## KHKA 1500 AM Honolulu, Hawaii 1st Quarter April – June 2020

- 1. KHKA broadcasts numerous public service announcement throughout the day to benefit local non-profit groups and our community. 501c3 groups as the Hawaii Bowl Foundation, Hawaii Speed and Quickness, and National Kidney Foundation. (schedule of PSA's run are attached)
- 2. KHKA in its television partnership with Hawaii News Now (KGMB, KHNL, K5) simulcasts on radio Sunrise morning show Weekdays from 5am-9am, and its news broadcasts weekday afternoons from 5pm-7pm. These news broadcasts cover many including but not limited to education, economy, agriculture/aquaculture, civil rights, politics, communication, finance, Hawaiian issues, Land Use, homelessness, transportation, and health.
  - a Additionally, special reports featuring press conferences from the governor and mayor were aired on the radio station, courtesy of Hawaii News Now.
- 3. University of Hawaii "Manoa Minutes" are one-minute vignettes about a broad range of issues related to education, teachers, and community at-large. The vignettes are produced by UH News.
- 4. KHKA airs a weekly public affairs program called "American Radio Journal" on Fridays from 11:00 p.m. 11:30 p.m.. These broadcasts cover many issues including but not limited to politics, economics, tax reform, civil rights, communication/social media, education, healthcare, and relief programs. The show ended on May 1. (list of issues on the back of the document)
- 5. On May 4<sup>th</sup>, KHKA rebranded to CBS 1500. The station carries additional news programming, such as the "CBS Evening News with Norah O'Donnell," a re-air of CBS Television's nightly 30-minute news program. The show covers national and global breaking news and other pertinent stories.

## COVID-19

- In partnership with Hawaii News Now, KHKA aired a series of specials titled "Coronavirus: Hawaii's Response," a town-hall style program moderated by Hawaii News Now anchors. It featured guests from government and private sectors. The shows aired on the following dates:
  - o April 14<sup>th</sup> at 9 p.m.
  - o April 22<sup>nd</sup> at 8 p.m.
  - o April 29<sup>th</sup> at 7 p.m.

- KHKA continued to air a series of Sunday specials from CBS Audio, titled "The Coronavirus, Changed Forever." The show ran each Sunday at 5 p.m. until May 17<sup>th</sup>, when it moved to 6 p.m. Show details are as follows
  - APRIL 5 Gil Gross delves into the Medicine, Science, Finance, and Education behind the Coronavirus, talking with global experts in their fields. Gil also speaks with the NFL's James Brown on the closure of sporting events and the magnificent work sports heroes are doing in their communities.
  - APRIL 12: Washington Post chief film critic Ann Hornaday on the runaway hit movie "Contagion". The movie was produced by Larry Brilliant, the guy who helped end the small pox epidemic, to illustrate all the failures that can happen when fighting a pandemic. Major Garrett, CBS Chief Washington Correspondent talks about the White House daily briefings and gives listeners a behind-the-scenes look at what's really going on. Major breaks down the relevant information America is craving during this critical time. Tech journalist from *Recode* exposes scam artists trying to profit from Coronavirus anxiety.
