

# QUARTERLY LIST OF PROGRAMMING PROVIDING THE MOST SIGNIFICANT TREATMENT OF COMMUNITY ISSUES

## **APRIL 1 – JUNE 30, 2021**

The following issues were identified as significant and addressed by WMTV in order to serve the community and act in the public interest as set forth by the Federal Communications Commission:

- 1. Education Class sizes, Connectivity, Teacher Retirements, School Referenda and Student Safety. They've long been issues of importance to our local viewers. This year, because of the pandemic, we've branded our commitment to these issues as "Navigating School." We also have a special, year-long series called "Class During COVID," where we are following 5 different classrooms and sharing monthly reports (the classes range from Kindergarten to College and include virtual, in person and blended models).
- **2. Politics** This will include issue-based stories from all levels, with an emphasis on local and state, and the Presidential and Congressional fall elections. There is a renewed push in Wisconsin for redistricting and a non-partisan board is set to hold statewide hearings, in advance of a legislative vote in 2021.
- **3.** Local Business and Tourism Due to the impact of the pandemic, we've launched a new series "Supporting Our Small Businesses." Stories airing as part of that project -OR- those touching on the impact of cancelled events—due to the pandemic and/or demonstrations and looting downtown will fall under this category. This is also for coverage of events bringing tourism dollars into the viewing-area.
- **4. Consumer Concerns** We've renewed our commitment to investigative journalism and other consumer-driven stories (scams, recalls, problem solving). Stories branded under the "NBC15 Investigates" franchise will be targeted to this category unless they fit another category better.
- **5. Severe Weather and Preparedness** for First Alert Days, our Weather Radio programming events, and other stories where we've assigned additional resources to cover storms (on approach, during and the aftermath).
- **6. COVID-19 Pandemic** This category is to detail coverage of the decisions and impact of decisions made by our legislative leaders, the toll on and also research being done at our local health care facilities, as well as impact on the workforce.
- 7. Social Justice This explores race relations within our communities, including the heightened tensions and demonstrations in downtown Madison, in particular.
- **8. Crime and Public Safety** Increased gang activity, stolen vehicles and home break-ins, gun control. Stories fitting the "social justice" category will not go here.

- **9. Community Impact/Outreach** This will be for stories re: personal appearances made by NBC15 Staff. It will also include the NBC15 School Shout Out (where classrooms wish our viewers good morning), our hallmark Share Your Holidays Campaign (celebrating its 25th year in 2020 to raise funds for Second Harvest Foodbank of Southern Wisconsin), the CareBox Campaign (to raise funds supporting \$10 boxes of healthy, fresh food for those impacted by the pandemic), and our "Something to Smile About" and "Making A Difference" franchises featuring the good deeds of people in our viewing area.
- 10. Agriculture -- Wisconsin, dubbed America's Dairyland, currently leads the nation in farm bankruptcies. Farmer mental health and access to resources is a concern amid growing suicides. The state's governor has also prioritized initiatives and legislation to help our ag industry in his 2020 State of the State speech in January. Millions of dollars were also earmarked to help farmers impacted by COVID-19 and to help get food to the hungry. *NOTE: This category should include legislative proposals and action vs. including it in "politics."*
