

QUARTERLY LIST OF PROGRAMMING PROVIDING THE MOST SIGNIFICANT TREATMENT OF COMMUNITY ISSUES

JULY 1 – SEPTEMBER 30, 2023

The following issues were identified as significant and addressed by WMTV in order to serve the community and act in the public interest as set forth by the Federal Communications Commission:

- **1. Education** Class sizes, Connectivity, Teacher Retirements, School Referenda and Student Safety. They've long been issues of importance to our local viewers. Because of the pandemic, we've branded our commitment to these issues as "Navigating School".
- **2. Politics** This will include issue-based stories from all levels, with an emphasis on local and state, and the Presidential and Congressional elections.
- **3.** Local Business and Tourism This is for coverage of events bringing tourism dollars into the viewing-area and what may affect turnout. (Fairs, festivals, sporting events, parks, playgrounds, activities, accommodation, etc.)
- **4. Consumer Concerns** We've renewed our commitment to investigative journalism and other consumer-driven stories (scams, recalls, problem solving). Stories branded under the "NBC15 Investigates" franchise will be targeted to this category unless they fit another category better.
- **5. Severe Weather and Preparedness** for First Alert Days, our Weather Radio programming events, and other stories where we've assigned additional resources to cover storms (on approach, during and the aftermath).
- **6. COVID-19** This category is to detail coverage of the decisions and impact of decisions made by our legislative leaders, the toll on and also research being done at our local health care facilities, as well as impact on the workforce.
- **7. Crime and Public Safety** Increased gang activity, violent crimes, stolen vehicles, home break-ins, and gun control.
- **8. Agriculture --** Wisconsin, dubbed America's Dairyland, currently leads the nation in farm bankruptcies. Farmer mental health and access to resources is a concern amid growing suicides. The state's governor has also prioritized initiatives and legislation to help our ag industry. Millions of dollars were also earmarked to help farmers impacted by COVID-19 and to help get food to the hungry. *NOTE: This category will include legislative proposals and action.*
- **9.** Community Impact/Outreach This will be for stories re: personal appearances made by NBC15 Staff. It will also include the NBC15 School Shout Out (where classrooms wish our viewers good morning) AND our hallmark Share Your Holidays Campaign to raise funds for Second Harvest Foodbank of Southern Wisconsin.

7/14, 4:30AM: CLOSER TO HOME, TORNADO WARNINGS IN ROCK AND WALWORTH COUNTIES WERE BEING MONITORED YESTERDAY. PLUS SEVERE THUNDERSTORM WARNINGS IN SURROUNDING COUNTIES.

7/17, 11AM: HIGH WINDS AND HAIL FELL IN PARTS OF THE COUNTY. IN MERRIMAC, ABOUT AN INCH OF RAIN POURED DOWN IN ABOUT 15 MINUTES AROUND 8 PM. NO TORNADOES WERE SEEN BUT STRAIGHT-LINE WINDS WHIPPED THROUGH THE TOWN AND TOPPLED TREES AND LEFT OTHER DAMAGE. NEIGHBORS SAY SIRENS DID NOT GO OFF AND IN MANY CASES THEY WON'T BE USED FOR STRAIGHT-LINE WINDS.

9/5, 4:30 AM: STUDENTS AT THE METROPOLITAN SCHOOL DISTRICT WILL HAVE CLASS TODAY. THE DISTRICT DOES NOT CLOSE FOR HEAT UNLESS THE DAYTIME HEAT INDEX REACHES 105 DEGREES OR HIGHER.

9/15, 6PM: THE DNR IS ISSUING A SPECIAL FIRE ORDER BECAUSE OF THE ONGOING DROUGHT.

VI. COVID-19

NBC 15 News (news stories average 1:00 – 2:00 minutes in length)

7/18, 6PM: REPUBLICANS ARE MAKING A NEW EFFORT TO BLOCK GOVERNMENT AGENCIES FROM CLOSING CHURCHES DURING EMERGENCIES. THIS COMES IN RESPONSE TO LIMITS ON CHURCH GATHERINGS AT THE START OF THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC. GOVERNOR TONY EVERS VETOED AN EARLIER EFFORT TO BLOCK GOVERNMENT CLOSURES AND RESTRICTIONS ON CHURCHES DURING EMERGENCIES. NOW REPUBLICANS ARE TRYING TO GO AROUND THE GOVERNOR WITH A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT. IT'S A LONG PROCESS THAT REQUIRES APPROVAL FROM TWO CONSECUTIVE LEGISLATIVE SESSIONS AND THEN FROM VOTERS IN A STATEWIDE REFERENDUM.

7/13, 5PM: UPDATED COVID SHOTS SHOULD BE READY BY THE END OF SEPTEMBER. IN A LETTER TO MANUFACTURERS, THE HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES SECRETARY TOLD THE COMPANIES THEY SHOULD PREPARE AN AMPLE SUPPLY.

7-14, 4PM: THE CDC IS FACING BIG FUNDING CUTS AND SOME OF THE EFFECTS WILL BE FELT AT THE STATE AND LOCAL LEVEL. THE AGENCY IS POISED TO LOSE ABOUT ONE POINT THREE BILLION DOLLARS IN FUNDS AS A RESULT OF LAST MONTH'S FEDERAL DEBT CEILING NEGOTIATION. THE MONEY WAS INITIALLY ALLOCATED THROUGH COVID SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING. THE CUTS WILL DIRECTLY IMPACT STATE AND LOCAL HEALTH DEPARTMENTS.

8/1, 4 PM: ACCORDING TO DATA FROM THE CENTERS FOR DISEASE CONTROL AND PREVENTION -- COVID HOSPITALIZATIONS ARE UP 12% NATIONWIDE. UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA INFECTIOUS DISEASE DOCTOR DAVID WOHL SAYS THE SUMMERTIME SURGE IS LIKELY DUE TO PEOPLE SPENDING MORE TIME INDOORS.

8/8, 5 PM: BACK TO SCHOOL IS AROUND THE CORNER AND YOU MAY WANT TO ADD THIS TO YOUR SCHOOL SUPPLY LIST, AN AT-HOME TEST FOR COVID. DOCTORS SAY IT'S RELIABLE AS YOU MAY HAVE NOTICED CHANGES WHEN IT COMES TO GETTING OTHER KINDS OF TESTS.

8/9, 11 AM: ACCESS TO COVID-19 TESTING IS CHANGING. IN THE THICK OF THE PANDEMIC, YOU MAY REMEMBER MOST TESTS WERE FREE AT PHARMACIES OR CLINICS.

8/16, 10 PM: THE NEW CDC DIRECTOR VISITED PUBLIC HEALTH MADISON AND DANE COUNTY. IT WAS HER FIRST PUBLIC VISIT AS DIRECTOR. SHE'S IS HOPING IMMUNIZATION NUMBERS GET BACK TO PRE-PANDEMIC LEVELS AS SCHOOL STARTS FOR ANOTHER YEAR. SHE SAYS SCIENTISTS ARE WORKING ON A NEW COVID BOOSTER THAT WILL BE AVAILABLE THIS FALL.

8/22, 9 PM: IN PERSON VISITATION AND PROGRAMMING IS SUSPENDED IN THE DANE COUNTY JAIL DUE TO A COVID-19 OUTBREAK. WE JUST GOT WORD FROM THE SHERIFF'S OFFICE THAT 49 RESIDENTS HAVE TESTED POSITIVE IN JAIL. THOSE INFECTED ARE NOW ISOLATED IN FOUR CITY COUNTY BUILDING CELL BLOCKS AND TWO PUBLIC SAFETY BUILDING HOUSING UNITS. THE OFFICE SAYS RESIDENTS ARE BEING TREATED IN JAIL AND IF CONDITIONS WORSEN THEY WILL BE TRANSPORTED TO THE HOSPITAL.
