1. TERRORISM

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on the terrorist attack in Paris, France, a discussion on terrorism as it relates to guns and mental illness, and a discussion on the terrorist attack in San Bernardino, California.

Topic: Americans were shocked and saddened to learn of a vicious terrorist attack in Paris, France, calculated shootings, hostage-taking, and suicide bombings in the heart of Paris and the Saint-Denis suburb, which left at least 129-people dead, and more than 350 others injured. Dr. Michael Kenney, a terrorism expert from the University of Pittsburgh's Graduate School of Public and International Affairs (GSPIA), talked about who might be responsible for the attack, and how the attack affected America's oldest ally. One of our guests, French native Christine Frechard, who owns an art gallery in Pittsburgh's Squirrel Hill section, expressed the sentiments of Pittsburgh's small, but tightly-knit French community, and international law expert, Professor Robert Barker, discussed the role of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO), of which the United States is a member, which considers an attack upon one member as an attack against all members.

Topic: During the Thanksgiving Day weekend, we paused to reflect on the series of recent violent terrorist attacks abroad, and multiple stabbing and shooting incidents at home, on campuses, and in schools. We asked Republican Congressman Tim Murphy of Upper St. Clair, from the 18th Congressional District (sponsor of a bill to overhaul the delivery of mental health services in this country and, a psychologist by profession, before his election to Congress), about terrorism, the role of guns, access to guns by the mentally ill, and the breakdown in the treatment of the chronically mentally ill.

Topic: In the latest wave of terrorism, at least fourteen people were killed, and at least seventeen others were wounded, when a heavily-armed couple began firing assault weapons inside a California state social services center's holiday party event in San Bernardino, California. The F.B.I. later said that it was treating this incident as an act of terrorism, as information became available that an employee at the center and his Pakistani-born wife had apparently become radicalized in Saudi Arabia several years ago, and had been acquiring major amounts of sophisticated ammunition and weapons in this country. Our guests talked about how the act could have been planned, how companies and other institutions are relying

more and more on private firms training their own employees for a possible terrorism incident, and how to talk with your children about their fears about terrorism.

2. PRESIDENTIAL CAMPAIGN - 2016

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on the Democratic Presidential debate, and a discussion on Republican Presidential candidate Donald Trump's comments he made, following the attack in San Bernardino, regarding a complete ban against entry by Muslims into the United States.

Topic: The first televised Democratic Presidential debate was conducted without the knowledge of whether Vice-President Joe Biden might still enter the race. After the debate, a short time later, Biden announced that he would not run for President in the 2016 election campaign. Our guests reflected on the debate performances of Democrats Hillary Clinton, Bernie Sanders, Martin O'Malley, former Rhode Island Governor, Senator, and Mayor of Warwick, Lincoln Chafee, and former Virginia Senator Jim Webb (the latter two would shortly drop out of the campaign). The guests also discussed the significance of Vermont Senator Bernie Sanders saying he was tired of hearing about Hillary Clinton's e-mails.

Topic: Republican Presidential candidate Donald Trump caused great controversy this week from comments he made, in reaction to the San Bernardino, California shooting massacre. Trump proposed a complete ban against entry by Muslims into the United States "until our country's representatives can figure out" what is going on. In our first segment, Wasiullah Mohamed, Executive Director of the Islamic Center of Pittsburgh, talked about Pittsburgh's Muslim community of several thousand, and their own reaction to the San Bernardino tragedy and Donald Trump's comments about Muslim entry into this country. In our second segment, Mohamed was joined by former Allegheny County Chief Executive Jim Roddey, Chairman of the Allegheny County Republican Committee, who denounced Trump, and said he did not think Trump would receive the Republican Presidential nomination.

3. PENNSYLVANIA STATE BUDGET

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion regarding the Pennsylvania State Legislature's failure to pass a state budget, and the economic impact that was being felt by school districts, also there was a discussion on the divide in opinion between Democrats and Republicans in the Pennsylvania State Legislature and how it was impacting the passage of the state budget.

Topic: When this broadcast was recorded, the Pennsylvania State Legislature had yet to pass a state budget, and the economic impact was being felt by school districts and students across the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania as the districts were facing the prospect of borrowing money to remain open. Former Pittsburgh city councilman and former Pittsburgh school board member Patrick Dowd, Ph.D., now Executive Director of the non-profit, education advocacy group, Allies for Children, talked about this growing crisis.

Topic: Indicative of the great divide in opinion between Democrats and Republicans, was the refusal of the Speaker of the State House, Republican Mike Turzai, from Marshall Township, to appear together on this broadcast with fellow House member, Democrat Frank Dermody, from Oakmont. That which divided Republicans and Democrats, from taxing to spending, and the future of the state liquor stores, when the broadcast was recorded in the beginning of November, continued to divide the parties in the middle of December as the state remained without a budget agreement, and school districts were contemplating the prospect of closing their doors. Republicans continued to blame Governor Wolf for the impasse, and House Republicans differed with Senate Republicans on two different proposals that emerged to try to end the deadlock.

Topic: Pennsylvania’s state budget crisis continued to drag on, with political gridlock even among members of the same political party, members of the state house and state senate. This program focused on the serious impact that the lack of passing a budget, and delivery of funds is having on both school districts and social services in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. School districts have been forced to borrow money; some districts may have to close schools after the first of the year if no agreement is reached, and some social services programs, for those in greatest need, may have to be cancelled.

4. DRUGS

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on drug abuse in Southwestern Pennsylvania and efforts to educate the public about this growing problem, in addition there was a discussion on efforts in Washington County, Pennsylvania, to combat heroin distribution.

Topic: Drug abuse is now a major social and criminal problem for Southwestern Pennsylvania and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and Pennsylvania's drug overdose rate is higher than the national average. The Commonwealth Prevention Alliance and several other Pennsylvania partner groups are using media savvy to launch the "Stop Opiate Abuse Campaign", an effort to reduce prescription drug abuse and overdoses in the state. Kathrine Muller, Project Coordinator for the Commonwealth Prevention Alliance, and Boom Supercreative's Creative Director, Scot Fleming, appeared on this broadcast to discuss their efforts to educate the public about this growing, life-threatening problem.

Topic: Washington County, Pennsylvania was rocked last summer by a series of deaths related to heroin overdoses. Their district attorney, Eugene Vittone, appeared on this broadcast at the time and pledged action by law enforcement officials to find the source of the drugs, and prosecute those responsible for acquiring them, and distributing them. He returned to this broadcast with a progress report on the efforts of a joint federal/county investigation, which resulted in the arrests of two people for heroin distribution, and the benefits of cooperation between federal and local authorities on an investigation like this.

5. TRANSPORTATION

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion regarding the lack of a regional transportation system from Allegheny to outlying counties, a discussion on the consolidation of the airlines industry in America, a discussion about the official end of US Airways, and a discussion about the changes that are needed to make Pittsburgh streets safer for bicyclists.

There is now a movement towards creating a regional transportation network through a regional transportation alliance, but, how would that work? Chris Sandvig, Regional Policy Director of the Pittsburgh Community Reinvestment Group talked about the goals of this movement

The United States once boasted nine domestic airlines, but now only has four: Delta, Southwest, American, and United.

Topic: Former US Airways employees gathered in Pittsburgh to mark the official end of an era, and an airline, US Airways, now completely incorporated into American Airlines. Veteran flight attendant Doreen Welsh, who survived the legendary “Miracle of the Hudson” – US Airways Flight#1549, which after a multiple bird strike managed to land on the Hudson River, guided by Captain Sully Sullenberger, shared her happy and scary memories of her career as a US Airways employee. She now works as a motivational speaker, and talked about her experiences with the airline.

But the transition hasn’t always been a smooth one, for motorists and bikes. After an October 23rd fatal bicycle accident in Oakland, which took the life of a popular woman administrator at the University of Pittsburgh, who used her bike to commute to work, we talked with bicycle advocates about the changes that are needed to make Pittsburgh streets safer for bicyclists.

Topics discussed in this category included a discussion on new guideline about when women should get a mammogram, and a discussion about how viewing and treating AIDS has changed.

Topic: Women born today have a one in eight chance of being diagnosed with breast cancer at some point in their lives, or almost twelve and a half percent of all women in this country. Women and doctors were confused when the American Cancer Society announced it was changing its guidelines about when women should get a mammogram, upping the age of regular screening from 40 to 45, and recommending that women have mammograms every other year starting at age 55. Our guests included the Chairman of the Allegheny Health Network Cancer Institute, Dr. David Parda, Diana Napper, Founder of the Glimmer of Hope Foundation and Breast Cancer Research Fund at Magee-Womens Institute, Wendie Anderson Berg, MSW, Ph.D., Radiologist at UPMC and a breast cancer survivor herself, and Kathy Purcell, MSW, CEO and Executive Director of Susan G. Komen Pittsburgh, who expressed deep concern over the confusing guidelines, and who recommended that patients have conversations with their own physicians about the best way to respond to the new guidelines.

This is considered the “biggest” expansion of the Pittsburgh AIDS Task Force Initiative in the organization’s history.

Topic: Young and old alike, members of every religious faith, were deeply moved by Pope Francis' visit to the United States, including Washington, D.C., Philadelphia, and New York City. We spoke with Father Terry O'Connor, Pastor at St. Therese Parish, in Munhall, Pennsylvania, and son of the late Pittsburgh Mayor Bob O'Connor, Bob's wife, Judy, and to two students from St. Joseph High School, in Natrona Heights, about what it was like to see Pope Francis in person, and to pray with him. Father Terry helped to celebrate mass on the same stage as the Pope, in Philadelphia (just prior to the Pope's arrival), and students Jacob "Jake" Hayes and Caroline Lindey, from St. Joseph High School, traveled to Philadelphia as part of a group of students, who were able to participate in youth religious events involving Pope Francis.
