Seguridad	Despierta América	10/04/2017	0:30	Yahoo on Tuesday (October 3) said that all 3 billion of its accounts were hacked in a 2013 data theft, tripling its earlier estimate of the size of the largest breach in history, which already had spawned a nationwide lawsuit. Yahoo said last December that data from more than 1 billion user accounts was compromised in 2013, the largest of a series of thefts that forced Yahoo to cut the price of its assets in a sale to Verizon Communications, its current owner. Yahoo on Tuesday said "recently obtained new intelligence" showed all user accounts had been affected. However, the company said the investigation indicated that the stolen information did not include passwords in clear text, payment card data, or bank account information. Verizon in February lowered its original offer by \$350 million for Yahoo assets in the wake of two massive cyber attacks at the internet company.
Salud	Despierta América	10/19/2017	0:28	Belgian scientists say they've made a research breakthrough in the relationship between sugar and cancer. Researchers found yeast with high levels of the sugar known as glucose overstimulated the same proteins often found mutated inside human tumors, making cells grow faster. The finding, published in Nature Communications on Friday, aims to shed light on how cancer

				develops. The research is able to explain the correlation between the strength of the Warburg effect and tumor aggressiveness.
Salud	Despierta America	11/14/2017	0:25	Eleven health organizations published new guidelines Monday that lower the threshold for what is considered high blood pressure. The parameters indicate patients should now be treated when blood pressure reaches one-hundred thirty over eighty. Those numbers used to be considered normal. Treatment was not previously indicated until blood pressure reached one-hundred forty over ninety. Under the new guidelines, one hundred and three million Americans -- or forty-six per cent of the population -- have hypertension. That's thirty-one million more Americans than under the old definition. According to the report, most of the newly diagnosed patients will not need medication. They can manage their blood pressure through lifestyle changes like exercise.
Seguridad	Despierta America	11/22/2017	1:00	Toys R Us has recalled nearly 30,000 wiggle balls that could pose a choking hazard for infants. The recall involves "Bruin Infant Wiggle Ball" toys, which are also called giggle balls. No deaths have been reported, but there have been six reports received of rubber knobs breaking off, including four reports of pieces of product found in children's mouths. The wiggle ball's plastic back can also detach, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission warned Thursday. The toys being recalled were sold at Toys R Us and Babies R Us stores across the U.S. and Canada from June 2016 through January 2017. They were manufactured in China, and have the model number "5F6342E" printed on them. Toys R Us has told shoppers to immediately stop using the recalled balls, and to take them back to its stores for a full refund.
Salud	Despierta America	12/19/2017	0:22	One study measured the daily radiation amount of nearly 1,000 women. Among the most exposed, the rate of pregnancy loss tripled the normal. The radiation produced by cell phones, wireless networks and power lines, which is increasingly common, presents particular risks for pregnant women. An investigation revealed that those most exposed to this type of radiation suffered spontaneous abortions almost three times more than the average. The study, conducted in San Francisco and Oakland by Keizer Permanente, gave the 913 participants an EMDEX Lite device, which measures the electromagnetic fields that create these radiations. He asked him to keep it with him for 24 hours and to keep a diary of the activities that were taking place that day. For the interviews, 453 women who had had what De-Kun Li, the main author of the work, considered "a typical exposure", that is, normal work and common recreational activities, were selected.

The bra, known as EVA, was developed with three friends through his company Higia Technologies, and was created primarily for women with genetic predisposition to cancer. Equipped with around 200 biosensors, the bra maps the surface of the breast and is able to monitor changes in temperature, shape and weight.

Inspectors "identified vulnerabilities with TSA's screener performance, screening equipment and associated procedures," according to a statement from the Department of Homeland Security. The statement added that the findings remain classified but that eight recommendations have been made to the TSA to improve checkpoint security. It is not clear what those recommendations are.

The vote was 227-205, with 13 House Republicans joining all Democrats to oppose the bill. The guidelines are cautious. They state that some scientific studies have linked long-term, frequent cell phone use with brain cancer, low sperm count, and learning, hearing and sleep issues. They note that the risks may be higher for children.

The core of Nate, where there are sustained winds of 90 mph, was speeding toward the mouth of the Mississippi River and an expected landfall during the night along the coasts of southeastern Louisiana or Mississippi. Soaking rains were already present in Alabama, Louisiana and

				<p>Mississippi. New Orleans Mayor Mitch Landrieu told residents to wrap up what they were doing and move to a safe place. "We're in the fight now. The storm is on us," Landrieu told his city of some 400,000 people, 440,000 when you count the tourists this weekend. The mayor told them to keep an eye on the latest developments, but remember that a Category 1 or 2 hurricane is still very powerful. "It's going to hit you hard, it's going to hit you fast," Landrieu said. Landrieu said he visited the city's drainage pumps facilities and he was pleased with the conditions. He was not pleased that some in the low-lying city were having hurricane parties.</p>

He added that the island territory's existing debt and infrastructure issues compounded problems. His tweets come at a time when only about 10 percent of the island's 3.4 million residents have electricity, Puerto Rico's government &lt; said Tuesday. Guaynabo, a city the president and first lady Melania Trump visited, is also reportedly still without power" Flashlights, you don't need 'em anymore. You don't need 'em anymore," the president said as he passed them out to city residents.</p> <p>He also tossed paper towels into the crowd of people gathered around him during the visit. Trump's administration faced criticism for its initial response, as Puerto Rican lawmakers begged him to help as basic necessities like food and clean water became scarce.</p>
Seguridad	Noticiero Univision	11/05/2017	1:53	<p>A gunman clad in all black, with a ballistic vest strapped to his chest and a military-style rifle in his hands, opened fire on parishioners at a Sunday service at a small Baptist church in rural Texas killing at least 26 people and turning this tiny town east of San Antonio into the scene of the country's newest mass horror.</p> <p>The gunman was identified as Devin Patrick Kelley, 26. Mr. Kelley, who lived in New Braunfels, Tex., died shortly after the attack. He had served in the Air Force at a base in New Mexico but was court-martialed in 2012 on charges of assaulting his wife and child. He was sentenced to 12 months' confinement and received a "bad conduct" discharge in 2014, according to Ann Stefanek, the chief of Air Force media operations. The motive for the attack was unclear on Sunday, but the grisly nature of it could not have been clearer: Families gathered in pews, clutching Bibles and praying to the Lord, were murdered in cold blood on the spot.</p>

Salud	Noticiero Univision	12/14/2017	2:00	Millions of Americans are signing up for 2018 coverage through the Affordable Care Act, defying the Trump administration's hostility to the law and a year-long campaign by congressional Republicans to repeal it. As a final enrollment deadline approaches Friday for consumers in 39 states, sign-ups appear likely to fall short of the 2017 total, due in part to a truncated sign-up period this year. Enrollment will continue into January in several large states, including California and New York. But the 2018 enrollment period - the first run by the Trump administration - has nevertheless defied expectations and the predictions of the president, who repeatedly proclaimed the insurance marketplaces dead. "The administration has done what it can to limit sign-ups," said Sandy Praeger, a Republican who served for 12 years as Kansas insurance commissioner and was president of the National Assn. of Insurance Commissioners. As of last week, nearly 4.7 million people had signed up for a 2018 health plan through HealthCare.gov, the online federal insurance marketplace that serves consumers in 39 states.
