2. Social Issues: Covered social issues and needs.
3. Politics: Covering local, state, and national politics.
4. Public Safety: Covered issues related to police, and crime.
5. Education: Covered issues related to education
6. Health: Provided information concerning health issues in the community.
7. Phone Calls: Conversations with local listeners about daily issues they're dealing with.

April 2023

It is our endeavor to serve the public interest. Here at KGTO Heart and Soul 1050 AM & 99.1 FM, we continuously broadcast issues of concern to Tulsa and its listening public. The following is a brief description of these issues that were addressed during the 2th quarter. We are airing PSA's informing the listeners up to date on various health concerns such as: Stress awareness Month, Child Safety Seat, as well as Free Health Screenings and Free Food Giveaways. We interviewed Valenthia Doolin with the Oklahoma Housing Finance Agency on the importance on buying a house is more beneficial than renting. Benita Gillispe with Tax Service, sharing tax tips before filing your taxes, Kamyrn Brewer (Loves Travel Stops and Country Stores and PPBC Student of the Month. This month we interviewed Rep Goodwin from Tulsa. We talked about Michael Eric Dyson speaking at the Tulsa Health Department and about the Black Caucus Gala coming up. Kamyrn shared her inspirational story on how she stays focus on school while involved in so many other activities outside of school and also shares her plans for the future. We interviewed Rev. M. L. Jemison, Pastor Marcus Curruthers and Debra Johnson about revival. We did a telephone interview with Idabell, OK Mayor, Craig Young.

May 2023

We continue to broadcast daily and weekly briefings in Tulsa on the upcoming events. Marilyn Hildrith spoke about the legacy of her mother Clara Looper and how now her story is being told with the Oklahoma Philharmonic. The commissioning of the new music commemorated the 100th year. We also talked to John Brown with Brown O'Haver, where they specialize in claim adjusting of insurance. They also provide support for those that are insured. Representative Regina Goodwin touches on the Oklahoma State Democratic Party, re-elects Alicia Andrews as Chair, she is the first black woman to hold the position in Oklahoma, Victor Luckerson, an author who received a great national review for his book "Built from the Fire". Rep Goodwin also shared the special sessions will resume on Monday June 12. Rep Goodwin also talked about Tulsa Race Massacre Survivors waiting on a judges decision on an abatement case. She also talked about Gov. Stitt and him ending funding for OETA and Native American wearing of Indian regalia during graduations. We talked about Black Wall Street license plates.

June 2023

We continue to broadcast daily and weekly briefings in Tulsa. Tulsa Attorney Hanson Dirani touched on a variety of topics that include: nursing home abuse, auto accidents, and sexual abuse. Jabar Shumate with the Urban League talked about their Expunge Expo. During the Expo they will help people work out and clean their criminal record. Robin Khoury with Little Light Academy talked about free tuition at their Christian school. The school is for children that have parents that are or have been incarcerated. Jaz Cox with Tru Sky Credit Union talked about saving money and Mrs. Washington with Mindful Counseling Solutions talked about her in-person services or virtual counseling for all ages. We interviewed Eddie Sarpong with Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity Inc. Rep. Regina Goodwin from Tulsa talked about a \$1.6 million federal grant to study the removal of I-244 across Greenwood.
