"60 Minutes" – Sundays at 6 p.m.

April 4th - For generations, William Golding's novel Lord of the Flies has been required reading for high school students around the world. Last year, in the midst of the global pandemic, a 50-year-old survival story not dissimilar to Lord of the Flies resurfaced. This week on 60 MINUTES, Holly Williams reports on the tale of six teenage castaways who survived on an uninhabited island for 15-months.

April 11th - More than a decade after he recorded it and nearly five years after his death, the music of Prince is still vibrant and relevant. 60 MINUTES cameras went to Paisley Park where the late artist kept a vault of unreleased music. They got a preview of songs from the album "Welcome 2 America" which comes out this summer. The music will be played on 60 MINUTES this Sunday for the first time on television when Jon Wertheim reports from Chanhassen, Minnesota just outside Minneapolis

April 18th - For decades, research has shown Black Americans are more prone to serious disease and death than whites in America leading the Centers for Disease Control to declare racism as a serious public health threat. Since the outbreak of the pandemic, communities of color have been hit especially hard, with Black Americans dying of COVID-19 at twice the rate as White Americans. Bill Whitaker reports on the research and the factors that play into its findings this Sunday on 60 MINUTES.

May 2nd - On this week's "60 Minutes," Secretary of State Antony Blinken tells Norah O'Donnell that he will visit Ukraine next week. This comes as Russian President Vladimir Putin has pulled back in the last few days some of the more than 100,000 troops he's amassed at the Ukrainian border. The demand for microchips in the U.S. is growing, but fewer and fewer are being manufactured domestically. Lesley Stahl speaks with Pat Gelsinger, the new CEO of Intel, and Mark Liu, Chairman of TSMC, the Taiwanese company leading the world in advanced chip production. John Dickerson interviews author, John Lewis, about his book, "The Premonition," which follows doctors and scientists who saw the pandemic coming.

May 9th - Anderson Cooper goes inside the dramatic missions to Mars by the tiny helicopter Ingenuity and the rover Perseverance in a report containing extraordinary footage provided by NASA. He reports that their dramatic landing on the Red Planet in February wasn't as smooth as it may have seemed to people watching at home. Cooper's report will be broadcast on the next edition of 60 MINUTES,

May 16th - Former Navy Lieutenant Ryan Graves says he and other members of his F/A-18 fighter squadron detected strange, maneuverable and unidentified objects flying in the restricted airspace southeast of Virginia Beach nearly every day for two years beginning in 2015. The sightings were so common, he says, pilots and their crews began to take them for granted. Graves is calling those objects a threat to security in a 60 MINUTES interview

May 23rd - At over 2000 degrees Fahrenheit, the heat from the incandescent chunks of molten rock hurling out of Iceland's newest volcano can be felt 200 yards away. The non-stop lava fireworks have drawn some 90,000 visitors, including one of Iceland's top volcanologists, Thor Thordarson. Bill Whitaker and 60 MINUTES cameras went to the island nation and his Whitaker's report will be broadcast on the next edition of 60 MINUTES

May 30th - On this week's "60 Minutes," judges say it's time for more security in the face of mounting violence. Bill Whitaker reports. Six years after our initial report, Lesley Stahl visits surviving members of the 90+ Study and finds out what scientists have learned from following the study's participants. And Jon Wertheim interviews pianist Igor Levit.

June 6th - On this week's "60 Minutes," a lack of transparency from Chinese officials and looming geopolitical consequences have damaged the credibility of a WHO-led inquiry into how the virus that causes COVID-19 originated. Lesley Stahl reports. How cybercriminals hold data hostage -- and why the best solution is often paying a ransom. Scott Pelley reports. And eighteen years after declining to take a hard stance in his first profile on 60 Minutes, Sir David Attenborough warns about the dangers of climate change.

June 13th - On this week's "60 Minutes," Scott Pelley reports on how first responders and emergency rooms are changing their protocols regarding mass shootings. Anderson Cooper takes us inside The Clotilda, the wreck of the last ship known to have brought enslaved Africans to America. And Sharyn Alfonsi speaks with the gold medal-winning gymnast Simone Biles.

June 20th - On this week's "60 Minutes," Scott Pelley speaks with Minnesota Attorney General Keith Ellison and the prosecutorial team that convicted Derek Chauvin for the murder of George Floyd. Sharyn Alfonsi profiles the Oath Keepers, the group, which has become a central focus in the ongoing investigation of the January 6 attack on the Capitol. And Jon Wertheim talks to baseball star Shohei Ohtani, who is also been called Japan's Babe Ruth.

June 27th - Brain trauma suffered by U.S. diplomats abroad could be work of hostile foreign government. Scott Pelley reports. Lesley Stahl talks to Ben Ferencz, the last living Nuremberg prosecutor, about his far-reaching message of peace for today's world. Bill Whitaker talks with the host of CBS's "The Late Late Show" about his favorite Carpool Karaoke guest, changing his show due to the COVID-19 pandemic, and his new Netflix project with Meryl Streep.

"Weekend Roundup" – Saturdays at 5 p.m.

April 17th - All 50 states halt the distribution of the Johnson and Johnson vaccine after six women developed blood clots, which resulted in at least one death. Correspondent Allison Keyes speaks with Vanderbilt University Medical Center infectious disease professor Dr. William Schaffner. In this edition of the Kaleidoscope, Allison speaks with Bishop Richard Howell Junior, who has opened the historic Black Shiloh Temple as a "safe space" for people to process their feelings about the Chauvin trial, the police shootings of black individuals, and the protests that followed.

May 15th - A major step in the fight against the coronavirus. Earlier this week, the CDC announced that fully vaccinated people do not have to wear masks outdoors, or in most indoor settings. Allison gets the details from CBS News Medical Contributor Dr. David Agus. The cyber-attack on the Colonial Pipeline has caused gas shortages across the south. CBS's Jim Krasula tells us what he is hearing from drivers. In this edition of the Kaleidoscope, a discussion about mental trauma in the Asian American and Black communities. Allison speaks with University of Albany professor and psychotherapist Dr. Alex Pieterse about what he is hearing from patients.

May 22nd - Confusion over the CDC's latest mask guidance, saying fully vaccinated people do not need to wear face coverings in most settings. CBS News Chief Medical Correspondent Dr. Jon LaPook joins host Allison Keyes to explain.100 year ago, Tulsa, Oklahoma was the scene of one of the worst race massacres in US history. In this week's edition of the Kaleidoscope, Allison speaks with Paul Gardullo, who is a curator at the Smithsonian National Museum of African American History and Culture, who has been working to make sure the nation never forgets what happened.

May 29th - families are taking to the air, roads, and rails to come together for Memorial Day weekend, thanks to the COVID19 vaccines. CBS's Errol Barnett reports. KCBS Radio reporter Tim Ryan has the latest on the San Jose mass shooting, where 9 people and the gunman died. In the Kaleidoscope we hear from 89-year-old former Ambassador and civil rights statesman Andrew Young. Mr. Young was there when Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated and helped draft the Civil Rights Act of 1964 as well as the 1965 Voting Rights Act. He tells Allison how he is feeling a year after the murder of George Floyd.

June 5th - the Department of Justice says it will handle ransomware attacks the same way it tackles terrorism cases. CBS's Jeff Pegues has the latest. During his remarks in Tulsa, where a white mob destroyed the Black Greenwood community, President Biden announced plans to target racism in housing in communities of color. In this week's Kaleidoscope, Allison gets a breakdown from Lydia Pope, head of the advocacy group, the National Association of Real Estate Brokers.

June 12th - President Biden and other world leaders met face to face in England for the G-7 Summit, for the first time since the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic. CBS's Vicki Barker gives Allison the latest from London. On June 19th, 1865, the enslaved people in Texas learned slavery had been abolished two years after President Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation. In the Kaleidoscope, Allison speaks with Greg Carr, the Howard University Chair of the Department of Afro-American studies, who explains the history of Juneteenth, which is now being celebrated across the country. designed to bring young college graduates back to their hometowns to lend their talents to their under-resourced communities.

June 19th - President Biden Thursday signed a bill making Juneteenth a federal holiday. It commemorates June 19, 1865, the day enslaved Blacks in Texas finally learned that they were free. That was more than 2 1/2 years after President Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation. Rep. Sheila Jackson Lee (D-TX), who has long supported this legislation, held the gavel and formally declared its passage in the House. She joins Allison to talk about how she is feeling, and what this means.

May 16th - In an exclusive interview, NIAID Director Dr. Anthony Fauci talks about the new guidance for the fully vaccinated, and the next front in the fight against COVID-19. We'll also here from former FDA Commissioner Dr. Scott Gottlieb. We'll have an exclusive interview with Israeli PM Benjamin Netanyahu amid increasing violence in the region. After a cyberattack on the Colonial Pipeline reveals glaring vulnerabilities in America's critical infrastructure, how do we strengthen our defenses? We hear from former Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency Director Chris Krebs and Intelligence Committee Chairman Adam Schiff. Plus, Senators Joni Ernst and Kirsten Gillibrand tell us about their breakthrough in the push to reform the way America's military handles sexual assault cases.

May 23rd - This week on CBS News' 'Face the Nation', guests include Vermont Senator Bernie Sanders (D), former Defense Sec. Robert Gates and Lt. Gen. Russel Honoré, who is leading the U.S. Capitol Security Review.
