires, in nineteen months. Our guests in this segment included Stephen J. Foreman, Associate Professor of Health Care Administration at Robert Morris University, and Dr. Sara Moeller, Associate Professor of Business Administration Finance at the University of Pittsburgh’s Katz Graduate School of Business, who talked about the great uncertainty that follows the expiration of the Highmark/UPMC agreement, as well as how all of this is affected by the Affordable Healthcare Act also known as “Obamacare”.

Guests: Tony Farah, M.D. - Chief Medical Officer, Allegheny Health Network & President
Blair Jobe, M.D. - Director, West Penn Allegheny Institute for Thoracic and Esophageal

Topic: Physicians Tony Farah and Blair Jobe appeared on this broadcast, to talk about the benefits of the formation of the new Allegheny Health Network, which was a result of the affiliation between the West Penn Allegheny Health System and Highmark. Dr. Jobe left UPMC, to join this Network. The guests also discussed how this might work, through the implementation of the Affordable Care Act, also known as Obamacare.

3. ECONOMY

Topics discussed in this category included discussions on unemployment and job growth in the region, a discussion on the stock market, and a discussion on where the economy is headed.

Topic: Economic reports just released gave a mixed picture of the Pittsburgh economy. Unemployment in the Pittsburgh region dropped one-tenth of a percentage point to 7.4 percent, in February and the seasonally-adjusted employment in the seven counties surrounding Pittsburgh was up by 1300 people, giving Pittsburgh the fifth-lowest unemployment rate in the state. However, according to the website pittsburghtoday.org, job growth in Pittsburgh has slowed and seasonally-adjusted unemployment in January was the highest, since December, 2010. Doug Heuck, Director of that website, joined us, to try to sort out these figures, and what they really mean to the people of this area.

That began to occur, several months later, after reports of concerns about the Federal Reserve’s likely future moves. Our guest, PNC Wealth Management’s Mike Maglio, shared his thoughts about the market, whether it’s still a good time to invest, and what we might expect, further down the road.

Pennsylvania's Secretary of Labor & Industry, Julia Hearthway, talked about a new "amnesty" plan for unemployment compensation benefits (the first of its kind in the country) in Pennsylvania, and how that would work, and both guests discussed where the economy on the state and local level is headed.

4. TRANSPORTATION

Topics discussed in this category included discussions on bridge and road repairs, and funding for mass transit.

Topic: When a portion of a major bridge in the state of Washington suddenly collapsed into the Skagit River, after being struck by an oversized truck, the nation's attention was turned to a growing national crisis: deteriorating roads and bridges, with depleted funding, to fix them. We spoke with the District#11 Bridge Engineer, Louis J. Ruzzi, about local bridge conditions, and Ruzzi discussed the need to pass state funding in the new budget to deal with bridge and road repair needs.

Topic: Pennsylvania state legislators are beginning to respond to pressure from constituents, to adequately fund transportation needs in the state, including roads and bridges repairs, and mass transit. Our guests included State Senator James Brewster, former mayor of McKeesport, (D) PA 45th Legislative District and Kent A. Harries, Ph.D., FACI, P.E., Associate Professor of Engineering at the Swanson School of Engineering, part of the University of Pittsburgh. Both discussed the seriousness of this problem, and how it affects travel time, and costs motorists money.

Topic: Most of our discussion included challenges that Allegheny County and Pennsylvania face involving funding for transportation of all types. Fitzgerald led a group of political leaders, business executives, and advocacy organization leaders on a trip to Cleveland, Ohio to study Cleveland's successful BRT or bus rapid transit program that links the medical and educational community with the business district. Both Allegheny County and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania face the crisis of dealing with a number of bridges that are "structurally deficient", roads that need to be repaired, a crisis condition for funding mass transit in Allegheny County and elsewhere, and dwindling financial resources, to fix them. The solution could include increases that would affect the Pennsylvania gasoline tax, already one of the highest in the country.

5. PITTSBURGH MARATHON

Topics in this category included a discussion on the Boston Marathon bombing, and how that event will impact the upcoming Pittsburgh Marathon.

Topic: Just weeks before the Pittsburgh Marathon was to take place, the running world and America were shocked by a terrorist bombing incident at the Boston Marathon on Patriot's Day when two pressure cooker bombs exploded on the Boston course in two separate places near the finish line, killing three people, and injuring 264 others. We spoke with the executive director and director of operations for the Pittsburgh Marathon, about plans for increased security at this year's Pittsburgh event. The Pittsburgh Marathon was conducted peacefully, but one participant died of a sudden cardiac incident related to a congenital heart problem, along the race course.

Topic: America was shocked when on April 15th, Patriots Day, the 2013 Boston Marathon, one of that community's most beloved events, was the target of a series of terrorist bombings involving pressure cookers left near the race's finish line, which killed three people, including a police officer from Massachusetts Institute of Technology (M.I.T.) and injured 264 others. The suspects were identified as two Chechen brothers, Dzhokhar and Tamerlan Tsarnaev (it was later determined that Tamerlan was actually run over and killed by his own brother, Dzhokhar, in the brother's attempt to flee). One of our guests participated in that Boston Marathon, describing what happened (she also attempted to assist medical personnel there, as she is an employee in Emergency Sports Medicine at Allegheny General Hospital), and said she still planned on participating in the Pittsburgh Marathon, scheduled a few weeks later. Our other guest, a former F.B.I. agent, talked about security, the investigation, and what might occur to prevent any terrorism at the Pittsburgh Marathon.

6. RESCUE OF THREE ABDUCTED WOMEN IN CLEVELAND, OHIO

The topic of this category was a discussion on the rescue of three women who were abducted in Cleveland, Ohio.

Topic: In one of the most bizarre criminal investigations in recent history, three women, who vanished from sight from a period of nine to eleven years ago, were freed from captivity (during the beginning of May), inside the basement of a Cleveland, Ohio home, along with a six-year-old girl, believed to be the child of one of the victims and her captor, Ariel Castro, a school bus driver. We spoke with Bob Meinert, retired Allegheny County homicide detective and the senior investigator for a firm that often searches for people, Dennis Bair, founder of a non-profit organization, Bair Find Foundation, that launches a program that features the photos of missing children on posters of local sports heroes, to draw attention to their disappearance, and KDKA-TV News Anchor Kimberly Gill, who anchored the news in Cleveland, Ohio, during a good portion of the investigation of this case,

about this unusual news story and crime. We discussed what happened, how it might have happened, and why it took so long for these captives to escape.

7. SUPREME COURT

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on the impact of the Supreme Court, and a discussion on the court's ruling regarding same sex marriage and benefits.

Topic: The United States government is often praised for its separation of powers, granting certain governing responsibilities to the legislative, executive, and judicial branches. But, the judicial branch often receives little attention, and it was the intent of this broadcast to shed some light on the United States Supreme Court, and its impact on the country. The current term of the Court considered some of the most controversial issues since the Warren Court, and our guests, law professor Robert Barker, and attorney Donna S. McClelland, a veteran of almost twenty years of service in the Pennsylvania Attorney General's office, discussed the composition of the Court and how its rulings affect everyday society.

Topic: In two, separate, historic, 5-4 rulings, the United States Supreme Court took on the controversial subject of same sex marriages, and, in the majority opinion, written by Justice Anthony Kennedy, said that the 1996 Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA), passed by Congress and signed by President Bill Clinton (who recently renounced the act) "violated constitutional guarantees of liberty, equality, and equal dignity". The ruling is expected to affect federal benefits for same-sex partners in states where same-sex marriage is allowed by law (other executive action by President Obama could allow some benefits to begin to be permitted for same-sex partners.) In the other case, involving the state of California's Proposition 8 which banned same-sex marriage in 2008, the Court said it did NOT have jurisdiction to rule on this case and sent the issue back to California meaning, that because a lower federal court struck down Proposition 8 as unconstitutional, same-sex marriage could resume in California. Our guests, leaders of two major gay rights organizations in Pennsylvania talked about what the Supreme Court decisions could mean for the gay community in Pennsylvania and Pittsburgh.

8. OKLAHOMA TORNADO

The topic of this category was a discussion on fundraising for the victims of the tornado in Moore, Oklahoma.

Topic: The tornado that struck Moore, Oklahoma in May was classified as one of the most powerful in history, and at the time of this broadcast resulted in the deaths of 24 people with 377 others injured, and significant damage across a wide area, a seventeen-mile path. The tornado's winds reached an amazing 210 miles per hour (classified as an EF-5). Our guests, representatives from the American

Red Cross and the Brother's Brother Foundation, talked about the efforts underway to help victims with food, clothing, and shelter, as well as psychological services.

9. COMMUNITY EVENTS & SPORTS

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on the restoration of the fountain at Point State Park, a discussion on the Three Rivers Arts Festival, a discussion on the economic impact of the Pittsburgh Penguins playoffs, and a discussion on the Pittsburgh Regatta.

The Promise received a \$1,000,000 donation from Thermo Fisher Scientific and also announced that many of its major donors have pledged to raise \$90,000,000 to reach their \$250,000,000 goal within two years. Our guests included Spencer Todd from Thermo Fisher Scientific, and Saleem Ghubril, Executive Director of The Pittsburgh Promise.

Cohon's tenure at Carnegie Mellon and his partnership and friendship with University of Pittsburgh Chancellor Mark Nordenberg were responsible for resurgence in the Pittsburgh economy, the addition of thousands of robotics, computer, and start-up jobs. We talked with Cohon about his successes here.

The topic of this category was a discussion on regulations and laws that impact the region's booming energy industry.

We talked with Babst Calland's Shareholder & the Chairman of their Energy & Resources group, attorney Joseph K. Reinhart, about how this will help both government and the energy industries deal with these issues.

The topic of this category was a discussion on recent controversial actions involving the IRS.

Topic: Controversy began to swirl around the Obama Administration, after a series of revelations about the role of that Administration and the federal government, in the way the Internal Revenue

Service operates, and a possible conflict with the First Amendment to the United States Constitution, and freedom of the press. The acting Commissioner of the IRS, Steven T. Miller, was forced to resign, after it was revealed that certain politically conservative interest groups were targeted by the IRS for scrutiny, regarding their tax-exempt status (it was later revealed that other liberal interest groups were similarly targeted, as well). Two members of Tea Party organizations in Western Pennsylvania talked about the impact of this investigative activity, and Charles Kelly, a First Amendment attorney and former Pittsburgh Post-Gazette reporter, talked about potential violations of the First Amendment (in a separate, but related scandal, it was revealed that the United States Justice Department had secretly obtained two months of telephone records of reporters and editors for the Associated Press, which AP called a "massive and unprecedented intrusion" into the gathering of news, which included investigations of the Obama Administration in Benghazi).

13. STATE LIQUOR STORES

The topic of this category was a discussion on proposals to privatize the State Store system in Pennsylvania.

Topic: In a very lively discussion, both of our guests, members of the Pennsylvania state legislature, talked about current debate in the General Assembly (part of state budget talks), over the future of the State Store system in Pennsylvania. Most Republicans want to scrap the entire state store system, while Democrats would prefer modernization over the present system. Private liquor sales would probably increase choice and variety, but could lead to the loss of many union jobs, across the state, involving state store employees. Democrats are united, in opposition to eliminating the state store system, and the debate continues, as of this writing.

Topic: Great controversy developed over the way that human organs for transplant are allotted for that transplantation, after the family of a ten-year-old girl from Pennsylvania, with "end stage" cystic fibrosis, Sarah Murnaghan went to court to challenge her place on the transplant waiting list, for a double lung transplant, because of her age. As a result of the court action, a federal judge allowed her to move ahead in line and be permitted to qualify for adult organs. Murnaghan received her transplant, and, at this writing, was still in the midst of recuperation from this serious surgery. Our guests included two, local human organ transplant recipients who disagreed with this court decision, and State Representative Joseph Petrarca, Jr., from Westmoreland County (his father was a kidney transplant recipient), who is sponsoring legislation to make it easier to donate and receive human organs for transplantation in Pennsylvania.
