10-6 ROGER FRITSCHENMEYER OF PRAIRIE INDEPENDENT LIVING RESOURCE CENTER DISCUSSED THE ANNUAL DISABILITY MENTORING DAY, WHICH INVOLVES OVER 100 HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS FROM RENO COUNTY AND SURROUNDING AREAS, INTRODUCING THEM TO FIELDS OF EMPLOYMENT INTEREST. AMONG THE TOPICS DISCUSSED WAS A NEED FOR VOLUNTEER MENTORS IN CERTAIN FIELDS. ALSO ON THE PROGRAM WAS LUKE BAUER, WHO TOLD US ABOUT A FUNDRAISER ORGANIZED TO HELP TRAPPER TYRELL WHO WAS CRITICALLY INJURED IN AN JUNE CAR WRECK. 10-13 DR. EDWARD HAMMOND, PRESIDENT OF FORT HAYS STATE UNIVERSITY, DISCUSSED ISSUES INVOLVING HIGHER EDUCATION IN KANSAS AND ON-GOING PROJECTS THEY HAVE AT FORT HAYS INCLUDING A LONG ESTABLISHED ONLINE COMPONENT AND COOPERATIVE AGREEMENTS WITH HUTCHINSON AND BARTON COMMUNITY COLLEGES.

11-24 AUBREY ABBOTT PATTERSON, PRESIDENT AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE HUTCHINSON COMMUNITY FOUNDATION, DISCUSSED THE FUND FOR HUTCHINSON, WHICH EACH YEAR PRESENTS GRANTS TO VARIOUS NOT FOR PROFIT ORGANIZATIONS IN RENO COUNTY. PATTERSON OUTLINED A PROJECT THEY HAVE BEGUN TO INCREASE THE SIZE OF THE FUND FROM IT'S CURRENT 3.5 MILLION DOLLARS TO BETWEEN 15 AND 20 MILLION DOLLARS BY 2030.

12-8 DEPUTY RENO COUNTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY TOM STANTON TALKED ABOUT THE TOYS FOR TOTS PROGRAM THE DA'S OFFICE PUTS ON EACH YEAR, AND A NEED FOR DONATIONS DUE TO ANTICIPATED HIGHER THAN USUAL DEMAND. KAY MCMILLIAN, COORDNATOR OF THE NORTHERN RICE COUNTY GOODFELLOWS PROGRAM, DISCUSSED THEIR ANNUAL PROJECT WHICH SERVES FAMILIES IN FIVE COMMUNITIES IN THE NORTHERN 2/3RD OF RICE COUNTY AND A SUBSTANTIALLY INCREASED NEED FOR DONATIONS OF ALL KINDS FOR THE PROJECT.

ALSO DISCUSSED ON THE PROGRAM WERE NEEDS FOR THE SOUTHERN RICE COUNTY GOODFELLOWS PROGRAM WHICH SERVES THE STERLING, ALDEN AND RAYMOND COMMUNITIES.
