4/3 Denver7 News at 11pm Health Issues 2 minutes A funeral Home owner talks about the challenges of tending to those who have died during the Covid-19 pandemic, including a need for PPE supplies.

4/8 Denver7 News at 1pm Cultural Issues 2 minutes A group encouraging children to "walk in their shoes" by creating a therapeutic art program that allows them to tell their stories through the artwork on their shoes.

4/16 Denver7 News at 9am Housing & Transportation Issues 30 sec. DIA reported a 95% decline in passenger traffic from the following week as the impacts of the C-19 pandemic intensify.

4/24 Denver7 News at 11pm Cultural Issues 5 minutes Denver7 breaks down the offensive players picked up in rounds 2 & 3 of the virtual NFL draft.

5/1 Denver7 News at 1pm Health Issues 45 seconds Friends, family and community members line the procession route for a CO paramedic who died of C-19 after traveling to hard hit New York to help care for patients.

5/11 Denver7 News at 11pm Crime/Law & Order 4 minutes A Castle Rock Restaurant decides to open on Mother's Day to a packed house despite state orders. We take a deeper look at the legal ramifications and the rights of those hoping to open faster than the state.

5/14 Denver7 News at 1pm Health Issues 30 seconds Eight hospitals in CO receive shipments of an experimental C-19 treatment called Remdesivir.

5/18 Denver7 News at 9am Crime/Law & Order 40 seconds A woman from Boulder could face a year in jail for violating the 14 day quarantine requirement for travelers to Hawaii.

5/17 Denver7 News at 7pm Education/School 2 minutes Due to budget constraints from the C-19 pandemic, teachers are being asked to renegotiate their contracts and raises to help balance the budget. Teachers in Denver went on strike a year ago for raises.

5/19 Denver7 News at 11pm Health Issues 30 seconds Two medications used to treat children are being recalled. Robitussin and Dimetapp due to potential overdose risk.

5/22 Denver7 News at 1pm Housing/Transportation 90 seconds More emissions testing sites reopen, which is a huge relief to car owners who have suffered through long lines to get their cars inspected during the C-19 pandemic.

5/24 Denver7 News at 11pm Cultural Issues 50 seconds President Trump orders the reopening of churches and other places of faith with proper social distancing.

5/28 Denver7 News at 9am Environment/Energy 90 seconds Rocky Mountain National Park reopens following the C-19 pandemic, but it will require visitors to plan ahead and seek online reservations.

6/2 Denver7 News at 11pm Crime/Law & Order 3 minutes An in depth look at the use of force applied during protests in Denver over police brutality spurred by the case of George Floyd. Police explain the purpose of their various force while demonstrators question the response.

6/8 Denver7 News at 1pm Health Issues 2 minutes CO lawmakers consider a bill that would add hurdles to the process of allowing parents to opt their children out of vaccinations.

6/12 Denver7 News at 11pm Economic Issues 20 seconds As restaurants are allowed to begin reopening, Littleton decides to close its main street to cars so that restaurants can expand their seating into the streets.

05 Dr. Jennifer Eberhardt, Psychologist & Professor, Stanford University and author of *“Biased: Uncovering the Hidden Prejudice that Shapes What We See Think and Do”* shares a deeply personal story about police racism and abuse of power from her book. Unconscious or implicit bias can be defined as the beliefs and feelings that we have about social groups that can influence our actions even when we’re not aware of it. Even Jennifer’s own children display biases like this, as described in her book. Just because you have a bias doesn’t mean you’re racist, but it could grow into something that becomes more racist. A person’s environment can influence their bias and training about bias has been proven to effectively reduce bias.
