The organization advocates for wounded officers who are forced to retire due to their injuries, and works to secure their retirement benefits and provide mental health support. Brown described how and why the organization began. He said that there are various organizations that handle *certain* needs but that Wounded Officers Initiative wants to address the total picture: retirement benefits, medical benefits, and even reintegration into the workforce.

But she adds that though job counseling and working with employers, it is possible to find the right technology and other accommodations to make employment possible. CIL also works to make the home accessible for the disabled individuals. For example, volunteers may build a ramp onto the home or add a special phone line for the hard of hearing. Finally, Walker invited listeners to *Stroll and Roll*. This fundraiser offers participants an opportunity to try to

complete the track in a wheel chair.

Valencia College was awarded a \$5.25 million grant by the U.S. Department of Education through the federal *Developing Hispanic-Serving Institutions Program*. This program is designed to expand educational opportunities on campuses where Hispanics and other minorities make up a large portion of the student body such as on Valencia's Osceola Campus. Plinskie explained that the money will be used to increase the number of career and technical education programs at that campus. Community focus groups will even be brought together to identify training needs unique to Osceola county. Part of the grant money will be used to increase student advising on Valencia's East Campus to help more students graduate and transfer to bachelor's degree programs.

Issues: Kids House of Seminole County is the one-stop for child

abuse investigations in Seminole County and the regional advocacy center for children who have experienced trauma and abuse. They conduct investigations, do follow-up with family, provide court testimony if necessary and follow the family to instill preventative measures. This means that the children are only interviewed once and therefore, do not have to repeat the trauma. Rizzo has been behind an effort to transform a storm water pond next to Kids' House into a peaceful therapeutic location for these children by planting vegetation that attracts wildlife. Sudol explained how her group provided the expertise for the planting that allowed volunteers to create the desired atmosphere. So now the stormwater pond is *Kids' Pond*, a pleasant place for children

and their therapists to walk and reflect. Rizzo says she

hopes that the idea to transform a stormwater pond spreads.

Jacobs. The basic idea is that a community group or family visits a local fire station and does something to thank firefighters for the work they do throughout the year. Kennedy says that it means a lot to them because firefighters are working on the holidays. She says that on average, the local firefighters respond to about 300 calls a day but they average more on holidays. She added that these firefighters are there for people during most difficult times of their lives.
