  - a. On November 8<sup>th</sup>, 2021, KHKA/K272GC entered into a television partnership with KHON-TV, the local FOX affiliate. The radio stations aired KHON2's local morning news show, Wake Up 2Day, from 5-8 a.m., and its sister show, Take 2, from 8-9 a.m. Additionally, special reports featuring press conferences from the governor, mayor, and law enforcement were occasionally aired on the radio station.
3. On May 4<sup>th</sup>, 2020, KHKA rebranded to CBS 1500. The station carries additional news programming, such as the "CBS Evening News with Norah O'Donnell," a re-air of CBS Television's nightly 30-minute news program. The show covers national and global breaking news and other pertinent stories.
4. Additional news programs include "America in the Morning" (M-F, Midnight-1 a.m. and 2 a.m.-3 a.m. / 1-2 a.m. and 3-4 a.m. when the clocks changed in November).

***December 2nd*** – Rep. James Comer, Chairman of the House Committee on Oversight and Accountability, and attorneys for Hunter Biden, the embattled son of President Biden, engaged in a war of words over the younger Biden's potential testimony to the Committee. The Committee is seeking to question Hunter Biden regarding allegations he leveraged his father's political standing to get sweetheart business deals with foreign interests. Host Jeff Pegues and CBS News senior investigative correspondent Catherine Herridge engage in an in-depth analysis of the many legal troubles besetting the President's son.

***December 9th*** - Jeff Pegues speaks with: FBI

Director Christopher Wray testified before Congress that when assessing the threat of foreign terrorist attacks on U.S. soil, he sees flashing red lights everywhere. ***October 21st*** - Major's guest this week is [Rep. Ken Buck \(R-CO\)](#), who thinks Republicans could consider pressing pause on their quest to find a new Speaker of the House and look to a temporary Speakership to break the current impasse. While it's not his preferred approach, Buck is intrigued by the idea of having the current Speaker Pro Tempore, Rep. Patrick McHenry (R-SC), be elected as Speaker on a temporary basis

**October 28th** - Major asks four CBS News correspondents to open their reporter's notebooks for a deep dive on the latest headlines from the Middle East to Capitol Hill. Senior national security correspondent David Martin discusses the reality on the ground in Israel and Ukraine as two wars continue to rage on. Face The Nation moderator Margaret Brennan speaks about the complexities involved in bringing hostages home and getting humanitarian aid to Palestinians in Gaza. Senior White House correspondent Weijia Jiang talks President Biden's unwavering support for Israel and his vision for a 'path to peace.' Finally, Congressional correspondent Scott MacFarlane details what's next for House Republicans after electing Rep. Mike Johnson (R-LA) to be the next Speaker of the House.

**November 4th** - Major has lunch with Dante Chinni, director of the American Communities Project, at Dupont Italian Kitchen in D.C. Chinni's research focuses on what shapes Americans' views based on where they live. Despite perceptions, according to his research, we may be a lot more similar than we are different.

**November 11th** - Major sits down with Senator Jack Reed (D-RI), chairman of the Armed Services Committee, inside Reed's Senate hideaway at the U.S. Capitol. They discuss Israel's daily break in its military campaign against Hamas, West Virginia Senator Joe Manchin's decision not to seek reelection and the continued blockade of military promotions by Senator Tommy Tuberville (R-AL).

**December 2nd** - Major sits down with Congressman Greg Landsman (D-OH), a devotee of religious text and...pop star Taylor Swift! Their conversation - recorded at Capitol Hill restaurant Santa Rosa Taqueria - begins with T-Swift "conspiracies theories," and then pivots effortlessly to talk of Landsman's Masters degree in theology from Harvard Divinity School. The freshman lawmaker says that the Israel-Hamas conflict has prompted him to turn to scripture, "because this war has been so disorienting."

**December 9th** – Major speaks with former GOP congressman Adam Kinzinger over to Zoom to discuss Kinzinger's new book, 'Renegade: Defending Democracy and Liberty in Our Divided Country.' He believes former President Donald Trump will be the 2024 Republican nominee - and if that's the case, Kinzinger intends to vote for President Biden. Kinzinger was one of two Republicans who served on the House committee investigating the January 6, 2021 Capitol riot.

**"60 Minutes" – Sundays at 6 p.m.**

**October 1st** - Correspondent Scott Pelley sits down with U.S. Attorney General Merrick Garland in Washington D.C. Pelley speaks with the head of the Justice Department about the indictments of former President Donald Trump, the Hunter Biden probe, and the January 6th indictments. Days before FTX cryptocurrency exchange founder Sam Bankman-Fried is set to go to trial, 60 MINUTES conducts the exclusive first interview with author and financial journalist Michael Lewis who had a front row seat to Bankman-Fried's rise and fall. Correspondent Jon Wertheim speaks with Lewis, ahead of his GOING INFINITE book release, about Bankman-Fried at the height of his empire, the collapse of crypto, and whether the FTX wunderkind believes he's innocent.

**October 8th** - 60 Minutes correspondent Scott Pelley interviews the "Godfather of AI," Geoffrey Hinton, who is speaking out about the promise and risks of advanced artificial intelligence his research helped make possible. As the nation's highest ranking military officer steps down, Norah O'Donnell profiles General Mark Milley. From inside the Pentagon, aboard the USS Constitution, and in his hometown of Winchester, Massachusetts, O'Donnell speaks with Milley about his four years as Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, his differences with former President Donald Trump, the military challenge of China and why America should support Ukraine in their war against Russia. In a broadcast exclusive, Bill Whitaker profiles mega sports agent Rich Paul ahead of his new memoir. The founder and CEO of Klutch Sports Group represents NBA sensations like LeBron James and Draymond Green and negotiated almost \$900 million in deals this past summer alone. Whitaker traces Paul's unlikely journey from the east side of Cleveland to his glittering life today and scores an invite to the Klutch All-Star Game party, one of the hottest tickets in the NBA.

**October 15th** – As the Israel-Hamas war intensifies and Russia's assault on Ukraine continues, Scott Pelley meets with President Joe Biden at the White House to discuss the United States' role in these raging conflicts, efforts to locate American hostages, the brutality discovered in Israel and Gaza, and the state of the war in Ukraine. Lesley Stahl returns to Israel to meet the family behind the heroic rescue effort at kibbutz Nahal Oz after it was attacked by Hamas. 60 Minutes revisits the story of 50 migrants who arrived in the United States through Texas in 2022 and were transported to Martha's Vineyard by Florida officials. Sharyn Alfonsi reports on the investigation into those flights by a Texas Sheriff who calls what happened a “covert criminal operation.”

**October 22nd** - Scott Pelley sits down with FBI Director Christopher Wray and intelligence chiefs from the United Kingdom, Australia, Canada, and New Zealand to ask whether the Israel-Hamas war has raised the terror threat at home in the United States and around the globe. Margaret Brennan conducts the first interview with one of the five American prisoners freed from Iran last month. With 200 hostages reportedly being held in Gaza, and 13 Americans unaccounted for, Emad Shargi's harrowing story is a stark illustration of the difficulties and perils involved in bringing citizens home. Cecilia Vega profiles international punk rock, pop princess, Alecia Moore - also known as Pink - as she hits 25 years of her successful music-making career. Vega meets Pink at her home in California, stops backstage on her tour and traces her somewhat troubled journey to superstardom. Bill Whitaker reports from the Isle of Man on the longest-running and most dangerous motorcycle race on earth: The Isle of Man TT. Once the seat of a Viking Kingdom, the 30 mile-long island sits in the middle of the Irish Sea, with England to the east and Ireland to the west. Whitaker examines the distinct Manx identity and the role a collision of cultures played in shaping such a wild and improbable race.

**October 29th** - Amid rising tensions in the Middle East, correspondent Bill Whitaker interviews Vice President of the United States Kamala Harris in the Eisenhower Executive Office building. Whitaker speaks with the Vice President about the situation in Israel and Gaza in the wake of the Hamas terror attack, and travels with her aboard Air Force Two to see her discuss important domestic issues, including gun violence prevention and immigration, while advocating for the Biden administration's policy agenda at a college in Nevada. Marc Lieberman is the producer.

***"Weekend Roundup" – Saturdays at 5 p.m.***

**November 11th** – Host Allison Keyes has team coverage of the situation in Israel, including CBS's Robert Berger in Jerusalem. We'll take a look at how abortion affected the off-year elections on Tuesday. In the "Kaleidoscope with Allison Keyes" segment, an in-depth discussion on a disturbing rise in syphilis cases in newborns in the US.

**December 2nd** - Allison Keyes has the latest on hostages being released amid the Israel-Gaza conflict from CBS's Robert Berger in Jerusalem. We'll learn about the urgency of the UN climate talks underway in Dubai from CBS's Pamela Falk. In the "Kaleidoscope with Allison Keyes" segment, a discussion about the life and legacy of the late, openly gay, civil rights leader Bayard Rustin.

**December 9th** – Allison Keyes gets the latest as the world marks three months of Israel's war with Hamas amid the deteriorating situation in Gaza. We'll hear from CBS's Omar Villafranca about a deadly attack on a college campus, this time in the same city where 60 people were killed in the deadliest mass shooting in modern U-S history. In the "Kaleidoscope with Allison Keyes" segment, pundits are worrying whether President Biden and the Democratic party has a Black problem.

***Face the Nation – Sundays at 6:30 a.m. and 7 p.m.***

**October 1st** - crisis averted as Congress passes a short-term funding extension to keep the government open. House Speaker Kevin McCarthy joins the broadcast for a Sunday morning exclusive interview. Plus, South Carolina Senator Lindsey Graham and Trump administration Defense Secretary Mark Esper talk about the debate over funding for Ukraine. Also, we hear from the heads of the self-proclaimed House Problem Solvers Caucus, New Jersey Democrat Josh Gottheimer and Pennsylvania Republican Brian Fitzpatrick. New York Governor Kathy Hochul discusses the destructive flooding that hit her state last week. Finally, we pay tribute to trailblazing California Senator Dianne Feinstein.

**October 8th** - Secretary of State Antony Blinken and Israel's ambassador to the United States Michael Herzog join the show as war erupts in Israel. And after the stunning ouster of former House Speaker Kevin McCarthy, South Carolina Republican Congresswoman Nancy Mace, one of the eight Republicans who voted to topple their speaker, shares her motive. Illinois Governor JB Pritzker and New York City Mayor Eric Adams, who is fresh off a tour of Latin America, warn that the migrant crisis is spiraling out of control.

**October 15th** - White House National Security Adviser Jake Sullivan discusses the role of the US in the ongoing war between Israel and Hamas. Then, Florida Governor and 2024 GOP presidential candidate Ron DeSantis gives details on the return of Americans from a volatile war zone. Rep. Mike Turner (R-OH) discusses aid for Israel and Ukraine as the House of Representatives remains paralyzed without a Speaker. Former CENTCOM Commander Gen. Frank McKenzie shares his analysis of the war and what to expect as the crisis unfolds.

**October 22nd** - we bring you the latest on the Israel-Hamas war with Secretary of State Antony Blinken and Senate Republican Leader Mitch McConnell. Plus, UNRWA Commissioner General Philippe Lazzarini gives updates on aid efforts in Gaza. And while President Biden requests more than \$100 billion of national security, the House of Representatives remains paralyzed; Liz Cheney weighs in.

**October 29th** - the very latest on the Israel-Hamas war and the escalating threats in the Mideast. White House National Security Adviser Jake Sullivan shares where the US stands 23 days into the ongoing war. Former CENTCOM Commander Gen. Joseph Votel lays out his analysis of the escalation and what to expect as violence rages on. And ICRC Director-General Robert Mardini gives a look into how the Red Cross is providing aid inside Gaza. Plus, Sen. J. D. Vance weighs in on President Biden's \$106 billion foreign aid package.

**November 5th** - the very latest on the Israel-Hamas war while emotions rise in the US. As Secretary Blinken continues his tour in the Middle East, we speak to Israeli Ambassador to the US Michael Herzog and Palestinian Ambassador to the UK Dr. Husam Zomlot; Deputy National Security Advisor Jon Finer gives updates on the US front. And Ambassador of Ukraine to the US Oksana Markarova joins us as war also rages on in Ukraine. Finally, Rep. Tony Gonzales and Rep. Jason Crow on working across the aisle as a part of the For Country Caucus.

**November 12th** - fighting intensifies in the Middle East as hostage negotiations continue. President of Israel Isaac Herzog, US National Security Advisor Jake Sullivan, and International President of Doctors Without Borders Christos Christou give a look at the war from all fronts. Congress continues to wrestle aid to Israel, border security, and a government shutdown; Sen. Mark Warner and Rep. Michael McCaul with the latest. Plus, what this year's election tells us about 2024.

**November 19th** - From the Middle East to the Pacific Rim, America's influence is being tested. Are we any closer to rescuing the more than 200 hostages still held by Hamas? We check in with some key players from the Biden administration, Capitol Hill, and around the world. Then, after President Biden's long-anticipated face-to-face meeting with Chinese President Xi Jinping, what's next for America's relationship with its biggest rival? We hear from the bipartisan leaders of Congress' China committee.

**November 26th** - could the fragile temporary cease-fire between Israel and Hamas create space for a diplomatic breakthrough? We bring you an exclusive interview with one of the deal's architects, the Prime Minister of Qatar, on the fate of the remaining hostages, and how long this truce could last. Plus, National Security Advisor Jake Sullivan, and a look at the global consequences of Gaza's humanitarian crisis with the leaders of two of the U.N's aid organizations. Back at home, we check in on Congress' sprawling year-end to-do list, including a border deal that could tighten asylum rules.

**December 10th** - we take a closer look at the challenges facing the country's leaders: inflation, immigration at the border, foreign policy and more. As Washington prepares for the holidays, Congress is at yet another impasse, and President Biden is stepping up his battle cry for 2024. We talk to Vermont Independent Senator Bernie Sanders and Oklahoma Republican Senator James Lankford, plus Biden administration Budget Director Shalanda Young. And as we enter the third month of the Israel-Hamas war, we hear more dire warnings from aid organizations about the humanitarian disaster in Gaza.

**December 17th** - a new CBS News survey of voters in Iowa and New Hampshire shows a ray of hope for Republicans who want to deny Donald Trump the GOP nomination. We talk with former New Jersey Governor Chris Christie, then turn to efforts being made on an immigration deal that could help free up funding to Ukraine and Israel. Rep. Tony Gonzales, Sen. Chris Coons and Ukraine's Ambassador to the US Oksana Markarova join us. Plus, the year-end forecast from the Federal Reserve might actually make Americans feel better about the economy going into 2024.



***December 24<sup>th</sup>*** - we look ahead to 2024 with our year-end correspondent roundtables as we enter a consequential election year and as Congress' to-do list grows. Plus, a reflection on political upheaval and global crisis during 2023. Finally, we discuss the good news from the past 12 months as the year comes to a close.

***December 31<sup>st</sup>*** - at year's end America's immigration system is in crisis. Will 2024 finally bring some solutions? Meanwhile, bipartisan negotiators in the Senate are struggling to strike a deal that might overhaul immigration laws for the first time in nearly 40 years. We check in with a top Republican negotiator, Sen. Lindsey Graham. And we'll hear from two Democratic mayors who say the influx of migrants has brought their cities to a breaking point. With just over two weeks until voters begin to choose the Republican nominee, the candidates are furiously trying to topple frontrunner Donald Trump. But is Trump's own candidacy in jeopardy as two states seek to disqualify him citing his role in the attack on the US Capitol on January 6th?
