Poverty Point Site is special because of: The earthworks are massive: 5 mounds and 6 C-shaped ridges surround a huge plaza. The geometric design is unique in the world and is a masterpiece of engineering. The site is 3,500 years old. At the time the earthworks were constructed, they were the largest in North America. The site was the major political, trading, and ceremonial center of its day in North America. Dated between 1700 and 1100 B.C., this site of more than 400 acres is unique among archaeological sites on this continent. In 1962, Poverty Point was designated a National Historic Landmark by the U.S. Department of the Interior. The site also became a Smithsonian Affiliate in 2010. Description: All juvenile detention facilities in the state of Louisiana are now licensed and inspected by the Louisiana Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS). This marks the first time that juvenile detention facilities in the state have been required to be licensed. "Licensing juvenile detention facilities is all about the safety of the children in these facilities," said DCFS Secretary Suzy Sonnier. "Before today, Louisiana did not have quality standards for these facilities to meet in order to ensure the well-being of the children in these facilities. We are correcting that today." State licensing of juvenile detention facilities became state law in 2010, after legislation sponsored by former state Representative Damon Baldone (D-Houma) was signed by Governor Bobby Jindal. R.S. 15:1110 establishes statewide standards for juvenile detention facilities, ensures maintenance of standards and requires facilities to be licensed. DCFS worked with representatives from juvenile justice, public safety and corrections organizations, state government and stakeholders to develop uniform licensing standards. In 2012, after developing regulations, the DCFS Licensing Unit began working closely with Louisiana's 15 juvenile detention facilities to prepare them for the licensing process. Before July 1, 2013, facilities were required only to meet fire marshal and health department approvals. DCFS conducted onsite consultations with facility staff last year in order to prepare them for official inspections. Facilities were also able to apply for waivers for deficiencies that did not impact the health or safety of the children in the facilities. Most waivers dealt with existing building facilities that would be prohibitively expensive to change, such as ceiling heights. Treasurer Kennedy announced that the Department of the Treasury will issue final demand letters this week to 36 entities that have up to now failed to comply with the provisions of Executive Order BJ 2008-30, established by Governor Kathleen Blanco and continued by Governor Bobby Jindal, which ensures transparency and accountability to NGOs that have received direct taxpayer support in past appropriation bills. Should these 36 entities ultimately decide to continue their non-compliance, they will be among the first items on the agenda for the new Office of Debt Recovery. Treasurer Kennedy has long advocated the establishment of such an office and made it a top priority during Governor Jindal's Streamlining Commission in 2009.
