Veterans and serviving spouses shared their frsutration with the lack of support provided by tribal, state, federal agencies during the pandemic.

On Monday Navajo Nation President Jonathan Nez was joined by Vice President Lizer in Many Farms, Arizona as he signed into law the Navajo Nation's Fiscal Year 2022 Comprehensive Budget throught Resolution CS-49-21, which includes full funding for veterans, prosectors, and many more direct services for elders, youth, and community needs. The FY'2022 Comprehensive Budget was approved by the 24th Navajo Nation Council by a voite of 18-3 on Sept 10, and will go into effect on Oct. 01. The three branch chiefs allocated approximately \$177 million in General Funds for the branches of government.
