January 31, 2007

Community Comes to Rescue of Elderly Couple

An outpouring of help for an elderly West Toledo couple after the city labeled their home a health hazard and a public nuisance. NBC24 first told the story on January 29, 2007 about the Fletchers. The elderly couple works hard to keep their home nice but was shocked when the city sent them a threatening letter because their fire wood was neatly stacked on the ground behind their home instead of on concrete or an 18-inch riser. Since the story aired, NBC24 has been flooded with e-mails and calls from people wanting to help the Fletchers. Our cameras were with the Fletchers when volunteers from the Cedar Creek Church showed up and surprised the Fletchers with a wood stand.

February / March 2007

Bluffton Bus Tragedy

The community of Bluffton, including Bluffton University went into mourning after a bus carrying the school's baseball team tumbled over the side of an Atlanta, GA highway overpass and slammed onto the pavement 30 feet below, killing five students, the driver and his wife. NBC24 provided continuing coverage of this tragedy including numerous fund-raising events, candlelight vigils, injury updates, and the team's first game on March 30, 2007 following the tragic crash

February / March 2007

Death of Toledo Police Detective Keith Dressel

Multiple Stories / Multiple Packages / Various Lengths / Multiple Live Remotes

On February 21, 2007, Toledo police detective Keith Dressel became the first Toledo police officer to be killed in the line of duty in 37 years. NBC24 provided continuous coverage of the tragedy including community support for the Dressel family. NBC24 provided information on numerous fund-raisers and donation points to help the Dressel family.

March 2007

North Toledo Block Watch

Following the murder of Toledo police detective, Keith Dressel, a North Toledo neighborhood tried to take back their streets. The area previously had a block watch program, but it disbanded because there was not enough interest or volunteers. As NBC24 news first reported, it took a detective's death to get a new group up and running.

BGSU Women Falcons Basketball Team in NCAA Tourney

New Robinson Middle School Dedication

On January 18, 2007, the new Robinson Middle School was officially dedicated at 9 a.m. at 1075 Horace St. Students, faculty, and TPS school board members took part of the dedication. The school's bell choir also performed. Students and faculty started to move from the old Robinson Junior High, 1007 Grand Ave., to its new location a block north over the December break. The state-of-the-art Toledo Public Schools middle school is part of the on-going building for success program started by former TPS superintendent Dr. Eugene Sanders. The TPS building for success program calls for 18 new schools to be built by 2011.

January 31, 2007

City Wants Cut Crossing Guard Funding

With a \$12 million budget deficit looming, Toledo lawmakers are making cuts that some critics say could put children's lives at risk. The city wants to cut \$600,000 from the budget that goes to fund 60 crossing guards for the Toledo Public Schools. The mayor says the city is too far in debt and it's time to let the school district pay for the crossing guards---or do away with them all together.

Toledo Public Schools Search for New Superintendent

After months of interviews, the Toledo Public School board made its choice for the next superintendent. Board members tapped Dr. William Harner out of Philadelphia. The announcement came on February 20, 2007 after two hours of closed-door deliberations by school board members. When the word came down, many people in the audience were clearly surprised by the decision. The board members' choice of Dr. Harner seems to signal a new direction for Toledo Public Schools. Dr. William Harner was the board's unanimous choice for superintendent.

February 9, 2007

Toledo Cracking Down on Truancy

The city of Toledo is cracking down on kids skipping class. Police are stepping up patrols searching everywhere - even the libraries - for truants. Police busted 23 kids skipping school on Wednesday and Thursday. They're starting weekly truancy sweeps to increase attendance. Mayor Carty Finkbeiner says it's an issue that hits close to home. "I had personal experience. My oldest daughter found it could be done, she and her boyfriend enjoyed a few hours away at the school they were attending," Mayor Finkbeiner said. Police are questioning kids to make sure they have legitimate excuses to miss class. Truancy arrests were up almost 20 percent last year.

March 29, 2007

School-To-Work Program

The IBEW's Toledo Electrical Joint Apprenticeship and Training Committee travels to seven area vocational Schools to teach students about its Apprenticeship Program. It's something these students can start immediately in IBEW Local 8's "School to Work" program and it turned Matt Dearth's life completely around. Dearth had become disinterested in school and doubted the value of his education. He needed inspiration. "It's a good job and wage and something to better yourself with. When you learn a skilled trade you can't take that away," he said. JATC provides a "School to Work" program. Every other week, high school seniors work 40-hours a week for hands-on electrical training. "And hopefully that way they can then make a more informed career decision," said JATC Training Director, David Wellington. This gave Dearth just the inspiration that he was looking for.

Lucas County Gets Mediocre Grade for Emergency Preparedness

A Department of Homeland Security report finds Lucas County is behind in adopting an advanced emergency communication system. In a report, the government says only six U.S. cities, including Columbus, have fully implemented advanced emergency communications systems. The Department of Homeland Security ranked 75 metropolitan areas for how well emergency agencies can communicate during a disaster. Toledo finished just barely ahead of Cleveland which was in the bottom six.

January 2007

Carty Finkbeiner Incident at Ottawa County Jail

Ottawa County Sheriff Robert Bratton released documentation on two December 2006 incidents involving Toledo Mayor Carty Finkbeiner and his wife at the Ottawa County Jail. According to documents faxed to NBC24 has received from Sheriff Bratton's office, Mayor Finkbeiner says that on Dec. 23 he and his wife were "treated less professionally that I believe we deserve." In a letter dated Jan. 2, 2007, Mayor Finkbeiner says his wife was denied access to the county jail's women's restroom during visiting hours. Then on Dec. 30 the mayor was denied a visit with his stepson, even though Mr. Finkbeiner arrived at the jail an estimated 28 minutes before visiting hours ended. In the letter Mayor Finkbeiner says the Ottawa County Jail staff was rude and arrogant. "Having been in public office for almost two decades, I recognize governmental arrogance when I see it," Mr. Finkbeiner stated in the letter to Sheriff Bratton. "I think less of the Port Clinton minimum-security system as a result of the rudeness and governmental arrogance displayed to first my wife, then me." In seven of the nine pages faxed to NBC24, Sheriff Bratton and his staff provide documentation in response to the December 2006 incidents with Mr. and Mrs. Finkbeiner. Sheriff Bratton says he has found no wrong doing.

January – March 2007

City of Toledo Budget Battle

During the first quarter 2007, NBC24 provided continuous coverage of the city of Toledo's budget battle. The city was looking at a projected \$12 million shortfall in 2007 and an anticipated \$17 million dollar deficit in 2008. Coverage included a trash collection fee, cutting school crossing guards, laying police, fire, and other city workers, as well as a reduction in some city services. The budget was passed according to state law before the March 31, 2007 deadline. It was passed on March 30, 2007, after two days of final city council hearings.

February 28, 2007

Iraq War Protesters Stage Sit-in

War protestors stage a "sit-in" claiming it's the only way people will pay attention to their message to end the war. Nearly a dozen people took their message to the street in front of One Government Center on Wednesday, but three other protestors decided to take a stand inside the Ohio building -- which landed them in handcuffs. Police say the three people, ranging in age from 61 to 78 years old, were blocking elevators, trying to send a message to Senator George Voinovich to end funding for the Iraq war. One protestor says she's doing it at the request of her son---a sailor serving his second tour in the mid-east.

March 14, 2007

Officials: Ohio Emergency Planning Still Falls Short

Emergency and health care officials from around Ohio say the state still isn't completely ready to handle a crisis on the level of a bioterrorist attack or flu pandemic. Meeting in Columbus Tuesday, they said gaps remain, such as the lack of a single overseer to coordinate among state and local agencies and hospitals.

The director of emergency preparedness for the Ohio Hospitals Association says one agency should be named the leader to develop an overall plan and performance standards for emergency service providers, hospitals and local governments. The officials brought together by the American College of Emergency Physicians plan to draw up recommendations for Ohio lawmakers.

Former Toledo Mayor Harry Kessler Passes Away at Age 79

Former Toledo Mayor Harry Kessler, the city's 54th mayor, has died. He was 79. Mr. Kessler died peacefully at Hospice of Northwest Ohio's Perrysburg facility Tuesday evening. Mr. Kessler, mayor from 1971-77, led the city's development of its riverfront and downtown. "Mayor Kessler was the truest example of unselfish giving and public leadership in my lifetime," said current Toledo mayor Carty Finkbeiner. "He was a great mayor. Then he was an excellent Toledo Public School Board member. Then he was a superb Toledo-Lucas County Library Board member. "He did each of the above, not for fame or fortune, but because he wanted to make a positive difference, and he did," Mayor Finkbeiner adds. "Harry Kessler was a consensus builder. He brought together business and labor, Republicans and Democrats and various people of differing opinions to improve Toledo."

The Toledo School Board named Deborah Barnett as its new president, succeeding Darlene Fisher whose one-year term expired, a TPS spokesperson said. The change came at Thursday's school board meeting. Steve Still was named Vice President of the school board. The TPS spokesperson said Barnett made the entire board sign an agreement to try and unify the board. "There is an effort of solidarity, to show some unity and an effort to work together," said Patty Mazur, Public Information Officer for Toledo Public Schools. Donovan Edwards, 82, beloved husband, father and grandfather, and often called the "dean of Toledo broadcast journalists," died January 25, 2007 peacefully at home with his beloved wife and family at his bedside. Don's award-winning 36 year career on Toledo television and radio began in 1962 when he joined WTOL-TV as a television anchor and became the first Toledo newscaster to anchor a live color broadcast. In 1973 he moved to morning radio with WSPD and later with WCWA and WWWM. He returned to television in 1990 as the news anchor for WNWO-TV. He retired from broadcasting in 1996. Authoritative, credible and respected, he set a standard for broadcast newsroom professionalism that continues to be mirrored in the efforts of writers, producers and on-air talent.

But his message packed quite a punch with B.G.S.U. students. There was no shouting and no pounding fists. Just a friendly conversation between Jackson and a few hundred college students. His message --- bridge the widening gap between the rich and the poor. "Money is making money," he said. "We saw ten billion dollars given on Wall Street in bonuses this year while we lost three million manufacturing jobs. And 50-million were without health insurance."

Little Aubree Has First Surgery

(Toledo, OH, and Chicago) -- A long day has come to an end for Christie Weidner and her daughter, Aubree. The first in what will be 20 years of surgeries is behind them. Last week, Christie and Aubree traveled to the Shriners Children's Hospital in Chicago for her first surgery in the long process of repairing her cleft lip and palate. For this young mother, facing the unknown was overwhelming.

"I didn't know what she was going through or the pain she'd be in after surgery," Christie tells NBC24. "I didn't know what to expect. It was nerve racking the entire time." The hours passed by and finally good news came from the doctors. The surgery was a success. But seeing her daughter in pain was devastating for Christie. "I felt like there was nothing I could do," she says. "She couldn't tell me what's wrong or what hurt." Just hours after the procedure, Aubree's new face is emerging. "I didn't know what to say when I saw her. She looked so different. She looked amazing and beautiful." Today this star patient is at home recovering and back to her old smiles again. But the next surgery is never too far off.

"I know she has 18-20 years of surgery," Christie says. "But we're taking it step by step and day by day."

Aubree will return to the Chicago area hospital in the next few days for a follow-up.

Toledo Police are warning that the web site Tagged dot com could be a new playground for online predators. Computer Crimes in Toledo were alerted to the site after a local elementary school girl, Danisha Macklin, 12, vanished with a 17 year old she met on the social networking site. The two left the Toledo area for three days before police found them together in Lima. Computer crimes investigators in Toledo are now taking a closer look at the site. NBC 24 examined the site and uncovered pictures of elementary school age kids in suggestive poses, some even wearing nothing but underwear. Several profiles, both young and old, had sexually graphic images. "What really bothers me is, I think there's going to be more problems than we know what to do with after kids get on these sites," said Lt. Met Stachura, Toledo Police Computer Crimes Unit. "We had a young girl missing this week, who met somebody on the Internet. That disturbs us."

After enduring years of pain, she has used her experience to help kids who suffer with skin diseases, and has created, "Camp Wonder", a place for them to have fun and not feel so self-conscious about their appearance. NBC24 was on-hand for the emotional ceremony. This will be the longest deployment that this many members of the 180th Fighter Wing will have seen, in the Iraq war. Wednesday, their families had the chance to give them a proper send-off. Tears of sadness mixed with tears of pride, as families said goodbye to their husbands and wives, headed for Baghdad. Tech. Sgt. T.W. Churchill, is leaving his wife and 16-month-old daughter. "I don't know what to expect," TSgt Churchill tells NBC24. "I'm looking forward to seeing all the structures, and history. It will be really neat to be part of everything over there." Forty members of the Civil Engineering Squadron will be deployed near Baghdad for up to six months.

Families Gather on Tenth Anniversary of Fatal Comair Flight

Ten years have passed since a Comair jet crash seared the souls of family members and friends of victims and spread pain and grief across Monroe County. Many of those affected will convene Tuesday at the memorial to remember 26 passengers and three crew members who died. Flight 3272 from Cincinnati / Northern Kentucky Airport was nearing Detroit Metropolitan Airport on the afternoon of Jan. 9, 1997, in a blinding snowstorm and bitter cold, pilot Dann Carlsen was beginning to maneuver the commuter jet to an approach pattern. The aircraft wasn't responding properly. With ice-encased wings, the plane nose-dived into a field close to a former church camp in Raisinville Township, near Monroe. The memorial is at Roselawn Memorial Park. "It's basically to bring everyone together and honor the ones that they lost," said Arlene Miasel, Carlsen's mother and a resident of Prior Lake, Minn. "I just want to make sure - because my son would have wanted it - to make sure that everyone is doing fine and let them know that I'm there for them," she said. "I want the volunteers who were at the crash - the fire department, the sheriff's department or whoever - to feel that they could come, too," Miasel said. "A lot of family members had questions about why the plane had the icing, and he might make them understand a little more of what happened," Miasel said. The National Transportation Safety Board determined that ice on the wings of the twin-engine Embraer EMB-120 plane caused the crash. More than 25 wrongful-death lawsuits were filed against Comair, based near Cincinnati in Erlanger, Ky., and Embraer after the crash. Settlements paid by the two companies amounted to nearly \$100 million.

Toledo Man Supports Family by Scrapping For a Living

A high-profile sting by Toledo police has shed light on the way some people in the glass city make money by finding and selling scrap metal. When you put trash out on your curb, the law says it's fair game for anyone who wants to come along and take it for themselves. Now, most trash, to be sure, just gets picked up by sanitation crews. But put out an old bed-frame, microwave or refrigerator, and odds are good that someone will sell it for scrap. All that glitters may not be gold, but if it's copper, brass, iron, steel or aluminum, that's nearly as good for people like Rob Alford. "I do what I do, he says." "I drive up and down the street, if I find stuff, I find it." The price of metal is getting more expensive and more worthwhile for him to sell at scrap yards. "On a daily basis I can make \$40-50," he says.

Alford goes to work when most are just getting home, because that's when they put out the trash.

He can't work his old job as a mechanic, because of back and leg injuries. Selling scrap helps pay for his medications. "I go Mondays around 5," he says, "to until about 9 or 10 at night. I work until I get a truckload. If I don't find anything I go home empty handed." When he collects his load, Alford brings it to Omni Source in North Toledo. There, they verify his ID, and weigh and record his haul, then pay him for the total. The Omni Source staff says when a company purchases stolen metal for scrap; it gives them all a bad name. On Monday another Toledo scrap yard was busted in an undercover sting. The owner and his son hauled away in cuffs. Omni Source staff says they'd much prefer to have honest customers, many of whom become almost family. "I've been here for 25 years," says Jeff Grunberg, Omni Source manager. "I've been seeing some of the same people for 25 years." Toledo police say almost every day they field reports of stolen metal, taken from homes and construction sites. Metal that thieves are trying to sell for scrap.

Last November, voters turned down a funding request and officials planned to shut down the start of this year. They only managed to stay open after people and foundations donated nearly a half million dollars. This anniversary could be its last, when money runs out at the end of this year. Its future could depend on a "do or die" vote this November. David Waterman, incoming COSI chairman, "We expect to go back to the voters in November, because we feel we have no option we have to get that eventually. If we try a second time and fail, we have no choice but to close." "The situation is grave at COSI for its continuance. Members of the community stepped up after the levy was barely defeated in November and managed to get it through to this next November," says Pete Gerken, Lucas County Commissioner. Officials are still deciding whether to go back to voters. COSI was just named "Best Science Museum in America" by Child magazine.

But most of it is tied to two things: the overall slump in the auto industry and so-called "predatory lending" practices. With high-paying blue collar jobs leaving the area, money's becoming scarce for lots of folks, making it hard for them to catch - and even harder to keep - the American dream. Theresa Kim's home is now up for sale. She has no choice; she can't afford to live here anymore. She was also a victim of so-called "predatory lending," taking on a mortgage with an adjustable rate that adjusted...upwards. After months of working eighty hours a week, she'd finally had enough. Since 1995, Lucas County has seen the number of home foreclosures rocket from just over 1,100 to more than 3,500, an increase of more than 200 percent.

Within the next few months, lawyers for Toledo priest Gerald Robinson will be crafting their appeal. Robinson's supporters maintain he is innocent -- despite his conviction in the 1980 murder of Sister Margaret Ann Pahl. And recently, I met one of Robinson's most passionate defenders -- a blogger, who will only be satisfied when the disgraced priest gets a new trial. Laura James is fascinated with murder. From her home in Detroit she authors the CLEW historic true crime blog. And she was caught up in the Robinson case from the beginning. James objected to the prosecution calling another Catholic priest as an expert on ritual. Father Jeffrey Grob saw disturbing symbols in the stab wounds on Sister Pahl's chest -- arrayed in the shape of an inverted cross. Laura James' blog has become an internet rallying point for Robinson supporters. Most in Toledo -- others around the world. James says only one thing will satisfy her, and that is testing DNA found on Sister Pahl's undergarments against that of confessed serial murderer Coral Watts. Watts has admitted killing 80 women -- some in and around Detroit -- during the same period as sr. Pahl's murder.

Adrian Daycare Provider Investigation

More charges are expected against an Adrian daycare provider, accused of molesting the children in his care. Police say they've identified another victim. But they fear there could be dozens more out there.

This case is so disturbing, the Adrian police detective who normally handles child sex crimes had to step down and turn the investigation over to another detective. And he says he can't even imagine how many victims there could be. Douglas Jay Clark made his first appearance in court today. Clark, 52, is accused of using his business, Guardian Family Daycare on Erie Street in Adrian as a place to prey on children. Police say they found pictures and videos of Clark molesting children when they searched his home. Investigators say they've now identified seven of the children in those videos. But they fear there could be many more victims. Police say one possible victim claims to have been molested by Clark more than 20-years ago. Police plan to file 27-more charges against Clark. That's on top of the 44-charges he already faced. Parents looking for a daycare provider should consider three tough questions before leaving their child.

Fight Breaks Out During East Toledo Murder Investigation

A fight broke out Saturday morning after upset family members started to interfere with an East Toledo murder investigation, police said. Sgt. Richard B. Murphy, Toledo Police spokesperson, told NBC24 that police were called out shortly after 9 a.m. on a report that a person was down inside an apartment at 1401 Mott near Elgin in East Toledo. A meter reader discovered the victim, Ricardo Horton, 29, of Toledo. She knocked on the door, but there was no response. She told police the interior door was open and she looked into the apartment. She thought it was vacant. She was about to leave when she saw the victim lying by the back door. She notified police. Neighbors told police that Horton and another person were outside the residence around midnight making lots of noise. Family members tell NBC24 that Horton was found shot. However, police would only say that the death was suspicious and the Horton suffered a wound to the head. He had been living there the last several months. While police were attempting to remove the body, some of Horton's family members wanted to see the body. They crossed the area marked by yellow tape and were confronted by authorities. One man was tazed during the confrontation. Police arrested Jerry Holbert, 22; Allen Sims, 30; Camille Daniels-Williams, 34; and Keith Stall Holbert, Sims, and Daniels-Williams, were charged with obstructing justice, resisting arrest, and misconduct in a police emergency. Holbert, 22, also has outstanding warrants --- Toledo Detectives were talking with him. Sims, 30, was the suspect who was tazed by Toledo police. The three were released Saturday afternoon.
