Toledo retools vicious dog laws

The State of Ohio declared Ohio's vicious dog law unconstitutional because it carried breed specific language that targeted pit bulls. After months of deliberation by the special committee, Toledo city council passed a new vicious dog law that eliminated references to pit bulls, provided larger fines for dog bites, and defined how long a dog may be kept outside unattended.

On October 13, Hubert Wiggins spoke with pit bull owners who are happy with the new ordinance, saying pit bulls are not the problem – owners are. In addition to the changes noted in the earlier story, Wiggins reported that unsprayed or neutered dogs caught roaming free will be fixed at the owner's expense.

Columbia Gas does not employ billing agents or collection agents, relying on the third party for those services.

Only a handful of Toledo businesses can say they have it. But now you can add Brooks Insurance Agency to the list of "energy star rated buildings" certified through the Environmental Protection Agency and U.S. Department of Energy.

Brooks Insurance says through its efforts it has reduced electrical consumption by five percent and around ten percent savings per year on the electric bills.

In all, 600 acres on and around his farm cannot be developed regardless of future owners. For his donation Miller received a tax deduction. But according to him, finances is just a small part of why he did it. He wants to preserve his property for future generations.

Portion of Middle Bass Island will be preserved in natural state

On the way over by ferry, you get a birds eye view of Middle Bass Island. From afar, you see land, trees, and water, but once you've arrived there's so much more to experience. Now, a small portion of the island, the East Point Preserve, is protected from development.

Participating organizations, including the Black Swamp Conservancy, the Put-in-Bay Township Park District, and The Trust for Public Land have all played a part in making this happen. The position on the tip of the island and its wooded shores create a great resting spot for migratory birds. The property also contains a diversity of habitats, including natural beachlands, mature hardwood forest, and grass prairies. The land also protects the federally threatened Lake Erie Water Snake and other listed plant and animal species.

The cost for the approximately eight acre site came to a million dollars. But funding from non profits and even the government helped offset the expense. Also Black Swamp Conservancy and the park district set up a conservation agreement, preventing the property from ever being subdivided or developed

Still time to take advantage of Ohio energy tax credit

Homeowners have until December 31st to buy qualifying items, such as certain heating and air units, water heaters, insulation, roofing, windows and doors.

The tax credit is 30 percent of the cost of certain energy-efficient home improvements, up to a maximum of \$1500 for both 2009 and 2010 combined. Make sure to save all receipts and signed statements from the manufacturer certifying the product qualifies for the credit.

Toledo's AAA Transmission wants to put you in a hybrid without the cost of buying one. At this auto shop a device is used to break water down to H-H-O. Two parts hydrogen and one part oxygen. This is also known as Browns Gas. By using this alternative type of energy it's estimated your gas mileage can increase 20 to 50 percent.

The cost of the H-H-O device can run between \$700 and a thousand dollars, depending if you install it yourself. Grow Soxx are two foot long cotton tubes filled with organic material, soil, and fertilizer. And while they aren't the prettiest to look at they sure shine at bringing a garden to life in places you wouldn't even think possible.

Toledo's Budapest Restaurant got to experiment with them this summer. Here, the tubing mixed with compost material was laid out in rows similar to a farm. Mulch covered the Grow Soxx and areas in between to help keep everything moist. The soil itself was contaminated since it was on the former site of a burned out building. This proves how versatile this product really is.

The non-profit, Center for Innovative Food Technology, or CIFT, played a big part in making this all happen.

The mood at Metzgers Printing and Mailing is definitely looking a whole lot brighter with the addition of more than four thousand square feet of solar panels on the roof of its main printing plant in south Toledo. There's hope close to 13% of its annual power usage can be generated through this technology.

Metzgers Printing worked with Solscient Energy for more than a year on this project, considered to be one of the largest solar installations at a privately held company.

Another five thousand square feet of panels will be added to the roof of the Mailing and Fulfillment Center off Frenchmens Road. The total array is capable of producing up to 125 thousand watts at any time during peak conditions. Think of it as powering 13 homes continuously.

Solscient Energy provided the system design, installation, and development of the solar array. This company is a tenant at the University of Toledo's Clean and Alternative Energy Incubator program.

Just this year, Ohio passed a new law establishing a bio-products preferred purchasing program for state agencies and state-supported colleges and universities. It's similar to existing "buy ohio" provisions in state law.

Parents said work schedules will have to be adjusted or their students will have to find a ride with another teenager. Oregon school officials say there is nothing left to cut.

On November 4, corrections officers that assisted in subduing Colton Benton testified that they had his arms and legs secure and that Sgt. Gray placed Benton in the sleeper hold while they were restraining him. They testified that Benton was not a threat once his arms and legs were secure. The prosecution also showed video of Sgt. Gray pushing Benton into a wall for no apparent reason where Benton struck his head and was apparently injured.

On November 5, the internal affairs investigator for the Lucas County Sheriff testified that the events that led to Colton Benton's death should have been investigated because false testimony was provided and documents were falsified.

On November 10, the sheriff's internal affairs investigator said he talked to the county prosecutor about Benton's death and said he told the prosecutor that the investigation was going nowhere and that corrective measures needed to be taken within the sheriff's department.

On November 11, the detective who investigated Colton Benton's death said he was uncomfortable pursuing the investigation because it "pointed fingers at Sgt. John Gray."

On November 12, the defense attorney representing Captain McBroom collapsed as he was cross examining a witness. He was conscious and alert when he was taken from the courtroom. The trial adjourned for the day.

On November 17, The prosecution rested its case. The last prosecution witness was the FBI agent who conducted the investigation that led to the charges being filed. He battled with defense attorneys who questioned his ability to recall what was said to him in interviews that were not recorded four years ago. Defense will start November 18.

On November 18, the defense for all four defendants made opening statements.

On November 19, the defense for all four defendants rested. The brought in an expert to demonstrate the sleeper hold that jailers are taught to use.

On November 30, the search for the Skelton brothers continued in Williams County, OH. The chief of police of Morenci said he did not expect a positive outcome in the search. Skelton's statement that he gave the boys to a woman named Joann Taylor has been dismissed as false. NBC 24 ran a picture of Skelton's van because police want to know if any Williams County residents saw the van in the area on Thanksgiving Day.

On December 1, NBC 24 ran two full packages on the Skelton story. Jon Skelton appeared in a Lucas County courtroom on December 1 and refused to waive extradition from Ohio. Skelton had been in a Toledo hospital with an injured ankle after an abortive suicide attempt.

Also on December 1, the search continued in Williams County for the missing brothers. Searchers concentrated on areas along the St. Joseph River and small retention ponds in the area as well as secluded wooded areas.

On December 2, the Toledo police dive team searched the waters of a number of area retention ponds and the St. Joseph River near a Williams County campground for the bodies of the three young boys now missing for more than a week. That evening, NBC 24 covered live a candlelight vigil held at Northwest State Community College in Archbold.

On December 3, the volunteer searchers continued to look for the Skelton brothers even though the Morenci police have ceased organized search activities. Pamela Osborne spoke with a teacher who had the Skelton boys in school about the toll their disappearance has taken on the school and its students.

On December 4, Pamela Osborne talked to Morenci residents who are still trying to find ways to help find the missing boys. Morenci's mayor canceled the city's Christmas tree lighting.

On December 5, Pamela Osborne provided a recap of events as they occurred from Thanksgiving evening when the Amber Alert was issued up until the day prior when the search officially ended. Osborne also covered the candlelight vigil held in Morenci the evening of December 5.

On December 6, 2010, NBC 24 reported on the efforts of local merchants and individuals to "keep hope alive" and encourage people to continue the search for the two missing boys even after the police ceased organizing searches. Signs are appearing all over the Morenci area.

On December 7, 2010, the Chief of Police of Morenci reported that there were no new leads in the boys' disappearance. He encouraged area residents to search their own properties.

On December 8, Skelton's parents visited him in the Lucas County jail. They came away from the visit believing their grandchildren were alive. Meanwhile, Skelton's aunt says she believes she can get Jon Skelton to open up to her about where the boys are, but she has not made any effort to travel from Florida to visit Skelton.

On December 14, Skelton appeared in a Lucas County court where he waived extradition and surrendered to Michigan authorities. He was transported back to Morenci.

On December 15, Skelton faced a judge in Morenci, MI where his bond was set at \$30 million. He was provided with a court appointed attorney. Tanya Skelton, Jon Skelton's estranged wife, says her faith and the Bible are sustaining her.

On December 16, Skelton appeared in court on the matter of his divorce. At this hearing, he claimed that he gave the boys to an "organization" that visited his home on Thanksgiving Day. He refused to name that organization and a judge informed him that he could be held indefinitely on a contempt of court charge.

On December 22, a prayer vigil was held to mark the one month anniversary of the boys' disappearance. Their mother pleaded for their return and defended herself against accusations made by the boys' father that she was not a fit mother.

William Carswell, part owner of the Main Street Exchange – an east Toledo second hand shop – was shot and killed in his business around 4:00 PM December 11. A coworker said he left Carswell – who was blind – alone with two men in the shop for just a few moments while he went to get change. When he returned, he found Carswell dead in the back room of the shop.

On December 14, 2010, police released surveillance video from another building that showed two men leaving the scene of the murder shortly after it happened.

On December 15, NBC 24 reported as breaking news that two cousins, Luis Osley and Alexander Osley, turned themselves into Toledo police after seeing their pictures on television. The two will be charged in connection with Carswell's murder.

On December 16, the Osley's appeared in Toledo Municipal Court and allowed time to retain counsel. Chance Walser took a look at their violent past where they beat and tortured a Vietnam veteran back in the mid 1990s in a crime that horrified the city.
