## **1. HEALTH CARE**

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on the effort by Republican members of Congress and President Donald J. Trump to repeal the Affordable Care Act, and a discussion about the implications of the dismantling of the Affordable Care Act on the U.S. population.

Topic: The political shots were fired during the Presidential campaign and continued into the beginning of 2017: the effort by Republican members of Congress and President Donald J. Trump to repeal the Affordable Care Act, or Obamacare, the signature legislative accomplishment of the Obama Administration. The wide-ranging discussion included views about the effectiveness and cost of Obamacare, but also moved into the philosophical question about whether government has a responsibility to care for the health needs of those who cannot afford to pay for that care themselves. The discussion also asked the still-unresolved question of whether if Obamacare is replaced, what replaces it, who pays for the cost of the uninsured, and what impact this will have on the Federal deficit.

Topic: As we recorded this broadcast, members of the United States House were battling, over whether to completely eliminate the current Affordable Care Act. Several hours later, (after our broadcast had been recorded for air on Sunday morning) when Republicans did not have the sufficient number of votes to accomplish this goal, President Donald J. Trump asked Speaker of the House Paul Ryan (R-Wisconsin) to withdraw the Republican proposal and replacement for the Affordable Care Act. Our guests, including two representatives from West Virginia University in Morgantown, West Virginia, talked about the implications of the dismantling of the Affordable Care Act on the U.S. population. While West Virginia voters supported Donald J. Trump's Presidential campaign, they also represent one of the economically poorest segments of the U.S. population, which relies heavily on Obamacare, and our guests described how the elimination of the program would provide healthcare providers, including the WVU Health System (WVUHS) with enormous economic challenges in caring for those who cannot afford to pay for healthcare themselves.

## **2. IMMIGRATION AND TRAVEL BAN**

The topic of this category was a discussion regarding the controversial policy of the Trump Administration to impose limits on immigration and travel from certain countries.

Topic: This program was devoted to a discussion of the controversial policy of the Trump Administration, under an executive order that was later “stayed” by the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals, which would have paved the way for the United States Justice Department to deport illegal immigrants from certain selected countries, including some in the Middle East. In our first segment we spoke with two Pittsburgh attorneys, Joel Pfeffer and Kristen Schneck, who specialize in immigration law. In our second segment we interviewed two women who deal directly with Pittsburgh’s immigrant population, from various nationalities and areas of the world, including the Latino population and immigrants from the Middle East. Our guests discussed the difficulties that the government will face in enforcing this executive order were it to be eventually reinstated, the fears that immigrants face of being deported, and being separated from their loved ones, and the legal recourse that they might have in the judicial and legislative system of this country.

### **3. PRESIDENT TRUMP AND THE PRESS**

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on President Trump’s methods of communication with the press, his perception of much of the traditional “media” as his “enemy”, and a discussion on the problems journalists face in attempting to report the news.

Topic: It quickly became apparent after the inauguration of Donald J. Trump as President of the United States, that his administration, as well as his method of communicating with the news media and the public would be very different than during any previous Presidential administration. Our guests talked about new strategies which Trump employed while a candidate, and which continued, of using Twitter, direct video broadcasts to the public, and for quite some time ignoring pleas by the traditional media to hold regular news conferences. There was also discussion of the President’s perception of much of the traditional “media” as his “enemy”.

Topic: Once again the “media” came under fire by President Donald J. Trump, who held his first news conference since taking office as President, and who along with his supporters, challenges the “fairness” of the “traditional” media outlets and reporters, attacking networks like CNN, and using the terms “fake news”, versus “real news”. Our guests provided historical perspective about the First Amendment and relationships between Presidents and

the media, including President Richard Nixon's battles with the press, and their investigation of the Watergate break-in and cover-up. Our guests also discussed the new problems they face as journalists in attempting to report the news.

#### **4. PRESIDENT TRUMP POLICIES**

Topics discussed in this category included discussions on business-friendly policies of the Trump Administration that should benefit the area's shale, oil & gas drilling industry, a discussion on the unorthodox methods of the Trump Presidency, a discussion on the Trump Administration's policy that reverses federal protections for transgender people, a discussion with a Pennsylvania State Representative regarding the Trump Presidency, and a discussion regarding economic policy under the Trump Administration.

Topic: Another executive order by President Donald J. Trump became the center of controversy. In this case, the Trump Administration's Justice Department stated its policy that the issue of transgender policy should be determined by the individual states, not the federal government (a reversal of the Barack Obama Administration's view on this issue). Our guests included two members of the transgender community in Pittsburgh, a bakery owner, Dena Stanley, Pittsburgh attorney, Elise Delong, and another Pittsburgh attorney, Mark Phillis, whose expertise includes employment issues and liability in the workplace. They discussed the daily challenges that they face as transgender as well as what might happen if local laws and state laws protecting their status were superseded by a federal executive order.

Topic: Rep. Mike Kelly, Congressman from Butler and the rest of Pennsylvania's 3rd Congressional District, has been a long-time supporter of President Donald J. Trump and his policies. He is also now a member of the powerful U.S. House Ways & Means Committee, which determines tax and spending policies in the House. Kelly discussed his perspective of the Trump Presidency, and the views of his constituents, the majority of whom, also supported Donald J. Trump's Presidential campaign.

Topic: Is the glass "half-full" or "half-empty"? That might be the way different economists would describe the state of the nation's economy more than two months into the Trump Administration. Our guests discussed economic policies, differing between the Obama and Trump Administrations, interest rates, and how this might affect consumer spending, and the course of the stock market. If the Affordable Care Act is repealed, will some sectors of the population withhold spending for consumer goods in order to use some of that money to pay for healthcare?

## **5. INFRASTRUCTURE**

Topics discussed in this category included discussions on the major problems with an aging infrastructure that carries much of Pittsburgh's water supply, and a discussion on the dangerously deteriorating infrastructure of the Allegheny and Monongahela rivers' locks and dams.

Topic: Once again, the embattled Pittsburgh Water & Sewer Authority (PWSA) came under fire after the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection noticed high levels of chlorine in some readings of the water at the Highland Park reservoir, in Pittsburgh's East End. Fearing the possible presence of giardia (later determined not to be the case), the state issued a water advisory and "boil water" alert for much of the city's population for several days. Our guests discussed the major problems with an aging infrastructure that carries much of Pittsburgh's water supply, the negative image that residents have of the PWSA, and what it will cost to improve the safety and reliability of the city's water distribution system.

Topic: Pennsylvania's Auditor General Eugene DePasquale joined Jon Delano to discuss several critical issues. The Pittsburgh Water & Sewer Authority has come under fire for its operation and financial health, and for problems with its aging infrastructure and resulting

compromises in the quality of the water supply on occasion. DePasquale told us that his office would conduct a performance audit of the PWSA.

Topic: The Allegheny and Monongahela rivers' locks and dams claim some of the oldest and most dangerously deteriorating infrastructure in the country. However, because of the way federal legislation is written, valuable funding that could repair that infrastructure goes to other places. Col. John Lloyd, Commander of the Pittsburgh District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, says that's because the upper Allegheny and Monongahela rivers have little-to-no commerce, but increasing river traffic in tourism, which is not covered in federal assistance.

### **6. HEALTH**

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on polio, and a discussion on Pittsburgh's role in medical and scientific research to try to unlock the secrets of Alzheimer's disease.

Topic: This was an especially meaningful broadcast, on several fronts, as our co-anchor Stacy Smith is a polio survivor himself, having contracted the disease as a child before a polio vaccine was discovered through the work at the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine and Public Health, by Dr. Jonas Salk, father of our guest, Dr. Peter Salk, who carries on his father's legacy. Dr. Peter Salk lived in the Pittsburgh area as a child during his father's historic, groundbreaking medical research at the University of Pittsburgh, talked about his father's work at Pitt to discover the vaccine, the controversy between the effectiveness and safety of the Salk injected killed vaccine, versus the Sabin live oral vaccine, and the reasons why, though millions of dollars have been contributed and spent, to eradicate polio from the face of the earth, there are still pockets of the disease in some underdeveloped countries. Dr. Peter Salk in addition to his work for the Jonas Salk Legacy Foundation is a Visiting Professor, at the University of Pittsburgh's Graduate School of Public Health

Topic: Pittsburgh is the center of some of the most important medical and scientific research, to try to unlock the secrets of the devastating disease – Alzheimer's. It's estimated that the cost of caring for Alzheimer's patients in this country could reach more than 200-billion dollars by the year 2040. Pittsburgh author Niki Kapsambelis has written an amazing book about one family in North Dakota, the DeMoes family, with a genetic mutation that has resulted in 100-percent of the family carrying a gene that apparently contributes to the cause of Alzheimer's, with some suffering from the disease and others passing it on to the next generation, and who are working with the University of Pittsburgh's Alzheimer's Research

Project's remarkable Chet Mathis and Bill Klunk, who are trying to follow the disease in living brains of those suffering from this condition. Our guests included "The Inheritance" author Niki Kapsambelis, and Dr. Andreas Pfenning, a computational biologist at Carnegie Mellon University, who is trying to translate genetic findings about Alzheimer's into new therapies to fight the disease.

## **7. REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT**

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on the transformation of a former steel mill into a new center for robotics in the 21st century, and discussions on economic development efforts in Clairton, Pennsylvania, and Lawrence County, Pennsylvania.

Topic: Hazelwood, a City of Pittsburgh neighborhood, was best-known for the presence of Jones & Laughlin's steelmaking at its now-closed Hazelwood Works, which produced coke from coal used in the production of steel. Now civic and business leaders hope that the re-named, Almono site, one of Pittsburgh's last large "brownfields" can be transformed into a new center for robotics in the 21st century. The federal government awarded Carnegie Mellon University \$250,000 for that purpose, and we spoke with Howie Choset, Ph.D., Professor of Robotics and Chief Technology Officer of Advanced Robotics, at Carnegie Mellon University, about what such a center would mean to the economy of Southwestern Pennsylvania, and the Hazelwood community.

There will be almost three and a half-million dollars available to encourage the creation of businesses that most people might take for granted, but which have disappeared over the years in Clairton, from restaurants to supermarkets. We spoke with Richard Lattanzi, Mayor of Clairton, about what this growth could mean to Clairton's people.

Topic: With real economic growth potential from adjacent Beaver County, because of the possibility of the construction of a petrochemical "cracker" plant, political leaders in Lawrence County believe that they can also benefit from this project. The chairman of the Lawrence County Commissioners, Republican Dan Vogler, Linda Nitch, Executive Director of the Lawrence County Economic Development Corporation, and Scott Whipkey, Geologist

with New Castle-based RAR Engineering Group, joined us to talk about the transportation and tax advantages of locating a business in Lawrence County.

## **8. MEDICAL MARIJUANA**

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on the potential for economic growth from growing and processing marijuana for medicinal purposes, and a discussion on the economic potential for a marijuana growing and processing facility for medicinal cannabis in Braddock, Pennsylvania.

Topic: In the first of two interviews in this broadcast, we discussed the potential for economic growth from growing and processing marijuana, solely for medicinal purposes, in McKeesport, Pennsylvania. Under state law passed last year, there will be a limited number of licenses for this type of business. We talked with Gabe Perlow, CEO of a new company, called PurePenn, and Jordan Lams, CEO of MOXIE, a Los Angeles, California-based company, with experience in this kind of venture, about their own proposal to win a license from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania (both men have had personal experiences with relatives who suffered from cancer, and who could have benefited from medicinal cannabis).

Braddock is still struggling to emerge from Act #47 financial distress status, and Fetterman says this kind of economic development could be a "game changer" for that community.

The topic of this category was a discussion regarding the creation of the University of Pittsburgh's new Cyber Institute that will assist in the response to cybercrime.

Cybercrime detection and prosecution was a central focus of his work as United States Attorney for Western Pennsylvania. We talked with him about the goals of this new center which will respond to a world that continues to be threatened by cyber warfare and global terrorism.

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on the naming rights change to the arena that plays host to the Pittsburgh Penguins, a discussion on the moving of the Theater Historical Society of America from Chicago to Pittsburgh, and a discussion on the economic benefits of film production in Pittsburgh – including the Academy Award Winning film “Fences”.

Topic: Pittsburgh has a rich, if uneven, theatrical history, from the location of the first nickelodeon in Downtown Pittsburgh, to the discovery of an abandoned infant at East Liberty’s Sheridan Square movie theatre in East Liberty, which led to the creation of the Variety Club charity. Therefore, it makes perfect sense for Pittsburgh to be the new headquarters of the Theatre Historical Society of America, which is moving from Chicago, to Pittsburgh. Jon Delano talked with the organization’s executive director, Richard Fosbrink, and David Newell, a board member (“Mr. McFeely”, on PBS’ “Mr. Rogers’ Neighborhood”) about the reasons for coming to Pittsburgh, and the rich theatrical archives, from memorabilia to performance programs and historical, architectural plans for theatres, which will be housed, at least temporarily, in a portion of the Heinz Regional History Center, in Pittsburgh.

But, unless the Pennsylvania General Assembly renews Film Tax Credits in its next budget, film production could come to a halt in places like Pittsburgh. (“Fences” brought an Academy Award, to Viola Davis – for Best Supporting Actress)

Topic: This program aired on New Year's Day and we wanted to look at two important aspects of the last year: the state of the local economy and unemployment, and the election of Donald J. In the first segment, Doug Heuck, Founder, Editor, and Publisher of *Pittsburgh Quarterly Magazine*, and Director of the University of Pittsburgh's Center for Social & Urban Research, provided the mixed economic data from the local economy during the rollercoaster ride of the 2016 Presidential election, somewhat increased unemployment compared to adjoining states like Ohio and some movement toward diversification of the local economy, despite some Mon Valley communities (once centers of steel production) that have been left behind. In our second segment, Dr. Philip J. Harold, Professor of Political Science at Robert Morris University, and Dr. Audrey Guskey, Associate Professor of Marketing at Duquesne University's Palumbo Donahue School of Business, discussed the historic and surprising victory of Donald J. Trump over Hillary Clinton, and everything from the Mylan EpiPen scandal to the Pokemon video and web craze.
