***“The Takeout with Major Garrett” – Saturdays at 6 p.m.***

January 2<sup>nd</sup> - Washington, DC Attorney General Karl Racine joins CBS News Chief Washington Correspondent Major Garrett for a discussion about police reform, the new administration and the potential for protests on January 6 when congress certifies the Electoral College votes.

January 30<sup>th</sup> - Former vice presidential nominee and senator Joe Lieberman joins Major to discuss coronavirus, the new Biden administration, whether the filibuster should stay or go and his biodefense initiative. Lieberman says the senate should pursue an impeachment trial of former President Trump and ought to censure him if they don't convict.

February 6<sup>th</sup> - Rep. Adam Schiff (D-CA) joined host Major to discuss COVID-19 relief negotiations proceeding in Congress, whether Schiff has his eyes on becoming the next California Attorney General, and the second impeachment of Donald Trump. Schiff and Garrett also discussed the role of the conspiracy theory QAnon in the Republican Party and controversial Congresswoman Marjorie Taylor Greene (R-GA).

February 20<sup>th</sup> - host Major Garrett discusses the Biden administration's plans for COVID-19 relief with a member of the White House Council of Economic Advisers, Jared Bernstein. Bernstein says the Biden Administration's American Rescue Plan "is calibrated to be of the magnitude to finally deal this COVID-19 virus the blow that hasn't occurred yet," and that the plan would create an "inclusive" economic recovery. Major and Bernstein also discuss the inequality that has been created by the pandemic, a potential \$15 minimum wage, and the best economic policies that can be put in place to help essential workers in these trying times.

March 6<sup>th</sup> - Major interviewed former acting DHS Secretary Chad Wolf. Wolf said that U.S. Capitol Police initially rejected help from the Department of Homeland Security during the assault on the Capitol on January 6. He added that he offered to send DHS law enforcement backup just after 2 p.m. that day, after a violent mob of Trump supporters had begun to infiltrate the Capitol. That initial offer was rebuffed by Capitol Police, Wolf said. Wolf and Garrett also discussed the Biden Administration's immigration policies. Wolf criticized the executive orders and actions the Biden administration had taken with regard to immigration, including rolling back some Trump administration policies. "A lot of these actions are actually very, very dangerous. Because what they are doing, taken together, is they are fueling the crisis that we see on the border today," Wolf said. "They're incentivizing vulnerable populations to continue to come to that border."

January 10th - Angus King, Maine’s Independent U.S. senator, will be the subject of a 60 MINUTES profile conducted by Jon Wertheim and broadcast on the next edition of 60 MINUTES. Wertheim Spoke with King the Morning after the Assault on the Capitol.

January 17th - Alex Smith, who overcame a catastrophic leg injury to play again in the NFL, ends his remarkable comeback season with a 60 MINUTES interview with Norah O’Donnell.
