A SOCIAL WORKER OF 25 YEARS, JOEL LEVY, HAS WORKED WITH THE HOMELESS AND HAS DEVELOPED THE REGIONAL ENGAGEMENT AND ASSESSMENT OF THE CHRONICALLY HOMELESS HOUSING PROGRAM AND SERVICES AS REGIONAL MANAGER FOR HOMELESS SERVICES IN MASSACHUSETTS. ABOUT 635,000 AMERICANS WERE HOMELESS IN 2012 AND ABOUT 100,000 OF THEM WERE CHRONICALLY HOMELESS. TO HELP THE POPULATION THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT SPENDS BILLIONS OF TAX DOLLARS EACH YEAR. HOWEVER THAT MONEY MAY NOT BE GOING TO THE PROGRAMS THAT WILL DO THE MOST GOOD. THE TRADITIONAL MODEL FOR HELPING THOSE WITHOUT HOMES IS TO MOVE THEM FROM ONE TYPE OF GOVERNMENT FUNDED HOUSING TO ANOTHER AS THEY ADDRESS WHATEVER ISSUES MAY HAVE LED TO THEIR HOMELESSNESS SUCH AS HEALTH PROBLEMS. LEVY ADVOCATES A NON-TRADITIONAL APPROACH THAT PUTS THE HOMELESS INTO PERMANENT APARTMENTS WHICH WOULD ALLOW THE HOMELESS TO RECEIVE MEDICAL AND MENTAL TREATMENT FOR THE ISSUES THAT CAUSED THEM TO BE WITHOUT SHELTER. IN THE LONG RUN, LESS TAXPAYERS MONEY WOULD BE SPENT.

JEFFERSON HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS TALKED ABOUT THEIR TOBACCO PREVENTION PROJECT. EMILY, CODY AND AUSTIN TALKED ABOUT HOW THEY GET STUDENTS INVOLVED IN THIS ANTITOBACCO PROJECT AND HOW MANY ARE CURRENTLY INVOLVED. THE PROJECT IS IN ITS 2ND YEAR AND USES PEER PRESSURE AND EDUCATION OF THE DANGERS OFUSING TOBACCO IN ANY FORM. THEIR END GOAL IS TO ELIMINATE STUDENTS USE OF THIS DANGEROUS PRODUCT. THE STUDENTS EXPLAINED WHAT THEY HAVE ACCOMPLISHED SO FAR AND THEY BELIEVE THEY ARE MAKING A DIFFERENCE. MINNESOTA'S BAN ON INDOOR SMOKING IN PUBLIC PLACES HAS HELPED, ALONG WITH FREE STOP SMOKING ASSISTANCE INCLUDING FREE PRODUCTS FROM CLEARWAY MINNESOTA WHICH OFFERS ONE ON ONE CONSULTATION. ABOUT 17% OF STUDENTS AT JEFFERSON HIGH CURRENTLY SMOKE AND/OR USE CHEWING TOBACCO SO THE CHALLENGE CONTINUES. MOST STUDENTS WHO SMOKE SAY THEY TRIED SMOKING WHILE IN GRADE SCHOOL OR JUNIOR HIGH. ANOTHER REASON STUDENTS QUIT IS THE HIGH PRICE OF CIGARETTES DUE TO MINNESOTA CIGARETTE TAX. ALSO AIRED AS A TWO MINUTE SOUND BITE DURING THE FOLLOWING NEWSCASTS:
