1. FEDERAL GOVERNMENT SHUTDOWN

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion regarding the impact the Federal Government shutdown had on air traffic controllers, a discussion on financial assistance programs available for federal workers impacted by the Government shutdown, and a discussion about efforts by the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank to provide food distribution for federal employees affected by the shutdown.

Topic: Once again America had to deal with the effect of a shutdown of most of the United States government due to political gridlock in Washington, D.C. Among its victims were air traffic controllers, including Michael Dalmaso, President of the Pittsburgh local of the National Air Traffic Controllers Association (NATCA), who received a pay stub for \$1.17 during the government shutdown. He joined us as we discussed the political ramifications of the shutdown, with Andrew Simpson, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of History at the McAnulty College and Graduate School of Liberal Arts (Duquesne University), and Victoria Shineman, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Political Science at the Kenneth P. Dietrich School of Arts and Sciences (University of Pittsburgh).

Traci Weatherford-Brown, Chief Advancement Officer for the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank, talked with Jon Delano about why this initiative was so important.

2. SOUTHERN BORDER WALL

The topic of this category were discussions with U.S. Congressmen (a Republican and a Democrat), who represent Pennsylvania, regarding funding for a border wall between the United States and Mexico.

Topic: Republican Congressman Mike Kelly, from Butler County, a member of the powerful House Ways and Means Committee, talked with Stacy Smith and Sally Stapleton about the government shutdown, political gridlock, and the growing controversy over whether Congress should appropriate funding to build a wall between the United States and Mexico, to cut down the rate of illegal immigration. When this program aired, some Republican members of the United States Senate turned down a Republicans spending proposal for more than five and a half billion dollars to build the wall, but also defeated a Democratic proposal that would have temporarily re-opened those closed portions of the federal government, while negotiations continued, about border security between America and Mexico. Congressman Kelly gave us an inside view of the political discord among members of his own Party, and between Republicans and Democrats.

Topic: As President Donald J. Trump prepared to deliver his State of the Union message, delayed while the partial federal government shutdown took place, and under the threat of a second shutdown, Pittsburgh Congressman Mike Doyle (D) 18th Congressional District, appeared on this program, as a follow-up to Rep. Mike Kelly's interview from the previous week. Much of the discussion centered on the controversy over President Trump's threatened declaration of a national emergency as a way of diverting certain government spending to the building of a border wall between the United States and Mexico. Democrats, now in control of the United States House of Representatives, vowed to fight the national declaration of emergency attempt by the President.

In our first segment, we heard from Allegheny County Controller (D) Chelsa Wagner, who is holding a series of meetings with citizens affected by this legal struggle. In our second segment Chelsa Wagner was joined by Judy Hays of Crescent Township, a breast cancer survivor and Highmark Health Insurance customer, who receives life-saving care from UPMC physicians at their Hillman Cancer Center, which could end if the consent decree expires, and Jessica Brooks, CEO and Executive Director of the Pittsburgh Business Group on Health, who talked about the potential impact of the end of the consent decree on their clients.

Our guests discussed the combined role of community policing and upgraded technology in helping to lower the crime rate, and create an improved bond between city law enforcement and the community.

Debbie Cunningham – Gibsonia, Alzheimer's Caregiver for Her Husband Topic: This was a compelling interview about the growing public health crisis of Alzheimer's disease. It is the sixth-leading cause of death in America. Jennifer Lingler discussed important medical research and care for Alzheimer's patients and their families at Pitt's Alzheimer Disease Research Center, and Niki Kapsambelis, local author, of the acclaimed 2017 book "The Inheritance: A Family on the Front Lines of the Battle Against Alzheimer's Disease" (2017) talked about the devastating impact of this disease. Alyssa Marsico, Communications Specialist for the Pittsburgh Office of the Greater Pennsylvania Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association, discussed the services that are available to Alzheimer's patients and their families. One local caregiver, Debbie Cunningham from Gibsonia, discussed the difficult challenges that both Alzheimer's patients and their family members face.
