WJXT Reporter, Jen Waugh did a documentary regarding the disappearance 10 years ago of HaLeigh Cummings who was just 5 years old at the time. This little girl from Putnam County...has been missing for 10 years. For those of you who were here in 2009 you remember like we do...the massive search for HaLeigh Cummings. She went to bed the night of February 9th and was discovered missing hours later by her father's girlfriend.

In February 2019 News4Jax began the first of a series of special reports focusing on the kindergartener, her family and the theories about what happened to her. Jen Waugh conducted in-depth interviews with 3 former investigators who worked tirelessly to find HaLeigh. In the documentary they share their memories of this case as well as their PERSONAL theories about what happened. In the documentary we look back at all of Channel 4's coverage over the past 10 years... by so many of our reporters. EDUCATION & CHILDREN'S ISSUES

College Admissions Scandal

WJXT reported on the recent college admissions bribery scheme. "The FBI uncovered what we believe is a rigged system." The Justice Department outlined a wide-ranging college admissions bribery scheme, charged at least 50 people, including 33 wealthy parents with paying up to \$6.5 million dollars to help their children gain admission into the nation's most competitive universities, including Yale and Stanford. "We're talking about deception and fraud. Fake test scores, fake athletic credentials, fake photographs, bribed college officials."

The admitted mastermind behind the scam, William Singer, set up a fraudulent charity used to launder the money parents gave him for bribes. "Getting into the right college will set the trajectory for the rest of your son or daughter's life - don't leave it to chance." Singer pleaded guilty to multiple charges including racketeering. He told a Boston judge: "I created a side door that guaranteed families would get in."

Mental Toughness

One of our News4Jax anchors, Kent Justice did a segment on mental toughness and emotional intelligence. It was a practical conversation on mental toughness - and the need for it politically, professionally, and personally.

In the segment our anchor interviewed a former US Marine who is an expert in the field. Here are some of the characteristics of people who are mentally tough and have high emotional intelligence: they don't let their feelings get in the way; they're willing to suspend their disbeliefs; they use compartmentalization to find common ground and they're professional listeners.
