Issue: Energy

Topic: Wyoming's Congresswoman Cynthia Lummis has been appointed to chair the U.S. House of Representatives' Science Subcommittee on Energy. The subcommittee will oversee energy research, development and demonstration projects. Lummis spoke with Rebecca Martinez from the Capitol press room in Cheyenne this week about how this assignment should benefit Wyoming.

Topic: The School of Energy Resources at the University of Wyoming is funded in large part with money from the energy industry. Other universities have gotten heat lately for not being open enough with their funding sources. Wyoming Public Radio's Irina Zhorov reports that some stakeholders are concerned about too much influence from energy at UW, but SER promises transparency.

Topic: Coal producers in the U.S. are looking to markets abroad to make up for decreasing demand at home. That's when raw resources are processed into more complex fuels and energy instead of just being burned. Wyoming Public Radio's Irina Zhorov spoke with CEO of the Wyoming Business Council, Bob Jensen, and manager at the Idaho National Lab, Richard Boardman, about why value added projects are important and what Wyoming can do to get on board.

Ozone levels have been so high that they violate federal standards, and the Environmental Protection Agency has given Wyoming three years to fix the problem.

Topic: Thanks to the occasional national scandal those who lobby government officials don't always have the best reputation. A lobbyist is someone who tries to persuade legislators to support measures that benefit his or her employer or special interest. But while big money and gifts make a big difference on Capitol Hill, those involved in the legislative process say that in Wyoming...it's more about trust and relationships. Wyoming Public Radio's Bob Beck reports.

Topic: Wyoming's Senior US Senator Mike Enzi is the Ranking Member on the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor and Pensions... and also sits on the budget and finance committees. Wyoming Public Radio's Rebecca Martinez spoke with him about a number of issues the Senate will be facing this year. Enzi says he thinks Congress has been neglecting the role of committees, and that's why it's been harder to get things done.

Topic: Wyoming's congressional delegation isn't happy with what they heard in President Obama's second inaugural address. Topic: Sublette County violates federal air quality standards, because of high levels of ozone, or smog. The ozone forms when emissions from oil and gas development mix together, under certain weather conditions. The Wyoming Department of Environmental Quality is responsible for fixing the problem, but there are a lot of unknowns about how ozone forms. Now, researchers at the University of Wyoming are trying to find some answers. We're joined now by Rob Field. He's an atmospheric scientist, and he's been monitoring air quality in Sublette County for several years.

Topic: In recent years the state legislature has seen an increase in conservative Republicans who are focusing more on personal rights and freedoms. Those rights range from removing federal restrictions on gun laws, to voting against anything that might resemble a tax. They've had mixed success with this approach, but they see their role in the state legislature as important. But others wonder if they're consistent. Wyoming Public Radio's Bob Beck reports from Cheyenne.

Topic: Frequently during the legislative session you will hear lawmakers refer to Wyoming's Permanent Mineral Trust fund. The fund was established in 1974 by then Governor Stan Hathaway and it is funded by a portion of severance taxes or taxes paid by the energy industry and occasional money deposited by the legislature. Income from the fund can be used to pay for government. It has a market value of roughly 5.6 billion dollars. It's viewed as a key part of Wyoming's funding future. Topic: It's been over a week since the Wyoming legislature wrapped up the 2013 session. The other surprise was that the interaction between legislators and the public got heated at times, especially during debate on gun bills. Wyoming Public Radio's Bob Beck spoke with a number of legislators about the session and has this report.

Issue: Education

Topic: The Wyoming Legislature is considering a few bills that would change the way the Department of Education is run. This week, the Senate Education Committee voted to have a governor-appointed director to oversee education issues in the state and redefine duties of the State Superintendent. Alternately, the House has plans for the State Board of Education, will consider removing the Superintendent as a voting member of the Board of Education. The board would become a state agency, and be in charge of education accountability. Ron Micheli is the chairman-elect for the State Board of Education, and he has some reservations about these proposed changes. He spoke with Wyoming Public Radio's Rebecca Martinez.

Topic: The Wyoming House of Representatives has joined the State Senate in passing a bill that would strip a number of powers from the State Superintendent and give them to a Governor appointed Director of Education. The Superintendent would remain on state boards and commissions with the other four elected officials. But the new Director would run the State Department of Education. Top lawmakers crafted the legislation right before the legislative session; and many believe that the legislature is moving too quickly. But some observers say the move is overdue. In other interviews Sternberg has made it clear that a key focus of his will be on improving academics at UW and he is also a big supporter of athletics. Wyoming Public Radio's Bob Beck asked him to talk about a few other issues.

Topic: The Master of Fine Arts in Creative Writing program has invited poet and labor activist Mark Nowak to serve as its Eminent Writer in Residence for a few weeks this year. Nowak has sat in on writing classes and read student manuscripts, but during his weeks in Wyoming, he organized four writing workshops in the Cheyenne and Laramie communities, where he and MFA grads encouraged workers from various trades to write poetry about their own experiences in the workplace. Wyoming Public Radio's Rebecca Martinez sat in on one workshop in Laramie.

Topic: Schools across the country have embraced sweeping anti-bullying measures in recent years. Universities and schools districts are encouraging teachers to celebrate diversity and discourage exclusionary language, but at the upcoming Shepard Symposium on Social Justice, the University of Wyoming will host a group that say teachers need to be *explicit* about their acceptance of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer or questioning students. Wyoming Public Radio's Rebecca Martinez spoke with educators in Laramie about their thoughts on the topic and filed this report.

Issue: Environment

Topic: The Department of Environmental Quality hosted a meeting on Thursday to discuss how it plans to fix Sublette county's air quality problems. Emissions from oil and gas production in the area have caused ozone, or smog, to form at levels that exceed federal limits. Wyoming Public Media's Willow Belden has the story.

Topic: Last year was the driest year Wyoming has seen in more than a century, and the dry spell has not let up. As a result, farmers and ranchers have had to make tough decisions and are deeply concerned about their livelihood for the coming year. Wyoming Public Radio's Willow Belden reports.

Date: 2-1-13 at 3pm and 2-3-13 noon on WPR. At 2-3-13 at 9am on WPM.

Topic: University of Wyoming just initiated a new program out of its burgeoning School of Energy Resources. The professional land management concentration will train landmen. Those are people who look for untapped oil and gas and other resources and negotiate contracts between their owners and companies that want to develop them. Wyoming Public Radio's Irina Zhorov reports that the program is just in time.

Topic: The Natural Resources Conservation Service is finishing up surveying the soil in Wyoming. They've been working on the project for decades, and they've completed surveys in most of the counties in the state. We're joined now by James Bauchert, the acting state soil scientist. He says the survey is part of a national effort to inventory, or map out, all the soils in the U.S.

Topic: Sublette County has an ozone problem. Ozone is produced by emissions from the oil and gas fields and contributes to smog, which can cause health problems. Several times in the past few years, ozone levels have exceeded federal limits, and the Environmental Protection Agency has given Wyoming three years to fix the problem. The Wyoming Department of Environmental Quality has been working with local residents and industry to come up with a solution. But that's hard to do, because nobody understands the exact chemistry of ozone formation. Wyoming Public Radio's Willow Belden reports that research funded by DEQ may finally be close to providing answers.

Topic: Last year, a task force of citizens, energy industry reps, and local leaders got together to tackle the ozone problem in Sublette County. They came up with a list of recommendations for the Department of Environmental Quality. Among other things, they called for tougher regulations on industry and more rigorous air quality monitoring. In January, the Department of Environmental Quality met with the task force to discuss how they would respond to the recommendations. They said nothing was off the table, but that some recommendations could take a long time to implement. Wyoming Public Radio's Willow Belden spoke with residents and members of the task force to find out what they thought of DEQ's response.

Topic: The University of Wyoming is part of two weather modification studies. The first is the Wyoming Weather Modification Pilot Project, and the second, companion project is the Silver Iodide Seeding Cloud Impact Investigation, or ASCII. Both studies are trying to learn more about atmospheric processes and whether people can do anything to eke more moisture out of the skies. Professor Bart Geerts heads the ASCII campaign, which is finishing up its second and last year.

Topic: A small corner of southeast Wyoming sits over the Ogallala Aquifer. The Ogallala is a huge aquifer that stretches from Wyoming and Nebraska all the way to Texas. It's a key source of water for agriculture, but it's being depleted faster than it can recharge. So the Natural Resources Conservation Service is trying to help save it. Here in Wyoming, they're doing that by encouraging farmers to give up their water rights. Wyoming Public Radio's Willow Belden reports.

Topic: Wyoming's chief game warden, Brian Nesvik, tells Willow Belden the smoothness of this year's wolf hunt shows that the state's wolf management plan is sound. But Sylvia Fallon, the director of the wildlife conservation project for the Natural Resources Defense Council, disagrees. Her group is one of several environmental organizations that's suing the U-S Fish and Wildlife Service over its decision to remove Wyoming wolves from the Endangered Species List. She says state quotas for how many wolves can be killed are too generous. They both join us.

Topic: Every year, the Bureau of Land Management removes thousands of horses from public land in Wyoming. They ship most of the horses to long-term holding facilities in the Midwest. But that's expensive ... and they're running out of space. So now the BLM has partnered with ranchers to create a so-called horse "ecosanctuary" right here in the Cowboy State. It's the first of its kind in the nation. Wyoming Public Radio's Willow Belden reports.

It's the first hunting-related grizzly death in the park. Rebecca Huntington has more.

Topic: A problem for children who are diagnosed with cancer in Wyoming is finding local care. Treatment typically requires long drives to cities. But Wyoming's Comprehensive Cancer Control Program is trying to change that. The program has hired an Oncologist who specializes in pediatric care to come to Casper once a month to treat children. Plans are underway to get more doctors involved in the effort. The Pediatric Oncologist is Doctor John Dr. vanDoorninck. He joined Wyoming Public Radio's Bob Beck at the State Capital to discuss the program.

Topic: The Wyoming Department of Health is encouraging Wyomingites to test the concentration of radon in their homes this winter, because it's the time of year that houses aren't well-ventilated, and the cancer-causing gas is more likely to rise up to living areas. The Environmental Protection Agency estimates that radon kills about 20,000 people per year. Wyoming Public Radio's Rebecca Martinez spoke with Dr. Wallace Akerley, director of thoracic oncology at the Huntsman Cancer Institute in Utah. She started by asking him what radon is, exactly.
