## **1. ANTWON ROSE, JR. SHOOTING**

The topic of this category was a discussion regarding the Antwon Rose, Jr., who was shot, and killed by an East Pittsburgh Police Officer.

Topic: Another serious discussion after a seventeen-year-old Woodland Hills High School student, Antwon Rose, Junior, was shot in the back three times by an East Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania police officer, after running from police following a different shooting incident elsewhere. Our guests discussed the difficult tragedy of this case, and the shooting deaths of young African-American males (within the same week, a Hill District teen, promising “rap” musician Jimmy Wopo, whose real name is Travon Da Shawn Frank Smart, was shot and killed in the Hill District). The guests included the co-legal counsel for the Antwon Rose, Jr. family, Attorney Lee Merritt, from Philadelphia, Attorney Fred Rabner from Pittsburgh, Tim Stevens, longtime Pittsburgh civil rights activist and Chairman & CEO of the Black Political Empowerment Project (B-PEP), Licia Lentz, Assistant Superintendent of the Woodland Hills School District where Antwon Rose, Junior, was a student, and Reverend Glenn Grayson, Pastor of the Wesley Center A.M.E. Baptist Church, in the Hill District, whose son Jeron was a murder victim in 2010.

## **2. CRIME**

The topic of this category was a discussion regarding news from the City of Pittsburgh about their efforts to fight crime, and the success of community policing procedures

Topic: There was encouraging news from the City of Pittsburgh about their efforts to fight crime, and the success of community policing procedures instituted by former Pittsburgh Police Chief Cameron McLay. Violent crime is down in the City of Pittsburgh over the last five years. Our guests, Chief of Police Scott Schubert, Public Safety Director Wendell Hissrich, Assistant Police Chief Lavonnie Bickerstaff, and Reverend Cornell Jones, Coordinator of the Group Violence Intervention Unit (GVI) for the City of Pittsburgh, talked about new tools and training. In addition our guest spoke about engagement between police and the neighborhoods that they serve, creating greater trust between police and citizens, including focusing on specific trouble spots and individuals most likely to commit crime, plus the use of the “Shot Spotter” and surveillance cameras to apprehend criminals.

### **3. PRESIDENT TRUMP MEETING WITH KIM JONG-UN OF NORTH KOREA**

The topic of this category was a discussion regarding President Trump's summit with Korean Supreme Leader Kim Jong-Un in Singapore.

Topic: Almost 68-years after the start of the Korean War, a war that ended with an armistice, resulted in the deaths of almost 34,000 American troops, 7,800 Americans still unaccounted for, and more than 28,000 troops still patrolling the borders, President Donald J. Trump announced plans for a summit with Korean Supreme Leader Kim Jong-Un in Singapore. The summit was on, and then it was off. This program aired before the summit was re-scheduled, and actually took place during the middle of June. Our guests talked about what we might expect from each side in the summit that would eventually follow, and the significance of President Trump being able to help in the release of three American citizens who were imprisoned in North Korea.

### **4. SUPREME COURT RULINGS**

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on rulings regarding a case involving a baker who refused to bake a "same-sex" wedding cake for a gay couple because of the baker's religious beliefs, and a ruling in May that overturned a 1992 law that essentially had prevented sports betting in the United States for commercial purposes.

Topic: As the "Me Too" phenomenon continues on, more allegations of improper sexual behavior have been made involving broadcast journalists, like Charlie Rose and Tom Brokaw, as convicted comedian Bill Cosby and movie mogul Harvey Weinstein await sentencing, or prosecution. How have these cases changed the public's perception of assault, and have they given courage to women, or men in some cases, who have been assaulted by members of the same, or opposite sex, in the workplace, to come forward to share their own experiences? Our guests talked about those accused, those making the accusations, and what we can expect going forward.

Topic: There was much to discuss with Pittsburgh Public Schools Superintendent, Dr. Anthony Hamlet, from the rash of school shootings across America, to the recently approved contract between the Pittsburgh school district and the Pittsburgh Federation of Teachers, to the district's "Summer Dreamers" program, now expanded, to include younger children, and student "readiness" for academic excellence. Dr. Hamlet's appearance covered a great deal of territory, and allowed him to spend sufficient time on some of the most challenging issues that the Pittsburgh school district is facing.

## **8. 50<sup>th</sup> ANNIVERSARY OF THE MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. ASSASSINATION**

The topic of this category was a discussion regarding the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Assassination.

Topic: This was an especially moving program as we looked back on a very painful time in both our nation and city's history, when the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was assassinated 50 years ago. We used KDKA-TV archival news footage, including an interview by legendary news anchor Marie Torre, with the Pittsburgh Police, whose helicopter had been fired upon during riots in the Hill District and Homewood-Brushton, minority communities, that followed the King assassination (many places that burned down – including a supermarket – were not replaced for almost fifty years). Our guests talked about the mood of the country and the Black community, the despair that was felt and the continuing struggle, fifty years later, to revitalize the Hill District.

## **9. FOOD SECURITY**

The topic of this category included discussions regarding food security standards and keeping pace with modern threats to food safety from E-Coli to terrorism.

Topic: At least 121-people became ill in 25-states, 52-people were hospitalized, and at least one person died, after an outbreak of E-Coli linked to romaine lettuce that was grown in Yuma, Arizona. Are our food security standards keeping pace with modern threats to food safety from E-Coli to terrorism? Dr. Amesh Adalja is Senior Scholar, at Johns Hopkins University's Center for Health Security, and is based in Pittsburgh. He talked with Jon Delano about the impact of this latest food crisis on the food industry, farmers, and the American public health system.

Dr. Amesh Adalja is a public health expert who recently completed an extensive study of the dangers of a world pandemic, such as the Spanish Flu of 1918, 100 years ago, which infected approximately 500,000,000 worldwide, about a third of the world's population, and killed from 20,000,000 to 50,000,000 victims, including about 675,000 Americans. He shared the results of his study, which also looked at the potential for the use of germs and chemical weapons, to violate national security and kill part of the population, and the dangers of contaminated food, like romaine lettuce from Yuma, Arizona, which sickened a number of people, and killed at least one person.

## **10. CHARITABLE PROGRAMS**

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on the Dollar Energy Fund, which helps those on fixed incomes who are struggling to pay their utility bills, and a discussion Regarding a Summertime Community Food Bank telethon that raised money to feed children during the summer.

Topic: Summertime is an especially challenging time for some families when it comes to providing sufficient and healthy meals. Because school is in recess, one important source of nutrition and food is not available to many families. KDKA-TV and the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank joined forces with Citizens Bank and Giant Eagle for the 2018 "Feed the Kids" Telethon. Citizens Bank promised to match donated funds, up to \$40,000, and a total of \$100,000 was raised during several hours of appeals during KDKA-TV's afternoon newscasts to help provide necessary food for those who are in need, whether elderly, poor, or financially challenged, or "food insufficient".

As a result, Bishop David Zubik announced the beginning of a consolidation of parishes in the Diocese, which could eventually involve the closure of some churches, and will almost immediately involve the transfer of priests from the parishes that they have led. Bishop Zubik joined Stacy Smith and David Shribman, for his perspective on this issue, and the important role that Catholic parishioners will play as the reorganization is carried out.

## **12. SUICIDE**

The topic of this category was a discussion regarding suicide.

Topic: This was a very sober reminder of a subject that too often has been swept under the rug: suicide. After the recent suicides of two prominent international personalities, designer Kate Spade, and celebrity chef and television personality, Anthony Bourdain, we felt it was necessary to hear the extent of the tragedy of suicide as it affects the rest of the world. Our guests included Colleen Sybert, Chair of Loss & Healing Programs for the Western Pennsylvania Chapter of the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention, who lost her sister Leanne to suicide thirteen years ago, and Rev. Jim Bertoti, Pastor of St. Peter's Reformed Church in Zelienople, Pennsylvania, who as a child was the repeated victim of sexual molestation by a family relative, attempted suicide but failed, and now leads a support group for those people affected by suicide.

## **13. FACEBOOK**

The topic of this category was a discussion regarding Facebook and privacy issues.

Topic: Facebook, and its founder Mark Zuckerberg, came under fire over privacy issues when an incident allowed users' information to land in the wrong hands, as personal data was "sold" to "malicious" third parties. (Zuckerberg himself was also a victim of this invasion of privacy). Our guests talked about the struggle between defending the First Amendment, privacy and protection of national security, and whether regulation and the law have not kept up with technology advances. When much of the law was written, most people did not even own a desk computer.

#### **14. BEAVER COUTY**

Topics discussed in this category included discussions regarding Beaver County's transition from dependence on an economy tied to steel manufacturing, to one that has a growing presence in healthcare employment, and natural gas processing.

Topic: KDKA-TV held a very special panel discussion, on April 5th, at the Fez, in Aliquippa, Pennsylvania, part of the station's "Eye on Community: Beaver County". Our guests, in this segment, Jack Manning, President & Executive Director of the Beaver County Chamber of Commerce, and Rebecca Matsco, Chair, of the Potter Township, Beaver County Board of Supervisors, previewed some of the issues affecting Beaver County that would be discussed at the April 5th event. KDKA-TV's Celina Pompeani and Bob Pompeani also took part in the "Eye on Community: Beaver County" event. As Beaver County transitions from dependence on an economy tied to steel manufacturing, to one that has a growing presence of healthcare facilities and employment, the role of healthcare looms very large in Beaver County. We continued our preview of KDKA-TV's "Eye on Community: Beaver County – with Norm Mitry, President & CEO of the Heritage Valley Health System, and Pat Nardelli, Principal, at Castlebrook Development Group, which helps construct new business, including healthcare facilities in Beaver County. This topic was expected to be one focus of the April 5th panel discussion event at the Fez, in Aliquippa, Beaver County.

Topic: As a follow-up, to KDKA-TV's "Eye on Community: Beaver County" and its well-attended panel discussion at the Fez, in Aliquippa, Beaver County, our guests focused on a key topic that will be debated in the next few years. The debate centers on the challenge and

promise of transitioning from steel manufacture, to construction and development of the Royal Dutch Shell Ethane Cracker Plan, in Potter Township, Beaver County, which will require thousands of construction workers, and eventually, workers, to help in the conversion of natural gas products into ethylene and then into plastics. What kinds of skills are needed by workers to fill these jobs, and what kind of training is available? Our guests talked about the role of labor unions in training and employment for this huge project.

## **15. FLOODING AND LANDSLIDES**

The topic of this category was a discussion regarding the expense to Pittsburgh neighborhoods from flooding and landslides.

Topic: Unusual winter and spring weather, extensive rain, flooding, and resulting landslides have created both financial and personal emergencies in the City of Pittsburgh for people whose neighborhoods sustained damage from these incidents. We talked with Pittsburgh City Councilman Corey O'Connor, representing District#5, including Commercial Street and Forward Avenue, where landslide damages in that area alone reached at least twelve million dollars, about what was being done to stabilize the hillsides that had collapsed. He also discussed the cost of these repairs, and what to do in the long run to address what has become a chronic problem in those areas.
