**Description:** Insurance Commissioner Jim Donelon said "draconian rate increases" for flood insurance provided by the federal government will be devastating to homeowners and businesses, and urged Congress to postpone changes passed in 2012 for at least another year. "The Biggert-Waters (Flood Insurance Reform) Act threatens to devastate our economy and make thousands of properties valueless. Politicians just don't do insurance well."

The 2012 law reauthorizes the National Flood Insurance Program, or NFIP, first passed in 1968, and will mandate substantial increases in premiums for certain policyholders in high-risk areas who, until now, have received subsidized rates. Proponents say the increases will help bring the program out of debt and toward actuarial soundness. Opponents argue that the changes will disproportionately affect policyholders in high-risk areas, like the Gulf Coast, and could go so far as to render certain properties valueless. Donelon is in the second camp. While he said some other states have coasts dominated by high-rise apartments, hotels and vacation homes, Louisiana's is a "working coast" that provides indispensable energy and exports to the entire region and the world. About 80 percent of policyholders nationwide won't be affected by the changes, according to FEMA. This is true St. Bernard Parish residents, 95 percent of whom should see no change in their premiums, Donelon said. However, he said whole subdivisions in St. Charles Parish would be facing increases that are unaffordable and untenable.

Louisiana has the third highest number of flood insurance policies under the NFIP and accounts for the majority of the program's debt, after \$16 billion in payouts to policyholders in the state in the wake of Hurricane Katrina.

Donelon said that he would like to see the 2012 changes delayed for one more year so Congress could include levee upgrades performed by local governments. The idea for the festival surfaced after Mentor Landry indicated the need to have a community festival to then L'Observateur newspaper editor Joseph Lucia Sr. With that idea, Frank Fagot, of the LaPlace Volunteer Fire Department, began organizing the community event. An informative editorial by Joe Lucia convinced the local citizenry that this was a good project for the community to undertake. The Andouille Festival started around the idea of incorporating local civic and family groups to participate in various booths. This created an atmosphere of local pride and togetherness and was the true success of the festival. In 1989, the fire department chose to sell its private enterprise and the Andouille Festival was moved to St. Charles Parish. In 1993, the Principal owner of the Andouille Festival, Mr. Mike Norton (owner of Bull's Corner in LaPlace) offered the festival rights back to the parish at no costs. The festival rights were received through the Parish's Department of Economic Development and its Economic Development Committee. A new name was registered with the Secretary of State of Louisiana and the Festival was renamed the "St. John the Baptist Parish Andouille Festival." The first St. John the Baptist Parish Andouille Festival was held in October of 1994 on the grounds of the Percy Herbert building in Laplace. The threeday event features music, good times, carnival rides and of course Andouille. Thousands of people merge upon the festival grounds every year for a fun-filled weekend, highlighted by cooking contests in which contestants prepare their recipes using Andouille in three categories: gumbo, jambalaya, and miscellaneous dishes. Believing that boys who roamed the streets should have a positive alternative, they organized the first Club. A cause was born. To recognize the fact that girls are a part of our cause, the national organization's name was changed to Boys & Girls Clubs of America in 1990. Accordingly, Congress amended and renewed our charter. 2006 marked the Centennial year of Boys & Girls Clubs of America, as we celebrated 100 years of providing hope and opportunity to young people across the country. Character development has been the cornerstone of the Boys & Girls Club experience since the first Club opened in 1860. The first Club professional, John Collins, devised a system of informal guidance to attract boys into the Club, capture their interest, improve their behavior and increase their personal expectations and goals. The procedures Collins used constituted a clearly planned, socially scientific system of taking boys off the street and promoting their development towards a successful, productive future. This system formed the basis of the Boys & Girls Club environment. It is still in use today with proven results. Description: Charter Schools are independent public schools that are free to be more innovative and are held accountable for improved student achievement. They foster a relationship between parents, teachers, and students to create an environment in which parents are more involved, teachers can be more innovative, and students are provided the structure they need to learn. Louisiana's Charter School Law was originally enacted in 1995 (Act 192) as a pilot program allowing up to eight school districts to volunteer to participate. These districts could either grant charters to eligible groups or apply to the State Board of Elementary and Secondary Education (BESE) to operate a charter school themselves. The law was substantially revised in 1997 (Act 477) to allow all school districts to participate, but the number of charter schools statewide was capped at 42. The 1997 act also allowed an "appealstype" procedure under which an eligible group could submit its charter proposal directly to BESE if a local school board failed to approve it or if the local school board placed conditions on the approval of the charter which were unacceptable to the group. In 2003, a constitutional amendment (Act 1293) and four bills (Act 9, Act 260, Act 381 and Act 944) impacted the operation of charter schools. The constitutional amendment authorized the State Board of Elementary and Secondary Education to take over failing public schools or provide for others to do so; it also authorized BESE to receive, control and spend the state and local per pupil share of the Minimum Foundation Program (MFP) for those schools. Companion legislation (Act 9) spelled out the procedure BESE is to follow to implement the provisions of the constitutional amendment; created a new "Type 5" category of charter schools as one option BESE has for providing for the operation of a failing public school it takes over; and includes special provisions for the creation and operation of Type 5 charter schools. Description: The Cash Management Review Board, leaders of the Office of Debt Recovery (ODR) agreed to move forward with State Treasurer John Kennedy's suggestion to immediately begin the process of collecting over \$1.6 million in past due ethics fines from public officials, lobbyists and Political Action Committees (PACs). "When Rep. Chris Broadwater first introduced the legislation to create the Office of Debt Recovery with my full support, I knew that it had the potential to be the most important cash management tool the state has ever had," said Treasurer Kennedy. "As today's testimony reflects, Louisiana is further ahead on our new debt collection process than I imagined. I particularly applaud Secretary Tim Barfield and the Attorney General's Office for agreeing to move forward with the collection of these long overdue ethics fines." According to testimony, the State Board of Ethics will soon be able to provide ODR the name of political candidates, lobbyists or PACs who have past due fines and, with the use of a new computer program, take immediate actions such as seizing bank accounts and revoking hunting and driver's licenses. "Politicians shouldn't hold themselves to a different standard than Louisiana taxpayers," said Treasurer Kennedy. Treasurer Kennedy also proposed that all or a substantial portion of money collected from these overdue fines be dedicated back to the state Board of Ethics, which has been underfunded over the last decade, for enforcement of existing laws. "We can ensure that our ethics and campaign finance watchdogs can beef up their efforts without having to raise taxes."
