Local business may soon get a big financial push to conserve more water. The city council took the first step to develop a rebate program to get businesses to change water fixtures. The city is considering cash incentives for businesses that purchase water saving toilets and faucets. Currently, the city offers homeowners rebates to change their water guzzling washers and toilets. That effort already led to big savings in homes.

ACTION NEWS 6PM, 4/15/09, LENGTH :55 SEC., LOCAL

Fresno Mayor Ashley Swearingen will mark her one hundredth day in office tomorrow by issuing a progress report to the city. Today, the mayor met with her community advisory panel at City Hall. Swearingen says creating the group was one of her top priorities after taking office. The mayor claims her administration has made many accomplishments in her first one hundred days. They include the creation of an independent police auditor to check the work of Fresno police officers. Swearingen says she always supported creating the position, and it wasn't a quick response to questionable incidents involving the police department.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 4/15/09, LENGTH :37 SEC. LOCAL

Demonstrators today will begin the second phase of a demonstration demanding water. In Mendota yesterday, growers, farm workers, and many of their supporters began a four day, 50-mile march. The annual event calls attention to the area's critical water shortage and record-breaking unemployment. Demonstrators want lawmakers to immediately increase water allocations to the valley's west side. They also want a water plan put before voters as a bond measure in the next election, and they're asking for public funding to help those facing remarkable hardship. Today and tomorrow, the march will go up Interstate 5 to Highway 152. The four-day March ends with a huge rally on Friday at the San Luis Reservoir.

ACTION NEWS 11PM, 4/16/09, LENGTH 2:03 MIN, LOCAL

Proposition 8 opponents say they have to be prepared for another future election. But, more importantly, they need to focus on educating more valley residents about gay rights. It's been more than five months since California voters approved Proposition 8, a measure that defines marriage as a union between a man and a woman. But a lawsuit was filed to overturn that decision, and the California Supreme Court now has until June 3rd to make its ruling. Seventy people attended a forum held Thursday night at Fresno City College. There, they discussed what went wrong before the election, and where they can go from here. Geoff Kors of Equality California says valley voters weren't targeted as much as they should have been, which is why an Equality California field office will open up in Fresno within the next several weeks.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 4/11/09, LENGTH :29 SEC. LOCAL

Governor Schwarzenegger says the state will go bankrupt if voters don't pass his budget reforms. The governor joined Los Angeles Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa yesterday in the southland. The two joined forces to promote Propositions 1A through 1F on the upcoming ballot. If passed, the propositions would provide billions to the state. Governor Schwarzenegger says all the propositions need to be approved, not just one or two of them. Californians will go to the polls on May 19th for a special election.

ACTION ENWS 5PM, 4/22/09, LENGTH :26 SEC. LOCAL

Absentee ballots for California's May 19th Special Election started going out today. Voters will decide on six budget-balancing measures, including a spending cap tied to higher taxes. ACTION NEWS 6PM, 4/22/09, LENGTH 2:09 MIN., LOCAL

Political analysts say it's easier to rally people against a ballot initiative than for one. But supporters have about four weeks to keep a band-aid on the budget. The central valley may have reached a saturation point when it comes to taxes. A loud crowd denounced taxes at Fresno's tax day tea party. One month earlier, Clovis voters said 'no' to Measure A, which would have raised their sales tax by one cent to help fund firefighters and police. But now, state ballot initiatives are asking voters to give a little bit more to fix the state budget.

ACTION NEWS 5PM, 4/22/09, LENGTH: 34 SEC., LOCAL

The city of Madera teamed up with the Madera Unified School District and Allied Waste for a shoe recycling program on Earth Day. Students, teachers, and other residents are being encouraged to drop off old athletic shoes at special bins on each of the district's campuses. The shoes will be collected tomorrow and then sent to a Nike facility where they'll be turned into material for sports surfaces like basketball courts and playgrounds. The high school that collects the oldest shoes will win 500 dollars for their athletic program, and the winning middle school will get 250 dollars.

ACTION NEWS 11PM, 4/23/09, LENGTH 2:21 MINUTES, LOCAL

The city currently allows residents to water every other day, based on whether their address ends with an odd or an even number. The city limits the hours residents can water, from 7 at night to 6 in the morning, and again from 8 to 11 in the morning. Under the new guidelines, the 8 to 11 watering would be eliminated. By eliminating the late morning cycle and encouraging conservation, the city hopes to cut water use by 20 percent.

California Democrats are meeting this weekend in Sacramento for their annual convention. One of the hot topics will be next year's governor's race. But the main focus is on the special election set for next month. Groups that are typically aligned with the Democratic Party, such as teachers' unions, are divided on the special election ballot measures. Especially Proposition 1A, which would extend for two years recently passed car, income, and sales taxes, while directing state lawmakers to reduce state spending.

The votes are still being counted in today's special election, but there's little suspense left at this hour. As our exclusive Action News Survey U.S.A. polls predicted, all but one of the statewide propositions have gone down to defeat. Proposition 1A would have increased the state's rainy day fund and maintained a series of tax hikes. Proposition 1B also went down to defeat.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 5/20/09, LENGTH :21 SEC., LOCAL

California voters have rejected the slate of budget propositions presented by Governor Schwarzenegger and state lawmakers. The overwhelming defeat of the special election package means California will have to cut about 20 percent of its general fund spending to balance the budget through mid-2010. The only proposition passing is the law to limit pay raises to elected officeholders while the state is running a deficit.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE 5/20/09, LENGTH :21 SEC., LOCAL

California voters made their voices heard yesterday. While turnout was light for the state's special election, those who did vote were clear, rejecting five of the six budget-related propositions on the ballot. Action News Capitol reporter Nannette Miranda was the only local reporter in Washington today, when Governor Schwarzenegger declared that deeper cuts are now on the way for schools, health care and public safety.

ACTION NEWS 5PM, 5/20/09, LENGTH 1:50 MIN., LOCAL

School district leaders say these are some of the worst cuts they have ever seen. Many were not surprised with special election results and say they are prepared to make the deep cuts necessary. With California voters rejecting the state ballot measures Tuesday, local educators are now bracing for big cuts to their budgets. Fresno County schools superintendent Larry Powell says Fresno County's 34 school districts will need to cut an additional 250 to 750 dollars per child. Fresno unified Chief Financial Officer Ruthie Quinto says this will be the third round of cuts this year adding up to nearly 100 million dollars.

ACTION NEWS 6PM, 5/20/09, LENGTH :47 SEC., LOCAL

Governor Schwarzenegger says he hears voters loud and clear now it's time to balance the state budget the old-fashioned way. That's after voters rejected several special election budget proposals last night. Voters said "no" to five of the six budget-related propositions on the ballot. Even the threat of a second round of cuts to education and public safety couldn't convince voters to support the ballot measures. Now the governor facing a new 21 billion dollar deficit says it's time to follow the people's will.

ACTION NEWS 6:30PM, 5/20/09, LENGTH :54 SEC., LOCAL

On Tuesday, California voters rejected five of the six budget-related propositions on the special elections ballot. Now deeper cuts are now on the way for health care, public safety and schools. This will mean the third round of cuts for Fresno County schools this year. Many expect to reduce their budget by 250 to 750 dollars per student. Superintendent Larry Powell says many schools could break even after receiving federal stimulus money, but he expects programs like sports, art, drama, and music to suffer. Now he is calling on professionals in the community to keep after-school programs going.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 5/21/09, LENGTH :47 SEC. LOCAL

Some eighteen-hundred students in the south valley will be forced to delay their degrees another semester. The College of the Sequoias has just announced it's cancelling some summer classes. Defeat of the special election propositions forced the shutdown of the fourth summer session at C.O.S. Admissions had to slash thirty classes and started turning away students. Many students are worried the classes they plan to take in the fall won't be offered at all leaving them to fall behind on finishing their degrees.

ACTION NEWS SPECIAL 8:30PM, 6/09/09, LENGTH :44 SEC. LOCAL

Fresno's mayor and police chief both went before the city council today to discuss how to make some difficult spending cuts work without depleting their departments. Fire Chief Randy Bruegman said if his department's budget is approved as proposed, he will have to take two engine companies out of regular service. Bruegman is being asked to trim about four and a half million dollars from his budget. The police department is being asked to cut twelve million in spending. Just yesterday, the union that represents Fresno's police officers announced a tentative deal with the city that would cancel a scheduled two percent pay raise. If union members agree to go without the raise, the department will save enough money to keep ten high ranking officers from being demoted.

ACTION NEWS 6:30PM, 6/10/09, LENGTH 1:16 MIN., LOCAL

Gottschalk's liquidation sales are expected to end by mid-July. Fresno's Public House restaurant remains open tonight despite being foreclosed and sold at auction. Some employees walked off the job at the restaurant in Granite Park after this morning's auction. The property was auctioned because the owners of the public house defaulted on a two million dollar loan. No one placed a bid, so the property now belongs to a local couple who loaned the money. Visalia firefighters are fighting possible furloughs. The city asked all of its employees to give up a 4-percent raise expected at the end of the month to help ease the city's mounting budget deficit. Most employees refused so now the city must consider furloughs and layoffs. Firefighters are expecting furloughs even if they give up their raise. The city council will talk about the budget on Monday.

ACTION NEWS 6:30PM, 6/10/09, LENGTH :36 MIN., LOCAL

South valley city officials say plans to move a casino have stalled. The city of Porterville had signed a memorandum of understanding with the Tule River Indian tribe last year to move Eagle Mountain Casino to the valley floor. But now the city says new tribe council members differ with the city on plans for the project. The plans call for the casino to move near the Porterville airport. Officials also wanted to build a hotel and golf course. The city said moving the casino closer to downtown would be safer and more convenient for visitors. The Tule River Economic Development Corporation could not be reached for comment.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE 6/11/09, LENGTH: 35 MIN., LOCAL

Visalia firefighters are battling a different type of emergency lately over finances instead of flames. Dozens of supporters of the Visalia Fire Department brought signs and wore red shirts yesterday. It's in protest of the city's latest proposal to cut six million dollars from next year's budget. The city has asked all employees to give up a four percent raise expected to go into effect at the end of the month. City officials say giving up the raise would prevent furloughs - but firefighters say they were told otherwise. Firefighters expect furloughs to increase response times. The city council will take up the issue at Monday's meeting.

ACTION NEWS 5PM 6/15/09, LENGTH: 27 SEC. LOCAL

Visalia firefighters are in the middle of a meeting that could save some of their jobs. The council could decide tonight to close fire stations and furlough some firefighters. Last week, dozens of supporters came out to protest the plan to cut back firefighters to help close a budget hole. The city has asked all employees to give up a four percent raise expected to go into effect at the end of the month. Council members have said that would prevent the furloughs.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE 6/17/09, LENGTH :30 SEC. LOCAL

Mayor Swarengin's message for the Governor tomorrow will be "borrow but don't take." That way the city can arrange short-term financing to deliver services. The Fresno city council also voted to join the league of California cities in a lawsuit against the state over the budget cuts. But a lawsuit can't be filed until the state budget is finalized.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 6/17/09, LENGTH :25 SEC., LOCAL

Governor Schwarzenegger will be in Fresno tomorrow to speak about the state's budget crisis. The governor will meet with the Central California Hispanic Chamber of Commerce at the Tower Theater in Fresno. The Governor is expected to discuss his plans to borrow money from the cities, to balance the budget. That money is meant to go toward city maintenance. The city council and Mayor Ashley Swarengin are expected to voice their concerns tomorrow, to the governor.

ACTION NEWS 11PM, 6/22/09, LENGTH :27 SEC. LOCAL

The Clovis City Council also approved major cuts to its public transit system tonight. The weekend stage line bus service will be suspended to offset funding losses through "Measure C" and the gas tax. The city council also voted to eliminate the taxi voucher service, which provides transportation for passengers in wheelchairs. A fare increase of 25 cents will also go into effect in August. The general services manager says the Fresno FAX route on Shaw Avenue will continue on the weekends.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE 6/23/09,LENGTH :38 SEC., LOCAL

Clovis council members say the budget decisions they made last night were painful and difficult. The biggest blow is to police and firefighters and ultimately the Clovis community. City council members unanimously approved the budget late last night. They had to slash \$5.3 million dollars from its general fund budget which includes public safety. The fire department will lose 3 firefighters and 1 staff member and will have to close the downtown fire station which just opened last year. Nineteen police officer positions were also cut. Clovis is able to avoid many more layoffs because of retirement incentives and vacancies. The city is also reducing hours at its senior center, and closing the Clovis recreation center.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE 6/23/09, LENGTH :43 SEC. LOCAL

Even abandoned dogs and cats in Fresno are now feeling the pinch of the troubled economy. Fresno city leaders have slashed 130 thousand dollars to the SPCA's annual budget. This, as the number of animals left at the S.P.C.A. has already increased because of the recession. The budget cut will reduce staff at the west central Fresno location and slow down emergency response times. The city council says everyone must take a percentage cut to balance next year's budget.

Five months later, it was on track to balloon to \$42 billion by next summer. And solving that wasn't enough; another shortfall of \$24 billion dollars will likely appear over the next year. Health care for nearly one million low-income children would also end. Education would lose another \$680 million. And state workers' pay would be reduced 5%. That's on top of the two furlough days, which were already a 10% cut. This latest round of proposed cuts is in addition to the package \$21 billion of deficit-reducing solutions the governor released last week, which included closing most state parks. Randall José may be hit with a double whammy: he'll likely lose his in-home support service because the state is cutting off those with less severe disabilities and his adult health day care may shut down.

Senator John Ensign apologized today to his colleagues--after revealing he had an affair with a married campaign staffer. Lawmakers leaving the closed-door session say he was somber and apologetic. Most of his colleagues accepted his apology. Ensign admitted last week he had a ten-month affair with a campaign staffer whose husband was a top aide in his senate office. The affair ended last August. The 13-year-old Minnesota boy who left his hometown to avoid chemotherapy must continue receiving the treatment. A judge made the ruling today because the treatment seems to be working for Daniel Hauser. Hauser says the ruling made him angry because the treatment makes him dizzy and gives him headaches. He has Hodgkin's Lymphoma, but initially resisted chemotherapy and sought alternative treatment.

So to solve an 8 and a half million dollar deficit, chief probation officer Linda Penner says she no choice but to close the facility. More than a dozen employees from the probation department have been laid off; others are being transferred within the department. Some of those being released will attend day programs offered by the Fresno county office of education.

At Yokomi Elementary School, it got so hot today one PE class opted to stay inside instead of going out on the field. The district says for some kids, hot weather and bad air quality is a challenge. According to recent testing, 60 to 64 percent of Fresno Unified 5th, 7th, and 9th graders scored in the healthy fitness zone for aerobic activity. 68-69 percent scored in the healthy zone for body composition and 69-70 percent for flexibility. At Yokomi Elementary, outside PE classes were cancelled for one group that stayed inside talking to UCSF medical students about how pollution and smoke affects the lungs.

Experts say everyone in the state needs to do their part to help conserve. A new education program will include public service announcements and posters.

The heat and bad air quality caused some PE classes in Fresno Unified to stay indoors. Schools raised orange air-alert flags today. Only sixty to sixty-four percent of fifth, seventh, and ninth grade students scored in the health fitness zone for aerobic activity. District health officials are now using a million-dollar federal grant to get more students moving.

Options may be running out for a Fresno Charter School. Officials with Kipp Academy will meet with parents and supporters tonight to discuss the future of the charter school. The school recently defaulted on a property loan, and the owner could reclaim the building at any time. Officials blame Fresno Unified for preventing Kipp from getting state funding. South valley college administrators are meeting about forming a new high school. The College of Sequoias in Visalia is holding an informational meeting about the new university prep high school which will open in August 2009 right on the COS campus. Tonight's meeting started at 6-pm and will be held in room one of the Sequoia building at COS.

Efforts by Governor Schwarzenegger to win voter approval of six budget measures grew more difficult this past weekend. A sharply split state Democratic party declined to back three of the propositions. They endorsed other propositions that would secure education funds and authorize billions of dollars in borrowing; including Proposition 1C, which would borrow money against future state lottery earnings. Only 32 percent said they'll vote yes for Proposition 1B, the education funding payment plan. The no votes dominate 54

percent to 37 percent. Propositions 1C, 1D and 1E also appear to be headed for defeat. The only proposition that may pass is 1F. That would cap the salaries of elected officials. Right now, 48 percent said they are certain to vote yes, and 38 percent said no.

How are students affected by economic hard times? We explore how financial worries are impacting kids and families and also look at solutions, plus some of the positive side effects of the recession. Talk to students about economic worries. Are they worried about their future? Do they hear their parents arguing now more than ever over money? Is there a lack of hope that exists? Lots of high school students may be worried they won't be able to go away for college. Community college enrollment is on the rise. How are students both younger and older adjusting? Speak to a counselor. Family service workers in Tulare County are assisting neediest families, are they seeing a rise for more services because of the recession? Mention transiency, kids can be lost to transiency, leading temporary lives.

Segment #1 : City of Fresno: Homeless Prevention and Policy Management. We were joined by Greg Barfield, Policy Manager, here to talk about Fresno's Homeless Prevention and Policy. This ten year plan is to end chronic homelessness in our city. HUD has awarded a direct formula allocation of \$3,130,746 of Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing (HPRP) funds to the City of Fresno based on its annual receipt of Federal McKinney-Vento funds through the Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) Program. Funds are intended to prevent homelessness, assist persons that are homeless, assist persons threatened with homelessness and rapidly re-house persons who are homeless, through diversion away from the emergency shelter system.

Segment #2: Homeless Village: Some of Fresno's homeless are just days away from receiving money from the \$2.4 million settlement from the City of Fresno. The money they receive will be in the form of housing vouchers. Action News Anchor Liz Harrison reports that it will solve the housing issue for some but hundreds more are filling up empty lots with not just tents but shanty towns. An advocate for Fresno's homeless says the city should provide safe housing for those who need it or at least designate a safe space for those who want to camp. Assistant City Manager Bruce Ruud says the Mayor's office should have an announcement about the short term solution within the next two months.
