 - a. On November 8th, 2021, KHKA/K272GC entered into a television partnership with KHON-TV, the local FOX affiliate. The radio stations aired KHON2's local morning news show, Wake Up 2Day, from 5-8 a.m., and its sister show, Take 2, from 8-9 a.m. Additionally, special reports featuring press conferences from the governor, mayor, and law enforcement were occasionally aired on the radio station.
3. On May 4th, 2020, KHKA rebranded to CBS 1500. The station carries additional news programming, such as the "CBS Evening News with Norah O'Donnell," a re-air of CBS Television's nightly 30-minute news program. The show covers national and global breaking news and other pertinent stories.
4. Additional news programs include "America in the Morning" (M-F, Midnight-1 a.m. and 2 a.m.-3 a.m. / 1-2 a.m. and 3-4 a.m. when the clocks changed in November).
5. KHKA airs high school sports broadcasts from the Interscholastic League of Honolulu and the Hawaii High School Athletic Association.

“America: Changed Forever” – Saturdays at 4 p.m.

April 15th – Host Jeff Pegues examines the historic indictment of former President Trump with an array of experts, discussing how Trump's popularity with his base increased because of the actions of New York County District Attorney Alvin Bragg; What effect the indictments might have on other pending investigations; and how history may regard the former President if he is found guilty.

May 13th - Jeff Pegues talks with Rep. Tony Gonzales (R-Texas) who represents a district that includes 800 miles of the U.S. - Mexico border. Mario Solis-Marich, Democratic Political Strategist and co-founder of Latino Voter USA. 60 Minutes Sharyn Alfonsi’s interview with Department of Homeland Security head, Alejandro Mayorkas. CBS News’ Manuel Bojoquez and Nicole Sganga report from the border.

May 20th - Jeff Pegues does a deep dive into guns and gun violence in America with an exclusive interview with Steven M. Dettelbach, the newly confirmed Director of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF). Director Dettelbach explains how advances in technology have fueled the rise of untraceable “ghost guns” and illegal gun modifications, what legislators at the federal level must do in order to assist ATF field officers, the struggles local police forces are facing across the country when it comes to tackling gun violence, and how his “small agency, with a huge task” is making the most of its resources to confront the violence facing Americans on an everyday basis.

May 27th - The NAACP has issued a travel advisory for the state of Florida: ""Florida is openly hostile toward African Americans, people of color and LGBTQ+ individuals. Before traveling to Florida, please understand that the state of Florida devalues and marginalizes the contributions of, and the challenges faced by African Americans and other communities of color." Jeff Pegues speaks with NAACP President Derrick Johnson about the controversial advisory. And CBS News Travel Editor Peter Greenberg goes in depth on the challenges of summer travel this year as record numbers of Americans are expected to hit the road and take to the skies. Finally, for the 75th Anniversary of the death of CBS News Radio reporter George Polk, we preview the audio documentary "Who Killed George Polk" with writer, producer, and host, CBS News White House Correspondent Steven Portnoy.

“The Takeout with Major Garrett” – Saturdays at 6 p.m.

April 1st - Major Garrett has breakfast with Rep. Dusty Johnson (R-SD) at the Dubliner Irish Pub and Restaurant on Capitol Hill. They discuss the latest developments with the debt ceiling negotiations and the dwindling legislative options available in preventing more school shootings. Plus: Johnson calls former President Trump a 'divisive figure,' and says he's still letting "things play out" when it comes to deciding which Republican candidate he'll support for the 2024 presidential election.

April 8th - Major speaks with Jay Ellis and David Stassen from the new sketch comedy limited series *History of the World, Part II* over Zoom. Stassen, a writer/producer on the show, explains how actor Nick Kroll ("a nuisance in Hollywood") convinced legendary comedian Mel Brooks to greenlight a sequel to the seminal 1981 feature film. Ellis, an actor who plays Jesus in several sketches, says the environment on set invited "play, improv and ad-libbing," adding an unparalleled level of comfort to the creative process.

May 6th - It was a dizzying week in financial news: the Federal Reserve raised interest rates, the U.S. experienced its second biggest bank collapse ever and President Biden and congressional leaders agreed to meet next week to find a way forward on the debt ceiling. What does it all mean? What’s the state of the post-pandemic economy? We’ve got CBS News Business Analyst Jill Schlesinger to explain it all and tell us about her new book, “The Great Money Reset.” We’re at Junior’s in Times Square.

May 20th - Major sits down with Rep. Nancy Mace (R-SC) inside her office on Capitol Hill. Expected topics: the 12-week abortion ban in Mace's neighboring state of North Carolina, the latest on the debt ceiling negotiations and the Republican congresswoman's ideal 2024 GOP presidential candidate.

May 27th - Major has coffee with Rep. Brendan Boyle (D-PA) at the Dubliner Restaurant on Capitol Hill. They discuss the status of the ongoing debt ceiling negotiations between the White House and Congress. Boyle, the ranking Democrat on the House Budget Committee, says the debt ceiling talks remain "a fluid situation" and despite the House's impending recess, he plans to stay in Washington over the weekend if an agreement is announced.

June 10th - Author and former broadcast journalist **Luke Russert** joins Major at famed Capitol Hill watering hole Tune Inn for a discussion of Russert's new book, "Look for Me There," a memoir about losing his father and traveling the world. Russert recounts advice he got in 2015 from then-**Speaker of the House John Boehner**, who told him to leave network news and explore the world. Stick around for a chat between Major, Russert and Boehner on why the speaker offered that advice and why it was the right call for Russert. Boehner also offers his thoughts on the state of the Republican Party and its frontrunner for president, Donald Trump.

June 17th - The matter of President Biden's age is something he will "have to deal with" on the campaign trail, Sen. Sheldon Whitehouse, Democrat of Rhode Island, said on "The Takeout" this week. Whitehouse, in an interview with CBS News chief Washington correspondent Major Garrett, said he has "very little" doubt that Mr. Biden will be the Democratic nominee in 2024. "There's not even a real alternative on the horizon for him," Whitehouse said. But Garrett pressed him on why he thinks consistent polling data shows at least 40% of Democrats don't want him to run again. "Well, I think we'd certainly — I think everybody would certainly like a younger Joe Biden," Whitehouse said. "I think the people are concerned about an 80-year-old president."

June 24th - Talkin' Politics with Former Maryland Governor Larry Hogan. The Republican former governor of Maryland has a lot to say about the 2024 race for the GOP nomination - a contest he says he will not join. But would he consider a third-party challenge early next year? Governor Larry Hogan sits down with Major on the banks of the South River at Mike's Restaurant and Crabhouse in Riva, MD. Hogan dishes on Trump and the classified documents indictment, why he thinks Ron DeSantis' campaign is off to a rocky start and what election denialism means for the Republican party. Pull up a chair and join us for crabs, hush puppies and good conversation.

“60 Minutes” – Sundays at 6 p.m.

April 2nd - Georgia Republican Rep. Marjorie Taylor Greene, nicknamed MTG, isn't afraid to share her opinions, no matter how intense and in-your-face they are. She sits down with Lesley Stahl. Following his testimony before two Senate committees this week, United States Secretary of Homeland Security Alejandro Mayorkas talks with Sharyn Alfonsi. They discussed the record numbers of migrants trying to cross the U.S. border with Mexico and why he refuses to describe the situation there as a “crisis.” Bill Whitaker explores the discoveries Icelandic scientists have made in forecasting eruptions like we forecast the weather and could apply to similar volcanoes in the United States, Japan, or Russia.

April 9th - Scott Pelley explores images captured by NASA's James Webb Space Telescope, the world's most powerful space telescope. Speaking with astrophysicists and astronomers, Pelley reports on the telescope's discoveries of distant galaxies, including one that's over 33 billion light years away, and an observation that, if confirmed, could upend the belief on how the universe formed and more. In the days of the Roman Coliseum, they called it “Bread and Circuses”—leaders using entertainment to distract citizens from genuine problems. Today, Saudi Arabia is accused of using the same tactic with a different name: “sportswashing.” Is the Kingdom diversifying its economy, as they insist, or covering up human rights abuses and political repression? Jon Wertheim traveled to Saudi Arabia to find out. Four years after the Cathedral of Notre Dame was nearly destroyed by fire, Bill Whitaker returns to Paris to witness the resurrection of the medieval structure and powerful symbol of France.

April 16th – Scott Pelley is given exclusive access to Google's AI lab in London and their Mountain View, California, headquarters as society moves closer to embracing the rapid advancements in artificial intelligence. How quickly machines can learn and teach themselves in the real world, the future of the artificial intelligence revolution, and other questions are discussed during Pelley's interview with Google CEO Sundar Pichai and other senior executives in charge of these systems. The Wager tells the true story of an open-water adventure in the 18th century that turns into a saga of shipwreck, anarchy, betrayal, and murder. Bestselling author and darling of Hollywood developers David Grann sits down with 60 Minutes before the release of his new book.

April 23rd - After catastrophic earthquakes devastated war-torn northwest Syria in February, Scott Pelley travels to the battleground to meet an American medical charity and volunteers for the White Helmets who braved the odds. Pelley speaks with healthcare workers, survivors and first responders about the earthquakes and the constant attacks on healthcare ordered by Syria's Bashar Al-Assad and his ally, Russia's Vladimir Putin. Bill Whitaker meets with Ray Epps and his wife Robyn. Epps is notorious among consumers of right-wing media as the man who initiated the January 6th attack to undermine President Trump. The convoluted theory posits Epps was a secret agent of the “deep state,” and it has been promoted by members of Congress. Death threats and harassment forced Epps and his wife Robyn to sell their Arizona ranch and go into hiding. So who is Ray Epps? Actor Nicolas Cage invites 60 MINUTES into his eclectic Las Vegas home to meet his African crow Huginn and discuss his over 40 years of making movies, including his latest role as Count Dracula in Renfield. Sharyn Alfonsi speaks with Cage about his love of cinema, his wide-ranging catalog of inspiration and the ups and downs along the way.

April 30th - THE DOMINO EFFECT – A woman in the United States is currently twice as likely to die during pregnancy as her mother was a generation ago, indicating that the country is experiencing a maternal health crisis. Sharyn Alfonsi visits Louisiana to report on the state of maternal healthcare in the United States, which has some of the highest maternal mortality rates and where women already face additional obstacles to care due to the state's abortion ban. The producer is Ashley Velie. OUT OF THIN AIR – Carbon dioxide's heat-trapping effects are worse than anyone expected, according to a 2023 United Nations climate report, as oil and gas emissions hit record highs. Bill Whitaker visits Iceland to observe the first commercial direct air capture plant, which could help solve climate change by removing carbon dioxide from the atmosphere and storing it underground. Whether or not a climate disaster occurs depends on how quickly this new industry can expand. Heather Abbott is the producer. AN AMERICAN DOWN UNDER – Mason Cox, the lone American in the Australian rules football league, is the subject of a profile by correspondent Jon Wertheim. Cox, who is nearly seven feet tall, is a native Texan who had never heard of football before moving to Australia to play for the legendary Collingwood Magpies. Jacqueline Williams is the producer

May 7th - A Nebraska middle school's concerns about the safety of its students led to one of the largest investigations into illegal child labor in this country. Scott Pelley reports. Bill Whitaker visits California's massive lithium reserve to see why some are calling this the next phase of the Industrial Revolution. Photographer James Nachtwey has made a career covering the world's most violent conflicts. He tells Anderson Cooper why documenting acts of compassion in the darkest times makes him believe in humanity.

May 14th - A whistleblower says the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints' investment firm has over \$100 billion – more than any religious fund in America. Instead of doing good, the church is bending the law, said a whistleblower. Sharyn Alfonsi reports. With brains six times larger than humans and most of their lives spent in the darkest depths of the ocean, sperm whales are largely misunderstood. Cecilia Vega searches the Caribbean Sea to find these massive mammals. Grammy Award-winning conductor Yannick Nézet-Séguin, is obliterating the stereotype of the strict, unapproachable maestro and reimagining the role of a modern orchestra. He sits down with Jon Wertheim.

May 21st - An investigation exposed that the Pentagon, and taxpayers, get taken advantage of by U.S. defense contractors. Bill Whitaker sits down with a former top contract negotiator who says the accountability system is broken. Cyber con artists are using artificial intelligence, apps and social engineering to scam Americans out of \$10 billion dollars a year. Sharyn Alfonsi reports. Famous for his giant sculptures, Jeff Koons holds the record for the highest price ever paid at auction for a work by a living artist. He shares his next big idea with Anderson Cooper.

May 28th - Once seen as a Cold War relic, Radio Free Europe has become a vital tool in today's battle against disinformation and authoritarianism, especially since Russia's invasion of Ukraine. Bill Whitaker reports. A devastating cyclone and a civil war stood in the way of entrepreneur Greg Carr's effort to save Gorongosa National Park in Africa. "It just makes you more determined," he said. Scott Pelley reports. Rick Rubin is one of the most successful and respected music producers of all time, although he claims to have no technical ability and says he knows nothing about music. Anderson Cooper reports.

June 4th - Sharyn Alfonsi reports on how new legal challenges against Meta, TikTok, YouTube and Snapchat may alter the future landscape of social media. Prince Harry's marriage to Meghan Markle and fractured relationships with members of the British royal family have been the subject of press coverage for years. He speaks with Anderson Cooper about his life and the death of his mother Princess Diana.

June 11th - Scott Pelley is given access to Google's campus in Mountain View, California, and its AI lab in London to examine its new slate of technologies. Anderson Cooper profiles David Byrne, the lead singer and songwriter of Talking Heads, the influential post-punk rock band of the late 1970s and 80s. The band broke up more than thirty years ago, and ever since, Byrne has been on his own eclectic journey blurring the boundaries of music, theater, and art. At 70, he's as creative, energetic, and unusual as ever.

June 18th - Thousands of Ukrainians are being held captive by Russia as prisoners of war, and, according to the UN, many are being tortured. Scott Pelley interviewed three women soldiers who were recently released including a military doctor who was pregnant during captivity. The soldiers share their harrowing, heart breaking and heroic stories of life in prison as well as the first moments of freedom. How close is China on the verge of war with Taiwan? Lesley Stahl visits the island to find out. Jon Wertheim sits down with all four members of the rock band Red Hot Chili Peppers, currently on their biggest tour ever.

June 25th - Scott Pelley reports from Ukraine, where more than 1,000 children are fighting cancer amid Russian attacks on hospitals and the power grid, putting their lives in immediate danger. A renowned American hospital and 21 countries have stepped in to help. Today, Saudi Arabia is accused of using the same tactic with a different name: "sportswashing." Is the Kingdom diversifying its economy, as they insist, or covering up human rights abuses and political repression? Jon Wertheim traveled to Saudi Arabia to find out. Lesley Stahl profiles Hans Zimmer, one of Hollywood's most in-demand composers, who will go on tour this spring to perform new arrangements of his iconic film scores.

"Weekend Roundup" – Saturdays at 5 p.m.

April 15th – host Allison Keyes begins with new details from CBS's Catherine Herridge on the probe into those leaked classified documents at the Pentagon, and the arrest of a suspect. We'll also have the latest battle over abortion rights. In the "Kaleidoscope with Allison Keyes" segment: a discussion about Artificial Intelligence and diversity as Levi's gets a backlash over a decision to use computer-generated models of color rather than hiring real people.

April 22nd - CBS News Weekend Roundup host Allison Keyes gets an update on the shootings of young people who showed up in the wrong place over the past few days, including a Ralph Yarl, the Black teen shot by a White man. We'll have the latest on laws around the nation affecting transgender people. May 20th - host Allison Keyes gets the latest on what lawmakers are thinking about AI from CBS's Scott MacFarlane, and how deeply experts think it may impact everything from schooling to disaster recovery. We'll hear about the drama over the debt ceiling from CBS's Nikole Killion. In the "Kaleidoscope with Allison Keyes" segment, Allison speaks with an activist lawyer about what the nation's newest laws restricting or banning gender affirming care for young LGBTQ people mean for them and their families. CBS's Jim Krasula on the coming demise of the AM radio era. CBS's Tina Kraus on how the Russian war is affecting children in Ukraine. CBS Evening News Managing Editor and Anchor Norah O'Donnell on Armed Forces Day - and her chat with two of the top leaders of the Air Force.

May 27th - Host Allison Keyes honors the fallen for Memorial Day, and has the latest on the holiday travel kicking off the summer season. We remember the mass shooting at Robb Elementary in Uvalde, Texas, and the killing of George Floyd at the hands of Minneapolis police officers.

June 10th - host Allison Keyes gets the latest on the historic indictment of former President Trump from CBS's Nikole Killion. We'll hear about the risks of the dangerous air quality conditions in the nation due to those Canadian wildfires from CBS News Chief Medical Correspondent Dr. Jon LaPook. In the "Kaleidoscope with Allison Keyes" segment, Allison speaks to a LGBTQ+ advocacy group about its declaration of a national state of emergency for that community citing what it calls discriminatory state laws.

June 24th – No episode information given

Face the Nation – Sundays at 6:30 a.m. and 7 p.m.

April 2nd - Face the Nation moderator Margaret Brennan reports the latest on the indictment brought against former President Trump by a grand jury in Manhattan for allegedly falsifying business records, Also, a conversation with Sen. Chris Murphy (D-CT) on gun violence and mass shootings in America. Margaret also speaks with Wall Street Journal editor-in-chief Emma Tucker about American journalist Evan Gershkovich who was detained in Russia this week.

April 16th - Face the Nation breaks down what you need to know about a federal appeals court ruling that kept an abortion pill available with correspondent Jan Crawford, and tackles the politics of the ruling, and the prospects for new gun legislation, with Republican 2024 presidential candidate Asa Hutchinson and Democratic Sen. Mark Kelly of Arizona. Also, Chairman of the House Intelligence Committee Rep. Mike Turner joins the show to discuss the latest in the discord leak of Pentagon secrets and an arrest late this week.

April 23rd - Margaret Brennan covers a daring special forces rescue operation to get American diplomats out of Sudan, where fighting continues as two top generals there jockey for power. Plus: we cover Friday's Supreme Court decision, which preserves access to a widely used abortion pill, for now, while the legal process in the lower courts continues. Also, an exclusive interview with Israeli PM Benjamin Netanyahu.

May 7th - moderator Margaret Brennan and Face The Nation bring comprehensive interviews on the impending end of Title 42 with DHS Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas and Senator Kyrsten Sinema (I-AZ)- plus reporter Nicole Sganga who visited with migrants this week in Texas. Rep. Patrick McHenry (R-NC) joins the show to discuss this week's debt ceiling negotiations between Speaker Kevin McCarthy and President Biden. Also, Face the Nation covers abortion restrictions recently passed in North Carolina with Democratic Gov. Roy Cooper.

May 14th - An expected spike in illegal crossings along the U.S.-Mexico border after the termination of the Title 42 pandemic-era migration control policy earlier this week did not materialize in the immediate aftermath of the policy change- and Face the Nation speaks with three elected officials from Texas who are on the frontlines of the crisis. Also: former SC Gov. and GOP Presidential hopeful Nikki Haley, and Rep. Lauren Underwood (D-IL).

May 21st - The clock is ticking and the first ever default on America's debt may be days away as President Biden rushes home to make a deal. Face the Nation moderator Margaret Brennan interviews Pennsylvania Republican Brian Fitzpatrick and New Jersey Democrat Josh Gottheimer who are working to find a bipartisan compromise. PLUS - The impact of the migration crisis on America's cities. New York's Democratic Mayor Eric Adams and Miami's Republican Mayor Francis Suarez say they are not getting any help from Washington. And a conversation with former Defense Secretary Robert Gates on American power and the cost of domestic dysfunction.

May 28th - House Democratic leader Hakeem Jeffries joins "Face the Nation" to discuss the tentative debt ceiling deal, plus Microsoft president and vice chair Brad Smith discusses the rise of AI.

June 4th - After President Biden signed a bill to raise the debt ceiling, narrowly avoiding America's first default, "Face the Nation" moderator Margaret Brennan interviews two dealmakers, Rep. Garrett Graves (R-LA) and Sen. Joe Manchin (D-WV) on their roles in the process, then asks Bank of America CEO Brian Moynihan to weigh in. Next, CBS correspondents Ed O'Keefe, Caitlin Huey-Burns, and Robert Costa give an update on the 2024 presidential race. PLUS, we hear the latest on the anticipated Ukrainian counteroffensive from Ukrainian Ambassador Oksana Markarova.

June 11th - Former President Trump's federal indictment has shaken up the 2024 race for the White House. Guest moderator John Dickerson speaks with one high-profile Republican who is opting out of the race, New Hampshire Governor Chris Sununu, as well as one who jumped in last week, North Dakota Governor Doug Burgum. Plus, a new CBS News poll takes a look at how voters are reacting to the historic news.

June 18th - CBS' Robert Costa moderates the show as Margaret Brennan reports from Beijing, where Secretary of State Antony Blinken became the first Biden administration cabinet official to travel to China. Blinken set out to ease military tensions between the two countries after two close calls in recent months around Taiwan. Plus, former Attorney General and GOP presidential candidate Chris Christie react to the Trump indictment.

June 25th - There is a lot we don't know about the motivations behind..and the consequences following Wagner group leader Yevgeny Prigozhin's actions in Russia this weekend. What we do know about what one senior administration official calls a "very bizarre episode," is that there seems to be a pause, at least for now, due to a truce struck between Vladimir Putin and Prigozhin that was brokered by the President of Belarus, a Putin ally. The terms of that deal are still emerging, but even after Prigozhin abruptly stopped his march to Moscow yesterday, there remains trepidation about the risks ahead on this unpredictable path for Russia, which holds the world's largest nuclear arsenal. April 2nd - Today we're taking a deep dive into a former SEALs Journey with psychedelic therapy and how it inspired him to create a wellness software company that is proving to have incredible success. We begin with a look at this SEALs stellar career, and how beneath the surface there was far more than meets the eye.

April 16th - We examine a landmark medical malpractice case that reveals how a Special Forces soldier is having to fight cancer and The Department of Defense. Army Master Sgt. Richard Stayskal was diagnosed with lung cancer by a civilian doctor, but Stayskal shares how the Army first saw a mass in his lung and did not notify him or immediately begin treatment. We hear how together with his attorney Natalie Khawam, he first had to overcome a 70-year-old legal precedent which prohibited service members from making malpractice claims against the DoD.

April 23rd - When Service members retire from the military, they are entitled to both retirement pay from the Department of Defense (DoD), and disability compensation from the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) if they were injured. Unfortunately, due to current laws, over 42,000 veterans are unable to fully collect both benefits at the same time. USMC combat vet Cole Lyle is fighting to change that.

April 30th - This week we're hearing from 3 veterans who are changing lives. Eric Brew a Marine Copts and Army vet now helps his fellow vets get connected with Fortune 500 executives who deliver year-long mentorships. And how many of these mentors become lifelong friends. We also hear from Dr. Xavier Bruce, a former USAF Officer who created a powerful program to help veterans overcome the stress, depression and anxiety associated with all types of life transitions. And we talked with Marine Corps veteran Kimberly Blanke, who offers fascinating jobs working with historical artifacts, and shared how this work can open doors to new careers.

May 7th - We start with an update on the medical malpractice case of Special Forces Master Sgt. Richard Stayskal. After our recent podcast about his cancer diagnosis and denied claim, we share the Army's response to our follow up questions. Then we hear from Dr. Shauna Springer, one of the nation's top authorities on overcoming trauma and working with military vets. Her book, "Warrior," calls out the mental health industry and reveals surprising new ways to look at treating depression, PTSD, and the mental health crisis in America. Combat veteran and journalist Matt Saintsing recently revealed on social media that he has been diagnosed as bi-polar. Saintsing talks about how he discovered his condition, how he's treating it, and can he still drink beer?

May 14th - Today we'll hear how Marine Corps combat veteran Byron Rodgers went from combat to becoming one of the nation's most elite Executive Protection Specialists. More than just bodyguards for high-net-worth individuals like Hollywood celebrities and corporate execs, Rodger's work has taken him across the globe to provide complex security details in the most dangerous environments.

May 21st - Many veterans have heard the window for filing their toxic exposure claims is closing soon. We talked about this rumor with Army combat veteran and VA Press Secretary, Terrence Hayes who shared how vets will always be entitled to their service-related care and benefits, but vets who file now may be able to receive more money.

May 28th - We talk with acclaimed actor and veteran philanthropist Gary Sinise. He's best known for his role as Lt Dan in Forrest Gump, but for years he's also been the host of the National Memorial Day concert. We talked about the concert and the incredible projects he's working on to support our wounded vets. Plus, the real-life veterans that inspired his portrayal of Lt. Dan in the award-winning film Forrest Gump. Carry the Load is a national relay to raise awareness for our fallen heroes and features teams who walk across 48 states and cover 20,000 miles. We talked about it with Navy SEAL veteran and co-founder Stephen Holley and Army veteran, JP Morgan Chase Director of Military and Veteran Affairs, Mark Elliott. They share tales from the walk, personal memories A powerful segment on what this weekend is all about. We discuss the special ways three veterans honor their fallen brothers and sisters. Guests; Navy SEAL veteran Jonathan Wilson, Army combat veteran and Military Matters podcast host, Rod Rodriguez, and Army veteran and CEO of Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans of America, Allison Jaslow.

June 4th - This weekend thousands will gather in DC and walk the city streets all night, to raise funds for the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention. Among those walking in the "Out of the Darkness; Overnight Walk" will be Air Force veteran Joan Pauling who shares her story. Pauling also shares how this all-night event was the first step on her journey to healing. More with Air Force veteran Joan Pauling including a detailed discussion about how AFSP helps veterans. Plus, how even people who appear to have it all together may be silently dealing with a mental health issue. Can addictions, depression and suicide be cured at the beach? Army vet and clinical therapist Tamara Evans talks about Transformation Treatment Centers in Delray Beach, Fl., and their new program "Help for Our Heroes". It's designed to help vets, cops, firefighters, and nurses overcome alcohol/drug addictions, PTSD and the suicide crisis in America.

June 11th - On today's show we remember and honor the combat veteran, hip hop artist Doc Todd, whose life was cut short after a heart attack last month. George Michael Todd went by "Mik" but he was known to the rap world as "Doc Todd". Doc, a nickname for all Navy Corpsman, who are the first to respond to Marines and soldiers injured on the battlefield. He was a big bear of a guy, who instantly made you feel good. Our friendship lasted several years, and over the course of several interviews he shared the combat and post military experiences that shaped his acclaimed album "Combat Medicine".

June 18th - This week we will focus on an incredible story of fatherhood, and its connection to veterans, PTSD, and mental health. Our guest is Patrick Smithwick, a devoted father and author of the new book "War's Over Come Home". It's the story of the ongoing quest to find his Marine Corps, combat veteran son, Andrew, who is currently roaming the country, homeless and fighting severe mental illness. We'll hear how his son's transition slowly went off the rails. And how his combat related PTSD may have played a pivotal part in his son's decision to leave reality behind and live life on the streets.

June 25th - Maddie Smith is an Army Ranger spouse, and her story is one that even the most hardened combat veterans will find inspiring. She faced severe alcoholism, postpartum depression, and crippling anxiety. We hear how her struggle with the bottle began, and how it almost drove apart her family.
