SECTION A: NEWSCAST OVERVIEW AND QUARTERLY ISSUES ADDRESSED

WFSC-FM airs four local newscasts during its broadcast day, Monday through Friday at 7:03am, 8:03am, 12:02pm, and 5:02pm, following three to ten minutes of world and national news from ABC Radio News. WFSC reports local and area news events and issues on an ongoing basis.

News Treatments: The nominal length of each of our lead or feature news stories described below is between 30-seconds and one minute 30 seconds.

Some of the issues covered in these newscasts and programs during the **fourth** quarter are as follows:

1-Public Health

News Treatments: Oct 19: Nov 4, 11, 18: Dec 19, 30:

COVID-19 Despite an overall reduction in cases, with the winter season here, the (Coronavirus) pandemic and seasonal flu continues to be a big issue in the news through the fourth quarter and our newscasts informed the public on the spread of COVID-19 at a local level, and provided ways that the community could slow the spread of the virus.

2-Employment

News Treatments: Oct 3: Nov 11,16, 21:Dec 9, 10

The fourth quarter saw some changes in the unemployment rate in Macon, Jackson, and Swain Counties, as businesses continued to recover. We connected listeners to job opportunities and employment resources including local job fairs during some of our newscasts.

3- Education / Schools

News Treatments: Oct 3, 19: Nov 16, 17: Dec 7, 27:

Throughout the fourth quarter discussion on the need for facilities improvements dominated the local school systems. We kept the community informed about any and all potential changes that were made to the local schools as well as curriculum policy changes and other educational information.

4- Public Safety

News Treatments: Oct 6, 11,12, 28: Nov 16: Dec 14, 27, 28, 29

Public Safety continued to be a great concern in the fourth quarter. In the event of serious weather, we kept citizens up to date on hazardous conditions in a timely manner. Throughout the third quarter, We kept citizens informed of weather related hazards and road closures due to mass construction across the region.

5-Critical Information to Citizens

News Treatments: Oct 11: Nov 9, 30: Dec 9, 14, 23

Policies and regulations consistently changed that affected the listening area in the fourth quarter on many issues. We provided critical information not necessarily obtained easily for our listeners. This may include election/voting information, government issues, transportation projects, and new or changing regulations. Issues mentioned during our news casts have an impact to Macon County and its residents, so it is paramount to connect our listeners with what they need to know.

6-Food Insecurity

News Treatments: Oct 21: Nov 22

Food insecurity remained a concern in the community for the fourth quarter, with many in the area struggling with a slow economy, high inflation costs, and children not able to receive lunch at school. We reminded residents about the need in the community to help spur donations to food banks Carenet and The Community Table. We also provided information about events and places residents could check with to get food, as well as the local school system's meal delivery plans.

7-Crime / Police

News Treatments: Oct 5, 12, 21, 26: Nov 10, 15, 16, 24 11, 22, 24: Dec 6, 9, 15, 21,22

The coverage area continued to experience more major crimes through the fourth quarter, along with sentencing for earlier crimes. We kept the community informed of the crimes and sentencing throughout the entire fourth quarter.
