Cynthia McFadden and the news we dreaded we would hear. After 29 days in captivity, Wall Street Journalist Daniel Pearl is confirmed dead by the State Department. Apparently his death is caught on videotape. Primetime details the gentle, irreverent soul whose family, colleagues, and courageous wife who offered herself in Danny's place to Pakistani captors, will sorely miss. The injustice of a journalist who went to figure out the truth of terrorism be slain by terrorists stays with us all.

LET'S ROLL (Lisa Beamer Baby)

"He was just a little guy, but he was a big guy to us." For wife Lisa Beamer, these words sum up big kid husband Todd, who became a national hero when he tackled terrorists aboard United Flight 93 with the rallying cry "let's roll!" Wife and mother of two boys, she became the nation's symbol for strength in the face of loss when on Jan. 8th she gave birth to baby Morgan, infant with her Dad's full head of dark hair, a new little sister to brothers David and Drew, who will someday learn about her father's heroism. Lisa talks with Diane Sawyer about inducing a pregnancy she felt she couldn't go alone, The Todd Beamer Foundation she established to help the 22 other children who lost parents on Flight 93, her views against the bombing in Afghanistan, feelings on her recent rise to a unique kind of fame, and, like many parents before, what it's like to answer children's searing questions about death and memories.

It starts as a tragic traffic accident in Texas - Bart Moran is killed when he is thrown from his Chrysler vehicle. At first, everyone assumed his death resulted from his not wearing a seat belt. But his wife couldn't accept that answer...Bart was known as "Mr. Seatbelt" among friends and family. A detailed investigation, then a courtroom fight, and now there are many - including the jury - who believe Bart not only wore his seat belt, but that the seat belt was faulty and defective. Biggest surprise of all: there are today some 12 million vehicles like this one possibly on the road - comprising nearly half of all cars made by Chrysler, Plymouth and Dodge. Many children lost parents on 9/11. Some have joined a program to express their sorrow and grief through art. *Primetime* gets unusual access to visit perhaps one of 9/11's most creative and cathartic programs: art therapy sessions led by a therapist from Ridgewood, New Jersey, who accepts families regardless of their financial situation. 53 have joined so far. Some of the artwork and images are harrowing, but the process and discussion of their work shows the therapy's clearly helping. We also meet a family who lost their father in a sudden, tragic death during the month of September 1999. Thanks to the art therapy program, it's been 2 years after the tragedy but the children are finally able to smile, talk openly about their father, and share some of their artwork with Jay Schadler. The contrast between children who lost parents on 9/11 and these kids is a stark one, but over time there is hope they will move on and gain new perspective...Jackie Payson producing.

Some, like Dr. Lawrence D'Angelo, say no...and claim 16 might just be the worst age for teens to get licenses...for both physical and psychological reasons.
