1 King Day 2024

On Monday, Rev. Sharpton and National Action Network honored the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. on what would have been his 95th birthday, with multiple events in several cities. From Washington D.C. to New York City, to Jersey City, NJ., they were joined by federal, state and local elected officials, clergy, celebrities, trailblazers, activists and tomorrow's leaders.

In the nation's capital, Rev. Sharpton, Martin Luther King III and Arndrea Waters King called for change and the preservation of hard-fought civil rights. Vice President Kamala Harris delivered a virtual address at the annual King Day Awards Breakfast. Held at the Mayflower Hotel, the breakfast honored individuals whose work has expanded justice and equality in their respective fields. Honorees included Maryland Gov. Wes Moore, award-winning actress Taraji P. Henson and Tracie Jenkins, award-winning actress and Dean of Howard University's Chadwick A. Boseman College of Fine ArtsPhylicia Rashad (who received the MLK Day Lifetime Service of Excellence in the Arts Awards), and others.

Rev. Sharpton then traveled to New York City for NAN's annual King Day Public Policy Forum at the House of Justice headquarters in Harlem. Everyone from Mayor Eric Adams, Senator Chuck Schumer, New York Attorney General Letitia James, NYC Comptroller Brad Lander, Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins, Manhattan Borough President Mark Levine, Councilman Dr. Yusef Salaam, to NYC Public Advocate Jumaane Williams and others addressed the packed audience. They renewed their commitment towards realizing Dr. King's vision as they laid out the challenges ahead and the work before us in 2024.

Following the forum, Rev. Sharpton was at NAN's King Day celebration in Jersey City, organized by NAN's Northeast Regional Director Pastor Steffie Bartley. This

commemoration featured prominent New Jersey leaders including First Lady Tammy Murphy, Newark Mayor Ras Baraka, former Gov. Jim McGreevey and others. Rev. Sharpton delivered a powerful address where he emphasized the need to continue to fight to ensure that every dreamer has equal access to make their dreams a reality.

And in between NAN's various King Day events, Rev. Sharpton also hosted his daily nationally syndicated radio show, Keepin' It Real, where President Biden joined the broadcast to discuss key issues and policies impacting Black Americans. The President's appearance represented a decades long relationship with Rev. Sharpton, including last year when Biden delivered the keynote address at NAN's King Day Breakfast.

1. <u>Demonstrating for DEI</u>

Each and every Thursday National Action Network leads a protest in front of hedge fund billionaire Bill Ackman's office in Manhattan. This week, they stood alongside 100 Black Men of America and called on the Federal Reserve Bank of New York to remove Ackman from the Investor Advisory Committee on Financial Markets, which advises the New York Fed on financial, economic and public policy matters.

Ackman led a deceitful pressure campaign which resulted in the recent resignation of Harvard President Claudine Gay, the first Black President of the university. Both DEI and affirmative action have been under ongoing attacks from right-wing activists like Ackman. NAN has been educating the public as to the importance of these programs/policies, and leading the charge to defend former President Claudine Gay who became a target of such smears. The weekly protests in front of Ackman's office are designed to hold him accountable and to push for greater protections for DEI.

1. NAN's Annual Convention

It may be January, but Rev. Sharpton and National Action Network are already hitting the ground running prepping for NAN's annual national convention. This year's conference will be held <u>April 10th-13th</u>, once again at the New York Sheraton Times Square Hotel. Sing in Praise of Dr. King

On Monday, Rev. Sharpton delivered a powerful keynote address at the Sing in Praise of King: Celebrating the Life of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. event at Newark Symphony

Hall in Newark, NJ. In addition to Rev. Sharpton, the packed event featured words from Newark Mayor Ras Baraka, a moving choir with Bishop Hezekiah Walker, performances from the Premiere Dance Theater of Montclair, Gospel singer Crystal Aikin and more.

Rev. Sharpton discussed the threats and fears that Dr. King and the King family endured through the years, as well as their remarkable resilience. He reminded everyone of the sacrifices he made, and his commitment towards justice and equality. The 36th annual Sing in Praise of King event was a full house which left everyone feeling empowered. And because the yearly gathering is designed to reflect, unite and uplift one another to continue Dr. King's dream, tickets were free and open to the public. Everyone left the evening with a renewed sense of dedication to the work ahead and our collective vision for a nation that keeps progressing forward.

1. Sustained Protests Outside Ackman's Office

Rev. Sharpton and National Action Network continued leading the fight to protect and preserve Diversity, Equity & Inclusion, otherwise known as DEI. For the fourth Thursday in a row, they protested in front of hedge fund billionaire Bill Ackman's office in Manhattan. They were joined by Arian Simone, CEO of the Fearless Fund and Founder of the Fearless Foundation. Along with other supporters, they chanted loudly in support of DEI, and called out Ackman and his deceitful pressure campaign against Harvard's former President Claudine Gay.

Rev. Sharpton has stood alongside the Fearless Fund and Fearless Foundation ever since they were sued last summer by right-wing groups seeking to diminish their work of empowering women of color entrepreneurs. He and NAN immediately denounced the attacks against them and warned about the greater impact the case would have on the future of DEI. On Thursday, Arian Simone stood in solidarity with NAN to show Ackman and other dangerous forces that they cannot and will not destroy DEI in our schools, the business sector or society in general.

1. The Loss of Dexter King

On Monday, the nation and the world lost Dexter Scott King, the youngest son and the third child of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Mrs. Coretta Scott King. According to the King Center, he transitioned peacefully in his sleep at home, following a valiant battle with prostate cancer. He was only 62-years-old.

At the time of his death, Dexter served as both Chairman of the King Center and President of the King Estate. He in fact devoted much of his life to protect his father's legacy, as well as the intellectual property he left behind. He was named after Dexter Avenue Baptist Church in Montgomery, Alabama where his father served his first pastorate.

1. Women of NAN on Roe v. Wade

As National Action Network continues to lead the way in the fight for civil rights across the board, one of the main battlegrounds is the quest for reproductive justice and equality. On the 51st anniversary of the landmark Roe v. Wade decision this week, the women of NAN released a powerful statement on the profound impact of Roe, on Black women in particular, and the dangers created when the Supreme Court overturned the decision. That statement said in part:

NAN will continue to strategize and organize for effective measures to combat regressive policies designed to hinder reproductive and civil rights. Fighting for reproductive justice will be one of the many pertinent topics addressed at this year's National Action Network convention in April at the New York Sheraton Times Square Hotel. 1. Protesting for DEI

Sharpton and NAN vow to continue the weekly protests until DEI is protected in the workplace, in academia and everywhere.

1. Victims of Navy Federal Credit Union

On Thursday, Rev. Sharpton and National Action Network held a press conference at the House of Justice headquarters alongside attorney Ben Crump and victims of discrimination by Navy Federal Credit Union as they demanded accountability. Recent Navy Federal Credit Union data revealed that they denied Black home loan applications at a rate of 52% and Latino home loan applications at a rate of 44%, compared to just 23% of white applicants.

Even when factors like debt-to-income ratio, down payment percentage and overall income were the same, many disparities were present. Veterans spoke on Thursday at the House of Justice in Harlem about how they were denied loans even when doing everything right. Rev. Sharpton and the attorney general of Black America, Ben Crump, vowed to keep fighting on behalf of such families and individuals until there is justice.

1. Interview with Bill Ritter

Rev. Sharpton sat down with ABC 7 Eyewitness News anchor Bill Ritter for an exclusive interview this week. During Black History Month, Ritter featured Rev. Sharpton for an illuminating conversation about the state of civil rights and his work through the years. Rev. Sharpton discussed the recent loss of affirmative action, voting rights and reproductive rights, and how such losses neutralize the gains of the civil rights movement.

The wide-ranging conversation also covered divisions in society, message for young people and so much more.

1. Celebrating Black History

National Action Network has teamed up with the Congressional Black Associates, Horton's Kids and others for a book reading event during Black History Month. Rev. Sharpton on the World Stage

In the early part of this week, Rev. Sharpton was across the pond in the UK for a multitude of speaking engagements. He led a special presentation and talkback at Homerton College, University of Cambridge with Lord Simon Woolley and students where he discussed his trip to the region 33 years ago when activists asked him for help getting justice for Roland Adams, killed by a white mob. Rev. Sharpton highlighted how Roland Adams' aunt is now a member of the House of Lords in the UK Parliament.

National Action Network's fierce leader also spoke at the 2024 National Church Leaders Forum in London about Black Church political mobilization. He discussed Dr. King's legacy and the Black Church, the pivotal role of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and the importance of the Church as a basis of gathering for the liberation struggle.

At another event at Cambridge Union, Rev. Sharpton delivered powerful opening remarks. He spoke of the seriousness of the moment and how the world will have to decide whether they proceed with autocracy or preserve democracy.

In the midst of all of these major speeches, NAN's founder also delivered opening remarks for a presentation at Oxford Union, where he met with students for a private Q&A beforehand and also participated in a fireside chat. In addition to these appearances, Rev. Sharpton also sat down for an <u>interview with SkyNews</u>, and penned an <u>op-ed for the Guardian</u> about rising racism in both the U.S. and the UK, and the power of the Black vote to stop it.

1. Invocation for Yusef Salaam

Back in the states, Rev. Sharpton delivered a stirring invocation for Exonerated Five member Yusef Salaam, now a member of the New York City Council. He reminded everyone that no matter what they do to you, you can still rise like a Phoenix if you hold on and if you stand tall. Yusef Salaam is a symbol for everyone said Rev. Sharpton.

Rev. Sharpton praised Yusef's mother and said that he was honored to stand with Yusef and fight for justice for the Exonerated Five decades ago and through the years leading up to this momentous occasion.
