Legislation No. 00664-21, sponsored by Naakikiyati Committee Graming Sub-Committee Eugenia Charles-Newton (Shiprock) was amended gaming compact with the State of Arizona after the Council initiated renegotiation in 2016. Under the Federal Indian Gaming Regulatory Act, the Navajo Nation and state are required to enter into gaming compacts to conduct certain types of gaming activities.

On Tuesday, Indian Health Services and all tribal health facilities on the Navajo Nation paused the use of the Johnson and Johnson vaccine base on the Drug Administration. The CDC and FDA recommened a pause in the use of the vaccine based on six reported U.S. Cases, out of 6.8 million doses administered nationally, of a rare and severe type of blood clot in individuals after receiving the Johnson & Johnson.

On Thursday, Navajo Nation Leaders were in attendance as Arizona Gov. Doug Ducey signed off on an amended gaming compact exclusivity for tribes and extends the duriation of the gaming compact to 2048. He also signed into law Arizona Senate Bill 1797, to expand the scope of gaming to include mobile and retail sports betting.

Popular Navajo News achor and journalist Colton Shone of NBC TV station KOB Channel 4 (Albuquerque, NM) and long-time Navajo Physician Dr. Michael Tutt will serve as Dine College's 2021 commencement speakers, in which 98 students will be awarded degrees and certificates on May 7.

Students on the country largest Native American reservation spoke to first lady Dr. Jill Biden on Friday about challenges theyve faced durig the conronavirus pandemic, including poor internet service and feeling of isolation.

The US office of the Assistant Secretary of Indian Affairs announced the Bureau of Indian Education's plan for disbursing \$850 million provided through the Amercican Rescue Plan Act fo Covid-19 relief, for BIE-funded K-12 schools and tribally acontrolled colleges and universities. Of this amount, the 68 Bureau of Indian Education k-12 schools on the Navajo Nation will receive approximatel \$171 million combined, Dine College will receive \$16.8 million, and Navajo Technical University will receive \$16.9 million.

Navajo Nation President Jonathan Nez and Vice President Myron Lizer strongly oppose Arizona Senate Bill 1713 and Senate Bill 1485, which would disenfranchise eligible Navajo Voters in the state of Arizona in future elections. In the 2020 general election last November, Navajo Votores came out in record numbers and changed the outcome of several elecions in the state, but if these bill apre passed and signed into law by Gove. Doug Ducey, those numbers will decrease.

On Saturday, Navajo Nation President Jonathan Nez and Vice President Lizer issued a proclimation to declare the month of May 2021 as "Navajo Nation Foster Care Awareness Month" to recognize and commend all people who devoted their resources, love, and care to provide for Navajo Children throgh foster care.

On Wednesday, Navajo Nation President Jonathan Nez, Vice President Myron Lizer, First Lady Phefelia Nez, and Second Lady Dottie Lizer were joined by the 24th Navajo Nation Council's Sexual Assault Prevention Subcottiee Chair Amber Kanazbah Crotty, Miss Navajo Nation Shaandiin Parrish, and the Albquerque Federal Breau of Investigation (FBI) Field Office at the Navajo Nation Veterans Memorial Park in Window Rock, Arizona for the signing of a proclamation recognizing Ma 5, 2021 as "Navajo Nation Missing and Murdered Indigenous People Awareness Day," in honor and remembrance of all indigenous people and surviving families who have lost their loved ones to murder and those who still remain missing.

Navajo Nation's President Jonathan Nez, Vice President Myron Lizer, and the Department of retirement Services ae pleased to announce the implmenaton of the Navajo Nation Enhanced Retirement Program (ERP).

The U.S. Department of Treasury annouced throgh a letter to tribal leaders issued on Monday, the coronavirus Sate and Local Fishal Recovery Runds program authorized by the American Rescue Plan Act, which provides \$20 billion for tribes to help "turn the tide on the pandemic, address it economic fallout, and lay the foundation for a strng and equitable recovery.

On Sunday, Navajo Nation President Jonathan Nez and Vice President Myron Lizer signed a proclamation to recognize May 16 -22, as "Navajo Nation Emergency Medical Service Week" to honor first responsers, emergency medial techn, paramedics, educators, and administrators who save lives every day by responding to emergenices in all Navajo Nation Communties./ Due t key criteria beign met for restrictios, the Coconino and Kaibab National Forests and coconino county will enter stage 1 campfire and smoking restrictions may at 8 am in an effort to protect public helath by reducting the number of preventable human-caused wildfires.

During a special session on May 14 the Navajo Nation Council debated the future of Controller Pearline Kirk.

The Navajo Nation already had its own police academy, universitities, bare association and court system. Plus a new Washington Office near the embassies of the other sovereign nation. And during the conronavirus pandemic the Dine, as many prefere to call themselves, gained an important distinction; the most populous tribal nation in the United States.

This week, the Commission on Navajo Government Development (CNGD) held a two day work session to recive reprots on Navajo Chapter governance and to enable commissioners to attend meetings either in-person or viturally as part of the ongoing coronavirus (Covid 19) pandemic. CNGD noted that their work session was held in person in Flagstaff, Arizona, while observing both Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and Navajo Department of Health (NDOH) Guidelines for mitigating Covid-19.

The Navajo Nation received ntoice on Friday from the US Dept. of Treasury, acknowledging receipt of the complete and accurate information and documentation that was submitted by the Navajo Nation Washington Office on May 21, wich was used to calculate the allocation of funding throught the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds program authorized by the American Rescue Plan Act that provides \$20 billion for tribes to help recover from the devastating impacts of the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic. Following the notice, the Navajo Nation Recieved its initial fundig allocation totaling \$1,861,554,458.43.

Navajo Nation President Jonathan Nez and Vice President Myron Lizer, in partnership with the Federal Emergency Management Agency, will host an online tow hall on Monday, June 14th at 6:00pm (DST) on the Nez-Lizer Facebook page and YouTube channel to provide information regarding FEMA's Covid-19 bural assisstance program for loved ones who lost a family members to Covid-19. The town hall will also air later in the week on local radio stations.

Navajo Nation President Jonathan Nez and Vice President Myron Lizer, Division Directors under the Nez-Lizer Administration continue to meet with leaders and officials from Navajo Nation Chpaters to hear the needs and priorities of their communities regarding the Covid-19 recovery efforts under the Amercian Rescue Plan Act. On May 28, the Navajo Nation received its initial funding allocation from the Amercian Rescue Plan Act totaling over \$1.8 billion.

Last week during subsequent special Naabik'iyati and 24th Navajo Nation Council meetings, the Council approved the reopening of 8 tribal parks through Legistation No. 0076-21. The legislation passed unanimously following the Navajo Nation;s change from "Orange" to "yellow" safety status under Covid-19 safety protocals detailed by Public Health Order No 2021-0005.

Council Delegate Charlaine Tso urges the public to join her in the search for Ella Mae Begay of Tolikan Sweetwater, AZ who was reported missing to the Navajo Police Deprtment Shiprock District on June 15.
