The radio stations aired KHON2's local morning news show, Wake Up 2Day, from 5-8 a.m., and its sister show, Take 2, from 8-9 a.m. Additionally, special reports featuring press conferences from the governor, mayor, and law enforcement were occasionally aired on the radio station.
3. On May 4th, 2020, KHKA rebranded to CBS 1500. The station carries additional news programming, such as the "CBS Evening News with Norah O'Donnell," a re-air of CBS Television's nightly 30-minute news program. The show covers national and global breaking news and other pertinent stories.

The Iowa Caucuses will be held on Monday, January 15th, 2024. Caucuses across Iowa will convene at 8:00 PM Eastern. CBS News Radio will be in Des Moines and will provide LIVE special news coverage.

Tuesday, January 23rd – New Hampshire Presidential Primary (2-4 p.m. HT)

The New Hampshire Primary will be held on Tuesday, January 23rd. CBS News Radio will have Correspondent Matt Pieper in Manchester providing Special Coverage leading up to and including primary night. Wednesday morning we'll have the latest analysis from CBS News' Political team. As part of our anchored coverage, we'll be joined by American University's Executive Director of the Sine Institute of Policy & Politics, Amy Dacey.

Thursday, March 7th – State of the Union Address (3-6:20 p.m. HT)

President Joseph Robinette Biden Jr. delivers the State of the Union to a Joint Session of Congress on Thursday night, March 7th, 2023. CBS News Radio will provide live radio coverage. Correspondent Steve Kathan anchors our coverage joined by White House Correspondent Linda Kenyon, Reporter Stacy Lynn on Capitol Hill, CBS News Business Analyst Jill Schlesinger and a variety of CBS News Correspondents and consultants.

“America: Changed Forever” – Saturdays at 4 p.m. (The show was discontinued on March 17th)

January 27th – In the wake of Donald Trump's decisive victory in the New Hampshire Republican primary, the GOP nomination for president seems to be his for the taking. Eugene Scott from Axios gives host Jeff Pagues a play-by-play analysis of what we can expect to see in South Carolina. And Scott explains why South Carolina Senator Tim Scott will NOT be the former President's running mate despite his key endorsement of candidate Trump in his home state. And, both violent and deadly crimes in the United States dropped significantly in 2023. Adam Gelb, founder, president and CEO of the Council on Criminal Justice, explains why we are seeing record-setting declines in homicides in America. Then we say farewell to CBS legendary Journalist and former host of Sunday Morning Charles Osgood, with Jane Pauley paying tribute to his life and legacy.

February 3rd – No show information available

February 10th - CBS News correspondent and host Jeff Pagues speaks with: Former US Attorney for the Eastern District of Michigan, Barbara McQuade, to give a wrap up of the Supreme Court news of the week regarding Trump's eligibility on the Colorado primary ballot. Alex Thompson of Axios breaks down how the Trump campaign is bracing for the former president to potentially be convicted of a crime and which of those trials loom largest for the campaign. Finally, we have Miriam Vogel, President and CEO of EqualAI, to discuss the state of artificial intelligence and the potential biases and risks that come along with this emerging technology.

February 24th - host Jeff Pegues revisits his reporting from the Eradicate Hate Summit in Pittsburgh as we examine the disturbing rise in mass shootings and targeted violence in America. We will hear from Department of Homeland Security Alejandro Majorkas in an exclusive interview with Jeff Pegues. Majorkas calls extremist violence the top threat to the safety and security in the United States.

“The Takeout with Major Garrett” – Saturdays at 6 p.m.

January 27th - Director and writer Michael Kirk joins Major this week to talk about his upcoming FRONTLINE documentary, "Democracy on Trial," which premieres on January 30th across all PBS stations and streaming on demand and YouTube. The film explores January 6th and the Congressional hearings investigating the insurrection, and the criminal cases against former President Trump.

March 30th - we focus our attention on the new nine-part Netflix documentary series Turning Point: The Bomb and the Cold War, which offers viewers a comprehensive look at the Cold War and its aftermath. Major chats with Turning Point director Brian Knappenberger, an accomplished documentary filmmaker whose team conducted over 100 interviews with a variety of subjects: survivors of the atomic blasts in Hiroshima and Nagasaki, current or former world leaders and many other key figures of the Cold War era.

“60 Minutes” – Sundays at 6 p.m.

January 14th - With hybrid work hardening from trend to new normal, correspondent Jon Wertheim looks at the crisis in commercial real estate, specifically in New York City's office sector. As occupancy rates have hit historic lows and interest rates have spiked, the value of office buildings is tanking. It's a growing problem nationwide, with more than a trillion dollars in commercial real estate loans set to expire in the next two years. Wertheim speaks with industry players about how they're staying afloat in a sector of the economy that's been rocked to its foundations. Correspondent Sharyn Alfonsi reports on a groundbreaking approach to brain surgery that could revolutionize the treatment of Alzheimer's disease and drug addiction without any incisions. Alfonsi follows neuroscience pioneer Dr. Ali Rezai for more than a year as he tests experimental procedures at the Rockefeller Neuroscience Institute in Morgantown, West Virginia. The results of Rezai's clinical trials are changing the lives of his patients and may offer hope to others suffering from brain disorders.

January 28th - Cecilia Vega interviews the woman charged with reforming the Federal Bureau of Prisons, director Colette S. Peters, as her agency is facing a major staffing crisis, aging, and deteriorating prison infrastructure and an alarming pattern of abuse that has persisted for years. Interpol, responsible for coordinating worldwide police cooperation, has come under some fire. Some members are accused of abusing its red notice system. Bill Whitaker speaks with Interpol's Secretary General Jürgen Stock. Pat Craig, founder of The Wild Animal Sanctuary in Colorado, has emerged as the go-to guy for orchestrating high-stakes animal rescues around the world. Jon Wertheim reports on Craig's most ambitious mission yet.

February 4th – Following the Federal Reserve’s announcement to hold interest rates steady, correspondent Scott Pelley interviews Fed Chair Jerome Powell in Washington, DC on inflation risks and the economy, the timeline for cutting rates, the health of the country’s banks, and more. Correspondent Sharyn Alfonsi reports on the fastest growing group entering the U.S. through the southern border – Chinese migrants. Alfonsi speaks with the migrants about following instructions posted on TikTok that guided them on their 7-thousand mile journey to the California desert where Chinese asylum seekers cross the border from Mexico through a 4-foot gap in the border fence. Technology has helped spur a sports betting boom. Correspondent Jon Wertheim examines what this has meant for sports fans, betting companies, and the gamblers – overwhelmingly young men – making snap bets anytime, anywhere.

February 18th - As tensions continue to escalate in the Middle East and the Iran-allied Houthi militia launch strikes against commercial and U.S. Navy ships in the southern Red Sea, Norah O’Donnell was the first journalist to report from the region in the air, on the water, and inside the 5th Fleet’s Command Center at Naval Headquarters in Bahrain. O’Donnell speaks with the Deputy Commander of U.S. Forces in the Middle East, Vice Admiral Brad Cooper and other Navy officers about a new kind of warfare on the high seas involving anti-ship ballistic missiles, as well as the disruption of international shipping traffic and whether an endgame is in sight. In the aftermath of President Joe Biden’s victory in the 2020 presidential election, Republicans in seven states where he won, including Wisconsin, banded together and cast fake electoral votes for Donald Trump. Correspondent Anderson Cooper reports on Wisconsin’s fake presidential electors and interviews Andrew Hitt, an attorney and former GOP state chair, who claims he and his fellow fake electors were tricked into signing the documents. Special Counsel Jack Smith alleges the fake votes were part of a plan, orchestrated by Donald Trump and conspirators, to try to overturn the election. Ahead of the 96th Academy Awards, correspondent Scott Pelley joins enigmatic actor Cillian Murphy in Ireland for a candid interview since being nominated for Best Actor in the blockbuster film *Oppenheimer*. Pelley talks to the Oscar front-runner about how he transforms for roles, his secret to maintaining a low profile and more.

February 25th - For nearly five months, Israeli forces have unleashed unrelenting airstrikes and a heavy ground offensive inside Gaza - decimating cities and displacing more than a million - all in response to the October 7th terror attacks by Hamas. It’s been reported that more than 29-thousand Palestinians have died. Correspondent Sharyn Alfonsi reports on the ongoing war and what’s been happening inside Gaza’s collapsing humanitarian aid and healthcare system. Through CBS-shot footage and first-hand accounts of an American doctor and aid worker inside Gaza, Alfonsi offers a rare window into the dire situation that international journalists have been barred from independently covering inside the 25-mile-long enclave. Correspondent Lesley Stahl reports from China as one of the few Western journalists to enter the People’s Republic since 2020, when the Chinese government under the direction of President Xi Jinping expelled some journalists and restricted access to others in the foreign media. Stahl interviews U.S. Ambassador to China Nicholas Burns on the contentious U.S.-China relationship, American and foreign investment in the wake of expanded espionage laws and intellectual property theft under Xi and the state of China’s floundering economy as its population ages and shrinks. Stahl also reports on the mood of the country after its oppressive zero-COVID policy.

March 3rd - After President Biden and former President Trump's visits to the Texas-Mexico border this past week, correspondent Cecilia Vega reports from Eagle Pass, Texas, where she interviewed Governor Greg Abbott. The governor's controversial border enforcement effort, known as Operation Lone Star, has led to a showdown with the federal government.

Correspondent Scott Pelley reports on the battle to ban 97 books in one South Carolina public school district and the role played by the national movement for "parental rights" inspired by a group called Moms for Liberty. The group says it is "fighting for the survival of America" but the book banning attempt was met with strong opposition in Beaufort, South Carolina. Bill Whitaker reports on NASA's plans to send Americans back to the moon with hopes of building a lunar outpost and traveling onward to Mars. With a stated target date of late 2026, Whitaker reports from Kennedy Space Center, interviews NASA's top watchdog, and visits one of its contractors, Blue Origin, where he asks tough questions around costs and timeline as they work towards this historic undertaking.

March 10th- Rise, Jeff Koons, The Last Minute

March 17th - Vladimir Putin has killed nearly all internal opposition to his unprovoked war in Ukraine. Tonight, Scott Pelley travels to a foreign city that's become a haven for courageous Russians defying Putin and speaking out. It's something no one else has tried and perhaps only she could pull off. Jennifer Thompson, a rape victim, is bringing together crime survivors and people who were wrongfully convicted.

March 31st - In the fourth installment of a five-year investigation into potential attacks on American government officials and a condition, known as Havana Syndrome, correspondent Scott Pelley reports on the intriguing case of an FBI official who says she was targeted inside the U.S., and on new information about the Pentagon's global investigation into these mysterious incidents. For the first time, sources tell 60 Minutes they have evidence that a U.S. adversary may be involved. Bill Whitaker reports from the chaotic and high-speed racetrack of "America's original extreme sport" - Indian Relay. As horse nation tribes unite for an exciting and dangerous bareback horse race, Whitaker looks at how the sport continues to grow and offer new opportunities of pride to the next generation of Native American youth.

"Weekend Roundup" – Saturdays at 5 p.m.

January 27th – host Allison Keyes gets the latest on the situation with Boeing and its safety issues from CBS's Kris Van Cleave. We'll hear about what's next as the 2024 presidential election heats up. In the Kaleidoscope with Allison Keyes segment, a discussion about the case of Brittany Watts, the Black Ohio woman who was charged with a felony after having a miscarriage at home. Featured: CBS's Jim Krasula on the passing of a civil rights lion.

February 3rd - host Allison Keyes gets the latest on jobs, and the economy from CBS News Business Analyst Jill Schlesinger. We'll hear about a raucous hearing on Capitol Hill on social media safety and kids. In the "Kaleidoscope with Allison Keyes" segment, a discussion about a move to hasten the return of Indigenous American artifacts and remains in the nation's museums to tribes.

February 24th – "host Allison Keyes has details and fallout from CBS's Ed O'Keefe after the Alabama State Supreme Court rules that frozen embryos are the legal equivalent of children. CBS's Jo Ling Kent on a massive AT&T outage. In the "Kaleidoscope with Allison Keyes" segment, a discussion about an online show using comedy to tackle a public health crisis.

March 23rd - host Allison Keyes gets the latest over the shocking cancer diagnosis for the Princess of Wales. A look at a Texas law allowing state law enforcement to arrest people they think have crossed the border illegally. In the "Kaleidoscope with Allison Keyes" segment, a look at a new study about the trouble navigating care for both healthcare workers and those caring for people with dementia.

Face the Nation – Sundays at 6:30 a.m. and 7 p.m.

January 7th - We traveled to the U.S.-Mexico border for a firsthand look at what a growing number of Americans are calling a “crisis.” We share our conversation with the new Speaker of the House Mike Johnson at the border. As the Iowa caucuses approach, Republican presidential candidate Gov. Ron DeSantis shares his vision for how he would handle the border if elected. On the third anniversary of the January 6 attack on the Capitol, Liz Cheney reflects on that day and the current state of the Republican party. Plus - Sen. Chris Van Hollen joins us live from Amman, Jordan where he tells us about his visit to the Middle East.

January 14th - it's Iowa Caucus Eve, but the traditional presidential campaign kickoff this year is anything but. In 2024, the starting line on the road to the Republican nomination is an icy one with subzero wind chill temperatures predicted for Monday's Iowa Caucuses. But with the once robust GOP field shrinking, few candidates are still committed. We'll have some striking insights into voters' thoughts on the frontrunner's rhetoric and his policies. We'll have expert analysis from our CBS News political correspondents and Amy Walter of the Cook Political Report. We'll talk to GOP presidential contender and former Arkansas Governor Asa Hutchinson about his ongoing campaign and New Hampshire Governor Chris Sununu on the momentum behind his preferred candidate, former South Carolina Governor Nikki Haley. West Virginia Democrat Joe Manchin also joins us. Finally, White House National Security Council coordinator John Kirby about the escalation of tensions in the Middle East and the growing controversy over Defense Secretary Lloyd's Austin's secret hospitalization.

January 21st - we go to Michigan to speak with Gov. Gretchen Whitmer about the 2024 presidential race and Biden's handling of reproductive rights. With the polls opening in New Hampshire this week, we ask former U.N. ambassador Nikki Haley about the state of the Republican race. On the anniversary weekend of the Roe v. Wade decision, we talk to Arkansas Gov. Sarah Huckabee Sanders about abortion access in her state and her tenure as the nation's youngest governor. Plus – we talk to Michigan voters who will play a key role in the 2024 election.

January 28th- we speak to Sen. Jim Lankford (R-OK) and Sen. Tim Kaine (D-VA), as lawmakers rush to finalize a bipartisan deal and secure the southern border. White House envoy Amos Hochstein joins us in studio to discuss diplomacy in the Middle East; CBS News reporter Charlie D'Agata tells us about his experience reporting in the region. Save the Children CEO Janti Soeripto gives us an update on the humanitarian crisis in Gaza. United Auto Workers (UAW) President Shawn Fain tells us what's next after his union finally endorsed President Biden last week. Plus: CBS News immigration reporter Camilo Montoya-Galvez joins us from Eagle Pass, Texas to discuss the crisis at the southern border.

February 4th - we speak exclusively to Arizona's independent senator Kyrsten Sinema in a rare television interview. She makes her case for a bipartisan immigration and border security bill and gives us the details of the Senate proposal. We hear from White House National Security Advisor Jake Sullivan as the U.S. retaliates following last week's attack on an American military base in Jordan. We also talk with the former head of Central Command General Frank McKenzie, who previously oversaw U.S. forces in the region. Plus, the heads of the House Intelligence Committee Ohio Republican Mike Turner and Connecticut Democrat Jim Himes tell us about the ongoing U.S. presence in the Middle East.

February 11th - we talk to President Biden's personal attorney Bob Bauer about the special counsel Robert Hur's investigation into Biden's mishandling of classified documents. Republican presidential contender Nikki Haley joins us to make her case for mental competency tests for both Biden and Trump. As Israel prepares to invade southern Gaza, we check in with Connecticut Senator Chris Murphy, who is trying to get aid to Israel and Ukraine through Congress. Plus – as America gets ready for Super Bowl LVIII, our very own James Brown talks to us about the state of the NFL.

February 18th - We'll hear from both of South Carolina's Republican senators – Tim Scott and Lindsey Graham - about their recent trip to the U.S.-Mexico border, and how the death of Putin critic Alexei Navalny will impact the push to aid Ukraine. South Carolina Democrat Jim Clyburn, who was key to Joe Biden's 2020 primary win, gives us his view on President Biden's reelection efforts. We'll also talk to CBS News legal analyst Rikki Klieman about former President Trump's ongoing legal challenges. Plus -- on this President's Day Weekend, we have a discussion on leadership, character, and American values.

February 25th - we speak to Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu about the ongoing war with Hamas. We'll also talk to Congresswoman Debbie Dingell (D-MI), about how President Biden's support of Israel is faring in Michigan. As the war in Ukraine enters its third year, we'll talk to Ukrainian ambassador to the U.S. Oksana Markarova. We'll also hear from Rep. Fitzpatrick (R-PA) and Rep. Golden (D-ME) about their new push for a vote on critical foreign aid to support America's allies. Former Senior Trump administration official Fiona Hill analyzes the former President's rhetoric on Russia. Plus – Donald Trump trounced Nikki Haley in the South Carolina primary. Robert Costa tells us what's next for the Haley campaign.

March 3rd - we ask Homeland Security Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas what Congress and President Biden can do to secure the border. With the growing U.S. sentiment for Israel to curb their military action, we'll talk to Biden surrogate and California Congressman Ro Khanna. We'll also hear from the House Intelligence Committee Chairman Mike Turner, and Alaska GOP Senator Dan Sullivan about their push for foreign aid to Ukraine and Israel. Finally, we talk to ATF Director Steve Dettelbach about guns in America, and why new technology might require new solutions.

March 10th - we ask Vermont Senator Bernie Sanders about the prospects of a six-week ceasefire in the Middle East. Senate Intelligence Committee Chairs, Sen. Mark Warner and Sen. Marco Rubio join us to discuss the worldwide threats facing America. We'll also hear from House Democratic Leader Hakeem Jeffries about progress in the Senate for national security provisions. Plus – we talk to Gary Cohn, a former Trump economic advisor about Americans' assessment of the economy.

March 17th - we'll talk to the heads of the House China Committee Rep. Gallagher and Rep. Krishnamoorthi about the push for a bipartisan bill to force TikTok to divest from their parent company. We'll also hear from Kara Swisher about what this could mean for TikTok's 170 million users in the U.S. We'll talk with Democratic Sen. Chris Van Hollen, who's pushing for tighter control on aid to Israel. We'll also talk to the head of UNICEF about the dire situation facing millions of the world's children. Plus – one year after his public split with the former President over January 6th, we'll sit down with Mike Pence, who said this week he will not endorse Trump's bid for reelection.

March 24th - following the terrorist attack in Moscow, US officials say ISIS-K is solely to blame. We hear from the Chair of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, Michael McCaul. We ask former Speaker Kevin McCarthy how Republicans can resolve their internal divisions and his support for President Trump. We talk to Senator Reverend Raphael Warnock about President Biden's campaign for a second presidential term. Plus, we talk to CBS News immigration reporter Camilo Montoyo-Galvez about the increased tensions at the US-Mexico border. Finally, we get the latest on the resurgence of ISIS-K and the radical group's threat to national security from Samantha Vinograd.

March 31st - following the sudden and deadly collapse of the Scott Key Bridge in Baltimore, we ask Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg and Baltimore Mayor Brandon Scott about the nation's roads and airports ahead of the travel surge this spring. As foreign aid package is stuck in the House, we get the latest from House Intelligence Committee Chair Michael Turner. Plus, talk with World Food Program Executive Director Cindy McCain about the dire hunger crisis in Gaza. Finally, we hear from two faith leaders on the power of hope.

CBS Eye on Veterans – Sundays from 5-6 p.m.

January 14th - Today we're hearing about how USMC Spec Ops vet Derek Herrera has built a business around a digital skin inspection tool, known as the Habit Camera, thanks to a partnership with VA's Technology Transfer Program.

January 21st - we're talking with former student veterans who testified before the Dept of Education in Washington DC, regarding for-profit colleges that failed to provide the useful degrees they promised, all while burning through the GI Bill funding they earned and even their private student loans. We open with the story of Air Force veteran Stephanie Pollay and her experience with ITT Tech.

February 4th - we're talking with Navy SEAL veteran and marketing mogul John Timar. During his post military career, he achieved success bringing Kill Cliff energy drinks to the forefront of the highly competitive US energy drink market and established partnerships with podcast giant Joe Rogan, the mixed martial arts community and raising millions for the Navy SEAL Foundation. But his latest venture steps outside of the energy drink business and introduces us to Grapple Science, a nutritional supplement targeting Jiu Jitsu athletes and other forms of mixed martial arts.

February 25th - We're talking with Navy veteran Jenna Carlton who founded the massively popular Facebook group "The Millennial Veterans." Between Facebook and Instagram, "Millennial Veterans" has amassed millions of views, and their content reaches hundreds of thousands of vets every week. We look back at her Navy service and discuss why many younger vets say they would not recommend joining the military.

March 3rd - we're joined by Connecting Vets National Security reporter Jack Murphy. A former Ranger Sniper, and Special Forces operator who served on several Joint Special Operations Command units, he shares what we'll find in a groundbreaking new book, "The Unit" by Adam Gamal and Kelly Kennedy. The Unit, offers a look inside the military's most secretive unit, which is so covert that even its name is classified.

March 10th - This week starts with examining three important pieces of veteran related cannabis legislation currently awaiting action by Congress. Cannabis attorney Jean Gonnell (Gone'nell) shares how these bills could help veterans.

March 31st - Today we're hearing from a type of military veteran so rare, most people will never meet one. Adam Gamal, an Egyptian Muslim immigrant, and native Arabic speaker, served on the most classified anti-terrorism unit in America.
