As of today, the Navajo Nation Office of the controller has issued nealy 120,000 checks for the Navajo Cares Act Harship Assistance Program. The first round of check printing contained more 2000,000 apporved checks that wree set to be issued and are expected to be completed by the end of the week.

Members of the Navajo Nation Council voiced appreciation and support for two bills in the Arizona Legislature that wold provide project funding to Arizona Department of Transportation for Hopi Route 60 (H60) and Cornfield Chapter projects. Both bills received approval votes in the Arizona House Committee on Transportation on Wednesday

On Saturday, Navajo Nation President Jonathan Nez, First Lay Phefelia Nez, and Vice President Myron Lizer came together with members of the 24th Navajo Nation Council at Navajo Veteran Memorial Park in Window Rock AZ, to sign into law Resolutions CJA-01-21, approving over \$54 million from the Navajo Nations Sihasin Fund to secure heavy equipment to help meet local community needs and for water infrastructure projects that will bring clan water to many Navajo Families.

The UK variant is currently the most dominant varient in the United States and has been detected in all 50 states, including any cases in the Fourt Corners states.
