Out of his own need to be part of a welcoming faith community, he founded the Solo Parent Society. "Grief is woven into an adoptee's journey," she says, adding desperate questions about birthparents are sometimes suppressed by pressure to be grateful. Castillo says domestic abuse doesn't have to be a violent attack, but may also be verbal abuse, and also how it affects children in the household. "Human trafficking is a legitimate concern for folks out the street," says Jeff Stern, CEO of the National Runaway Safeline. More than 4-million teenagers are homeless every year, though not always by choice. "Whether it's that they don't feel safe in their own home, or whether they've been kicked out, this is not something young people generally want." Whatever drove them to the streets, hunger inevitably awaits. Traffickers spot runaways as easy prey and sometimes offer food to bait the trap.</p>

Truckloads of tuna, beans, rice, fresh water, baby food, hygiene kits even cellphone chargers distributed through European Christians have been crucial to the survival of displaced families. Her dad oversaw pastoral leadership at Kyiv Theological Seminary. Jessica Wiebe also grew up in Kyiv, from first grade on, in a missionary family. Both young women's parents are American, and their families are now in safe locations as Russia continues its brutal attack against the sovereign nation. And both are currently students at Cedarville University in Ohio. Abigail and Jessica have been able to share about life in Ukraine with fellow students and professors, helping them understand the lifestyle and many concerns of the 44-million Ukrainians - <i>and pray</i> for Ukraine. Students and professors alike are eager to know more about the country and its people. We talked with Jessica and Abigail separately and obtained considerable insight and heartfelt thoughts that are available to you in our individual podcasts. In a sense, both young women are in a position to act as information ambassadors to Americans who are very concerned about the war and the brutal things happening at the hands of Russian forces.</p>
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Ukraine - Children	K-LOVE's Positive People	May	Monthly Feature Various	Weekly Promo 60 seconds Podcast 15:58	<p>Led By Determined Ohioan Sherri McClurg, 'New Horizons for Children' Protects the Vulnerable in Ukraine</p> <p>Ohio-Based New Horizons for Children has operated in Ukraine since 2009. When the prospect of a Russian invasion seemed likely in February, Executive Director Dr. Sherri McClurg traveled to Ukraine to see what could be done. “The plans were to go over before the war to be preventative. How can we help our orphanages? Are there any schools we need to evacuate to get children to a safer area in Ukraine? So that was all in the works - and the war broke out while I was there. Very overwhelming!” When it became clear the war was not going to be swift and done, “It quickly changed to which schools <i>do</i> need to evacuate? Which ones <i>can</i> we evacuate? It was the middle of a war zone, right, so we were spending time in bunkers, and it was getting really, really, scary and there were distinct moments that really stand out to me where I was just like, ‘Lord, what are we doing here?’... ‘Lord, I’m ready to go home!’ When I get out of this bunker, I’m out of here.” But Sherri shares the next morning God showed her just what his plan was for her.</p> <p>Representatives from the Ukrainian military asked to meet “and in that conversation they asked if what we were doing</p>
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					<p>with these few, we need to do with a lot of children. And would you stay and partner with us to evacuate children from the east (eastern Ukraine) and move them to the west?" The local government realized the care and professionalism Sherri's team offered and they wanted to expand that to help even more children in orphanages and boarding schools flee the immediate war zone.</p>
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Ukraine - Children	K-LOVE's Positive People	May		<p>So far, working with their partner Aerial Recovery, they have taken in 1,200 children to the western side of the country. And that number is growing. "These children, they're all in institutional care. They've all had complex developmental traumas throughout their life. They have trauma that they're already carrying. Now we're pulling them out of these war-torn regions." Her desire is to keep the kids in their own country where they know the culture and the language. Knowing the sheer number of Ukrainians - in the millions - who have crossed the border into Poland, Romania, and Moldova and the risks facing children, human traffickers for example, Sherri is getting considerable help from the area government to find good buildings to safely secure the children <i>inside</i> Ukraine. She believes many of the children who have crossed the border may never return to Ukraine. "We're bringing in blankets and bedding and medicine and providing medical care." "So, the whole point of the safe havens was to just stop some of the chaos and some of those additional traumas and just create a <i>space to breathe.</i>" Realizing the potential for intensified war to come to western Ukraine, "All of the safe havens are very close to the border, and we have emergency plans in place if we</p>
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					<p>need to emergency-evacuate all the kids across the border, we can do that.” Looking ahead, the need will continue in different ways for years. “When this conflict resolves, lots of these schools have been blown up. There’s no place for these children to even go back to. And what is this going to look like and what do we need to do? It’s one thing to create a temporary shelter that’s safe and warm and takes care of our needs right now, <i>but these are children</i>, and they’ve got a lot more needs than just this moment of getting them safe.”</p>

They suffer sleepless nights, heavy rucksacks, muddy marches and lonely months --or years-- separated from loved ones. As battle drills build strength and endurance for mind and body, Cru Military Ministry seeks to strengthen a soldier's heart and soul. The mission "for us, specifically...it's <i>spiritual fitness</i>," says Dave Eatman, retired Marine and Cru National Director. The ministry offers "discipleship, education and mentoring and encouragement to serve Christ well and walk with Christ well while in uniform."</p>

Recipients of care must be living under the poverty level and not be receiving any government agency assistance. Hamilton says youth many times these youth have never had a chance to shop for new clothes, so San Antonio threads offers them to pick out clothes that they like with their own personal shopper. The youth are referred to the organization, and pick out their clothes, just like a regular clothing store. The youth can shop twice a year. The new clothes often help them with their self-esteem, and for the older youth, find clothes that will help them obtain a job, and gain self-sufficiency. Hamilton says they also have a chance to mentor these youth while they're shopping, many times making a huge impact in the child's life.</p>

Arms of Hope serves San Antonio, and other Texas communities, by providing Christ-centered support services and programing that help single mothers and their children overcome life challenges. Robertson describes programs including Together Program, Family Outreach, College and Career, and Right Start. Robertson also shares a "success" story about a former student who, with the help of Arms of Hope, overcame her life struggles and went on to become an attorney in San Antonio. Healthcare	Closer Look	May 22	7:30 pm	20 minutes	University Health - Nurse/Family Partnership Bob Dittman talked with Claudio Ochoa, Nursing Supervisor of the Nurse/Family Partnership at University Health in San Antonio about helping expectant mothers with pre and post natal care. The program is for moms and families that are financially disadvantaged to get free help from a nurse/partner that visits their home, helps with nutrition, safety in the home, and best practices to get mom and baby off to the best start. Ochoa says they stay with mom for up to two years after the baby is born. They also help with making sure mom and the family are self-sufficient, providing referrals to other agencies they may reach out to for additional services.
