Toledo's "Code Red" Buildings

An NBC24 Follow-up: The old warehouse that was destroyed Saturday in a two-alarm fire, it was one of 46 buildings that city officials call "Code Red" --- Meaning they are unsafe to occupy. NBC24 also learned that if a fire breaks out in one of these buildings labeled "Code Red", that Toledo fire crews will not go inside to battle the blaze. They will simply let the building burn to the ground and protect neighboring structures. But many of these old buildings are also homes to homeless people who could be trapped if the buildings burn. If a building is labeled "Code Red", Toledo fire crews will not search the structure, even if they believe someone might be inside. Officials tell NBC24 that they will not attempt to rescue anyone unless they actually see them in the building.

October 4, 2006

Residents Fed Up with Gun Range Noise

Residents in Perrysburg say they're fed up with the sound of gunfire next door and have organized to do something about it. Residents have presented a petition to shut down the Perrysburg Police Department's outdoor firing range. Residents living near and across the Maumee River from the range say they're constantly dealing with noise and other issues 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Dan Pollock can hear gunshots from his property and he is spearheading the effort to get it closed.

NBC24 covered the group's effort as they presented them to Perrysburg City Council.

Republican Mike DeWine said it was not an intentional snub of voters in Northwest Ohio, but the invitation slipped through the cracks. Republican candidate for Ohio governor Ken Blackwell not only ignored the invitation, but did not return NBC24's calls.

At Woodmore High, hundreds gathered to remember Todd Hatch. The 16 year old died when the car he was in, hit a tree and struck a sport utility. Two teens are still in serious condition. Todd's father wore his son's favorite shirt as he recalled his son's joy for life. Other relatives who spoke at the service Monday remembered Todd as a fun-loving, gifted guitar player with a talent for making people smile.

Disturbing Trend

A local teenager tried to kill himself by jumping out of the fourth floor of his school Thursday, and this seems to be a disturbing trend --- Kids killing themselves at or near their schools. The incident took place around 11 a.m. at the Toledo School for the Arts in Downtown Toledo. Police say the 13-year old boy was found lying here on the sidewalk after jumping from a fourth story window. He survived the fall, but he is seriously hurt. Police rushed to the school after a passer-by reported seeing the student lying, face down, screaming in pain. NBC24 was told he was alone in a band practice room when he jumped, breaking his back, leg and hand. And this isn't the first school suicide we've seen recently. Back in February, a teen committed suicide by hanging himself in the bathroom of Bowling Green High School. Since then, one Bowling Green student killed himself at home and two others tried.

Davis then tried to put her bra on the antenna of the car she was riding in, and it blew off causing a nearby car to swerve and flip over. Davis insists she took off the bra because her dog chewed on it, making it uncomfortable. Davis was sentenced to probation and 24 hours of community service, but was not fined. She is being sued by the driver of the car that crashed.

Ford: No Changes Expected in Maumee Decision

Ford Motor Company spokesperson told NBC24 Thursday that she doesn't expect a change in the decision to close the Maumee Stamping plant, despite a \$15.7 million incentive package submitted Wednesday by local officials. On Wednesday, leaders from the city of Maumee, Lucas County Commissioners, Toledo-Lucas County Port Authority, Congresswoman Marcy Kaptur, UAW Local 1892, as well as other state and local leaders submitted a \$15.7 million incentive package to Ford in the hopes to save the Maumee Stamping plant. In September, Ford announced it was closing the plant as part of a restructuring plan to turn the company around. The proposal includes an offer from the Toledo-Lucas County Port Authority to buy the stamping plant and lease it back to the company. The Port authority tells NBC 24 that they have offered to buy the plant at 50 percent of its appraised value and lease it back to Ford. The city of Maumee is offering cash for a job creation and retention program as well as tax exemptions. **NOTE:** In the end, Ford still stayed with its decision to close the plant.

COSI Future Unknown After Levy Fails

A Toledo tourist attraction asked for help from voters, but they've said no. A tax levy to raise money for the city's Center of Science and Industry -- or COSI -- has been rejected by a close margin of just over 1,500 votes. Officials with the science museum had warned they would run out of money in December and said the levy would determine COSI's future. They also said the measure would have raised property taxes for the average Lucas County homeowner by about \$5.00 per year.

City has \$10.6 Million Deficit

In an address to city council, Toledo Mayor Carty Finkbeiner said the Glass City has a budget problem to start fiscal year 2007. The City of Toledo is \$10.6 million in the hole. Mayor Finkbeiner delivered the proposed 2007 budget to city council Wednesday. He had to do it by Nov. 15 at 4 p.m., a state law. Councilman George Sarantou, who chairs the budget finance committee, says the first step is to form a committee to study ways to get the city out of the red. Sarantou says he doesn't expect any job cuts. By law the council must pass a balanced budget by March 30.

Eight priests who have been convicted or accused of child sex abuse continue to hold state-issued certificates to teach in private and religious schools, it was reported. Another priest convicted of possessing child pornography and a teacher who is not a priest but was accused of sexually touching a female student also have teaching permits, the report said. The Ohio Board of Education next week plans to revoke the teaching certificate for Stephen G. Rogers, a former religion teacher at Toledo's Central Catholic High School. He was convicted of possessing child pornography in 2003. The state also is investigating the certificates of the nine others. Only one is known to be still teaching, the report said.

Fr. Robinson Supporters Raise Money for Legal Defense

Some 300 supporters of Father Gerald Robinson showed up Sunday to raise money for his legal defense fund, in the hopes that the appeals process would lead to a new trial. Father Robinson, of course, was convicted of murder last May for killing Sister Margaret Ann Pahl at the former Mercy Hospital Chapel in April 1980. Supporters paid \$15 apiece for a chicken dinner at the Scott Park Banquet Room in South Toledo. The money raised will go towards Father Robinson's legal defense fund. Television cameras were not allowed inside the banquet hall. John Donahue, the attorney who will spearhead the appeal of Father Robinson's conviction, spoke with NBC24 in the hall's parking lot. Donahue had never met Father Robinson when the Catholic priest was convicted, but is now convinced that Robinson is innocent.

The Vatican raised concerns about the wedding ceremony because Katie Holmes had been raised catholic and there was an apparent interest in a dual ceremony.

Trucker Confesses To Killing Five Prostitutes

A truck driver on trial in the deaths of two women pleaded guilty to killing four women and taking part in the slaying of another. All the women were prostitutes whose bodies were found in the Toledo area between 2000 and 2005, prosecutors said. Dellmus Colvin, 47, pleaded guilty to aggravated murder and complicity to commit murder. In exchange, prosecutors agreed not to seek the death penalty. Dellmus Colvin shocked court observers, admitting to not only killing Jackie Simpson and Melissa Weber, but also three other women he wasn't even charged with murdering.

The Trial of Sonya Moussaed

Moussaed was charge with murdering her boyfriend's one year old daughter in April 2006. A Monroe County jury found Moussaed, 28, guilty of first degree murder in the beating death of one-year old Gracie Simmons. She was sentenced to live in prison. Detectives contended she killed her boyfriend's daughter at home while the child's father was gone at work. A child abuse expert testified Gracie appeared to have been punched, slapped, and shaken to the point that her head was bleeding, her skull was fractured, and her brain was swollen. A judge called this "the ultimate act of child abuse."

November 13, 2006

Powell: \$1 Million Bond Set in Weekend Arson

Wayne Stanton Powell is accused of starting a house fire in North Toledo that killed four people, including two children. Toledo police captured Powell, a former NBC24 Fugitive of the Week, days after the arson fire. He was arraigned on charges of aggravated murder, aggravated arson and felonious assault charges. The judge set his bond at \$1 million. This is a capital case where the Lucas County prosecutor will seek the death penalty. This case is expected to go to trial in 2007 and NBC24 will provide continuous coverage.
