Her powerful description of those days and her life afterward shows the courage and strength of our military veterans. Veterans finding great jobs through the "Hiring Our Heroes; Fellowship Program" with Army veteran Geralyn (Jera'Lynn) Hall.

"60 Minutes" - Sundays at 6 p.m.

October 3rd - A former Facebook employee says tens of thousands of pages of internal company research she has provided to the Securities and Exchange Commission prove Facebook is lying to the public and investors about the effectiveness of its campaigns to eradicate hate, violence, and misinformation from its platforms. That former employee, who anonymously filed the complaints with federal authorities against Facebook last month, will reveal her identity and speak her mind

October 10th - The Biden Administration officials tasked with reuniting migrant children and parents separated over three years ago at the border have managed to reunite just a fraction of the more than a thousand families estimated to still be apart. With little or no record keeping of the separations during the Trump Administration, and problems finding many parents in Central America, the task force has reunited just 52 families after seven months of effort. Sharyn Alfonsi speaks to the head of the task force and to a Salvadoran family caught up in the chaos

October 17th - Anderson Cooper talks to former defense secretary and CIA head Robert Gates, who touched on several other topics -- including the rise of China and the limits of America's military. Bill Whitaker reports on the Green River Drift, where ranchers push thousands of cows along the same 70-mile route their ancestors pioneered 125 years ago. And Jon Wertheim travels to Great Britain to report on the future of England's pubs -- after the coronavirus pandemic closed them to close their tabs for more than a year.

October 24th - Actor Michael Keaton has impressed audiences and critics for four decades in a variety of roles in films that have grossed billions. He's known for his range of roles, but says range isn't defined by the different characters he plays but by the range within each one. Keaton speaks to Jon Wertheim about his craft, his career and his latest role as a rural doctor overwhelmed by Oxycontin

October 31st - The future could see the world's human data, delivered through the rising power and reach of artificial intelligence, in the hands of a powerful few - a recipe for a dystopian tomorrow populated by "hacked humans," says Yuval Noah Harari. The world-renowned author tells Anderson Cooper nations must begin cooperating to prevent this by regulating artificial intelligence and the collection of data across the world. And Harvard-trained architects create a new model of building designed to serve communities and the lessons learned on a project in Rwanda.

November 7th - A foundation set up by steel magnate Andrew Carnegie has been recognizing and rewarding heroes since 1904. Thousands have been honored as "Carnegie Heroes." Scott Pelley interviews Carnegie Hero Fund awardees and reports on brain characteristics such individuals seem to share that could be a possible marker for bravery in human beings.

December 12th - When the U.S. military pulled out of Afghanistan in August, the Taliban immediately seized control and the international community acted quickly – freezing Afghan assets and foreign aid to pressure the Taliban to negotiate. To date, those negotiations haven't happened. Today, 38 million Afghans find themselves facing one of the worst humanitarian crises on the planet. Sharyn Alfonsi traveled to Afghanistan to discuss the crisis with one of the new Taliban ministers, talk with suffering families and meet with the humanitarian groups who have been left to pick up the pieces and negotiate with the Taliban to avert a global catastrophe.

December 19th - Scott Pelley travels to Kentucky to talk to survivors, local weather people and national scientists to find out what made this set of storms so deadly. Bill Whitaker reports from Lowndes County Alabama to find out who is responsible for why so many poor, and predominately African American families, live without plumbing. And Lesley Stahl profiles comedian Trevor Noah of the Daily Show who believes that some of his American success can be traced to being a foreigner/outsider.

December 26th - Global rising temperatures are shaking up much of the wine industry, from the grape's growth cycle to, in some cases, how wine tastes. Lesley Stahl travels from France to Great Britain to document how famous wine-growing regions, like Champagne, France, are being impacted. Jon Wertheim, talks with Chinese dissident artist Badiucao about criticizing the Chinese regime and his life in exile.

October 2nd - There's a new oral medication to fight Covid-19. It's developer, Merck, says it can cut the risk of death or hospitalizations in half. CBS News Medical Contributor Dr. David Agus spoke with CBS Mornings. After a week where President Biden's agenda was stalled by infighting among Democratic lawmakers, his popularity is taking a hit. CBS News White House Correspondent Steven Portnoy joins Allison to explain. In this week's Kaleidoscope, Allison is joined by Paul Gardullo, Smithsonian historian and curator of the National Museum of African American History. He talks about the museums exhibition, "Make Good the Promises," which looks back at the Reconstruction era, the period after the Civil War, and what happened with Blacks and their quest for freedom.

October 16th - An FDA advisory panel approved Covid-19 booster shots for both Moderna and Johnson & Johnson. At the same time President Biden is trying to mitigate inflation and high prices partly driven by gridlock at the nation's ports. Allison gets the latest on what the president has to say about all of this from CBS's Ed O'Keefe. CBS News Business Analyst Jill Schlesinger discusses the inflation problem with Allison. CBS's Alex Tin has the latest on the decision from the FDA advisory panel. But, CBS's Meg Oliver reports from Montana, that the coronavirus is surging in rural America. The White House says it will lift travel restrictions for fully vaccinated foreign nationals on November 8th for both air travel and land borders. CBS's Adrienne Bard in Mexico City says that announcement hit close to home. There's new guidance from experts on how millions of Americans use aspirin. CBS's Dr. Tara Narula reports. The late Henrietta Lacks, a Black woman at the center of some of the most extraordinary discoveries in medical science, is finally being honored by the World Health Organization for research using her cells without her knowledge or consent. CBS's Elaine Cobbe reports. Kean University in New Jersey is known as one of the top ten most diverse facilities in the Northern U-S. CBS's Lisa Mateo tells us its president moved to make sure the staff reflected the student population. In this week's Kaleidoscope, Allison is joined by Taisha Saintil at the non-profit Haitian Bridge Alliance. She discusses the plight of Haitian migrants trying to make their way from South America to the U-S to seek asylum. Thousands who camped under a bridge on the Southern border are gone -- many of them sent back to Haiti with limited housing, food and water. The actor who played Star Trek's Captain James T-Kirk finally went to space for real. CBS's Peter King tells us it blew William Shatner's mind. CBS's Elise Preston has a story that sounds like a Disney movie, involving a Montana Park Ranger, a little girl and her bear. Finally, Chicago legend, historian and activist Timuel Black, died this week at the age of 102. Allison talks to Chicago Sun-Times Reporter Maudlyne Ihejirika about the life of an elder statesman -- mourned by many, including former President Barack Obama.

October 30th - President Biden meets with Pope Francis as part of his busy schedule at the G-20 Summit. This comes as he fails to win Democratic support on his \$1.75 trillion dollar Build Back Better plan. CBS's Ed O'Keefe has the latest. Another step Friday made towards vaccinating 28-million kids against Covid-19. Children between the ages of 5 and 11 could start getting shots as early as next week, if the CDC signs off on smaller doses. CBS's Janet Shamlian reports. In 1955, Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat to a white man on a segregated bus in Alabama. Parks was widely celebrated as the "mother of the civil rights movement." However, nine months earlier, Claudette Colvin was arrested for the same thing. On this week's Kaleidoscope, Allison speaks with the now 82 -year-old Ms. Colvin, who is seeking to clear her name.

November 13th - Public health experts are warning a new surge of Covid-19 cases is set to hit around Thanksgiving. Cases are up in at least 35 states. This even though the Biden Administration says its vaccine program for children ages 5 through 11 is off to a strong start. The Labor Department says inflation has hit a 31-year high, with prices skyrocketing at more than double the rate we've seen in recent decades. In the Kaleidoscope, we are commemorating Native American Heritage Month. This week, as world leaders wound down that UN Climate Summit in Scotland, some 3.7 (M) million Native American and Indigenous people around the nation are facing direct threats to their land and culture over everything from rising waters and temperatures to glacier melt. Allison speaks with the Quinault Nation's senior planner, Kelsey Moldenke, about the risks people there are facing.

November 20th - The federal government is expanding access to Pfizer and Moderna Covid-19 booster shots for all adults, as some states are already doing so amid an increase in hospitalizations among vaccinated people, often those who have not yet had a third dose. CBS News Medical Contributor Dr. David Agus joins Allison with what this means. President Biden says he stands by a Wisconsin jury's decision to acquit Kyle Rittenhouse of all charges for the shooting deaths of two men and the wounding of another during a night of violent protests over the police wounding of a Black man. CBS's Michael George. n the Kaleidoscope, we commemorate National Hip Hop History Month. We reached out to Barry Mayo, a legendary programmer who rose to general manager at New York's KISS-FM and then to ownership of what became the 12-station network Broadcast Partners, Inc. Many think Mayo was the first to play rap on the radio at KISS, but he tells Allison it is a little more complicated than that.

November 27th - On the Weekend Roundup, we'll bring you the latest in the trial of the men accused of murdering Ahmaud Arbery. As President Biden pushes to get the Senate to pass his Build Back Better Plan, his approval ratings are down. We've got the hottest tech gifts for the holidays. And, adult advent calendars are a big deal this year and boozy!

December 4th - The Covid-19 Omicron variant is now in the US and President Biden is outlining plans for the nation to slow the spread. But many parents still worry about how to keep their children safe. Pediatric infectious disease specialist Dr. Ruth Kanthula joins Correspondent Allison Keyes and has advice for protecting our families. In this week's Kaleidoscope, we sit down with Rev. Dr. Cassandra Gould, the Executive Director of Missouri Faith Voices, to discuss the disproportionate toll student loan debt has on Black students.
