KDKA Political Reporter and Analyst, Jon Delano also joined the discussion about the Democrats' plans to try to unseat President Trump in a red state he won in 2016.

Trump's decision to impose tariffs on products made by the Chinese, which are often dumped into United States' markets, depressing costs, and resulting in the loss of American trade competitiveness, and jobs.

Our guests talked about the repercussions of tariffs, and whether they result in the protection of jobs, or lead to American job losses, when goods produced in America, and exported to countries like China, are met with retaliatory tariffs, making American prices noncompetitive. Part of the discussion included the impact of tariffs, positive and negative, on the American steel industry, including steel produced in the Western Pennsylvania area.

3. SIX-MONTH ANNIVERSARY - TREE OF LIFE SYNAGOGUE SHOOTING

The topic of this category was a discussion marking the six-month anniversary of the Tree of Life Synagogue Shooting Massacre in Pittsburgh.

This was one of the most meaningful and important discussions in the history of this program, marking the six-month anniversary of the Tree of Life Synagogue Shooting Massacre in Pittsburgh's Squirrel section, on October 27, 2018, which resulted in the deaths of eleven congregants, and the serious wounding of other members, and police officers, who eventually stopped the gunman's shooting spree. Rabbi Hazzan Jeffrey Meyers was conducting Sabbath worship services, when the gunman began his massacre, and helped some congregants to safety. The three congregations that shared the Tree of Life building at Wilkins and Shady Avenues, in Squirrel Hill – Tree of Life, New Light Synagogue, and Dor Hadash - welcomed members of the Charleston, South Carolina Emanuel AME Church, to worship with them and provide support (the weekend that this program aired), as they shared the grief and recovery process that followed mass shootings inside their two houses of worship, driven by hatred by others. They also reflected on yet another hate-driven shooting, inside a San Diego-area synagogue, Chabad of Poway, which took place during a Passover Sabbath worship service, and killed one, injuring the congregation's own rabbi.

Our guests included an expert on the costs of financing higher education, the University of Pittsburgh's Dr. Lindsay Ward, Saleem Ghubril, Executive Director of the Pittsburgh Promise, which has made it possible for thousands of minority and economically challenged students, who qualify academically to go to college, through the awarding of partial scholarships, and State Senator Lindsey Williams (D) PA 37th Senatorial District, a political minority member of the State Senate Education Committee.

The Board of Governors of the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education (PSSHE) recently approved a new tuition policy that will allow Pennsylvania's fourteen state-owned universities more flexibility in determining their tuition rates. Part of that determination will include evaluation of regional differences in household income, the cost of living, and costs of university programs. The President of Indiana University of Pennsylvania, Dr. Michael A. Driscoll, and Dr. Patricia McCarthy, IUP's Vice-President of Enrollment Management, shared their thoughts with Jon Delano about how this new freedom could invigorate programs, and enrollment, at state-owned universities.

5. OPIOD ABUSE

The topic of this category was a discussion on the continuing battle on the federal and state level against opioid abuse.

We talked about the continuing battle on the federal and state level against opioid abuse, which took on new meaning when Attorneys General of different states, including Oklahoma and Pennsylvania, recently filed suit against manufacturers of addictive drugs, like OxyContin. We also discussed the fight against cybercrime, by foreign agents and governments, which affects everything from computer hacking of institutions like banks, to national security, and the conduct of elections.

There is no vaccine against the polio-like Acute Flacid Myelitis (AFM), and measles is spreading in certain communities where individuals, including some with religious or political opposition to vaccination, including measles. Amesh Adalja, MD, Senior Scholar for Johns Hopkins Center for Health Security, who is based in Pittsburgh, talked about all of this with Jon Delano.

7. MANUFACTURING AND JOBS

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on U.S. Steel's investment of one billion dollars to modernize its Mon Valley Works, a discussion regarding Shell and the Community College of Beaver County, who are working together to educate and train students for careers at the new Shell plant in Beaver County, and a discussion on a study that shows that the manufacture of coal still plays a major role in the economy of Southwestern Pennsylvania.

Sara Greenstein - Senior Vice-President, Consumer Solutions, U.S. Steel U.S. Steel Corporation, which has recently been the target of environmental groups' and government complaints about pollution in Allegheny County, after a major fire a few months ago at its Clairton Coke Works, increased the amount of pollution from the plant, recently had some positive publicity about steelmaking in Southwestern Pennsylvania. The company announced that it plans to spend \$1,000,000,000 to modernize its Mon Valley Works, which will include improvements in production that should reduce pollution levels. Allegheny County Executive Rich Fitzgerald and Sara Greenstein, Senior Vice-President of Consumer Solutions for U.S. Steel, joined Jon Delano to discuss the impact the U.S. Steel investment will have on the economy, the Mon Valley, and steel manufacturing, which remains a key part of Western Pennsylvania's economic past, present, and, now future.

This program examined both the problems and promise in the struggle for economic development of Pittsburgh's Hill District neighborhood, in which many residents were displaced in the early 1950's and 1960's for urban redevelopment that did not include housing, businesses, and recreation to directly benefit the people of the Hill District. In our first segment, we looked at some disappointing development attempts, from the Shop 'N Save supermarket, which recently closed, to the closing of recreational and social service facilities, operated by the Hill House Association, which experienced financial disaster and dissolution. The second segment examined a proposal by the Pittsburgh Penguins who own valuable Hill District-Uptown property that used to house the Civic Arena, which was demolished, when the PPG Paints Arena was built, and whether this proposal truly would provide real housing, business development and recreation that would employ people who live in the neighborhood. We also looked at progress in renovating the house in which playwright August Wilson was raised, and attempts to transform it into an art expression area and tourist attraction.

This was an especially uplifting segment, about an economic success story in Homewood-Brushton, a predominantly African-American community, which many residents say has received little, or no financial investment for economic opportunity. The exception is "7800"

Susquehanna" (an address on a street, in Homewood) which once housed a foundry for Westinghouse Electric Company. Matt Madia, Chief Strategy & Development Officer, for Bridgewater Capital, which attracted investment money to launch this facility, talked about what it means to entrepreneurs and business owners, as well as employees, to have a place to house their company, and Nisha Blackwell, Founder of Knotzland Bowtie Company, located at "7800 Susquehanna", described her pride in being able to create her own business, and hire people within her own neighborhood.
