We talked to local mentors who are sharing their time with kids. See how kids who have grown up with challenges are finding success thanks to having role models in their lives. Meet Jesse, an 18-year-old journalist who writes about overcoming obstacles in his personal life. He isn't afraid to speak out about the role young people can play in their community. Jesse's role models include President Barack Obama, whose election has given him new hope that he can achieve anything in his life. One Central High valedictorian tutors her fellow students. When Karla came to the United States, she did not speak English. Her self-determination, along with the support of her teachers and counselors, propelled her to the top of the class.

This long-time, successful one-on-one mentoring program helps change the lives of valley children who are "Littles" and adults who volunteer as "Bigs". Santana's program is preventing kids from falling through the cracks as they improve their literacy skills.

ACTION NEWS MIDDAY, 07/14/09, LENGTH :30 SEC., LOCAL

This Midday the Fresno City Council is considering a plan to take over the met museum. Council members will decide today whether taxpayers should bail out the troubled museum. The Met and the city of Fresno have negotiated a plan in which taxpayers would front 15-point-2 million dollars on a defaulted bank loan. The museum plans to bring in more exhibits like "Bob the Builder" to increase attendance and memberships to do its part to save itself.

ACTION NEWS 5PM, 7/14/09, LENGTH :30 SEC.,LOCAL

A south valley city is making cuts to public safety to try and close a three million dollar budget gap. The Visalia City Council approved one and a half million dollars in cuts to the Visalia police department. They're offering a thirty -thousand dollar retirement incentive to sergeant-level officers and higher. The city hopes up to six officers will retire. If **no one** retires then officials say layoffs at the department are inevitable. The council also approved laying off six people, including two battalion chiefs at the fire department.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 7/15/09, LENGTH :27 SEC., LOCAL

The Fresno City Council finalized a plan today, to take financial control over the Met Museum. City council member's agreed to use tax dollars to make up a fifteen -million dollar loan the met couldn't pay. The city guaranteed that loan two years ago. Fresno Mayor Ashley Swearengin is now turning her attention to the granite park development in east central fresno.the city also guaranteed a five million dollar loan there but the developer has not been paying it off.

ACTION NEWS IS LIVE, 7/22/09, LENGTH :32 SEC., LOCAL

A south valley city is taking a stand against same-sex marriage in California. The Porterville City Council voted to approve the drafting of a resolution opposing a current bill making its way through the state legislature. State senate bill 54 would allow same-sex couples who married outside the state before proposition eight's passage be considered married spouses in California. Same-sex rights supporters voiced their opposition to the city resolution at tonight's meeting. The city council will now draft a letter of opposition to the senate bill, and vote on it in two weeks.

ACTION NEWS IS LIVE, 7/22/09, LENGTH: 28 SEC., LOCAL

The city of Fresno and Fresno county officials have settled a lawsuit over the early release of inmates from the county jail. A lawsuit against Sheriff Margaret Mims after the department said it had to release 72 inmates, early. Under the agreement approved by the Board of Supervisors, Sheriff Mims will have to create an electronic system to inform the city when inmates are released early, because of overcrowding. That plan had already been approved by the Fresno city council.

ACTION NEWS 6:30PM, 7/23/09, LENGTH: 29 SEC., LOCAL

Parking ticket fees are going up in Fresno for the second time this year. In February, city officials approved an increase of three dollars, because of the passage of a State Senate bill. Now they'll be adding another two dollars after finding out they still owe the state more money per ticket. It's estimated that about two million dollars will be generated from tickets per year. The increase applies to about 60 different types of tickets, including parking in restricted zones or parking in fire lanes. It is effective immediately.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 7/24/09, LENGTH :23 SEC., LOCAL

The owners of the Fresno Grizzlies say they're facing money troubles and they're asking the City of Fresno for help. Yesterday in a closed door meeting, the Grizzlies' management told the City Council that poor attendance and a weak economy are hitting them hard. They're asking the city to reduce their lease payments at Chukchansi Park. City Manager Andy Souza says the Grizzlies will likely get some financial relief.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 7/27/09, LENGTH :27 SEC., LOCAL

The future of an Atwater councilmember at the center of an e-mail controversy could be decided. The Merced Chapter of the NAACP is calling for councilmen Gary Frago to resign. Frago forwarded several e-mails to city leaders and friends with jokes about President Obama and First Lady, Michelle. Those jokes used a derogatory term for African-Americans and one joke related the President to O.J. Simpson. The e-mails were discovered by the Merced Sun-Star. A special council meeting will be held tonight.

ACTION NEWS 5PM, 7/28/09, LENGTH :42 SEC., LOCAL

A public meeting will be held in Firebaugh about rerouting the San Joaquin River around the Mendota Pool. As part of the project, officials plan to widen more than 10-miles of the existing river channel leading up to the pool, which forms behind Mendota dam. The nearly 200-million dollar project is considered a major effort in restoring salmon in the river. The fish need a clear path to swim upstream to spawning grounds. The bypass and channel widening are the first of many projects over the next seven-years to re-establish the San Joaquin River, which is the state's second-longest river. Tonight's meeting starts at six p-m in Firebaugh at the City Council chambers located at 16-59 13th street in Firebaugh.

ACTION NEWS 6:30PM, 7/29/09, LENGTH :47 SEC., LOCAL

Most valley residents believe an Atwater City Councilman should not remain in office after forwarding racist emails. An exclusive action news poll conducted by survey USA shows 47 percent of those familiar with the story feel Gary Frago should leave office. 39 percent believe he should keep his job. Also, 71 percent of those surveyed say they feel the city should reprimand him. The city council has voted to issue a letter of disapproval. And now an outraged Atwater resident has pulled the paperwork to begin a recall campaign.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 8/9/09, LENGTH :41 SEC., LOCAL

Aaron Ball works and lives in the Tower District. He loves the tower like so many who call it home. But ball does not agree with all of the proposed changes. This rendering shows how a traffic circle would look at the intersection of Olive and Van Ness. It is a similar concept for olive and Wishon in front of the Tower Theater.

Fresno City Council president Cynthia Sterling has announced plans to seek higher political office. Sterling announced she will run for Fresno County Supervisor next year. She used the old superior courthouse in Kerman as the backdrop for her announcement yesterday. The courthouse has been closed. Sterling calls it a symbol of the services that the county has lost in recent years.

ACTION NEWS MIDDAY, 8/11/09, LENGTH :29 SEC., LOCAL

Some Fresno firefighters are climbing up the ladder inside their department. Inspector, Leslie Forshey moves to Senior Fire Prevention Inspector and Debory Remily to Fire Prevention Inspector. Chad Brisendine received a letter of commendation and Javier and Scott Suniga received the public recognition award.

ACTION NEWS MIDDAY, 8/12/09, LENGTH 1:30 MINUTES, LOCAL

A CD obtained by Action News this morning contains about 200 emails forwarded by Gary Frago, many of which involve racist or sexist jokes some of the emails refer to violence against President Obama, his delegates, as well illegal immigrants. Another involves a made up conversation between Oprah Winfrey and George Burns that makes an offensive remark about African American women. Councilman Frago has apologized for forwarding the emails and on Monday night he resigned as mayor pro tem. But many people have said that's not good enough. They also want him to give up his city council seat, and they say the volume of racially offensive emails only makes them more certain he should step down.

ACTION NEWS 5PM, 8/13/09, LENGTH 1:02 MINUTES, LOCAL

A debate is growing between the city of Fresno and tree Fresno. The city council recently approved several changes to revitalization plans for Eaton plaza in downtown fresno.those plans include the removal of nine camphor grove planted in the early 19-60's.city officials say some of the trees are diseased and roots are buckling nearby sidewalks. Representatives with Tree Fresno placed yellow ribbons around the trees it wants the city to save. Tree and picnic table the organization also offered to adopt Eaton Plaza to help save the city money.

ACTION NEWS 6:30PM, 8/13/09, LENGTH :33 SEC., LOCAL

The City of Fresno has filed a lawsuit to try and stop the operation of a marijuana dispensary in the city. The city claims the med-mar pot dispensary at Olive and Palm Avenue began operating without city approval and has sold marijuana for several months from the location. The suit seeks to force the closure of the dispensary as a public nuisance and threat to public health and safety. In 2007, the Fresno City Council approved an ordinance regulating the establishment of medical marijuana dispensaries within the city. A hearing has been set for Tuesday to address the lawsuit.

ACTION NEWS 6PM 8/18/09, LENGTH :38 SEC., LOCAL

The Merced City Council voted down a plan to convert a vacant apartment complex into temporary housing for the city's homeless. This city-owned 12-unit apartment complex is where the housing would have been provided. But in a 6 to 1 vote Tuesday night, councilmember's said the idea to provide a place for homeless to stay was good. They raised concerns about the location of the proposed housing location. The City would also have been required to inspect a mold problem in some of the units. That would have cost

the city 46 thousand dollars to do. Councilmember's asked staff members to explore different locations where temporary housing could be offered to needy residents.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 8/20/09, LENGTH 1:54 MINUTES, LOCAL

The first public hearing on Wal-Mart's plan to put a massive distribution center in Southeast portion of Merced and supporters say they want the jobs. Opponents are concerned about the environmental impact from all those trucks. Thomas Libby: "Are the elected representatives more interested in jobs for some people, or are they more interested in health for everyone." The attorney for a citizen's group opposed to construction of the Wal Mart distribution center found fault with the city's Environmental Impact Report. Thomas Libby believes it does not properly address the air pollution problem. Air pollution is the primary objection to the project. "I have nothing against Wal-Mart. I love Wal Mart stores. It's one of my favorite stores. I'm not against jobs. I have an unemployed son. I would love for him to have a job at Wal Mart. But overriding that is my concern for the children." The concern is from the pollution caused by the more than five hundred semi trucks that will be coming and going from the distribution center 24 hours a day, seven days a week. But supporters, which include most of those in the audience, say the 12 hundred jobs the distribution center will bring make it all worthwhile.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 8/24/09, LENGTH :24 SEC., LOCAL

Today, Fresno city leaders will meet with triple-A baseball executive to discuss the future of Chukchansi Park and the Fresno Grizzlies. The team wants the city to reduce their annual rent at Chukchansi Park from one and a half million dollars to five hundred thousand. The team is struggling because of reduced attendance and revenue. While meetings will be held today, no decision will be made at this week's city council meeting.

ACTION NEWS 6:30PM, 8/24/09, LENGTH :47 SEC. LOCAL

New farm is coming to western Fresno County, but this one has little to do with crops or livestock. The city of Mendota held a ground-breaking for a new solar farm one of the largest of its kind in California. The solar farm will provide 5 megawatts of emission-free solar electricity to PG&E. That's enough energy to power about 78-hundred homes.

ACTION NEWS 6PM, 8/25/09, LENGTH :20 SEC., LOCAL

The City Council must now decide on plans for a Wal-Mart Distribution center in Merced. The planning commission approved a proposal to build a distribution center in merced.it could bring 12-hundred jobs to the area. But opponents say it will affect air and the quality of life. The project will be presented to the Merced city council September 21st.

ACTION NEWS 6:00PM, 9/08/09, LENGTH :39 SEC. LOCAL

City officials in Clovis are considering a plan to raise prices for water charges partly because of a lack of homebuilding in the area. Two years ago, when a homebuilding boom was predicted water officials decided to raise the fees to anticipate the high demand for water. But because of a lack of homebuilding, officials still need to raise the fees because of the general cost to supply water. If approved the first increase, 20 percent, would go into effect next january.three other increases would take place through 20-12 raise fees by a total of about six dollars. Tonight the council meets to decide whether to set a public hearing date for the issue in November.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 9/08/09, LENGTH :25 SEC., LOCAL

The Merced City Council is meeting tonight to hear possible plans for the homeless in their area. Among the ideas a transitional housing development or creating a public campground for the homeless. Last month council voted down a plan to convert this vacant apartment complex into temporary housing.councilmembers said they liked the idea just not the location. Tonight they will also consider accepting a grant to be used for temporary financial assistance and housing relocation.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 9/10/09, LENGTH :26 SEC., LOCAL

The Fresno City Council is taking out its checkbook. The city is holding a special meeting this afternoon to announce it will pay the expenses of two projects backed by the city. The city had guaranteed loans to Granite Park and the Fresno Metropolitan Museum. Both have not been able to get financing for their construction loans and have defaulted. The meeting is open to the public and will be held at one o'clock this afternoon at City Hall.

ACTION NEWS 6PM, 9/10/09, LENGTH 2:10 MINUTES, LOCAL

The New construction is one of nine new office buildings going up. But this actually isn't part of the granite park project, right over here are the softball fields the city now owns and its 18 acres with almost nothing on it. The dirt is mostly untouched and the trees are dead. This is Granite Park and it's not the picture of a great investment, especially at 2004 prices. But that's when the city of Fresno co-signed a loan on the property with a nonprofit agency.

ACTION NEWS 11PM, 9/10/09, LENGTH :50 SEC., LOCAL

Fresno's City Council met in a special session today to approve new bonds to pay off 20 million dollars in bad loans it co-signed. the city made the agreements with Granite Park in 2004 and the Met Museum in 2007. At Granite Park, the city gets 18 acres that includes three softball fields and a lot of vacant land. An assessment due next week should help the city determine what to do with the land. The solution could have the city looking to partner up with yet another business.

ACTION NEWS 6:30PM, 9/14/09, LENGTH :36 SEC. LOCAL

A new project at Fresno's Chandler Airport will create a new runway at the southwest Fresno airport. The one point seven million dollar project is being funded by federal grants and measure c money. Also included in the project is the installation of energy-efficient airfield guidance signs and improved storm drainage.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 9/14/09, LENGTH :28 SEC., LOCAL

The Clovis City Council just decided to re-open the city's rec center after budget cuts forced its closure last month. The city council voted tonight to re-open the rec center next month through at least the end of the year. The council made the move thanks in part to donations from the community. But they say more money is needed to keep the center open. the center closed in early august as a result of the city slashing its budget for recreation programs.

Segment #1: Domestic Violence & Loss of State Funding: We were joined by Pam Kallsen, Executive Director here to talk about the issue of domestic violence and a drastic cut in state funding. We found out how that will affect the services they provide. For nearly 30 years, the Marjaree Mason Center has offered shelter and supportive services to victims of domestic violence in Fresno County. Currently, the center operates the county's only domestic violence shelters. California's recently adopted budget has dealt a severe blow to the state's victims of domestic violence. Governor Schwarzenegger cut 20-point-4 million dollars to 94 shelters and centers statewide. As a result, many centers will have to make drastic cuts to their programs. Some will have to close their shelters altogether.

Lawmakers were stalled for days over what and how much to cut. The governor and republican leaders refused to raise taxes while Democrats fought to preserve essential services like welfare, and health care for low-income children. Highway safety researchers estimated that, in 2002, cell phone use by drivers contributed to some 955- fatalities and 240 -thousand accidents. The former head of the traffic safety administration claims he was urged to withhold the research to avoid angering members of congress and because of the fear of losing taxpayer funding.

It is opening day of the Merced County Fair and the extreme heat has animal exhibitors taking extreme precaution for their livestock and themselves. Handlers and animals had to keep their cool under intense rays and temperatures in the 100s today. Many now bring high powered fans and misters to the fairgrounds for themselves and their livestock. Some handlers say they've lost prized animals during the fair because of the heat.

Unsafe water levels have prompted officials from the u-s army corps of engineers to temporarily close the swimming beach at Hensley Lake in Madera County. Starting tomorrow, visitors will not have access to the beach and a nearby picnic spot at the Buckridge recreation area because of low water levels. The lake's boat launch and other recreation points will remain open. The corps of engineers says that it will reopen the closed areas when water levels reach high enough for visitors to safely swim again.

The Fresno County Sheriff's Department needs your help finding the fifth person they say played a role in yesterday's killing of a Kerman couple. One woman and three other men are in jail in connection to this double murder. Drug agents had also been investigating the de Bartolos after getting a tip they were growing marijuana in their home. merced county sheriff's deputies have arrested a 35 year old woman for the murder of an elderly man in winton. Detectives discovered the man's body in his home after receiving an anonymous 9-1-1 call. They say the suspect, Rachele Hampton, also lived there.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 7/27/09, LENGTH :35 SEC., LOCAL

Not many police departments can afford a helicopter to fight crime, but one valley town found the next best thing. The police department in Ripon unveiled its new airborne crime fighting tool; a powered parachute craft. The craft seats two, has a motorized fan and uses a parachute to get off the ground and keep it in the air. The powered parachute only costs about 30-dollars an hour to operate versus 15-hundred dollars an hour for a helicopter. It's also much easier and faster to train police officers on how to use it. This is the first powered parachute being used by a police department in California.

Sugar daddy's and a strip club in Lindsay are the two places the county says will be affected. The new rules would require the county to look at a Criminal background before they're allowed to go to work. On Tuesday Tulare county supervisors introduced new rules to adult oriented business license requirements that would call for exotic dancers to go through a background check first.

Several drowning in the central valley this summer have one local hospital looking at ways to put more people in life jackets. kaweah delta medical center is looking for donations of new life jackets. They're asking people to donate new life preservers that still have the proper tags on them.

The government's vaccine advisory panel met in Atlanta, today and came up with a list of groups of people who should be at the front of the line when the h-1-N-1 vaccine becomes available and about half the U.S. population is on a government vaccine priority list. This includes: pregnant women, who in studies have been found to be especially vulnerable to this virus. Not all public health experts are convinced about the safety of the vaccine that's still being developed. Public health experts advise people to get the regular flu shot when they become available. And then be ready for the h-1-n-1 vaccine when the time comes.

The investigation into a suspicious fire has taken a strange twist ending with a police surveillance camera going up in an upscale neighborhood. In the week since the camera went up, police have made six arrests and given out twenty tickets, it all started when a pair of fires came precariously close to homes in the area, right around the Fourth of July.

For police, odds also keep them constantly re-evaluating which approaches are working best." when we find that one strategy is working better than another, then we'll increase the number of those."

A lawsuit has been filed against the states on-the-job safety board on behalf of farm laborers who work in the fields in extreme heat. The ACLU says the state has failed to establish common-sense regulations that would provide water, shade and rest when farm workers are working in the heat.

Fresno Police Officers say there's no recess from school safety and in fact, they're stepping up patrols over the next two weeks around campuses. Drivers will see extra enforcement in school zones, during the hours school is in session, typically from 7:30 a-m to 3:30 p-m. Officers say speed can make all the difference in preventing a collision. The stopping distance at 40 miles per hour is 164 feet. At 25 miles per hour, it goes down to 84 feet. Violators are often parents themselves.

In tonight's health watch, a new research adds to the safety concerns for a cervical cancer vaccine gardasil is a series of three shots given over six months, meant to protect girls as young as eleven years old from cervical cancer. Two studies published in the journal of the American Medical Association shows more than 12-thousand mild medical problems after vaccination but there are more than 700 reports of serious medical problems, including blood clots and 32 cases of death. Although the reports are preliminary some doctors are thinking twice about the vaccine. So far, more than seven million Americans have received the gardasil injections.

Government safety officials are warning parents about a type of recalled bassinet that has been tied to two deaths even after the recall. The consumer product safety commission says four infants have now died after they crawled into one of these simplicity sleeper bassinets. The three-in-one and four-in-one convertible bassinets have some design problems that are dangerous. They were recalled a year ago, but two kids have died since then. They were sold under a couple different names, so log onto our website at abc-30 dot com for details on the affected products.

Tomorrow will be the last day for nearly 30 correctional officers at the Fresno County Jail. The layoffs take effect while the sheriff struggles with a budget deficit. So far this month Action News has counted 139-inmates who were released early due to budget cuts and over-crowding. Jail records indicate some of the men and women were facing violent charges like assault with a deadly weapon and battery. County Supervisor Phil Larson says he doesn't like the releases but the county doesn't have tax revenue to keep the jail fully staffed.

For those who toil in the hot valley sun protection is not only needed it's required by law. Farm laborers must have water, bathrooms and access to shade nearby. Inspectors found all three during this visit but that's not always the case.

Chief Jerry Galvin and 8 patrol officers make up Mendota's new police department which will be housed in this 52-hundred square foot facility in the city's north side.

Kohl's Department Stores delivered a check for 67 thousand dollars was given to children's hospital of central California today in hopes of promoting water safety. The money will be used to fund the hospital's water safety program. Organizers for the safety effort say that 47 children have been injured this year in the valley while swimming or in bodies of water. Children at this hospital were taught how to use floatation devices and how pool-side items can be used to rescue swimmers who are in trouble.

A Fresno agency that helps the disabled is hoping a brand new fence will protect them from gas thieves. As of this morning the parking lot at the diamond learning center on west Shaw Avenue is surrounded by this wire fence. The Fresno "LARCS" donated the 25-hundred dollars needed to build the fence.

The Director of the Centers for Disease Control says doctors have very high confidence in the safety of the h-1-n-1 flu vaccine in production right now. The Obama administration says vaccinating children will be a priority when the vaccine is finished, but they're not planning to make it mandatory.

Of the four companies kohls department store is paying the largest fine of **425-** thousand dollars.

Fresno police say there's been an increase in burglaries at local businesses. There have been 39 in just the last five weeks and more than half in northeast Fresno the others happened in central and northwest. Police have some surveillance video from a couple of cases. The video shows one man running out of a smoke shop in central Fresno with his hands full of stuff, before he gets into a waiting car and speeds away. Teenagers in the Central Valley of California will have new prospects for a better life thanks to more than \$350,000 in

grants that the Fresno Regional Foundation has made with the support of The William and Flora Hewlett Foundation. The Fresno Regional Foundation has been asked by the national. While the rest of the nation has experienced declines in the rates of teen pregnancy over the past decade, California's Central Valley has bucked this trend. Fresno County has one of the highest teen birth rates in the Central Valley, according to the California Department of Health Care Services. The Public Health Institute-an independent, nonprofit health research organization-has estimated that Fresno's unusually high rate of more than sixty-one births for each thousand teenage girls costs society \$160 million a year in the delivery of additional government services, losses to the workforce, and other secondary costs.

Segment #3 & #4: Children's Hospital Central California: Each year Children's Hospital Central California and ABC30 team up to tell you stories about the hospital and their important patients and families. This year's special "Amazing Care for Kids" featured a story about fragile infants receiving specialized care. We have the story of Zacariah and Michelle who were born at just 25 weeks, so premature they spent three months after their birth in the neonatal intensive care unit at Children' Hospital Central California. At barely one pound each, they were only about the size of an adult hand. The babies more than made it, they thrived and this year, were chosen as the Ambassador for Kid's Day. Another child's story was told, little Seth at just over a year old doctors at Children's Hospital Central California discovered his heart was breaking. Dr. James Prochazka made the diagnosis; a membrane was obstructing blood flow to Seth's heart. The damage was repaired in surgery and another operation would follow when Seth turns three. By five years old, Seth needed a pacemaker to back up his tiny heart. Most people will have just one surgery in their lifetime; Seth had 5 by the age of 7. Doctors placed a titanium mechanical valve in his heart that's designed to last for many years.

The California Department of Public Health's Domestic Violence Program provided funding to 94 agencies statewide, some of which operate multiple shelters. Schwarzenegger eliminated the program's \$20.4 million budget when he used his line-item authority to veto nearly \$500 million in the revised budget passed by the Legislature. California's program was created 15 years ago to fund local agencies for abuse victims after the high-profile death of Nicole Brown Simpson, O.J. Simpson's former wife. The agencies also rely on grants from foundations, the federal government and private donors. Last year, student teams from marketing classes in the Craig School of Business raised more than \$190,000 as part of their service learning assignment.

Segment #4: Heart Center at Children's Hospital Central California: Evening under the Stars: We were joined by Jennifer McDougal, Mallory's Mother and Cindy McDougal, Adams, Mother, Sister-in-Law. The seventh annual Evening Under the Stars-dinner-dance is scheduled on Saturday, October 3rd at Fig Garden Golf Course. Proceeds benefit the Wilson Heart Center at Children's Hospital Central California. Evening under the Stars was created by John and Jennifer McDougal who lost their daughter Mallory more than six years ago to a rare heart defect. The McDougal's rallied their family and friends to create Evening under the Stars as a way to honor Mallory's memory and to give back to Children's Hospital who provided such compassionate care in their time of need. The event committee has grown to more than 20 members, all touched by loved ones who have battled a heart condition. To date, event precedes top \$225,000 and more than 350 guests attend the dinner-dance.

The health department has confirmed 32 cases of the h1n1 virus in Fresno County and 58 probable cases. 11 people are currently in valley hospitals with the h1n1 virus. Doctors say the virus can turn deadly--very quickly for those with pre-existing conditions. Medical experts expect h1n1 cases to increase this fall. They advise everyone to get a seasonal flu shot and h1n1 vaccines are being tested, and could be available for those at high risk.

Most central valley residents are concerned about the swine flu. An exclusive action news poll conducted by survey USA found 56-percent are very, or somewhat worried about getting sick. 41-percent say they're not worried. The government announced new guidelines for dealing with the swine flu in the workplace. It's the latest measure in anticipation of an h-1-n-1 resurgence this fall. They say businesses can help by letting their employees know that if they have flu-like symptoms they shouldn't come to work and encouraging employees to wash their hands frequently and cover their mouths when they cough and sneeze-and have contingency plans in the event of the spread of the virus.

More than 100-deaths from swine flu have already been reported in California this year. There's a special risk for school children because of their close contact with other students. Swine flu vaccines won't be available until at least October.

The school year has barely begun and swine flu has already hit some south valley schools. No campuses have been shut down. visalia unified has confirmed 12 cases of swine flu, with two more still pending. School officials urge parents not to be alarmed, but expect more cases.

Governor Schwarzenegger says the state has been working with health care providers to prepare for the upcoming flu season. Governor Schwarzenegger says the state will do what it can to distribute the swine flu vaccine as quickly as possible.

Fresno state's athletic department got the call on Monday and several university of Wisconsin football players had the flu. The athletic trainers in Madison wanted to make sure Fresno State Football players would be ready. Experts now say adults may need just one dose of the h-1-n-1 flu vaccine which could help boost the nation's vaccine supply this fall. u-s and Australian researchers say at least 75-percent of people vaccinated for the swine flu virus should be protected with one dose, just like a regular flu shot. Scientists previously thought it might take two doses. Now twice as many people will be able to get the shots, which is important as numbers of h-1-n-1 illness continue to grow.

The swine flu shot could be available a couple weeks earlier than expected. The vaccine was supposed to arrive for everyday Americans in the middle of October, but the nation's health secretary says some of the shots should be available by the first week of next month. Hospital officials and medical providers are meeting at the state capitol to discuss preparations for the massive swine flu outbreak expected this winter. The California Department of Public Health estimates one in four residents will contract the H1N1 virus during the upcoming flu season. All hospitals are required to have a pandemic flu plan, and have stockpiled supplies and flu treatment drugs such as Tamiflu, because swine flu often affects the lungs; she says hospitals are stocking up on ventilators. Health officials say they're now waiting to find out how severe the swine flu will be in the coming months.

A vaccine for the H1N1 swine flu could be available soon. The government has approved a formula to protect against the virus. Last year, Coakley was laid off from her job serving as a vice principal within the Fresno unified school district. This year, she'll teach second grade at southeast Fresno elementary school. It's a brand new k through 6 schools that was designed to alleviate overcrowding in the district. The school will be open for the next two years until a permanent school is built. But her return doesn't come without some expense. Coakley has already spent the 150-dollars she was allocated to buy school supplies for the entire year. She's also spent hundreds more of her own money. The school's principal, Misty Her, says because of budget cuts, teachers are given less to work with this year forcing them to come up with lower cost solutions.

This new elementary school is made up entirely of portable classroom because it's only designed to be a temporary solution to overcrowding in the district. Along with space, the students along with their teachers are facing financial challenges as well. This morning 800 kindergarteners through sixth graders will walk onto campus as the inaugural class at southeast elementary. To prepare teachers have been stocking up on school supplies. But budget cuts only allotted 150 dollars per classroom for supplies for the entire year. So teachers are digging deep into their own pockets.

The major prison reform narrowly passed by the state senate changes how California punishes some criminals. It aims to save the state money by reducing the inmate population by roughly 27,000 during this budget year 10,000 more next year. It allows the governor to commute the sentences of non-citizen felons and turn them over to the feds for deportation and gives early release to low-risk offenders who earn it through education or substance abuse programs and eases parole supervision, making it harder to go back to prison. Lowers certain property crimes to misdemeanors and, creates a commission empowered to change sentencing laws. The plan supported by governor Schwarzenegger and Democrats' sparked impassioned debate from Republicans, who say the crime rate will rise.

WATER CRISIS IN THE CENTRAL VALLEY

ACTION NEWS 5PM, 7/01/09, LENGTH :41 SEC., LOCAL

The water pumps are flowing again tonight in the Sacramento - San Joaquin delta. Federal officials' ended seasonal restrictions today intended to protect the threatened delta smelt. The biological opinion that governs delta water exports lasts through June 30th. the action means summer water exports will no longer be specifically restricted to protect smelt. Wildlife experts claim the delta smelt population may be near extinction. Water agencies say the pumping limits have aggravated California's three-year drought. The water pumps will be turned off again in the winter

ACTION NEWS 6PM, 7/01/09, LENGTH 1:56 MIN., LOCAL

Fresno's former Mayor is never one to shy away from controversy and at Wednesday's water rally, he walked into a new one, comparing the endangered species act to deadly attacks on U.S. soil. Alan Autry stirred up the crowd of thousands outside his old offices at city hall, demanding action from the Federal Government.

Federal officials have promised money to help the central valley deal with the water shortage, but it didn't come today. Some central valley farmers desperate for relief from a state-wide water shortage are poised to receive help from the state soon. He met with Mendota farmers last month and toured the city's dry. . Fallow fields. As part of the water release, farmers will have until the end of November to "re-pay" the loan by replenishing supplies that will be used in the valley this summer.

ACTION NEWS AM LIVE, 7/28/09, LENGTH 1:03 SEC., LOCAL

The community food bank will meet with State Officials tomorrow morning to try and make it easier for central valley residents to get some much-needed assistance. About 25-hundred people were nearly turned away from a food giveaway today, in mendota. the state is providing millions of dollars in food relief to those hardest hit by the drought and water cutbacks. But in order to qualify for the free food, everyone must show proof of residency, plus, an unemployment slip, termination notice, or letter from an employer stating they were laid off because of the water shortage.

Representatives from the governor's office called me just a little while ago to tell me the stringent requirements for drought relief in the form of free food have been scrapped. For the last two days the state department of social services scrambled to find a solution after valley leaders complained they were insensitive for wanting to turn away thousands of people who didn't have the right papers the state wants to make sure those getting "drought relief" really have been laid off or can't find work because of the water shortage. Initially everyone needed proof of where they live, plus an employment check stub or letter from an employer stating they lost their job because of the drought. But Larson says no one in the Mendota food line Tuesday knew that and that common sense should have prevailed in a town where almost half the population is out of work.
